The "Fimes of Ceylon" and the "Mild Hindu."


What the red rag is to the bull the "mild Hindu" is to the Times of Ceylon. He moves heaven and earth and leaves no stone unturned to prevent the appointment of the Hindu Solicitor-General even to act for the Attorney General, which the latter had done on three previous occasions in spite of the

clamour and protests of our contemporary, although on two other occasions others were appointed to act for the Attorney--General, for reasons best known to Gov ernment which they are not bound to disclose. But His Excellency the Governor was pleased to make known to the public by means of a communique published in all the Colombo dailies why Mr. Ramanathan was not appointed on the last occasion when Mr. Layard went to Australia to represent this Colony at the Common-wealth celebration. This communique which we published in a recent issue of this paper fully admitted Mr. Ramanathan's claims to act as Attorney General on future occasions, as long as he holds the appointment of Solicitor General. Although Mr. Ramanathan was entitled to be appointed permanently as Attorney General in succession to Mr. Layard yet we cannot hold His Excellency the Governor responappointment of Mr. sible for the Kershaw as Mr. Layard's successor, since this appointment has been made outside the Colony by the Secretary of State. It is too much to expect the appointment of a local man as Attorney-General, simul taneously with the elevation of a colonial official as Chief Justice of the Colony. But the tactics of the Times and other Colombo papers, with the exception of the Independent, to prevent the appointment of the Solicitor-General to act as Attorney-General till the arrival of Mr. Kershaw, betray not only great malice but also implacable racial and religious hatred. We do not think the Government will be a party to the machinations of Mr. Ramanathan's enemies. If they yield to this unreasonable clamour, public confidence in the assurances of Government and their professions of just and impartial treatment of all officials, whether Europeans or natives, Christian-or non-Christians, would be considerably shaken.

Our object in writing this article is not so much to vindicate Mr. Ramanathan's claims for a higher appointment as it is to expose the vile calumnies and discreditable tactics of his enemies, evidently resorted to to prejudice him and his relatives and co-religionists in the eyes of the Government and the public. The latest attempt of this kind was contained in the Times of Ceylon of the 12th Instant, in connection with the Hon'ble Dr. Rockwood's visit to Jaffna. Our

contemporary says:-

"The Tamil M. L. C. has been much in the "public eye" recently, on account of the spontaneous and remarkably general welcome accorded to him on his recent visit to Jaffna, and now, on the eve of his longer journey, numerous will be the good wishes of Europeans and Ceylonese alike. It will hardly be credited that a number of telegrams were sent from Colombo to Jaffna, urging that Dr. Rockwood's visit should not be made the occasion of a celebration. The argument of the "mild Hindu" was that those appealed to would jeopardise their own interests over the recovery of the seat in Council if they showed to the island generally that the doctor had any popularity or recognition outside Colombo. The temper of the North, however, was wrongfully estimated, and, although Dr. Rockwood contributed nothing to the tamasha-monetary help being common among Oriental recipients of honours -and was entirely taken by surprise, the Jaffnese of all positions and beliefs vied with each other in doing him honour. His envious compatriots in Colombo then said that it must have been done at the Government Agent's suggestion, the fact being that Mr. Ievers was unaware of Dr. Rockwood's unexpected visit until the arrival of the steamer. The incident did credit to the Jaffnese, and not to their Colombo friends who were 'hoist with their own petard."



"Our contemporary tells a strange story of the despatch of telegrams from Colombo, so soon as Dr. Rockwood's recent visit to the North was announced, cautioning some of the leading Tamil residents in Jaffia against taking part in demonstrations of welcome. We have reason to believe that the story is authentic; and we regret to say we feel no surprise at the action of the Colombo partisans, such is the bitterness of feeling roused by defeat among people who have not been educated to political rights and controversies. But our Tamil friends here ought to know that it was absurd for them to pretend that Dr. Rockwood was a nobody on his appointment to the Legislative Council, after they had themselves chosen him as their Chairman at the most important meetings held in Colombo, when the seat had fallen vacant, on two previous occasions. It is to the credit of the Jaffnese that they paid no heed to the petty promptings from Colombo. In honouring so distinguished a countrymen of theirs, who has further earned the respect and confidence of the members of every community in the island, they were honouring themselves. The good Doctor's reputation-not only as one of our ablest medicos, but also as a high-principled Christian gentleman-cannot suffer by such attempts to bel'ttle him; and we are sure his well earned holiday will not be clouded by pondering on such pettinesses"

Now that we deny the whole story being in a position to do so, the Observer also is bound to disclose the reason that made him 'believe that the story is authentic'. It cannot be denied that the persons meant by the Times and the Observer are thepredecessors of Dr Rockwood in the Tamil seat in Council or their friends in Colombo.

Dr. Rockwood's visit to Jaffna took place more than a month ago, and the Times paragraph in question was published just a month after the reception accorded to the Doctor in the Jaffna District Court Hall. It would be interesting to know why this story of the telegrams in question was so long withheld from the public and reserved till now without finding a place in the glowing accounts of the reception sent to the Colombo papers. Perhaps such a fabrication as that contained in the paragaph in question and the pitting of one Tamil against another are required at this moment to serve the ulterior objects of the anti-natives represented by the Times of Ceylon. We do not think that Dr. Rockwood who is taken by the Times under his protection would fare better at our contemporary's hands than Mr. Ramanathan, if he is, as the latter is, an aspirant for the Attorney-Generalship. or a seat on the Supreme Court Bench. The Doctor is fortunate in being the most em-

inent Surgeon in Ceylon whose services are required by the Europeans in the Colony, and in occupying a position which will not disturb the vested interests of Europeans.

The present Tamil M L.C.is undoubted!y a distinguished Jaffnese, being one of the ablest medicos in Veyl m and one who has raised himself to his present position by dint of his own perseverence and industry. On his arrival in Jaffna, therefore, after an absence of about 35 years the leading men here called on him and he returned their visits. A reception was organised for him in the District Court Hall, and almost all the persons invited attended. No address was presented there. And it was evident from the speeches made on the occasion that he was honoured not so much for his labours as a legislator as for his eminence and distinction as a medico. This was the "spontaneous and remarkably general" welcomeaccorded to Dr. Rockwood in Jaffra. But why make so much fuss about it, even after the lapse of one month, and why such malignant slanders concerning persons who were utterly indifferent about the whole affair? We hope the Editors of the Times and the Observer will, as fair-minded and honourable journalist's, either substantiate their imputations or withdraw them.

KAPILA AND HIS PHILOSOPHY.

R. A. RAMUPILLY F. T. S. F. R. A. S. PERAK.

Although there are so many works and treatises treating about the founders of the six systems of ancient Hindu Philosophy, yet very few care to learn them. As these treatises are in the original tongue and their English or Tamil Translations are also rare, I think it proper, in my humble opinion, to give out a few salient points on the lives and works of these great Indian Sages excerpted from rare and valuable works both English and Tamil through the medium of a Journal which w uld find itself in the hands of many a reader.

KAPILA. The system of Philosophy introduced and taught by Kapila is called the Sankhya System The Sanskrit word Sankhya means Enumeration. There is a passage in the grand Indian Epic, the Mahabaratha alluding to this word, "They exercise Judgment and discuss Prakriti and other twenty and four principles and therefore called Sankhyas. This system of Philosophy treats by a Synthetical Process that the whole creation is built up from the twenty-five Tattvas. Its opposite school of Nyaya Philosophy founded by Aotama, by an Analytical Process, dissects the whole creation and brings it to the Primodial Elements.

Kapila the founder of this sect as some maintain, was the son of Brahms. Another great sage says that he was one of the Avatars of Sri Kristna. But in the Bahavat Purana he is mentioned to have been an incarnation of Sri Kristna as the son of Devahuti. Whatever may have been his birth, he was, however, one of the greatest sages and philosophers of giant intellect that India has ever produced. His chief works in extant are (1) SankhyaPravachana which is a collection of aphorisms in six Kandams and (2) Tattva Samasa. His fundamental doctrine is that the absolute prevention of the three sorts of pain is the Summum Bonum of the Soul. The three states of pain are First, Evil proceeding from Ego; either from external beings or from supermundane causes. The two remaining sorts are from external sources-the one excited by some mundane being the other by the agency of a being of a superior order produced by a fortuitous cause.

THE OPENING OF THE NORTHERN RAILWAY

DESCRIPTION OF THE CASKET PRESENLED T) H.E THE

Governor by the people of Jaffina on the occasion of Governor by the people of Jaffina on the occasion of his opening the northern section of the Railway has just been brought to Colombo by Mr. Advocate C. Tirunavukarasu, Secretary of the Reception Committee, and has been lodged in the custody of Dr. Rockwood. To the courtery of the latter of Dr. Rockwood. To the courtesy of the latter a representative of the Observer is indebted for an representative of the Observer is indepted for an inspection of the article this morning. The casket, made entirely in Jaffna, is particularly chaste and very beautiful. The body is made of richly polished ebony. Standing about seven inches high, the casket measures some 14 inches by six inches. The casket measures some 14 inches by six inches. delicate workmanship displayed on the handsome and valuable mounting is remarkable. On the top, or lid, of the casket there is in the centre a plain silver plate bearing the inscription:—

"Presented to His Excellency the Right Hon. Sir West Ridgeway, GOMG, KCB, KCBI, Governor of Ceylon, by the people of Jaffna, on the occasion of the opening of the Northern Railway, March, 1902.

Maker, K. Kuttipillai, Jaffna," Surmounting this plate, in the centre, is a raised representation of the Royal Coat-of-arms in solid gold. Two Hindu deities, one borne by an elephant, the other by a peacock, formed in solid gold, are separated from the Coat-of-arms by two silver rose--water sprinklers, while on the other side of each of the deities there is a representation in silver of cups used for containing sandal solutions. Then, occupying the whole width of the casket, there are two ele-phants in silver—one at each end of the casket—one upholding a palmyra and the other a cocoanut palm. Just above these elephants are two golden butterflies, their eyes represented by rare rubies. The whole is bordered by a strip of gold filigree work, studded with large rubies, which in minuteness and delicacy of execution we have never seen excelled. The top sides of the accelerations are mounted with a border of the acceleration. sides of the casket are mounted with a border of silver filigrae work, while a massive silver bead binds the bottom, the vacant space between the two bord-

ers on the sides is fitted up with silver to bacco leaves.

The whole is mounted on four solid silver elephants. Inside, the casket, which is opened by means of ingeniously contrived springs, is lined with purple velvet, and contains the address presented along with the casket, neatly done in gold letters upon white silk and enclosed in a wrapper of red silk. The whole forms a fitting and valuable memento of an interest--The Ceylon Observer. ing event.
