The Morning Star And Qurselves,

In our leader of the 22nd Ultimo headed "Practice versus Precept", we had to comment on a Christian gentleman's letter in the Morning Star, which appeared above the nom de plume of 'Theophilus' and dealt with a previous leader of ours on the non--practice by Christians of the precepts taught by Christ. "Theophilus" replies to our second article in the "Star" of the 13th Instant. The reply does not deal with the main points at issue between us, but only with side-issues. The tu quoque argument is freely indulged in, as if the alleged superiority of Christianity to Hinduism, is demonstrated by proving that Hindus areas bad as Christians. We do not wish to prolong the controversy, and if we revert to the subject once more, it is to obtain the verdict of the public, on the charge of misrepresenting Mosaical teachings preferred by Theophilus. As to the points left untouched here, the public -- Christians as well as Rindus—will be able to judge aright by comparing what Theophilus and we have said. We have also to observe that the last letter of Theophilus is written with a "feeling". which should not be the characteristic of a "Christian", and which "heathen" as we are, we have not shown towards him.

Theophilus assails our position that Moses and 1 Christ taught opposite doctrines, the

one the religion of revenge, and the other the religion of love, in the following terms:—

"That the first statement of the "Organ" is ill-founded will appear from the following quotation from the Institutes of Moses "Then shalt not hate thy brother in thy heart and shall not avenge nor bear any grudge against the children of thy people, but thou shalt love thy neighbour as thyself. I am the "Lora". Lev. IX 17, I8. The "Organ" has, evidently, failed to grasp the fact that there are civil or judicial and religious laws in the books of Moses. The punishment inflicted on those who break the civil laws are never held to originate in sentiments of revenge. Even in his civil laws, Moses has exhibited consummate statesmanship. Is the "Organ" in a position to say that the Institutes of Manuare superior to those of Moses in this respect?"

Theophilus will understand that seldom, if ever, we make ill-founded statements about Christianity or Christian Scriptures. He should not place us in the category of Christian Misi naries who after a few months' sojourn in Ceylon or India, take upon themselves to pass under review Hinduism, Hindu literature, and Hindu institutions as if "critical" powers have been vouchsafed

to them from heaven.

In Exodus XXI,24 and Leviticus XXIV, 20 Moses preaches: "Eye for eye, tooth for tooth, hand for hand, foot for foot" &c .. As against this position of Moses, Theophilus quotes Leviticus XIX., 17, 18 where Moses says: "Thou shalt not hate thy brother" &c .. Theophilus makes an attempt to distinguish between the "civil" and "religious" laws in the books of Moses. Apart from the fact that Moses nowhere draws any distinction between civil and religion laws, the passages quoted by Theophilus occur in a chapter where civil laws are laid down. The 26th and 27th verses, for example, of Chapter XIX deals with "eating" and "rounding" one's head. Therefore, according to all known canons of interpretation the verses quoted by Theophilus must be construed to mean that an Iraelite should not hate an Israelite (his brother), and those in Exodus XX1 and Leviticus XXIV must be construed to apply to non-Israelites who were required to be revenged. Jesus Christ himself, who never dealt with the "civil laws" of the Jews, understood Exodus XXI and Leviticus XXIV in the sense in which we have taken them. And Theophilus cannot certainly say that Christ Jesus misunderstood the Bible. In Matthew V says Christ: "Ye have heard that it hath been said, an eye for an eye, and a tooth for a tooth..... 'Ye have heard that it hath been said, Thoushalt love thy neighbour and hate thine enemy, But I say unto you, Love your enemies, bless them that curse you, do good to them that hate you, and pray for them which spitefully use you and perse-dus XXI and Leviticus XXIV are referred to showing thereby that Moses did not deal with the "civil laws" of the Israelites in those chapters. Will Theophilus argue that the Sermon in the Mount where Christ abrogates the Mosaic law was intended to apply to the civil transactions of the Jews?

Throughout the books of Moses, "Theophilus" will find him ordering the massacre of non-Israelites, and in some cases the order was to "spare nothing that breatheth". It is therefore clear that our statement that Moses taught and practised the religion of revenge and Christ the religion of love, is so far from being "ill-founded", supported

by the Bible.

It is quite inexplicable to us why Theophilus should labour hard to prove that the teachings of Moses and Christ are identical. Admittedly Christ founded a "new dispensation", and the salvation of the world now comes by Christ. Our reference to Moses was only to show that though Christ introduced the religion of love and himself contrasted it with the teachings of Moses by placing them in juxtaposition with his own teachings, yet it is the rules laid down by Moses that are followed by Christian nations all the world over.

The question whether the Institutes of Manu are superior to those of Moses is irrelevant. Moses was the mouth-piece of God and founded the Jewish religion. the predecessor of Christianity. Manu certainly was not the founder of Hindusm. Inneed Hinduism does not stake its existence ou the Avatarhood or Incarnation of any person. It takes its stand on principles which are universally and eternally true. Even if the sayings or teachings of any particular "Rishi" or seer like Moses are found to be untenable, Hinduism will still stand. It is the only religion in the world that does not derive its name from a particular founder. The basic principles of Hinduism are not "doctrinal", but self--evident. However that may be, when we stated that Hinduism embraced the teachings of Christ and much more, we meant only to say that Christ, one of the greatest sages of Asia, taught and practised untils. which are found in Hinduism. Our Christian brethren, who believe in such doctrines as "Salvation by the blood of Christ", "Eucharist", &c, have no reason at all to traverse our position. As unprejudiced critics of Christ's teachings, we admitted that he laid down high moral precepts. Christians are certainly in agreement with us on this point. Then how have we given cause for the charge that we do not "know" the teachings of Christ sufficiently well? Knowledge and belief are not always co-extensive. If we do not believe in Christ's atonement, and did not refer to it in our paper, non constat that we are in ignorance of what it is. Our Christian friends will learn to be charitable to us.

Hoursafter hours elapsed. Gentle sleep clasped his weary limbs. All of a sudden he fell into a swoon. 3. Tenders are invited for the purchases of the timbers as they stand in the jungle.
