### Jaffna and Plague Regulations.

Though Jaffna is India's next door neighbour and is, to all intents and purposes, a part and parcel of that Continent, yet it has been for the last three years cut off from all direct communication with India in order to protect it from the introduction of the bubonic plague, which has been prevailing in India for some years past. The loss, hardship, and inconvenience, which the people of Jaffna suffer on account of the quarantine regulations rigorously enforced as a preventive measure against the introduction of the bubonic plague from India, are not adequately understood and felt by the Government. As the Government was influenced in its action by the best of intentions, and as we thought that these stringent regulations were only of a temporary nature and would not assume, as they have now assumed, a permanent character, we have hitherto refrained from saying anything antagonistic to the measure, and have, on the contrary, supported it. Finding however, that the best interests of the Peninsula suffer by the further continuance of these quarantine regulations, we are now led to plead for their relaxation in some form or other.

Jaffna is more closely connected with India than any other part of Ceylon, not only on account of its proximity to it, but also on account of racial and so many other considerations. It was peopled from Southern India, and from ancient times the intercourse between the neighbouring continent and Jaffna has been very close, easy, and frequent, in fact closer, easier, and more frequent than between Jaffna and any other part of Ceylon, the two countries being separated by only about forty miles of sea. We depend upon India not only for our food supply and other necessities of life, but also for most of our luxuries. The only market outside this Island for the staple product of this Peninsula—tobacco—is India. Thousands of the sons of Jaffna are employed in different parts of that continent, and education being cheaper and more substantial there than in Ceylon, large number of our young men go over to India for their education. The sacred Shrines of the Hindus,—who form the vast majority of the Tamils of Ceylon,—being also in India, pilgrimages to those shrines are also of frequent occurrence. All the Saivite Priests who perform funeral obsequies and most of those who solemnize marriages, among the Hindus of Jaffna, come also from India. And hundreds of families here depend for their livelihood on the trade on cloths, jewellery, bulls, cury staffs, &c., imported from South India, which under existing restrictions cannot be easily carried on.

A trip to and from India whether on business, pleasure, or pilgrimage was, till the enforcement of the present quarantine regulations about three years ago, easy and inexpensive, so much so that one could have gone from and returned to Jaffna, after visiting some of the most important centres of South India, within a week's time and at a cost of a few rupees. But since the ports

of Jaffna were closed against the landing of passengers from India, not only the return trip from India has become very expensive, but also very tedious and attended with very great risks and delays. Owing to this cause people in Jaffna refrain from going to India to attend to their usual avocations, except under the direst necessity, and thereby become great losers. Jaffnese in India who hold offices under the Indian Government and in Native States and who used to visit their native land frequently, have been obliged for the last three years to forego the pleasure of paying a visit to their kith and kin and to look after their property situated in Jaffna. They have been long indulging in the hope that the regulations which were intended as a temporary measure, would not be permanently enforced, and that they would be enabled when the regulations are relaxed or removed, to travel as freely and conveniently as before.

It cannot, therefore, be denied that the present quarantine regulations are working incalculable harm to the vital interests of the Peninsula in general although our stay-at-home friends have not yet begun to realize it, and attribute the immunity which Jaffna enjoys from the plague solely to the precautionary measures of the Government. The plague seems to have become endemic in India. Is Jaffna, then, to be denied for ever direct communication with its neighbour and mother country? We do not think any one with sufficient knowledge of the facts and circumstances stated above will answer this question in the affirmative.

The only course now open is to relax the present stringent rules and allow the landing of passengers from India in one of the ports of Jaffna, under such safeguards as have been tried and found efficient in the metropolis of the Island. If the precautionary measures adopted in Colombo, where thousands of passengers, most of them the scums of society, land daily, have been the means of saving the Island from the visitation of the plague, how much more successfully similar measures can be carried out in Jaffna? The passengers who land in Colombo daily are not only thousands in number and composed for the most part of estate coolies, but also include persons from plague infected localities in India. Proper examination of these passengers, therefore, by the Medical Officers both at Tutucorin and Colombo is impossible. Knowing as we do the process of examination which obtain, in Tutucorin we think that the prevention of the introduction of the plague into Ceylon is not solely due to the preventive measures adopted by the Government.

We do not propose the entire removal of the quarantine regulations now in force in Jaffna, but advocate, as we have already stated, the relaxation of them by allowing the landing of only such passengers from India as could produce a health certificate from a responsible officer of Government in India, certifying to the fact that the passenger was coming from a place not infected with plague and that he was resident in that locality for at least one week prior to the granting of the certificate. This would be a more effective means of preventing the introduction of the plague into Jaffna than the system of examination now obtaining in Tutucorin. And this could be carried out in Jaffna without additional expenditure to Government as there is a Medical Officer now stationed in Kaits to enforce the quarantine regulations now in force in Jaffna. Even if a necessity for additional expenditure arises, we do not think the Government will grudge it, in view of the great relief which the relaxation of the present quarantine regulations will afford to His Majesty's subjects in this part of the Island.



It is worthy of notice in this connection that the Jaffna passengers who experience so much difficulty, under the present regulations, in returning to their country after a visit to or sojourn in India, are composed almost entirely of respectable persons who have nothing to do with the plague infected parts of that Continent, but have business and official connections with South India which is free from that epidemic. It is a well known fact that, though the plague has been prevailing in the Northern and central parts of India for the last four years or so, no indigenous case has occurred during this period, in those parts of South India whence the vast majority of the passengers return to Jaffna.

In our humble opinion, the Government does not seem to be acting consistently in the matter of enforcing the plague rules. Indian passengers bound to Trincomalee and Batticaloa are allowed to get on board the Ceylon Steamship Company steamers at Paumban, but Jaffna passengers are strictly prohibited from doing so. But the strangest part of the thing is that, Indian coolies required for the Northern Railway works are now allowed to land at Kaits under proper safeguards and quarantine, and proceed to the place where they are to be employed, but not the residents of Jaffna who are well known for their cleanly habits. Why not accord this privilege to the Jaffna passengers who would prefer landing in one of the Jaffna ports and being even kept in quarantine on shore for a fixed number of days in camps intended for the purpose, to the long, costly, and hazardous trip via Colombo which they are now obliged to undertake in returning to Jaffna?

We earnestly hope that our Government will consider the inconvenience, trouble, and hardship which the present regulations cause to the inhabitants of the North, and see its way to relax the present regulations in the direction indicated by us. The Government has so long enforced the rules with the best of motives and in the best interests of the people. But in our opinion the time has come for their relaxation, and we have not the slightest doubt that His Excellency Sir Joseph West Ridgeway whose attention was drawn to the subject at Point Pedro, will before he goes to England in April see his way to afford some relief to the Tamils of Jaffna in this respect.

### His Excellency The Governor's Visit.

Never before in the history of Jaffna had such grand reception been accorded to any ruler foreign or native as that accorded to Sir West Ridgeway on the occasion of his last visit. His Excellency landed on the 9th, and was received in the Customs Pandal by Mr. Ievers, Mr. Sanders, the Rev. Dr. J. J. Main, the Hon'ble Dr. Rockwood and others. The principal members of the Railway Committee, Reception Committee, headmen and other Government officials were also present. The Sea Beach Road, the Reclamation road, and all the avenues to the city were full of sight-seers and spectators and the whole looked a sea of heads. Mr. Advocate Kanagasabai was introduced to the Governor by His Excellency, who was thereafter, driven to the Fort by the 3rd Cross Street and the Main Street. Though thousands of people attended the landing, and the roads of the town were full of spectators, there was not a single breach of the peace, not a single mishap or accident. This is as much due to the vigilance of the Police as to the law abiding character of the people.

On the 10th Instant, an address was presented to His Excellency at the Pandal put up at the Kachcherri premises, the reply to which we published in our last issue. The address will be found in our columns elsewhere. Nearly a month before the 10th Instant, the Government Agent had issued invitations to the leading residents of Jaffna, officials and unofficials, to attend a garden party held on that day in order to meet His Excellency the Governor. The whole Jaffna was astir to respond to the invitation, and from 2 P. M. up to 4.30 P. M. gentlemen from all parts of Jaffna poured into the "Old Park" to honour His Excellency. Immense crowds of people lined the streets leading to the Kachcherri, and all the approach roads were filled to overflowing.

The reading of the address over, His Excellency held a levee which was attended by all the prominent members of the Jaffna community. The Levee over, His Excellency was seen to walk about the garden in front of the Pandal. His Excellency left the Pandal and was driven to the King's House at about 6 O'clock.

On the 11th Instant, His Excellency paid a private visit to Chavakachcherri early morning and at about 8. A. M. arrived at the F. N. S. Hospital, when an address was presented to him. His Excellency went over the Hospital grounds and was pleased with all that he saw. In the evening about 4-30, His Excellency drove to the Railway premises, where an address was presented to him by the Railway officials, to which His Excellency suitably replied. Then the first train between Jaffna and Kangesanturrai was run containing His Excellency and suite, the Government Agent, and all the officials and the leading residents of Jaffna. The train started back from Kangesanturrai about 6-30, and reached Jaffna before 7 O'clock. His Excellency was escorted to the Fort from the railway station by a torch light procession which was very grand and imposing. Next morning His Excellency and suite left for Point Pedro. A report of the functions held at Pt. Pedro will be found elsewhere.

### LOCAL & GENERAL

The Jaffna Hindu College—The Ordinance to incorporate the Board of Directors of the Hindu College has been passed. On behalf of the Hindu community we thank Mr. Obaysekara for carrying the Bill through the Council.

The Jaffna Agricultural Company Limited—A Company has been started in Jaffna under the above name with a capital of Rs 100000 divided into 5000 shares of Rs 20 each for the purpose of acquiring lands in the Wanni districts and cultivating the same with paddy, tobacco, and other products. Among the Directors are Mr. William Mather, a most successful company promoter, Mr. Kanagasabai and others. Nearly 2500 shares have been sold though the company was started only on the 11th Instant.

The Muniagar of Poonakari—Mr. F. R. Sandrasegaram, the young and energetic Muniagar of Poonakari, has been appointed to act as Muniagar of Delt and President of Village Tribunals in that Island, in addition to his own duties as Muniagar of Poonakari and Tanukai. We congratulate Mr. Sandrasegaram on his new appointment.

Persons—Among the gentlemen who came to Jaffna from outstations in connection with the Governor's visit, we noticed Mr. A. A Reception to the Hon. Dr. Rockwood—A reception was accorded in the District Court-house Jaffna on the 11th Instant to the Hon. Dr. W. G. Rockwood. It was largely and respectably attended. Mr. F. M. We regret that circumstances have prevented Lady Ridgeway from coming amongst us on this happy occasion—the more so, as her Excellency has always been foremost in all good works for the benefit of the people.

### CORRESPONDENCE.

#### HIS EXCELLENCY'S VISIT TO POINT PEDRO.

##### RECEPTION SECOND TO NONE.

His Excellency drove in a carriage and pair from Jaffna on the morning of the 12th Instant through many pandals and arches all along the route of 21 miles and arrived at Point Pedro close upon 9 O'clock accompanied by Mr. Ievers and the aid de-camp and was received by Mr. Allegecon, Police Magistrate, Messrs. Theyver Nagalingam, Sub-collector Kretser, Muniagar Sivasidamparam, Manikkam, Proctor Subramaniam Senior, Candappa, Velauthampillai, Post and Telegraph Master Venayagam, Proctor Ganapatipillai, Surveyor Ganapathipillai, Kandiah, Panniamorthy, Muttnvelu, Arambamorthy, Interpreter Nicholas, Nagalingam, Bastiampillai, Velupillai, Ropes, Shroff Sittampalam, Sithambarapillai, Ganagarayer, and thousands of others, and was conducted to the pandal which was put up by Mr. Theyver Nagalingam, the leading merchant and shipowner, who spared neither pains nor money to do everything that could make the reception a grand and magnificent one. The pandal was very tastefully decorated under his personal supervision within the short space of a few days which elapsed after it was known that His Excellency's visit to Point Pedro, His Excellency took his seat on the



platform with Mr. Ievers on his left and Mr. Allegecoon on his right. The Lieutenant Governor, the General Manager of Railways, and the Private Secretary who cycled ahead and arrived at the Rest-house a little earlier, then came and took their seats also in the platform. An address welcoming His Excellency and praying for a branch line of the Railway from Kaugesanturai to Point Pedro and thence to Kodikamam meeting the main line at that station, and relaxation of the quarantine regulations now in force, and thanking His Excellency for the benefits of the Railway to the North, the prospect of which at one time was characterized as a tantalizing vision has now become an accomplished fact by His Excellency's untiring efforts and complimenting Mr. Ievers for his wise and able administration and his indefatigable efforts to advance the interests and resources of the people, and Mr. Allegecoon for the able and acceptable way in which he administers justice in the law courts, was read in a very clear and audible tone by Mr. Vadivelu, Registrar of Births and Deaths, and a son of Postmaster Vinayagam. His Excellency replied in feeling terms and expressed hopes that Point Pedro would have a branch line in due course, and that the relaxation of quarantine would also be considered. His Excellency also expressed an intention to improve the harbour at Point Pedro, the desirability of which His Excellency said was brought to his notice, and complimented Mr. Allegecoon for having amply answered His Excellency's expectations in giving the people of Point Pedro a magistrate of their own nationality. Mr. Chit. Kailasapillai interpreted His Excellency's reply. Besides Kailasapillai Modliar, Mr. Thilainathar, Maniagar of Valigamam West, Mr. Sandrasegara Maniagar of Poonskari, and Joseph Sandrasegara, Interpreter, Provincial Road Committee, were also noticed among these present. Proceedings in the Reception Pandal having come to a close, His Excellency left for the Rest-house amidst the din of native music and firing of cannons, and in the way His Excellency was making several enquiries about Point Pedro from Mr. Allegecoon who was walking by his left and on arrival at the Rest-house His Excellency once more thanked the people for the cordial Reception accorded him, and then the company dispersed. The gubernatorial party had breakfast at the Rest-house and at three O'clock in the evening they walked up to Mr. Allegecoon's residence where His Excellency was received by Misses Edith and Florence Allegecoon at the main entrance, who sprinkled Rose-water, garlanded, and presented bouquets. His Excellency and the Lieutenant Governor and party with Mr. Ievers, after introduction to the inmates of the house in which young Walter Ridgeway Allegecoon was not forgotten, had tea at the magistrate's, the Misses Allegecoon in the meantime entertaining the party to some choice songs. His Excellency was from there conducted in procession to the Jetty where a very neatly, tastefully, and lavishly decorated cargo boat awaited. This was also got up by Mr. Theyvar Nagalingam. At the jetty Mr. Nagalingam was introduced by Mr. Ievers to His Excellency who expressed his thanks to him for having taken so much trouble in getting His Excellency pay a visit to Point Pedro and according a most enthusiastic reception at his own cost. His Excellency also stated that had he left Ceylon without visiting Point Pedro, which is found to be a very important, prosperous, and growing town, he would have been very sorry. hearty cheers were called for by the Sub-Collector Mr. Kretser and were lustily given. Firing of salutes after salutes continued till the steamer was out of sight, and an unprecedented public reception was so very successfully closed.

It is considered a great fortune to Point Pedro that His Excellency was able to spare so much time here on his first visit to Point Pedro, which, we hope, will not be the last.
