The Faffna Agricultural Company Limited.

The formation of this Company marks an important event in the annals of Jaffna.

It was started on the 11th ultimo-the very day the first section of the Northern Railway was opened-in response to the earnest appeal of His Excellency the Governor, made the previous day, in the course of his speech at the Kachcheri Pandal calling upon the people of Jaffna to colonize the Values and utilize for cultivation the immensetractoffertilelands which would soon be brought within easy reach of the inhabitants of this Peninsula by the opening of this Railway.

On the morning of the 11th ultimo the members of the Managing Committee of the Jaffna F. N. S. Hospital as sembled in the Committee Room to receive His Excellency the Governor and present him with an Address. They had to wait for an hour before His Excellency arrived, and, in the meantime the members informal ly discussed among themselves the bearings of the Governor's speech and considered in what manner effect could be given to His Excellency's wishes in regard to the development of the Vannies. The happy idea of forming a Paddy Cultivation Company was suggested by Mr. Advocate Kanagasabai who urged Mr. W. Mather, the successful promoter of two other Companies in Jaffna, who was present on the occasion, to undertske the formation of this Company also. Mr. Mather having consented to do so, it was agreed that the Company should start with a capital of Rs 50,000 in 2500 shares of Rs 20 each, and that it should be known as "The Jaffna Paddy Cultivation Company." About a thousand shares were taken on the spot before the arrival of the Governor and suite in the Hospital at 8. A. M.; and before that day was over another thousand shares were subscribed to. Mr. levers the Government Agent was informed in the Hospital of what was done in regard to the formation of the Company, and he promised to do all he could to promote its welfare.

The general meeting of those interested in the Company was held on the 17th Instant, under the presidency of Mr. Advocate Kanagasabai, when it was decided to change the name of the Company into "The Jaffna Agricultural Company?', in view of the cultivation of tobacco and other products, besides paddy, being undertaken by the Company. The 2500 shares originally proposed having been almost sold before that date, it was also resolved to increase the capital to Rs 100,000 by the addition of another 2500 shares. The following gentlemen were appointed first Directors of the Company, viz Messrs A. Kanagasabai, C. Tiru-Navuk-Arasu, Isaac Thambyah, V. Casippillai, G. S. Johnpillai, S. Thambvahpillai, W. Mather R. C. Alexander, S. Asaippillai, S. Veluppillai, R. M. Velupillai, A. Sapapathy, M. M. Meyadeen, S. Visuvappa, S. Sethupathy and M. Chinnappah; of whom Mr. Mather was appointed Managing Director and Mr. Alexander Secretary of the Company; and Messrs. Mather, Casippillai, Asaipillai R. M. Velupillai, Sethupathy and Sapapathy were appointed a sub-committee to select the Vannies the best sites for the agricultural operation of the Company and report on it to the Directors. Messrs. Casippillai, and Asaipillai, have already left here for the Vannies on this important mission; and, considering the var ed experience of these gentlemen as planters and agriculturalists, we have no doubt that their recommendations will reet with approval.

Such is the history of the origin and growth as it stands at present, of the Company which is destined to play an important part in the development of the wilds of the Vannies which were at one time the "Granary of Ceylon" and to make the railway to the North and their rigation policy of the Government a success. It would also

be seen that this Company was formed not so much for the individual gain and benefit of those who originated and fathered it, as it is for the good of the community at large. It is more a philanthrophic and public undertaking than a speculative one, though it cannot also as a speculative concern fail to be a grand success, if properly worked, The success of the Company will give a rude shock to the expectations of those pessimists who hold that even the construction of this railway cannot be the means of regenerating the wilds of the Northern parts of the Island, and will prove that His Excellency Sir J. West Ridgeway's confidence in the capacity of the Jaffnese to colonize the Vannies and develop their resources has not been misplaced. On the success or failure of this Company will greatly depend the future of the Irrigation works which the Government have constructed or are going to construct in the Northern and North-Central Provinces of the Island. We do not say that the Jaffna Agricultural Company will take up the whole regions to be irrigated by these tanks and bring them under cultivation. But what we mean is that if this pioneer company would prove a successful undertaking, not only will other Companies follow the example of this Company, but thousands of private individuals also will acquire lands and take to cultivation in those regions, converting the Vannies into what they once were the granary of Ceylon. It is therefore, to be hoped that the Government will afford every facility in their power for the acquirement of dands by this Company and grant them on easy terms, so that the result of its working might be of mutual benefit both to the Government and to the Company. Sir J. West Ridgeway is a farsighted states nan to see that the Jaffna Agricultural Company is an auxiliary to the success of his Railway and Irrigation policy; and, we feel sure, His Excellency will not fail to enc urage and turn to good account the enterprise and public spirit shewn in the formation of this Com-

Under the fostering care of his successors it supplied for many years the medical wants of the whole District and still dues so to a very great exteut alth a h hospitals and dispensaries have recently been established in various parts of

On the motion of Mr. A. C. Krishnapillai seconded by Mr. S. J. Benjamin, J. N. Tisseveerasinghe Esqr., Advocate, was voted to the Chair.

Proposed by Mr. T. S. Tillainayagam. B. A., and seconded by Mr. J. A. Ondatjie, that Mr. P. Nicholas be elected Hony. Secretary.

Tue Chairman then addressed the Meeting and said that he thanked them for electing him as their President and he was glad to preside at the Meeting because it was a meeting composed entirely of his own countrymen. The object of the meeting was a very praiseworthy one. From the notice which had been circulated, they would have learnt the object of the meeting; it was to evince their gratitude to a great benefactor of the country. It did not require any argument to convince them that the Jaffaa Railway was a great boon-perhaps the greatest boon that has been conferred on the Jaffnese by any ruler or Government, native or foreign, since the blind Minstrel Yalpadi settled down in the Jaffna Peninsula and colonised it by settlers from Scith India. It was South india. It was equally indisputable that they owed this boon to the statesmanlike policy and the strenuous and indefatigable efforts made by their present Governor in the face of many and seemingly insurmountable obstacles. Several resolutions would be submitted for carrying out the object of the meeting and the gantlemen who have to propose and second these resolutions would explain them to the meeting and it was not necessary for him, (the speaker) to say anything about that then. The Chairman then dwelt at some length on the two prominent traits in the character of the Jaffnese-their Patriotism and Gratitude-ample proof of which was given in the movement now started by them in connection with the Northern Railway. Dr. Hallock was then called upon to propose the Resolu-

tion standing in his name.

The learned Dr. in a brief speech pointed out that the Jaffna Railway which had been mooted years ago, had only now been realised, which was due to the statesmanlike efforts of His Excellency Sir Joseph West Ridgeway, and is a great boon to the people of Jaffna. He referred to his having travelled along and the people of the people of Jaffna. the North Road and the difficulties he experienced. He added that His Excellency's memory should by all means be perpetuated: that there have been several proposals regarding the form the memorial should take; some had suggested a Town Hall, others a Statue. and so on; but in whatever form it might be, there

should be a permanent Memorial, and he said he had

much pleasure in moving.
"That this Meeting, on behalf of the Jaffnese, resident in Batticaloa, being alive to a sense of the fact that His Excellency the Right Honourable Sir Joseph West Ridgeway, G. C. M. G., K. C. B. K. C. S. I., Governor of Ceylon, by his obtaining for the Northern Railway the sanction of the Secretary of the State, and getting a good portion of the work completed in such a short time, has conferred on the people of the North a greater benefit than what any previous Ruler has done for them, and has thereby placed them under a deep debt of gratitude-is of opinion that His Excellency's memory be perpetuated by a Permanent Memorial."

S. N. G. Eliyatampi Mudr. in seconding the Resolution, said that the Chairman had properly remarked that the Jaffnese are noted for patriotism and gratitude and that they should be true to that saying. Before seconding the Resolution, he said he thought it right that two things should be considered.

1st, Whether the Railway was really a boon to the

2nd. Whother His Excellency's act in respect to it was such a special one as to place them under any deep debt of gratitude.

As to the first point he said the proposer had explained to them how it was advantageous, and the benefits they were about to enjoy were so very palpable that it would have been superfluous for the speaker to go over them. The second point, he said, was the most important part of it; they were all aware that the idea of the Railway to the North was proposed by many at the beginning and influential men opposed it, and His Excellency had to fight a hard battle to get them this boon and has thereby placed them under a deep debt of gratitude, and that they should therefore heartily join in the noble movement that has been

Mr. K. V. Markandan supported the Resolution which was unanimously carried amidst loud cheers. Mr. T. S. Tillamayagam B. A., in a clear and lucid

speech proposed the 2nd Resolution.

"That subscriptions be raised locally, and for this purpose a committee consisting of the following gentlemen be elected:—The Chairman, the Secretary, the Treasurer, Messrs K. V. Markandan, S. N. G. Eliyatampi Mudr., J. P. Clarke Mudr., A. Cathiravelupillai, N. Ponnampalam, Dr. D. P. Nicholas, J. T. Muttiah Mudr., Dr. S. Hallock, & Messrs. L. Manuel, C. Ponniah Mudr., C. Muttiah, E. Crowther, R. A. Masrtensz & C. T. Tampoe."

And in doing so he stated that after the eloquent words that fell from the previous speakers it would be almost superfluous for him to add anything to them. If they had listened only to the suggestions of self-interest, the feeling uppermost in their minds that evening, should be to dissociate themselves from the good brethren of Jaffna, who have set on foot the movement to perpetuate the memory of Governor Ridgeway's administration under which the Railway to Jaffna was brought about. But they were not selfish and so gladly availed themselves of the opportunity of contributing their mite towards the accom-plishment of that worthy scheme. The speaker added that he was quite unable to infuse any enthusiasm into the minds of those present but would, taking the cue from the Chairman, venture to suggest as their motto that evening the well known lines of Sir Walter

Scott with a slight alteration:—

"Land of my sires, what mortal hand
Can e'er untie the filial hand.

That knits me to My NATIVE LAND?"

He then appealed to those present to contribute liberally towards the Memorial and make that evening's

meeting a thorough success.

The Resolution was seconded by Mr. A. Thuraiappa and supported by Mr. M. Chellappa-tried unanimously.

Proposed by Mr. J. N. Olegasagram and seconded by Mr. M. Chellappah, Mr. A. Thuraiappa was elected Hon'y Treasurer.

Proposed by Mr. S. J. Benjamin, Proctor, seconded by Mr. A. Cathiravelupillai, Head Clerk, P. W. D., and carried unanimonsly.

"That the subscriptions collected be forwarded to the Hon'y Secretary of the Parent Committee in Jaffna to be used in aid of the funds collected by the said Committee for a Permanent Memorial,"

Mr. Benjamin in proposing, said that he took the deepest interest in everything national; meetings such as the one then held, help to infuse fresh strength into the drooping spirit of many a countryman of his, especially those in such a dull and monotonous place as Batticaloa. The Jaffna Railway he said was the realization of the wildest and most beautiful dream of the modern Jaffnese. He said that when he was young they spoke of a Railway to Jaffna. Then it seemed to him as far from the field of possibilities as the most impossible figure in ancient mythology. But now it was a realized fact and there could be little doubt about the success of an undertaking which had been considered beneficial to the country by Sir J. West Ridgeway, a far-sighted politician, keen diplomatist and a Ruler of wonderful administrative capacity. The opposers of the Jaffna Railway, he said, whether they be Europeans or Burghers, Sinhalese or Tamils, would soon begin to praise it. He added that he was perfectly certain that the members of the Parent Committee were quite capable of deciding the form the Permanent Memorial should take.

Mr- C. Ponniah Mudr, when called upon remarked that the previous speakers and the resolutions proposed by them dealt with the subject of the Permanent Memorial and it was not necessary to say anything

urther about it; and he said he had great pleasure

in proposing the following resolution.
"That a telegram be despatched to His Excellency the Gonernor on the opening day of the first section of the Northern Railway conveying the grateful thanks of the Jafinese resident in Batticaloa for the boon conferred by His Excellency in giving the Railway."

Mr. R. A. Maartensz, Postmaster seconded and Mr. J. W. Olegesakaram supported earried unanimously. J. P. Clarke Mudlr. in a humorous and lengthy speech, partly in Tamil referred to "gratitude" touched on by the Chairman in his address, quoting

from Tiruvalluvar that "a good deed done must not be forgot, a bad deed must at once". He ob erved that the previous resolutions appealed to their purses but the one he had appealed to their heart.

Mental speed surpassed all other speed such as the railway, telegraph, &c.. He pictured a tailless grateful dog looking into the eye. He brought to painful recollection the name of that patriot and philanthropist, the late lamented Mr. Advocate S. Nagalingam who had worked for the Railway, and paid a high compliment to the departed hero.

He compared the obtaining of the Northern Railway to a hard-contested battle fought by that General Hon. Mr. P. Ramanathan C. M. G., with Governor Gordon and Hon. Messrs O'Brien and Christie; but, he said, that it remained indecisive when he (Mr. Ramanathan) became a Government Servant.

Still, the speaker added, there was another General yet out in the field, the great Father Lytton. O. M. I. who gathered arms and ammunitions, as if it were, by collecting facts and figures, publishing voluminous Railway pamphlets, and bringing home to all in the monster meeting held in Colombo (in which, the speaker thought, he was only an insignificant spectator) indisputable arguments in favour of the Railway. The noble priest, he said, went even so far as the Downing street for an interview in order to secure us this boon.

Still, the fort had to be entered into, the doors kept closed by Sir William Twynam had to be opened for which purpose Mr. R. W. Ievers stepped forward.

Of the several prominent gentlemen that deserved the gratitude of his countrymen, two remained besides H. E. Sir J. West Ridgeway; and the speaker said that he had great pleasure therefore to propose.
