THE AUROBINDO IDEAL OF A WORLD UNIVERSITY

Writing in the Madras Hindu on April 10th on Sri Aurobindo's ideal of a world centre for Education, Hemendra Prasad Ghose observes:—

The success of that experiment provided the basis for founding a University—an international university. But as the old Hebrew monarch who had it in his mind "to build a house unto the name of Lord my God" had to yield to his successors the realisation of the ideal, so it has been left to Sri Aurobindo's successors—belonging to different races and countries, to give a shape to the ideal. They have got the clay model of the work and have to secure the stuff to carve it in marble. The blueprint is there already.

The work of establishing the University has been taken in hand. The response to the appeal already issued has been satisfactory; because: (1) Some of Sri Aurobindo's admirers in East Africa have combined themselves to defray the expenses to be incurred in buildings; (2) America is likely to help in supplying the most up-to-date materials for the buildings and the fittings (3) A band of professors of wide experience and reputation have offered to work as teachers; (4) Applications have been and are being received from students from many parts of the world anxious to join the foundation. Two buildings have already been purchased to locate the University and negotiations are in progress for the acquisition of more lands and buildings and building sites. The idea is to have a University town self-contained as far as possible in Pondicherry. A small beginning is to be made and the University allowed to grow and gather strength.

Seed-Bed of Ideas

Lord Chesterfield has told us that great events are really due to much smaller causes than historians with duly jealous regard for the dignity of their profession dare admit. And it is not impossible that the future of the system of education which the national Government of the Indian Union, which may, in the near future, include within its ample sweep India, Pakistan, Burma, Ceylon, and Tibet,

will have to evolve and adopt will be greatly influenced by the work of this University which will be the seed-bed of ideas. It will be voicing the views of one of the greatest thinkers of the age.

Lord Dufferin said of Egypt: "The fellah like his own Memnon, had remained 'irresponsible to the beams of the new dawn'. The world which had long been steeped in materialism has not remained irresponsible to beams of the teachings which Aurobindo has imparted to it—the teachings of the Gita—the 'living message' of the teacher who is not only the God in man who unveils himself in the world of knowledge, but the God in man who moves our whole world of action, by and from whom all our humanity exists and struggles and labours, towards whom all human life travels and progresses."

The response has been marked and rapid. The world is

Minister Bandaranaike At Thiruketheeshvaram

Hon. Mr. S. W. R. D. Bandaranaike accompanied by his Cabinet colleague, Hon. Mr. C. Sittampalam, one of the Vice-Presidents of the Thiruketheeshvaram Temple Restoration Society paid a visit to the Ancient Temple. Mr. S. Saamuganathan, Asst. Archaeological Commissioner, who is in charge of the excavation work at Thiruketheeshvaram explained to Mr. Bandaranaike the antiquity of Thiruketheeshvaram, and gave details of the various finds made during the excavation work.

The Secretary, Mr. Sivaubramaniam, brought to the notice of the Minister the various requirements of Thiruketheeshvaram and added that the temple was repaired by Prince Vijaya when he landed in Ceylon and said that it had occupied a great place in the national life of Ceylon in ancient days. He further intimated that in addition to the restoration of the ancient temple and its appurtenances, one of the objects of the Society was the dissemination and propagation of Saiva religion.

Later a meeting was held, presided over by Hon. Mr. Sittampalam. Mr. Bandaranaike in a moving address said that Thiruketheeshvaram was as Anuradhapura and Polonnaruwa and that these ancient places should be preserved and treated with the greatest veneration. He added that his mind and spirit were elevated by his visit to Thiruketheeshvaram and that this sacred spot had left a mark on him. President Unveils Premier's Portrait

'To speak about Jawaharlal Nehru is to recite the history of India during the last 30 years and more' said Dr. Rajendra Prasad unveiling a portrait of Premier Nehru at the Rajaji Hall in Madras on April 7.

Concluding a one-hour speech Rajen Babu said "After all, we are just on the threshold of independence. We have just attained power which may enable us to make ourselves prosperous and happy. We have not yet succeeded in making the country prosperous and happy, as we would wish it to be. It is this period that requires great constructive ability and leadership of a very high kind. In Jawaharlal Nehru we have got that constructive ability and that great quality of leadership. We have got in him that apparent selflessness which conquers all opposition; not because everybody agrees with him, but because everybody feels that, when he says a thing, it cannot be anything but what he feels to be the best.

Opposition—Conquering Trait

There are many in this country who are prepared to subordinate their own opinions to his because of his sincerity which is so apparent, because of his great experience and because they feel that, with his knowledge, and experience, he must be right rather than they themselves. That is always the case when one becomes a leader. Since he is a leader in the best sense of the term, we know that there are millions of our countrymen who are willing not only to follow him but to make further sacrifices which they may be called upon to make in the cause of the country. Pandit Jawaharlal led us during the period of struggle and now he is leading us during the period of reconstruction. Let us all hope and pray that God will give him health strength and long life, to accomplish the great task with as much success as he has accomplished the last task which he undertook, viz., winning independence for India".

NEW YEAR GREETINGS
AND STOCK-TAKING

A HAPPY NEW YEAR WE wish all our readers. *Vihirithi* has almost run its course and in a few more hours, the new year *Kara* will be ushered in with great jubilation and joy by all Hindus and Buddhists. May the Korean War and all unrest end during *Kara* and may Peace and Good Will reign among the nations of the world.

During the dying year in Ceylon, trade had flourished; rubber, tea and coconuts have fetched the highest prices hitherto known. Although the Island has still to depend on foreign countries for sixty per cent of her food requirements, yet sufficient food is available so as to avoid famine and starvation. The Gal Oya Scheme is being speeded up ahead of schedule and plans for settling cultivators on newly opened allotments of land are being implemented. So far as Industries are concerned, cottage industries have not shown much progress; many a Government Factory has been worked at loss but the Cement Factory at Kankesanthurai has been hailed as a great success. In Education a new era has dawned and free schools are hoping for better days. A Fundamental and Adult Education Centre has been opened in the N. C. P. and the different branch organisations of the U. N. O., such as the W. H. O., I. L. O. and F. A. O. are expected to co-operate with one another to improve health, education and food production locally. Malaria is said to have been brought under control; infant mortality has been reduced; and campaigns have been launched for the prevention of Polio and T. B. Hospitals are crowded

in spite of extensions and there is a shortage of drugs. Conditions of transport have not improved much; the Railway continues to be run at loss and bus queues are becoming longer but the roads are being improved. Better Postal and Telecommunication facilities have been provided. The first stage of the Laxa Pana Hydro-Electric Scheme has been completed. Work has commenced on the Port Scheme for Colombo. Notwithstanding elaborate Housing Schemes, the dearth of houses is being keenly felt. The new houses built at Karaiyoor show signs of new life but threaten to become slums again. The recommendations of the National Flag Committee have been adopted by Parliament and a permanent Commission has been appointed to examine and carry out in different stages the introduction of national languages into state departments. The different communities in the Island have lived in harmony.

Much has been achieved but more remains to be done. The Right Hon. D. S. Senanayake deserves to be congratulated for keeping together the diverse elements one finds in his Cabinet and securing for the country stability and peace. May Providence guide the powers that be along proper paths so that no mistakes might be made or any injustice done and may all the peoples of the world live in peace and contentment.

Education Must Tend
To Cohesion

Study of English Essential

Speaking at a school foundation stone laying ceremony in Kumbakonam, Sir C. P. Ramasamy Iyer said that no nation can afford to neglect an international language like English.

Touching on the capability of education Sir C. P. Iyer said that both infinite expansion and infinite experimentation were possible and added that a purely literary education and a good memory was condered enough in those days. To-day, they were confronted with different problems. Education to-day had to aim not merely at banishing illiteracy, but at making their young men think and feel originally and adventurously. They must learn to discipline their emotions, evolve into concord with others and share in common joyous living. Any education which did not tend to coherence, bringing all of them together was not worthwhile.

Referring to what ought to be their educational ideal, the speaker said that it was not what was actually taught in schools and colleges that mattered but the pliability, adaptability and efficiency of the mental organism that was most important. The capacity for thinking for oneself intellectual elasticity and the capacity to assimilate and retain—it was these that they must develop in their pupils.

Letter to the Editor

Hindu Temporalities
Tussle

Sir,—With reference to the article of Mr. S. CumaraSuriar which appeared in your valuable journal of the 6th April 1951 under caption "Hindu Temporalities Committee Procedure Defended" I have the honour to inform you that Mr. CumaraSuriar does not really understand the exact time when "Veda Agama Saiva Sidhantla Sabai" was established. It was established in the year 1923. The founder of this Sabai is Sir Ponnambalam Ramanathan. The object of this Sabai is to do missionary work to Saiva Religion and to do away with any act or acts done by any single individual or societies against Saiva Religion. I make it clear to the Public that this Sabai was not formed after the appointment of the Special Committee on Hindu Temporalities" as Mr. CumaraSuriar says. In the first place I want to know the real religious status of each member of the Committee. Are these members qualified to serve in a Committee of this type. It is only the cleverest lawyer that is allowed to occupy the Bench of the Supreme Court and to administer justice. So if proper investigations were to take place in matters concerned with religion it is the duty of the Government to appoint a Committee of experts in Sastras, Agamas etc. of Religion. Is it that Saivaites will have to accept a report prepared by a committee who do not understand anything of Saiva Sidhantam. If such a report is accepted by Saivaites, it is just like a blind man leading another blind man which will end in the falling of the two blind men in the same deep pit. Mr. Cumarasuriar encourages the Chairman of the "special Committee" and induces him even in this article to take speedy steps to—introduce legislation. The business as well as the duty of the Chairman of the Special Committee is finished then and there when the report is submitted to the Home Minister. The Chairman of any Committee whether political or religious is considered to be an impartial tribunal and not as a partisan. Mr. Cumarasuriar will understand that it is the duty of the Home Minister to see that a legislation is introduced in the House of Representatives after sounding public opinion. Public opinion is more important than legislation in a Government of its people. If any Bill were to be introduced in Parliament against Public Opinion Mr. Cumarasuriar will also understand that such an act of Parliament will have to be appealed against before the higher authorities of the world. It would be better if Trust Ordinance is amended. Mr. Cumarasuriar defends the action done in India. There is the Hindu Raj. Here in Ceylon the Saivites—a handful of people are under Buddhist Raj. If the State were to be allowed to have its interference with Saiva Religion the Buddhists' influence will overwhelm and there will come a day when Buddhism only will prevail in Ceylon and Saiva Religion will disappear.
