## Ceylon Customs.

(Continued from our last issue.)

The value of exports in 190, amounted to Rs 102,840,313, distributed under the following heads: -

The value of Ceylon Produce exported shows a decrease below the figures of 1899 of Rs 14,118,271 and below 1900 of Rs 4,891,122. This decrease is mainly attributable to the smaller shipments of tea, the value of which has also declined from 36 cents a pound in 1900 to 33 cents in the year under review.

Imports re-exported shiw an increase of Rs 99,752 as compared with 1900 and of Rs 282,762

as compared with 1899.

The value of coal exported for use of steamers fell from Rs 13,963,980 in 1900 to Rs. 12, 931,060 in 1901, the quantities imported having been 590,099 tons in 1900 and 627,723 tons

The exports of specie show a decrease from Rs. 2,919,796 in 1900 to Rs 2,65%,178 n 1901.

The value of exports to the United Kindom has fallen from Rs. 56,295,521 in 1:00 to Rs 50,158,739 in 1901, while there is a ree in the exports to the British Colonies from Rs. 8086, 705 in 1900 to Re. 18,994,800 in 19 1 and to F reign Countries from Rs 20,580,046 in 1900 to Rs 20,755,749 in 1901.

The export of tea to Russia (Asiatic and Eur pean) rose in 1901 by 842 386 lb.; but that to the United States shows a decreese of 249, 412 lb. The exports to Russia (Asiatic and European of Ceylon produce were valued in 1901 at Rs 4,069,415, against Rs. 4 282,500 in 1900. The fall in the value of exports of Ceylon produce to the United States of America in 1901 as compared with 1900 was from Rs 6,602,935 to Bs 5,458,167, and is attributable chiefly to cocoanut oil, which shows a reduction from 66,102 cw., value R. 941,960, to 27, 22 cwt., value Rs 434,766.

In the staple articles of export, cardamoms show a decrease of 232 cwt., as compared with 1900; but there is an increase of 553 cwt. as compared with 1899. The quantity of connamon has fall n from 41,215 cwt. in 1900 to 39,810 cwt. in 1901.

Coir yarn, fibre, and rope exported from the two principal ports (Colombo and Galle) sh w an increase of 27,401 cwt. as compared with 1899, and of 1,084 cwt. as compared with 1900.

Copperah exported from Colombo and Galle also shows an increase of 136038 cwt. as compared with 1899 and of 52,019 cwt. as compared with 1900.

The exports of citronella oil have decreased by 1,920,797 ounces. Of the total value of Ceylon produce exported, the products of the cocoanut palm represent nearly 21 per cent.

Tobacco, unmanufactured, exported in 1901 was 28,283 cwt. of the value of Rs 674.181, which is decrease below 1900 of 14,240 cwt. and Rs. 307,659. This export, of tobacco is from Jaffna alone to Travancore and Cochin, and the decrease in the quantity exported was owing to the partial destruction of the tobacco crop in the middle of 1900 by floods. If Mr. Gibson's, experiment of curing the tobacco of this District to suit European markets will succeed there is, indeed, a bright future for Ceylon tobacco, as the cultivation will increase, resulting in a corresponding increase in the quantity exported.

### QUARANTINE REGULATIONS AND JAFFNA.

We stated in a past issue of this paper that an influentially signed memorial had been forwarded to His Excellency the Governor through the Hon. Dr. Rockwood praying for the relaxation of the quarantine Regulations now enforced in Jaffna for the last three years and a half. We learn that a reply has been received declining to accede to the prayer of the Memorialists.

We have already pointed out the inconvenience, hardship, and loss which the people of Jaffna undergo, on account of the continued enforcement of these regulations, which were originally intended to be temporary measure but which has now the effect of permanently shutting out all direct

communications between Jaffna and India. As an example of the evil consequences of the present state of affairs we may mention the case of Mr. T. Ponnambalam Pillai, the acting Conservator of Forests, Travancore. This gentleman hurried from Travancore with his family on hearing of the serious illness in Jaffna of his brother, the late Mr. T. Chellappal'ıllai, retired Chief Justice of that State. But owing to the Quarantine Regulations he was obliged to travel via Colombo, which he reached a few days after he left his station. He was not then able to leave Colombo as soon as he reached there as the Northabout Steamer had left that place for Jaffna one day previous to his arrival. He was, therefore, obliged to remain about a fortnight in Colombo with his family and undergo unnecessary expenses and hardships till he left that place by steamer of the 16th Instant and arrived here the following day, long after his dear brother's death. Had there been direct communication between Jaffna and South India, Mr. Ponnambalam Pillai would have not only, in all probability, arrived here be ore the death of his brother and performed his funeral obsequies, but would have saved the large expenditure in . volved in his juraey via Colomboand soj urn there for a fortnight. He could have come to Jaffna from Travancore via Negapitam or Point Calimere in six days time and with an expenditure not exceeding one tenth of what he was obliged to spend in the long and circuitous jurney via Colombo.

We hop; to publish the memorial and the reply of the Government in our next

ssue.
