SIVARATHIRI AND WORLD PEACE

THE DESIRE FOR DOMINATION has almost always been the cause of wars in the past and will continue to be so in the future. The United Nations have won the war but they have yet to win the peace; the lust for power appears to loom large in their deliberations. At this juncture it will be good to pause awhile and consider the significance of Sivarathiri which was observed by Hindus all over the world on February the 19th instant. The entire project is estimated to cost Re. 1,100,000 but of this amount it is proposed to spend only Rs. 150,000 during the present financial year. The work is scread over several years and the first stage is to be undertaken this year. The main object of the scheme si to prevent the entry of sea water into the lagoon and to store fresh water during the dry weather which would improve the quality of water in the wells around the lagoon and also provide a source of fresh water for the irrigation of the large extent of land that is reclaimed.

Britain to Quit India

Time Limit Fixed University Entrance

BRITAIN will quit India at a date not later than June 19 8. This is the purport of a statement made by Premier Attlee in the Parliament last week.

The Premier wished to make it clear that it was the definite intention of the British Government to take the necessary steps to effect the transference of power into responsible Indian hands not later than June 1948.

Mr. Attlee also announced the termination of the appointment of Lord Wavell as Viceroy and his replacement by Lord Louis Mount-

It is clear from Mr. Attlee's statement that no drastic change would take place in the Interim Government. Both the Congress and League blocs, according to present indications are likely to t iy on in the Interim Government.

The Congress Working Committee has been called to meet on March 2. Mr. Jinnah the President of the Muslim League refused to comment on Mr. Attlee's declaration as he had not fully read it.

Though the Labour and the left wing English Papers applaud Mr. Attlee's statement, the Conservat ve Press views it with alarm.

Pandit Nehru, Vice-President of the Indian Interim Government said that the British Government statement on India was "wise and oe paid. courageous".

He said the declaration that the final transference of power to Ind.a would take place not later than June, 1948, "not only removes all misconception and suspicion, but also brings reality and a certain dynamite quality to the present situation in India."

"It is a challenge to all of us and we shall try to meet it bravely in the spirit of that challenge", he added.

Pandit Nehru hoped that the disqualification. 'long history of conflict and illwill" between Britain and India was over and declared: "We look forward to peaceful and co-operative transition and to the establishment of close and friendly Jaffna, 18-2-47. relations with the British people."
