

MAYOR'S HEALTH WEEK APPEAL

How Food Handlers Err

My observations would naturally make us all think of some of the causes that contribute to the spread of these diseases. Let us think of them today. The only way I can do it is to list the complaints I have received from time to time.

(a) The utensils used are dirty.

(b) The utensils used are invariably washed, by being merely immersed in a bucket of cold-water. The water in the bucket is hardly ever changed.

(c) The utensils after being washed in this unsatisfactory manner are wiped with dirty rags. This rag is used for dusting furniture as well!!

(d) The tables are dirty and greasy.

(e) Drinking water is not boiled and not cooled and not properly stored.

(f) Empty aerated water bottles are not properly washed. Some bottles with aerated water when opened give a smell of kerosine oil, coconut oil and hospital medicine!

(g) The premises where food is served are ill lit with cock-roaches creeping all over. There is often an offensive odour in the dining room.

(h) Food is exposed to the contamination of flies and dust.

Personal Habits

You will agree that under such conditions the diseases discussed earlier can thrive. Can we as citizens of this Town allow such complaints to continue?

Now we will discuss the lack of good personal habits in some food handlers. We Easterners are in the habit of washing ourselves after using a latrine. People with long finger nails while washing themselves

can accumulate in between finger nails small quantities of faecal matter. These people do not wash their hands with soap and water, before serving food. They thus transfer the infection, on their hands on to the food, they serve. Besides this is very objectionable. Food handlers, please out your finger nails short and always wash your hands with soap and water immediately after you use a latrine. Also see that the night soil in the bucket is covered with either saw dust or sand each time you use the latrine to prevent an offensive smell as well as prevent flies coming in contact with faecal matter. The latrine should be maintained at all times clean and tidy.

There is another matter where you as well as some of the residents are offenders. I refer to the pernicious habit of throwing rubbish on the roads. Many a visitor to this Town has adversely commented on this unpatriotic act. In some of the Trades premises there are back drains. These are hardly ever cleansed. Disinfectants are never used. They are ideal breeding places for flies. Patrons have to consume their food in the midst of the foul odour that emanates from these drains. Please do not throw rubbish of any kind on to roads but deposit them in dust bins. Kindly have your drains cleaned up daily and disinfectants used.

Duty of Proprietors

Having discussed about food handlers it is appropriate to appeal to Managers of Food Handling establishments. However much Food Handlers may realise their responsibilities it is not possible for them to render satisfactory service unless you provide the facilities and maintain buildings in a

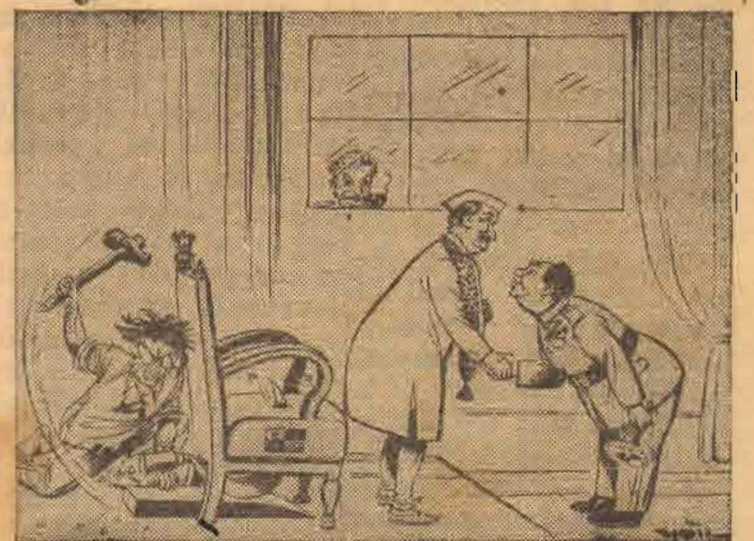

JAFFNA
RAILWAY STATION

The historic greatness of the Northern Capital and its geographical situation are not the only factors that go to make it one of the most important towns of this country. By reason of its large population and the extent of its communication with the rest of the Island, Jaffna has acquired a recognition as the second largest town of Sri Lanka. The growth of cities and towns like that of living beings has to be maintained by the provision of modern facilities. But it is a matter for great regret that this provincial capital of the North has not been provided with adequate railway facilities.

The Jaffna Urban Council during its period of existence had requested the Minister of Transport and Works by means of a resolution that the Jaffna Railway Station should be remodelled in keeping with modern requirements and the needs of passengers. But the post-war difficulties in procuring building materials especially steel had come in the way of immediate action being taken in this matter. The same question has been taken up by the Municipal Council now. It now rests with the Minister of Transport and Works to

take action in this matter early.

The demand for double platforms and modern conveniences does not arise from any desire to add an artificial aesthetic beauty to this ancient town. The natural splendour of this peninsular capital on the lap of the lovely waters of the Jaffna lagoon and the structural attraction of the old Dutch Fort are in themselves enough for creating self-satisfaction. What the railway passengers complain of is that the present platform arrangements at the Jaffna station are not merely inadequate but inconvenient to the large number of people who board or alight from trains and do not facilitate a quicker and easier rail service.

The delays in the running of trains in the Northern line are due mainly to the fact that facilities for crossing of trains have not been adequately provided. Island platforms facilitate the working of trains according to schedule and prove very helpful to passengers in moving about without inconvenience and confusion. If a statistical survey of the time taken by crossings of trains at the Jaffna station be made it will be seen that the entire northern service has to suffer owing to the want of proper platform facilities here. There are occasions when passengers attempt to board a train or alight from it while it is halted in the loop-line waiting for another train to steam into the station alongside of the platform. This means risk of limb and life and means much.

We understand that the scheme that was prepared as far back as in 1947 has the approval of the Ministry of Transport and Works and all that remains to be done is for it to be given top-priority in the list of projects and plans awaiting execution. There cannot be any doubt that this scheme is urgent and essential because it provides for a speedier and better rail service. Speed is the keynote of efficient administration and delays in the railway mean corresponding inconvenience to other departments.

The Minister of Transport & Works who has first hand knowledge of the utter inadequacy of the Jaffna Station platform to meet the requirements of the heavy railway traffic here need not be told that this matter deserves priority of consideration.

HEREDITARY FACTOR IN
'INTELLIGENCE'

Deductions From Daily Life

INTELLIGENCE as a psychological concept has a much wider connotation than the term intellect. The latter is regarded mainly as a mental function which enables a person to carry on abstract thinking, to educe relations, co-ordinate items of experience make generalisation and draw inferences. Intelligence in addition to these comprises the capacities of quick adjustment to situations, of application of past experience and general principles to a present problem, of selective attention and response to a complex course of events. It is not necessary for our present purpose to aim at a precise definition. The description given above is sufficient in this context.

Estimate Based On
Efforts

It is commonly accepted that we can form a fair estimate of a person's intelligence on the basis of his efforts at meeting the various situations in which he is placed. The intelligence tests attempt to prepare imaginary and conceptual situations that can be intellectually grasped or can be perceived and acted upon. The success and failure of persons to adjust themselves to these prepared situations enables us to form an estimate of intelligence analogous to that operative in daily life. But since these situations are prepared and controlled, they can be graded with respect to their difficulty. A failure in the tests, then, is not merely a performance of low quality. It is a performance in reference in a situation of a certain order of difficulty which can be quantitatively estimated. Hence, it is possible to estimate the quantity of failure. And it is possible from this, it is argued, to estimate the quantity of success.

Such success or failure may be relative to age, relative to experience and in some cases relative to the quality of the mind. This last idea signifies that certain persons are so constituted that whatever their age and experience may be, they would be unable to adjust themselves to situations beyond certain degree of complexity. But the order of difficulty and complexity of the problems and situa-

tions are relative to various age-levels. Hence the quality of intelligence is finally equated with intelligence of certain age-levels.

To Arrive At Quantum

Various scales of problem-situation have been devised with practically the same basic idea. It is believed that intelligence exhibits itself through many channels of response. A computation of the degree of success and failure of these different types of response would give a clue to the quantum of intelligence.

There are various methods of computation of the score of value of intelligence. The most widely used method is the one that represents the quotient of intelligence as a ratio between the mental age and the chronological age expressed in the shape of a percentage. The mental age is measured by the test situation, corresponding to the age levels, in which the person succeeds or fails. The chronological age is expressed in years counted from birth. It is believed that this quotient does not alter to any appreciable extent during the period of normal growth for any given individual.

The I. Q. or Intelligence Quotient then may be supposed to represent a constitutional factor. Since the latter to a large extent depends upon inheritance, the I. Q. may be said to reflect hereditary factors. A comparison of the I. Q. of the members of the same family would, then, give us an idea of the extent of its heritability.

Yet one must not lose sight of the fact that the I. Q. is computed on the basis of the scores yielded by a number of special functions.

These reflect the process of growth and maturation which implicate the influence of environment. Hence, it is not possible to isolate the heritable phase of intelligence. Nor is it possible to say that the intelligence is a hereditary trait. At the same time, there is a considerable body of evidence to show that there is a hereditary factor at the base of intelligence.

The writer, Dr. Frederick Casson, a former Army psychiatrist, declares that "schizophrenics have been shy, dreamy and retiring usually since childhood. They are often precocious 'model children,' highly thought of by fond parents and schoolteachers for their docility although not mixing well with other children. In adolescence they become more noticeably odd and out of touch.

"They show unbalanced enthusiasm for queer forms of religion, politics, art and philosophy and take up feverishly with fellow devotees, otherwise tending to be solitary dreamers."

and nutrition. I Appeal to you to take a scientific interest in your trade. Money making should never be your only consideration.

Create Public Opinion.

I therefore appeal for public opinion in this matter. It is only a strong public opinion that can help to remedy the many unsatisfactory conditions in our Food Handling establishments. Unfortunately many of the Town residents are apathetic because it is only a negligible proportion of them who patronise these establishments. The many victims are all from outside the Town. The economic conditions of the Tamils are getting worse. Food is also becoming scarce. The days when the earnings of one member of the family were enough to keep body and soul together are no more. Both man and woman will have to work in the future. As in other countries, we may, as a result of this, have to take at least one meal a day outside the home. Let us therefore get together to improve the sanitary conditions of Food handling establishments. In many a country by effectively boy-cotting dirty establishments, people have ensured clean food and clean surroundings. I am sure we in Jaffna can also do this.

Food Handlers' Unions

I am informed that in modern cities Food Handlers form themselves into an association called the "Food Handlers Association." Their main objective is to provide clean food and clean surroundings. They get the Health Officers to give them regular lectures and demonstrations. They cooperate in every possible manner with the Local Health Authorities. They win the confidence of the public. I appeal to you, particularly those in Grand Bazaar, Fort, Station, Chundikali, Vannarponnai and Mosque Wards to form yourselves into a Food Handlers Association with a view to taking collective action to improve sanitary conditions.

May I end this appeal by requesting you to make clean Food and clean surroundings, as your aim in the interest of the better Health and happiness of the people whom you serve. Service above self is always a commendable trait.

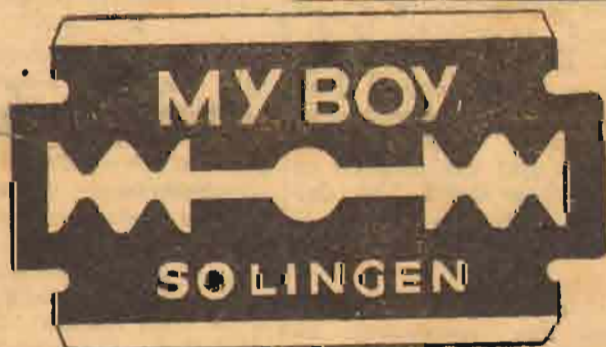
