## THE INDIAN STAGE

THE art of the drama has flourished in India in various forms from the earliest times.

According to a popular myth, it was an Indian R-ja—Raja Nabasha—who had the first stage built and called upon the *apsaras* and *gandharvas* (divine nymphs and musicians) to act upon it. Another legend tells us that some of the gods, wanting amusement, asked Brahma who, consenting, invented the *Natya Veda* in which dialogue, acting, music and dances were taken from the *Rig Veda*, the *Yajur Veda*, the *Sam Veda* and the *Athar Veda*. Brahma ordered, according to the same legend Viswakarma to build a *Rangshala* (stage) on which the drama *Amrit Manthan* containing the well known theme of the gods churning the sea, was staged.

From the earliest times drama has occupied a very prominent place in Hindu society and reflected the social customs and religious beliefs of the age.

The plots of the early dramas—written in Sanskrit—dealt mainly with the lives of the gods and the goddesses or the Rishis or Munis. It was only much later that kings were made the heroes of plays and, still later, that the common man with his problems and perplexities came into his own.

Little is known about the design and structure of the early Indian stage. There were, however, no permanent buildings, only wooden platforms erected temporarily for a performance, and the spectators sat around on all four sides.

There was no system of lights such as we are familiar with today, the dramas being nearly always presented in daylight.

There were no curtains either for the actors to make their exits and their entrances and the use of a white curtain behind the stage—the audience sitting only on three sides—was a later development. The green-room was some distance away so that the actors had to make their way among the spectators in walking across to the stage.

Scenery, too, was the minimum and much was left to the imagination of the spectators. Far from hindering the art of the drama, this drawback gradually developed into an easy symbolist and the audience came to recognise certain actions or appearances as typifying certain objects or ideas.

An actor, for instance, who entered the stage with blood-stained clothes and a sword in hand was taken to be a soldier returning from the battlefield and was expected to give, and invariably did give, an account of the battle.

Any reference to the Indian stage naturally brings to mind the most celebrated of all dramatists, Kalidas and his immortal play *Shakuntala*.

## American Citizens' Appeal

A group of diplomats, scientists, labour leaders, lawyers, Congressmen and civic leaders have urged the United States, Britain and Russia to make the ideal of world disarmament come true.

In a memorial to President Truman, Premier Attlee and Marshal Stalin, the signatories point out: "You three men can lead in making a new world—one with a peace that never has existed in the recorded history of man."

The memorial is coupled with warnings about the use of atomic weapons, big armies and waging aggressive wars. It gives the following as the five essentials for prevention of atomic war and for permanent peace:

1. A convention (as proposed by Russia) providing that violation of disarmament shall be a 'grave offence' against the State.

2. Provision for an international control commission which would effect and maintain disarmament simultaneously and progressively of all war weapons except those for internal police purposes.

3. A United Nations Charter which provides 'immediately available' forces to act in any emergency.

4. All United Nations have declared for "inspection" and ample safeguards against the violations and evasions of atomic regulations.

But before him there were many noteworthy dramatists and writers.

The *Natya Shastra* of Bharata is the first important book on the art of the drama. In the 4th century A. D., when drama seems to have reached the zenith of its popularity, such distinguished men of learning as Shvaghosh, Bhavabhuti, Harsha and Banabhatta flourished.

To the old Sanskrit dramatists the theatre was a medium through which morality and religion were taught. Tragedy or comedy, as it is understood today, was unknown.

In the later Prakrit dramas musical comedies and farce invaded the stage, and the comic character replaced the godlike heroes. *Rahas*, *Swang* and *Bharoop*—inferior forms of the old dramas—became popular.

The modern Indian theatre made its appearance in the time of Agha Hasan Amanat Lucknawi, a courtier of Nawab Wajid Ali Shah.

It was he who started the *Indar Sabha* which staged a number of dramas on themes taken from Hindu mythology and Persian legends with such success that many enterprising business men were prompted to start theatrical companies, greatly influenced by contemporary English companies.

## Police Work — A Cross Word Puzzle

### Local Police Chief on Rowdyism

A largely attended public meeting of the residents of Chankasai Parish was held on Monday last at the Sittankerti Ganesa Vidyasalai in order to form an Anti-Crime Society. The D. R. O. Valikamam West after thanking the G. A. N. P. and the Superintendent of Police for their presence, urged the necessity for the formation of such a Society. He proposed the formation of a Central Advisory Committee for the Parish with Sub-Committees for each of the V. H. divisions.

Mr. C. Coomaraswamy the Govt. Agent, then addressed the audience. He emphasised the urgent necessity for public co-operation if crime was to be stamped out in the area and referred to the very laudable part played by the Public in 1939 and 1940 in assisting the Police during the great wave of crime which took place at that time and how that assistance was chiefly responsible for arresting that wave of crime.

The Superintendent of Police Mr.

Osman de Silva assured the hundred percent co-operation of the Police to the Society in its attempt to suppress crime. He stated that Police work was just like a cross word puzzle with few clues available and the assistance of the public was essential if the puzzle was to be solved correctly. He stated that crime figures for the last 9 months of the present year were very much less than during last year. He however stated that the kind of crime which was feared by the public was rowdyism and he added that even minor cases of drunkenness and intimidation were being taken up by the police in order to arrest this type of rowdyism.

The Chairman, V. C. of the area, Mr. A. K. Navaratnam and Mr. S. Kartigesu, the President of the Punnalai Farmers' Association also promise their co-operation.

The meeting then proceeded to the election of the various Committees suggested by the D. R. O. Valikamam West.

### INTERNAL PURCHASE SCHEME

THE MODIFICATION OF THE Internal Purchase Scheme was urged by a deputation from the East Ceylon National Association which waited on the Minister for Agriculture and Lands recently. The deputation expressed the opinion that "as the internal purchase scheme involves ruinous waste of Government money, which goes to pay officials and minor employees and provides manifold opportunities for corruption it should be modified and interprovincial barriers be abolished". The deputation also submitted that paddy should be recovered on the acre basis and co-operative paddy purchase societies should be formed for this purpose.

In our opinion the whole scheme should be completely revised on the clear understanding that the scheme should be in force only during the present emergency. Any attempt to continue the levy of paddy beyond this period should be resisted and on this point a definite assurance should be obtained from all political parties. We are afraid that the temptation to continue the levy is great but it is the duty of owners and cultivators of paddy lands to make their voice heard. If they are silent, they will have only themselves to thank for the continuance of a tyranny which was unheard of in times of peace under British rule.

Unlike the Batticaloa deputation we are against not only inter-provincial barriers but also all barriers. There is no reason why paddy should not be recovered on the acre basis. In fact, this is what is being done. Once the paddy is recovered, why should there be any restrictions at all on the transport of paddy? An army of officials is now employed on the issue of permits, and on other duties connected with it. The men in charge of food-barriers are hopelessly corrupt, and anyone but Mr. D. S. Senanayake would know that this is only natural. The Government has placed comparatively ignorant and uneducated men in charge of these barriers and their pay is very small, with the result that paddy is illicitly transported with their connivance and to their profit. It is high time that restrictions were abolished and paddy was collected on a sane and healthy basis.

## WHAT THE "HINDU ORGAN" STANDS FOR

(From a Correspondent)

"Sir Mohamed Macan Markar is reported to have made a speech in Sinhalese at a meeting of the U. N. P. at Kurunegala the other day and said that although the Moslems were in Ceylon for a thousand years it was a shame that all of them were not able to speak in Sinhalese. If that is so, I shall like to present Sir Macan with a copy of a paper read before the Royal Asiatic Society fifty-eight years ago, in 1888, by Sir Ponnambalam Ramanathan, on The Ethnology of the 'Moors' in Ceylon for Sir Macan to understand what his race is and what his mother-tongue is. Sir Ponnambalam, in that paper, has proved, after laborious research and by quoting great authorities, that only a handful of Egyptian and Arabian Mohamedan Missionaries were domiciled in Ceylon in the fourteenth century and that ninety-nine and half per cent of the Muslims of Ceylon were Tamils converted to the new faith. Sir Ponnambalam came to the conclusion that taking into consideration their language, their history, their customs and physical features the proof cumulatively led to no other conclusion but that the 'Moors' of Ceylon were ethnologically Tamils. Is it strange then that our Muslim brothers stuck to their mother-tongue Tamil, as their home language since, according to Prof. Max Muller, the mother-tongue is the true exponent of the national character of any race? Sir Macan may regret to-day that his kith and kin cannot address meetings in Sinhalese and to-morrow he may regret that they do not wear *kandais* with combs over them", said Mr. C. N. DevaRajan of Manipal at a largely-attended public meeting held at Sandilipay under the auspices of the All-Ceylon Tamil Congress with Mr. G. G. Ponnambalam in the chair. Among the other speakers were Mr. J. V. Chelliah, Emeritus Professor, Jaffna College, Mr. S. J. V. Chelvanayagam, Advocate, Mr. K. Kanagaratnam, Retired Auditor-General, Mr. S. Ponnambalam, Teacher; Mr. T. Subramaniam, Teacher; and Mr. S. Thillaiampalam, Teacher.

Referring to the exhortation of Mr. A. E. Tamber, Vice-President of the Northern Province Teachers' Association at Neervely recently that people should not believe in all that appeared in the press, which implied that people should believe in only what men like Mr. Tamber alone spoke, Mr. DevaRajan said that Mr. Tamber seemed to have joined company with the two democratic Ministers who recently started penalising newspapers that gave news and commented on matters that were making them uncomfortable in the discharge of their duties. With regard to the charge by the leader of the Jaffna Bar, Mr. A. V. Kulasingham, Editor of the "Hindu Organ" that certain Inspectors of Schools were harassing teachers that they should vote for this or that candidate in the forth-coming elections, Mr. DevaRajan said that he himself knew that a certain Inspector was under orders to go on transfer to another Province. The Inspector approached an influential member of Council and said that he would work for the councillor if he were retained in Jaffna. On the Councillor's making representations to the Minister of Education the transfer had been deferred and yet Mr. Tamber had the temerity to stand up as the Vice-President of a Teachers' Association and defend a department of the Public Service. Continuing, Mr. DevaRajan said that Mr. S. R. Canaganayagam, the political babe of Jaffna, who aspired to become the Prime Minister of

Ceylon one day by keeping aloof from the Tamil Congress and attacking it took to task Mr. Kulasingham, who had a vast experience of men and matters as a long-standing lawyer and a respected journalist on the ground that he was making use of the columns of a religious journal to advance communal interests. Mr. Kulasingham, as they all knew was a man trained in the school of criticism both as lawyer and journalist and he never spoke or wrote anything without the full data before him and without weighing the pros and cons of every word he uttered or wrote. Perhaps Mr. Canaganayagam does not know the aims and objects with which the "Hindu Organ" was started sixty years ago. If he will read the editorial in the very first issue of that paper, written by the late Mr. Chellappah Pillai, Retired Chief Justice of Travancore, the first Editor of the paper and also the editorials written by the late Mr. Sabapathy who was Editor for a number of years Mr. Canaganayagam will find that the paper was started not only to safeguard the interests of the Saiva Religion in Ceylon but to safeguard as well the social, economic and political interests of the Tamils in particular and the people of Ceylon at large. As one of the previous speakers, Mr. Chelvanayagam, said, if the government of a country went wrong everything concerning the welfare of a people, their language, religion, rights and freedom would all go wrong. It was therefore, the duty of every paper, whether religious or non-religious, sectarian or non-sectarian, to guide its readers correctly in matters political. It was false propaganda to say that either the "Hindu Organ" or the Tamil Congress was propagating communalism. The Tamils to-day were only fighting with their backs to the wall against other communal cliques and juntas, masquerading under big national names, so that the Tamils and their rights and language and their very existence might not be swept out.

### Uranium Deposits In Poland

A Polish new paper report says that Uranium deposits found by Polish geologists in Lower Silesia are the richest in Europe and second only to Russia's.

The newspaper adds, Prof. Bohdanzi, a noted geologist and former director of the Leningrad Geological Institute, has discovered the deposits, which the Germans started exploiting during the war. The Germans are also reported to have obtained one gramme of radium yearly on initial operation in that sector.

## 3 DAYS LIMIT

### Govt. Order on Kataragama Pilgrims

Pilgrims to Kataragama during the annual *Thiru Karthikai* festival will be allowed to stay there for three days only, according to rules framed under the Pilgrims' Ordinance, which has been gazetted.

The rules state that no pilgrims shall arrive at Kataragama, before December 7th or stay in the camp area within a radius of half a mile of the Maha Devale and a quarter mile of the Pillayar Kovil.

This area will be under the general control of the Government Agent of the Uva Province and under the immediate supervision of an officer designated the "Supervising Officer". He will be assisted by the Medical officer and by the Police Officer in charge of the camp.

No pilgrims will be allowed to take any cattle within a quarter mile of the camp area without a permit from the Supervising Officer and if an epidemic breaks out in the camp area, the Government Agent can direct the pilgrims to leave the camp area along any route he prescribes.
