## WHAT THE TAMILS WANT

### A Strong, Equitable and Free Government

A largely attended meeting was held on Sunday at Sandilipay North under the auspices of the All Ceylon Tamil Congress. The President, Mr. G. G. Ponnambalam explained the objects of the Congress and urged the necessity for all the Tamils to support and consolidate its position specially in view of the chaotic condition which prevails in the country today. Messrs J. V. Chelliah, S. J. V. Chevanayagam, K. Kanagaratnam and C. N. Devirajan spoke at the meeting. Mr. Kanagaratnam referring to the question of leadership of the Tamils raised recently by Mr. Mo'amure in the State Council said: "It is unfortunate that Leadership of Tamils should be conferred by one member or another without reference to or the mandate of the people who are expected to be led. Perhaps taking the cue from Mr. Mo'amure, the Minister for Home Affairs took greetings from the Northern Province to the meeting of the United National Party held at Kurunegala. While there is no objection to restricting the contest for leadership to the two members representing Jaffna and Point Pedro even to the unfair exclusion of other outstanding men the Tamils should carefully examine the credentials and qualities of the men who aspire to lead them. The Tamils were great warriors in the political life of this country and for years their leadership was gratefully acknowledged by our brethren of the majority community because it was characterized by courage, fearlessness, independence and absolute faith in freedom for all. It is most distressing to me as a Tamil to find the cartoonist of the Times of Ceylon invariably depicting the only Tamil member of the Board of Ministers in a state of fear and in a crouching position. I do not blame the cartoonist who is an expert in his job and who describes all personalities truthfully and without fear or favour but I do ask whether the Tamils of today have lost all chivalry and courage associated with giants like the late P. Coomaraswamy, Sir P. Ramasethan and Sir P. Arunachalam who enjoyed the fullest confidence of the Sinhalese people.

"I wish to refer to another statement of the Member for Jaffna at the United National Party Meeting at Kurunegala, viz. His inability to join the Tamil Congress stressing that a minority was best served by having faith in the professions of the majority community". ### Farmers' Appeal For Relief

At a largely attended meeting of the farmers of Vaddukoddai held on the 30th November 1946; at the Thirugnana Sambanda Vidyasalai; under the presidency of Mr. S. Rutnam Acting Chairman of the Vaddukoddai Village Committee, it was unanimously decided to forward the following resolution proposed by Mr. S. Annamalai and seconded by Mr. A. Sabapathipillai to the Hon. Minister of Agriculture.

"That this meeting of the cultivators of Vaddukoddai beg to bring to the notice of the Hon. Minister of Agriculture, that during the paddy cultivation of this Maha Season 1946-47, the cultivators have spent large sums of money amounting to an average of Rs 240 per acre on weeding alone, unprecedented in any year; and that they request him to give redress in cash as was done during the year 1944-45; thereby encouraging the cultivators to produce more paddy."

cussed, the Member for Jaffna in a bold and forceful speech referred to a series of broken promises and assurances given to the Tamils being treated as a scrap of paper. I do not wish to refer to many other things in which he condemned the attitude of the Sinhalese leaders towards the Tamil community. It is not my purpose to refer to these unpalatable things—to quote the Member for Jaffna in any communal spirit but to ask the Member for Jaffna to satisfy his community that since his most virulent speech in 1935, he has reasons to have faith in the professions of the political leaders. We as a community are always prepared to extend our fullest co-operation in working the new reforms to achieve the final object of full freedom for this country. It is the earnest and sincere aim of the Tamil Congress. But we want proof of the sincerity and earnestness on the part of the leaders in spite of previous failures to do the right thing by all communities. Today there is ample evidence of dissatisfaction with the present Government. It is both stable and inefficient. The criticism levelled against it even by those who invariably supported it show its utter weakness and helplessness to face situations which unexpectedly arise as a result of the unsettled war conditions. What we want today is strong leadership which will inspire confidence in the people. Let the Tamils face the situation boldly and by uniting among themselves co-operate with all who wish to establish a strong, equitable and freedom-loving Government."

## A Perfect Scandal

### A. S. P. ON HIS EXPERIENCE OF CO-OPS.

"The way the Co-operative Societies are run is a perfect scandal. This is my two and a half years' experience in the district" said Mr. C. A. Edwards, Assistant Superintendent of Police in the course of a speech he delivered at the last meeting of the Morawak Korale Planters' Association.

Several speakers criticised the co-operative societies in the district, some alleging that about 50 per cent had grave defalcations.

It was alleged that except for auditing purposes no officials of the Co-operative Department visited the societies. Much could be done if regular visits were made to the villages and propaganda talks given to popularise co-operative ideas.

The Assistant Superintendent of Police, Mr. C. A. Edwards, stated that with his two and a half years' experience in the district the way the co-operative societies were run was a perfect scandal. But due to insufficiency of evidence many prosecutions could not be launched. It was no use blaming the Co-operative Department when the fault lay with the members of the societies themselves.

If societies appointed responsible people to posts of managers and treasurers all this trouble would end.

Time and again he had found that cases of burglary of co-operative stores were 'put up shows' as investigation disclosed, that cash for the preceding two or three days had not been given to the Treasurer—the rule being that this should be done daily. So a burglary was stage-managed and it was reported that cash as well as textile coupons had been stolen.

Mr. R. Samarasekera, Assistant Registrar of the Co-operative Department, promised to inquire into complaints they had to make against any officers.

## NO POLITICS!

### For Local Government Employees

The Local Government Service Commission has imposed a ban on employees of any Local Authority participating in any form of political activity.

They are not to seek election as a member of the Legislature or of a Local Authority, not take any part in the election of another to such office beyond recording their votes.

The Commission has also prohibited any member of the Local Government Service convening, attending or taking part in a meeting to consider any action of the Government or of any Local Authority, or of the Local Government Service Commission itself.

No member of this Service may be a member of any political association, any ratepayers' association or any trade union.

Members of the Service are given the privilege provided the prior sanction of the Local Government Service Commission has been obtained, of forming associations, membership of which is confined to themselves.

Any such association must be purely departmental in character, and must have no affiliation with any outside trade union.

No person outside the Local Government Service should be an office-bearer, even as Patron or a Vice-Patron.

These decisions of the Local Government Service Commission will have the effect of bringing the employees of Local Authorities into line with public servants. They have hitherto enjoyed almost unrestricted freedom in respect of political activity.

## BUS WORKERS' STRIKE

### Called Off After One Day

A strike of Bus workers of the Valigamam West Omnibus Company which threatened to take an ugly turn was averted by the timely intervention of the Superintendent of Police and the Government Agent. For some time past, the relationship between the Company and its workers has not been cordial, it is stated following the refusal of the former to accede to many demands of its employees.

The Valigamam Bus Owners' Association, on Saturday last gave notice of dismissal to some of its inspectors. Immediately all conductors, drivers and other inspectors working under that company struck work and it was feared that the strike would spread to the other bus companies too. However on

the intervention of the Government Agent and the Superintendent of Police, the Bus Owners' Association agreed to suspend the notice of dismissal given to the "bus inspectors pending the decision of a tribunal appointed to inquire into the disputes. The strikers agreed to the settlement and returned to work on Sunday evening.

### IMPORT OF TEXTILES

ACCORDING TO A PRESS REPORT, Mr. R. Hewavitarne, Minister of Labour, Industry and Commerce, wants licences to be issued to anyone who is in a position to import cloth; "I am considering the question of the desirability and feasibility of issuing textile licences to anyone who is in a position to import textiles into this country", he says in the course of a letter to the Textile Controller. Mr. Hewavitarne also admits that it is becoming increasingly difficult to continue to impose restrictions on trade. He might have added that the public has come to dislike these restrictions as the only visible result is a scarcity of cloth all round. The Government's policy in this matter has imposed severe hardships on the people, and these hardships are rightly attributed by them to the intervention of the Government in the textile trade. It is our duty to point out that the withdrawal of the restrictions would not and could not make the position of the people in this matter worse than what it is now. Let the Government by all means control prices and distribution, though the present system of distribution is bad enough; but the Government owes it to the public to encourage wholesale traders to import more cloth into the country. It does not matter where we get the cloth from, provided we get it.

The present textile position is very serious indeed. Coupons for the current period have not been released, and does the Textile Controller expect the people of this country to clothe themselves in rags for no other reason than that Ministers and interested officials have tried to control the textile trade and failed? Every system must be judged by the results. The results of textile control show conclusively that it was a mistake on the part of the Government to have meddled with the import of cloth. The traders know their business much better than the Government. Prices can be controlled within reasonable limits without the necessity for throwing the whole textile trade out of gear by imposing restrictions. We trust that Mr. Hewavitarne will persuade his Committee to agree to the abolition of the the present restrictions without delay. The public has been victimised long enough, and its patience is well nigh exhausted. We warn the Ministers that textile control is no longer needed.

## A WORD TO OUR CORRESPONDENTS

Some time ago I took the unusual step of refusing to publish letters obviously and fundamentally hostile to the declared policy of the *Hindu Organ*. That policy still remain the same. It is founded on honest conviction and the highest regard for the welfare of the Tamils. Most of the letters which were refused publication came from correspondents who have for a long time received the hospitality of these columns for the purpose of defending the very cause which I supported then as I support it now. It seemed to me that the object of these letters was not to convince me but to carry on a propaganda in the columns of the *Hindu Organ* itself against the editorial policy. This is not permissible. It is one thing to reply in good faith to letters and articles expressing the opposite view and quite another to fill the few columns available to this paper with lengthy and contentious matter. I admit, however, that refusing to publish letters is like sitting on the safety valve: it drives discontent underground and makes editorial policy appear intolerant of opposition. This is equally undesirable I have, therefore, decided to publish letters from any quarter however hostile to the policy of the *Hindu Organ*, but I hope correspondents will remember that the space available is limited and that the columns of this paper should not be monopolised by them for purposes of propaganda. An attempt, and a very modest one, has been made to increase space by making Friday's issue a six-page paper. This means that all the issues of the *Hindu Organ* will be six-pages.

Another reason why I stopped publishing certain types of letters and contributions was that they threatened to become intensely personal and acrimonious. This is true of some letters which supported the Tamil Congress and some with opposed it. Correspondents as well as contributors will note that if letters and articles are to be published they must refrain from personal at-

tacks. From time to time I have pronounced my own verdict on certain individuals. I have done so in a spirit of detachment and on proper material. These pronouncements belong to a category that differs radically from some of the letters which were refused publication. They are not to be classed with the voice of faction and with the calculating and interested subservience which delights in writing letters to the press.

It is also important that letters should be authenticated by the person writing them. There was one letter which made me furious and which I declined to publish. A portion of this letter was in manuscript I knew the handwriting to be that of an old friend whose present political attitude does not commend itself to me. Instead of authenticating the letter himself, he got his clerk to sign the letter, which contained a personal attack on me as Editor of this paper. These subterfuges should be avoided. Besides, it is certainly not the duty of an Editor to publish letters attacking him personally.

One reason which prompted me to revoke my decision is that, as long as differences of opinion exist, as they do exist at present, it is on the whole better to let the public speak for itself through the correspondence columns, subject of course to the Editor's discretion which, however, should not be exercised purely on political grounds.

In view of the approach of the elections, I feel it my duty to avoid political controversy as much as possible. This is not always possible. Sometimes as Editor it will be my duty to deal with controversial questions and pronounce my own opinion on them. But on the whole it would be better if it were avoided, and it is my duty as well as that of correspondents and contributors to bear this in mind, having regard to the fact that there are differences of opinion amongst us which call for patience and mutual tolerance.

### Elections in August

#### Symbols for Candidates

Elections to the new Parliament will be held during July-August next year and not in June as anticipated earlier. This is due to a delay in the publication of final electoral registers in England.

The final electoral registers, will be released in England on May 31 and they will reach Ceylon by about June 15. Nominations will take place towards the end of June and Parliament will meet during the first week of September.

Preliminary arrangements for the elections have now been completed, and steps will be taken to select suitable symbols as soon as the Municipal elections are over this week.

It is likely that about 18 to 20 symbols will be chosen from the present symbols used by Municipalities, and, unlike in the case of Municipal elections, symbols will be allotted to candidates by drawing lots.

There will be 2,300 polling stations in the island as against 791 used during the 1936 elections. This will enable candidates to poll a larger number of votes and will also reduce the cost of elections to candidates. All the elections, according to present arrangements, will be completed within 10 to 20 days.

The State Council will be dissolved during the last week of February or on March 10th at the latest. After the dissolution of the Council and pending the formation of the House of Representatives and the

The London Indian Conference has failed. Nehru and Sardar Baldev Singh have returned to India in time for the inauguration of the Constituent Assembly which met yesterday under the chairmanship of Dr. Sachchidananda Sinha of Bihar who was appointed by the Government to be the chairman *pro-tem*. All members except the Leaguers attended the meeting. The Assembly immediately proceeded to business, and elected Dr. Rajendra Prasad as its permanent president.

## GOVT. SERVANTS AND WEALTH

### SABHA WANTS A COMMISSION

The Lanka Mahajana Sabha, which held its 27th annual general meeting at Palm Court, Edinburgh Crescent, Colombo on Saturday last resolved to ask the Government to appoint a commission to inquire how certain Government officials acquired their wealth during the past five years.

The resolution, which was in the name of Mr. H. W. Amarasinghe, M. S. C. for Galle, was moved in his absence by Mr. A. G. W. Jayawardene and was seconded by Mr. V. Munasinghe. It stated: "In view of the gross corruption of which so many officers appointed by the Government during the past five years have been guilty—possessing today wealth impossible of possession without gross corruption—this Sabha feels the urgency of Government insisting on a searching enquiry as to the means by which the present wealth of such individuals has been obtained."

Mr. Forrester Obeyesekere said that such a commission should be given all powers to summon witnesses.

The resolution was passed.

### SIR RAMASWAMY AIYER

Sir, C. P. Ramaswamy Aiyar Dewan of Travancore is at his own request relinquishing the office of Dewan. It is understood that the Maharajah of Travancore has agreed to release him from the office. It is gathered that Sir Ramaswamy decided to retire in order to be able to exercise complete freedom of writing and speaking in the discussion relating to the future Indian Constitution.
