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The Significance of Work Camps

"A work camp is a group of people living together under simple conditions and working on a voluntary basis to meet some community need."—Max Parker.

The work camp movement dates from the formation of Service Civil International by Pierre Cerezole in 1920 as an attempt to foster goodwill between peoples who had been divided by the hatreds and suspicions of World War I. The movement first reached Ceylon when the World University Service and the Institute of Social Work together organised the Hanwella Work Camp in June 1955. Since then several other Work Camps have been organised under various auspices, perhaps the most ambitious camps have been the ones organised during the long vacation of 1960. The Manawa International Work Camp to rehabilitate a backward community was a joint project of the S. C. I. and the Shramadana The Moladanda Work Movement. Camp Training Project was co-sponsored by the Co-ordinating Council for Work Camps in Ceylon and the Central Ceylon Youth Cuuncil, There is every sign that the work camp has caught the imagination of the youth of this country.

The benefits a work camp may confer on the area where it operates have a significance far beyond the material aspects. A new cottage would mean more than meeting the need for shelter of a rural family, it would convey the ideal of a higher standard of comfort and dignity in living to the entire village. A built up well or a sanitary lavatory would signify a higher standard of hygiene. A new village road such as the one that has now linked Moladanda with the main road system and enabled a motor vehicle to reach the village for the first time in history is a symbol of the far-reaching effects of modern means of communication. With the

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it, the village is bound to share in the economic and social development of the area. Not only persons and goods can now move to and fro but newspapers and books and the radio will reach the village and the children find schools more accessible. In the wake of all these changes new ideas will enter the remote rural areas. It is true that urban society is a freer and richer society than the rural, but what is desirable is not the migration of rural folk to the towns but the enrichment of rural life by bringing the freedom and amenities of the towns to the remotest villages.

The gain to camp participants will be no less valuable than to the people of the village. If the aim of education covers the education of the worker, the man and the citizen. the work camp is a school to achieve all three aspects of the educational The work camp however is pre-eminently a school for citizenship. Aristotle discovered long ago that men do not acquire virtues by talking about them but by practising them. Citizenship education is

road and the wheeled traffic now on - most effective when it is instilled by organising it as an experience. For one thing camp life and manual labour provide a severe discipline. that much of this code of discipline is self-imposed strengthens character. For another, the leadership in a work camp has to justify itself. In a feudal society leadership goes by birth; in a totalitarian state it goes by political ideology. But in the democratic conditions of a work camp the leader's authority stems from his character and his efficiency at the work site no less than in the house meeting. Perhaps the distinctive gain in a work camp consists of the fellowship generated by shared service and shared living. international work camp persons of different countries are brought together and this contributes towards sowing the seeds of better international understanding. In a work camp like that of Moladanda urban and rural youth shared in a common endeavour. The participation in the project of large numbers of men and women from the village and teams from neighbouring villages increased the area of friendship. There could be no better

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means of building human brother-hood.

Work camps properly organised could make a vital contribution to the spread of democracy. It is being increasingly recognised by social thinkers that the essential work of a democratic society is not the power of a central parliament nor the welfare services of the state, but the preservation of the individual's freedom and the extent to which the community remains a community. A new society, equal and free, can be created not so much through theoretical instruction or political action but through experience of community activity, group discussion and group dicision. The case is clearly in favour of shifting the emphasis from a central parliament to the small community group. With enlightened leadership, a work camp drawing the people of a village into participation in thinking out, planning and executing measures for better conditions in their area can be a powerful instrument to create a new attitude. Nor need these discussion be confined to local problems. When the village community has caught a vision of what

their village and their country might be and retain their own initiative in action, it is truly then that change will begin. It is when the first village in Ceylon becomes self-conscious in this manner that a real social revolution will be possible in this country.

No work camp should conclude without an attempt to evaluate its success and to draw conclusions for improving the technique of such camps. A work camp is a sociological experiment of deep significance.

The following suggestions about the organisation of work camps are derived from the experience of some of the work camps that have been held in Ceylon:-

(1) Selection of Work Project:

The project selected should answer to a felt need of the community concerned and at the same time be an enterprise likely to evoke the enthusiasm of the participants. The sponsoring organisation should therefore consult both these parties and also take into account the available material resources.

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- (2) Local Co-operation: A work camp is not just donating labour service to a village. The active participation of the local population is necessary not merely to achieve quantitative results but the more intangible objectives. In particular the co-operation of all local organisations should be sought. The real test of the success of a camp is whether the spirit of self-help continues after the campers have departed.
- (3) Mature Leadership: There should be a proportion of older age-groups to provide stability and mature leadership to a work camp. A few persons with previous work camp experience would be very desirable. Trained leaders would be particularly necessary where the objectives include: (a) training in work camp techniques, (b) a social survey of the village, (c) a social education programme. Perhaps the ideal age distribution would be one-third, 16 plus-18: one-third, 18 plus-21: one-third, over 21.

- (4) Pre-camp Activity: An advance party should make a preliminary study of the locality as well as make the necessary arrangements for the smooth running of the work camp and project.
- other camp participants should arrive in the afternoon before the day the work is due to commence. They should meet each other (if they have not met before) meet the people of the village, go over the work site and familiarize themselves with the setting and the task to be accomplished.
- (6) Camp Administration: The division of responsibilities among individuals and groups should be clear. Regular camp meetings and discussions would be necessary. The daily routine should include some organised recreation. The Camp leader should have every aspect of camps life and work under his eye. Yet he and others chosen for leadership roles should exercise authority not so much by

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giving orders but by friendly and gentle means. The effectiveness of a Camp depends on morale and discipline. Punishments should be administered only in extreme cases.

(7) Follow-up Activity: An agency which has sponsored a Work Camp should continue to watch subsequent developments in the

village, especially the growth of any youth organisation that may have been set-up. While following up the work project initiated, the local organisation may provide volunteers for new works camp elsewhere.
