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## NATIONAL SCHEME OF EDUCATION

### Head Masters' Wholehearted Support

THE eleventh annual general meeting of the Ceylon Headmasters Conference held on Saturday at St. Benedict's College decided to send a deputation to interview the Minister of Education on various matters connected with the S. S. C. Examination.

An informal discussion was also held with Dr. Ivor Jennings, Vice Chancellor of the University, regarding the University Entrance and H. S. C. Examinations.

Mr. A. Kumaraswamy, Principal Jaffna Hindu College, in the course of his Presidential address said that the schools which the Headmasters' Conference represented had mainly been responsible for the English education of the Island and could justly be proud of their record of work. That they had contributed to the national development of the country even its worst opponents must concede and it was therefore idle to presume that they were opposed to any national scheme of education.

There was a lurking fear in certain quarters that these schools were apathetic and even opposed to such scheme.

He was confident that he was voicing the sincere feelings of the conference when he said that it was very willing and ready to offer its active co-operation for the production of a national scheme of education.

#### Free Education Policy

The State had now undertaken the responsibility of the education of the Island and had set about its task without, he feared, a well organised plan. Some of them had been impelled to disagree with the free education policy for two obvious reasons. One was that it would impair the efficiency of the schools and the other that it was too heavy a burden for the State to shoulder.

"We should certainly guard ourselves against the first, but with regard to the second", he said, "I feel that the position we should take should be somewhat like this: 'We do not oppose; it is our duty not to oppose; it is for the State to find the money.'"

Some of their schools, Mr. Kumaraswamy said, were really great schools and it would be a loss to the country if the State failed for want of a satisfactory solution to incorporate them in the national scheme of things. To ignore the place these schools occupied in the Island and to fashion some idealistic scheme in the air would be folly.

The chief problem before the State should be to provide enough schools to remove the illiteracy prevalent in the country. One was not quite sure if the creation of Central

and Junior Schools was helping towards the solution.

The question of the medium of instruction could be taken as settled with regard to primary education. But the moot question that arose was how far it was practicable to make the national languages the State languages when the medium of instruction through them was confined to the primary stage in what were called the English schools.

#### Practical Difficulties

The practical difficulties that made the restoration of the national languages to their rightful place could not be over-emphasized; but when an agreed policy on this question had been arrived at, they could not be insurmountable.

One was tempted to ask whether it was worthwhile purchasing the whole realm of English literature at the expense of their national individuality. He was of opinion that they should help in the progressive acceleration of the endeavour to teach their boys and girls in their own languages. A period of five years would certainly suffice for the full and complete realisation of the use of the national languages in their schools.

Referring to the subject of religious teaching in schools, Mr. Kumaraswamy said that the conscientious scruples of every denomination should be respected and safeguarded by the State.

## Indonesian Republic

### Dutch-Indonesian Agreement

The Dutch Government has recognised the Indonesian Republic as Government as 'de facto' exercising power in Java, Madura and Sumatra," under the draft agreement reached between the Dutch and the Indonesian delegates at a meeting on Friday, it was announced in Batavia.

A United States of Indonesia, comprising the entire territory of the Dutch East Indies, is to be formed as a Sovereign State on a federal basis.

The agreement, which has been initialled by both delegations, stated that the United States of Indonesia is to form part of the Netherlands-Indonesian Union which will also include the Kingdom of the Netherlands, Surinam and Guayana. It is hoped to set up the Union under the Netherlands' Crown before January 1, 1949.

## What He Discovered

(—Sri Swami Siddheswarananda—)

Sri Ramana Maharishi represents the pure tradition in Advaita Vedanta. In Vedanta there is a theistic as well as a non-theistic tradition, and these refer to two aspects of reality. The first treats of Saguna Brahman and the second treats of Nirguna Brahman. The Bhagavad Gita says the path of the Unconditional is not to the aspirant who is still bound by the 'body-idea' (ch. 12, Verse 5). Maharishi transcended the body idea on the very day he made the investigation into the nature of the self. His spiritual career is of particular interest to the student of Vedanta; for, an example like His is rare to find. He is one who has acceded to the realization of the Nirguna ideal without passing through the preliminary stages of discipline where much importance is given to devotion and worship. In history a most brilliant example of the same line of research and realization that Maharishi undertook is that of Lord Buddha though he had to spend long years of meditation before he had the Awakening. We are now above the prejudice handed down through ages where Buddhism and Vedanta in their essential spiritual appeal are placed one against the other in unrelenting opposition. We now consider Lord Buddha as one of the continuators of the Vedanta tradition of the Upanishads where the non-theistic ideal was lived and practised.

When Maharishi made the first investigation "Who am I?" evidently he had not envisaged this particular technique or any other one. He had not then any theological education. Maharishi once told me that at that time he was not even familiar with such terms as Brahman or Atman. He had not the support of any of the accepted thesis on the subject. The enquiry was his own and the way he discovered was equally his own. He discovered much later that he had come to the same conclusion that Scriptures and the experience of others in the same lines had arrived at from time immemorial.

Crown's name. The agreement specifies that 'common interests' include foreign relations, defence, finance and subjects of an economic and cultural nature.

A special clause provides that 'in case the population of the territory (in the Dutch East Indies) after due consultation with the other territories should decide by democratic procedure that they are not or not yet willing to join the United States of Indonesia, they can establish a special relationship for such territory to the States and to the Kingdom of the Netherlands.'

### JINNAH AGAIN!

MOHAMED ALI JINNAH'S utterances of late have passed the nuisance stage and developed into a state when they have become a definite danger to the social and communal well being of India. Time and again we have in these columns made pointed reference to the dangerous path this self appointed Fuehrer of Indian Muslims is leading his co-religionists to. This man has learnt nothing by experience, and encouraged perhaps by the running-with-the-hare-and-hunt-ing-with-the-hound policy of Viceroy Wavell has begun to indulge in antics which, if unchecked in time are bound to spell disaster to the orderly Government of that sub-continent during what is called the present transitional period. In the course of a further interview to foreign journalists last week, Jinnah when asked what would happen in the next six months or a year if and when the Congress and the League are not agreed on the question of the division of the country, is reported to have replied: "What happens is what you see; you have been witnessing what is happening. India's civil strife will continue until absolute Pakistan is achieved." Audacity could not go any further: and we dare say that this statement is a definite challenge to Viceroy Wavell. Though to all intents, there is an Interim Government which is national in character, the Viceroy is ultimately responsible for the maintenance of law and order in the country. Sardar Patel has publicly announced it. During the time of the terrible Bengal carnage when thousands of Hindus were mercilessly killed by Muslim fanatics, the Interim Government scrupulously avoided interfering in it, because it had not the power to do so. We are told the Hindus in vain looked to Nehru and his colleagues for timely help to prevent their extermination by Muslim Goondas. It was only after they found that the Interim Government had no statutory power to intervene, that the Hindus "to teach a lesson" took up arms in Bihar, and the results we all know. Any other man but Jinnah would have profited by the lesson and would do his utmost to bring about a peaceful atmosphere in the country. Whatever be Jinnah's attitude, we take this opportunity to utter a note of caution to Viceroy Wavell. It is not late even now to mend up matters and to end the talks of "civil strife" which are directly being engineered by the Pakistan-minded maniacs. The Viceroy should take a strong hand and ask Jinnah and his stooges to stop once and for all these threats of "civil strife", the definite purpose of which is the whipping up of the fanaticism of hooligans and goondas.

## Political Adventurers And Co-ops.

### Lawyer Accuses Co-op. Officials

That the officials of the Co-operative Department in Jaffna are actively participating in Politics was the view expressed by the President of the Islands Co-operative Stores Union, Mr. N. T. Sivagnanam, Proctor S. C.

In his presidential address at the second annual general meeting of the Islands Co-operative Stores Union held at Kayts on Monday last, Mr. Sivagnanam said: "I am aware of the machinations, plots and subtle methods adopted by the Department to remove enthusiastic honest and devoted co-operative workers from office because they are not predisposed to support their political wishes. A co-operative head should rather be an adviser and guide than a puppet dictator."

Mr. Sivagnanam further said that the co-operative inspectorate, without attending to official work, were let loose in the country for propaganda purposes to promote their political campaign. The result was that there was no supervision or auditing of stores.

"The Department would be better advised to concentrate their energy to tighten up the supervision and administration of societies and stores."

Mr. Sivagnanam said that it was unfortunate that there was a tendency now even to convert co-operative meetings to political platforms to further political aspirations.

## Notes and Comments

### Sir Oliver

Sir Oliver Gunatilleke is back in Ceylon, and we find that he is running hither and thither giving solace to some, encouragement to a few and hope for others of the planting industry: and the latter are beholden to him for this solicitude. This is well and good. But we take this opportunity to remind Sir Oliver, that more urgent affairs are waiting to be attended to by him, and about these the general public have come to be apprehensive and rather impatient. There are 689 audit queries to be satisfactorily answered by Sir Oliver. The answers are long overdue. Lakhs of rupees are involved. Rightly or wrongly an impression has been created in the minds of the people that fraud and embezzlement of public funds have been going on in the Departments under the C.D.C. on an unprecedented scale. We are told by the Auditor-General that there has been open flouting of regulations even after such irregularities have been pointed out. Sir Oliver was himself the Auditor-General before he became the C. D. C. and his principal assistants were experienced officers of the Audit Department before they were taken into the C. D. C's Department. Hence neither Sir Oliver nor his assistants, who it is alleged perpetrated these irregularities, can now plead ignorance of the regulations. We cannot even now persuade ourselves to think that Sir Oliver condoned these disgraceful irregularities. We are confident that Sir Oliver will be only too glad to unravel the mystery of these irregularities and to expose the culprits who have, we regret, brought disgrace to the whole administration.

### Indonesia

The Draft Agreement signed by the Dutch and Indonesian representative in Java cannot be called an ideal one which would satisfy the nationalist elements in Indonesia.

The only redeeming feature in the draft agreement is that the Dutch have once and for all abandoned their efforts to reconquer Indonesia with British guns and foreign mercenary troops, and have recognised the *de facto* Government of Dr. Soekarno. However, we are afraid the Dutch have not completely abandoned their imperialist designs and the agreement which they have now cleverly manipulated for ratification by Dr. Sultan Sharir is an attempt to salvage their Empire with a new form of Imperial Association. The constitutional arrangements in the proposed Dutch-Indonesian Union on many vital matters such as defence, foreign policy, finance etc. are far from satisfactory and they fall far short of the proposals embodied for the settlement of both the Indian and Burmese constitutional problems. The greatest flaw in the draft agreement from the Nationalist view point is that the United States of Indonesia which would be a "self-governing dominion" under the Dutch Crown cannot secede from the proposed union—consisting of the Kingdom of the Netherlands, Surinam and Curacao, on the one hand and the United States of Indonesia comprising the entire territory of the East Indies on the other—a right granted to the British Dominions under the Statute of Westminster. With this most reactionary flaw in it, it is futile to expect the Indonesian Nationalist elements to meekly acquiesce in the present arrangement. True, Dr. Soekarno and his lieutenants have accepted the draft agreement perhaps with the idea of using it as another vantage ground in their further march for complete independence. The whole of Asia is awake and Indonesia cannot any more be tied to the apron-strings of the Dutch Imperialists who have sucked its life-blood for a period far too long; and sooner or later the Dutch have to quit in spite of agreements and treaties.

## School Inspectors

### Local Agents for U.N.P.?

The Special Correspondent of The "Times of Ceylon" writes:—

A group of teachers, both vernacular and English, met me and alleged that certain inspectors were organising public meeting and speaking at them in support of the candidates of the U. N. P. They said that they were being told what to do at the coming parliamentary elections by these officers of the Education Department. They were afraid that if they did not follow the dictates of these officials they would be marked men.

These teachers maintain that in Jaffna the teacher is still a highly respected individual whose word carries weight with the public.

They told me that a recent case was a meeting of the Youth League at Karainagar, an island in Jaffna, which was presided over by a member of the State Council, who was a candidate for the Parliament. In the presence of this member an inspector of schools told the members of the League that the member was the person most fitted to be the leader of the Tamils.

Mr. S. Natesan also conveyed the greetings of the North to the U. N. P.

Mr. S. W. R. D. Bandaranaike who spoke earlier, said it was made out that there was conflict among the Party Executives and that its leadership was in dispute. It was by their unanimous wish that Mr. Senanayake was asked to be the Party leader.

## Gandhiji Urged To Break Fast

Dr. Rajendra Prasad, it is learnt, has written a letter to Gandhiji urging the latter to resume normal diet as all are quiet in Bihar, and the province is repentant for the unfortunate happenings within its boundaries.

Sardar Abdur Rab Nishtar, Leader of the Council of State, in answer to a question by Mr. Hussain Imam said that reliable evidence indicated that the number of those killed in the Bihar disturbances had reached five figures and the damage to property would amount to several crores of rupees. He added that over a 1,00,000 homeless persons were huddled together in refugee camps and private houses in Patna and other towns.

Dr. Rajendra Prasad, the Food Member said that what happened in Bihar was not worse than the happenings in Eastern Bengal. He added that it was absurd to think that the number of those dead in Bihar had reached five figures.

## CONFERENCE OF MUTTS

### Memorandum To Be Submitted

A conference of the representatives of Sri Ahobila Mutt, Sri Dharmapura Adhinam, Sri Kanchi Kamakoti Mutt, Sri Parakala Mutt, Pushpagiri Mutt, Sri Raghavendra-swami Mutt, Udipi Mutt, Uttaradi Mutt, Sri Vanamamalai Mutt, Sri Shankeswar Karavir Mutt and Vyasaraya Mutt was held at "Ashrama", Mylapore last week under the chairmanship of Mr. K. Balasubramania Aiyar.

The meeting considered measures to convene an all-India Conference of the Mutts in the country during the first week of December at Madras. The object of the proposed all-India conference would be to submit a memorandum to the Constituent Assembly for the enactment of provisions in the Indian Constitution for fundamental rights and safeguards guaranteeing freedom of worship and the inviolability of religious institutions and their properties and of religious observances, customs and usages and the preservation of the autonomy of the Dharma Pethas (Mutts) from legislative and executive interference. The meeting resolved that steps should be taken to hold the conference in the first week of December in Madras.

## Nefarious Propaganda

### Bengal League Leader Speaks Out

Maulana Mohammed Akram Khan, President of the Bengal Provincial Muslim League, in a statement says that he has a special duty towards Bihar at this juncture, since "for the tragedy of Bihar, the first responsibility lies on the Muslim League Government of Bengal, which is practically a personal show of Mr. Suhrawardy." It is, therefore his duty, he says, to be with the sufferers in Bihar and share their distress, misfortune and ordeal.

Maulana Akram Khan continues that as soon as trouble started in Noakhali, Mr. Suhrawardy and his Government issued some statements which, directly or indirectly, helped the ill-designs of the party that was bent upon trouble. Not only that, by a fiat, the Bengal Chief Minister succeeded on the one hand in gagging one section of the Press and on the other hand, gave liberty to the other section to indulge in the publication of false and grossly exaggerated news under official sanction. This went on for a month, unchecked and unabated.

The Bihar tragedy, says Maulana Akram Khan, is the direct result of this "nefarious propaganda of imaginary atrocities that was carried on under the very nose of Mr. Suhrawardy's Government. The sufferings in Bihar to-day are due to the shortcomings and short-sightedness of the Muslim League Government of Bengal."

## INTERNAL PURCHASE SCHEME

### Harvesting of Paddy in the Jaffna District—Kalapokam 1946/47

By virtue of the powers vested in me by the Defence (Miscellaneous) Regulation 37, the Defence (Purchase of Foodstuffs) Regulations 1942, the Defence (Paddy Cultivation) Regulations 1943, I, Mayilvahanam Sri Khanta, Assistant Government Agent (Emergency), Jaffna District, a competent and proper authority do hereby direct that:—

1. Every person whether owner or cultivator in charge of the reaping of the harvest of any paddy or Kurakkan land situated within the Jaffna District and which is expected to be harvested during 1946/47

(a) shall inform the Kirama Vidane of the area in which the land is situated

i. the dates of the reaping and threshing of the harvest not less than ten days ahead in each case; ii. the name, situation and extent of the land;

iii. the names and addresses of the person or persons entitled to take or receive any part of the produce; IV. details of the share or shares of the produce to which such person or persons may be entitled.

(b) shall not remove any paddy or kurakkan harvested in Kalapokam 1946/47 from the threshing floor until the harvest has been checked and verified by the Kirama Vidane or any other officer authorised by me in writing and until the acreage levy has been delivered to the Kirama Vidane at the rate of two (2) bushels per acre of well winnowed paddy free from chaff, dirt, grit etc.

2. I do further direct that:—

(a) Removal thereafter to the barn or other place of storage within the same Chief Headman's or Divisional Revenue Officer's division shall only be on a permit on form I. P. S. 33(b) issued by the Kirama Vidane of the area in which the threshing floor is situated.

b) For transport from one Chief Headman's or Divisional Revenue Officer's division to another within the District, application on form D. F. C. 34 should be made to the Chief Headman or D. R. O. of the division in which the applicant resides.

ii. For transport from one District to another, application should be made to the Govt. Agent, Assistant Government Agent or Assistant Government Agent (Emergency) of the area in which the applicant is resident giving all particulars asked for in Form D. F. C. 34 (in duplicate); copies of which can be obtained from any of the above officers. To expedite the issue of permits, the applicants are requested to produce reports from the Kirama Vidanes or any other duly authorised person of the area of their residence and of the areas in which the paddy or kurakkan lands are situated, giving particulars of the house-holds and of their shares of paddy or kurakkan from the various fields.

(c) No paddy shall be utilised for consumption by an owner or his dependants possessing Ration Book until the surrender of the appropriate number of rice coupons.

3. If no application for removal of any share to a place outside the Chief Headman's or Divisional Revenue Officer's area is made to me within six weeks from the date of harvesting, all stocks of paddy or kurakkan are liable to be requisitioned under the Internal Purchase Scheme.
