

'AIR OF DECEPTION' FELT BY TOURIST IN RUSSIA

Although the Soviet Union boasts that the iron curtain has disappeared, it still hides much of its internal activities from the strangers in its midst. In his recent series of articles in "The Guardian", James Morris describes the "air of deception" he felt during his Russian tour and its effect on his personal assessment of Soviet claims of immense progress.

"You will discover", he warns, "that Russia still keeps her secrets, tourists or no to urists: that, though you are free to wander where you will and can penetrate almost anywhere if you are prepared to put your foot in the door and argue, nevertheless the deeper enigmas of the Soviet Union remain inviolate...."

"The pundits may pontificate, the propagandists prate: but we still do not understand the intentions of Russian policy, we do not really know how stable the regime is, we cannot for a certainty name the men of power in Moscow, and we never know, from one day to another, what the Russians are going to do next."

"Mr. Khrushchev seems, on the face of it, to be a conciliatory kind of statesman. But, whether he really believes in the principle of co-existence or whether this is merely a period of Communist consolidation and preparation, we just do not for the life of us know".

In the opinion of Mr. Morris, the iron curtain is still "gauntly erect"; "Diplomatists are still rigidly circumscribed can meet only carefully approved Russians hardly ever go into a Russian home, and are still overheard by buried boudoir microphones."

"Westerners are still compelled to live in specified ghetto like apartment blocks, guarded by

gendarmes. I cannot myself believe in the universal wiring of hotel rooms or the shadowing of ordinary foreign visitors, but I know from painful experience how thoroughly the frontier police, excluding co-existence, examine the newspaperman's carbon copies when at last he leaves the country."

Mr. Morris gives full credit for the verifiable improvements in this field: the ending of radio jamming, the admission of an American magazine (likely to be followed by a British equivalent), the disappearance of the fear of the detention camp among Russians who spoke to foreigners, the protestations of peace and goodwill in the Soviet Press. "Nevertheless, it is still practically impossible to buy Western newspapers in Moscow, except the lackey broadsheets, and though the guides say anybody may read 'The Guardian' 'at certain libraries' it proves to be an extremely difficult undertaking if you actually go and ask. Only a breath, only a whisper of the free West has yet seeped Moscow."

Russian law, Mr. Morris admits, has undoubtedly taken a turn towards the fairer and the franker, "but you will not really discover, as you pace the Moscow pavements, whether the days of terror have gone for good. Nobody hears the sinister midnight knock nowadays, and the dread Lubianka prison is an insurance office. Russia certainly does not feel, at first taste, a bullied, oppressed, or frightened country. But how soon the winds could change, how subtle are the pressures of orthodoxy and conformity nobody knows".

In attempting to assess whether Communism has really worked in Soviet Russia, the writer asks whether the same degree of progress could have been achieved by other,

ANOTHER ATTEMPT AT STABILITY

In very extra-ordinary circumstances, the voters of this country have been called upon a second time to elect their representatives within the all-too-short space of four months. The nomination papers for the various electoral areas that were tendered today to the respective Returning Officers indicate that candidates who fought the March Election have not run away from the scene of battle but have remained true to their political conviction that they should once again go to the country and seek a clear mandate. It cannot be denied, however, that some of the parties, the S. L. F. P., the M. E. P. and the L. S. S. P. have been affected by the Second Election in the form of desertions and expulsions. The hickering that followed the dissolution of Parliament in March have made it possible for a no-contest pact, between the S. L. F. P. and the L. S. S. P. after the fashion of the M. E. P. arrangement in 1956.

While in 1956 the different parties merged in the M. E. P., the present alliance has been reported to be of a limited scope. The dangerous trend of forming ad hoc coalitions with a particular objective appears to have obtained a permanent place in the political system of this country. The lesson of the happenings between 1956 and 1959 cannot be easily forgotten. The July election must be viewed by all leaders in a patriotic sense. The need of the country is not making any party or combination of parties a power in the country but the establishment of a stable, efficient and good Government. The voters, the candidates, and the leaders of parties, therefore, have a sacred duty to perform now.

Forthcoming General Elections

Sir,
(In reply to the inquiry as to whether I am offering my services as a candidate at the forthcoming Parliamentary elections. I wish to reply in the negative.)

It was only in March that the electorates of the Northern and Eastern Provinces indicated their mind clearly and emphatically by returning the Federal Party in great strength. While I do not agree with that verdict, I am inclined to accept it entirely. Now that the Federal Party has been given leadership, it is not proper or wise in the interest of the Tamil Community and Ceylon to seek to disturb it so soon and specially at this critical juncture. I fervently trust that Tamil members who may be returned to Parliament at the forthcoming elections will in the first instance endeavour their best to find out the avenues for a program of honourable co-operation with the non-Tamil Communities, particularly the Sinhalese Community.

There is an old saying that we must not change horses while crossing a stream. In that spirit, I wish that the Federal Party be given an opportunity now to render service. It is needless to add that should anything be found wanting here after, my present opinion naturally will be revised as a matter of duty in the public interest.

American Company Plans Publication

Together the books will be a complete record of the modern evolution of the countries of Asia and Africa during the past 100 to 150 years.

The East Wind Book series will be published in paper and cloth editions and each volume will be illustrated.

Grove Press is one of the newer New York publishing houses. Among its publications are the higher-priced paperback "Evergreen" series which has introduced to the public many avant garde modern writers, and many books describing the culture and philosophy of Asia.

Grove Press publisher Barney Rosset commented:

WINGLESS VEHICLES

Development In Transport

Described as "one of the most interesting developments in transport since the Wright brothers", Messrs. Bristol Siddeley Engines Ltd. of Britain have produced an exploratory design for a jet-sustained wingless vehicle capable of being driven along roads or taking to the air at the will of the driver. It has been named the "flying pig."

It is claimed that such a vehicle would be so simple to handle that it could be driven by a competent motor transport driver.

A Bristol Siddeley spokesman said that the company was investigating the problems of building such a vehicle and already improved designs were being prepared. At this stage it was not proposed to build a prototype.

Such a vehicle has been made possible by the development of a jet engine equal to seven times its own weight or more.

The company claims that even at the present stage this type of wingless vehicle has a lifting capacity almost equal to that of the largest helicopter and has a much greater speed. Travelling at 230 miles an hour it would carry a payload of two tons for 150 miles or one ton for 190 miles.

These wingless vehicles, the company said, would not depend on a ground cushioning effect such as for the Hovercraft, and were capable of flying, if necessary, at altitudes of 10 000 to 15,000, feet so that they could not only cross jungles or rivers, but mountain ranges.

These vehicles would be much cheaper than a helicopter, though clearly, considerably more expensive than a two-ton truck.

The "flying pig" is designed to be capable of use on ordinary roads, with a small gas turbine engine driving the road wheels.

Because of the relatively high initial cost at this stage it is expected that the wingless vehicles will be used first for military purposes.

Third Republican Member Of Commonwealth

From the Commonwealth Prime Minister's conference, which resumed on May 10, to discuss constitutional matters, the following official communique was issued:

"At their meeting today the Commonwealth Prime Ministers were informed that the Constituent Assembly in Ghana had, in pursuance of the recent plebiscite, resolved that the necessary constitutional steps should be taken to introduce a republican form of constitution in Ghana by July 1, 1960.

"In notifying this forthcoming constitutional change the Prime Minister of Ghana assured the meeting of his country's desire to continue her membership of the Commonwealth and her acceptance of the Quaker as the symbol of free association of its independent member-nations and, as such, the Head of the Commonwealth.

"The heads of delegations from other member-countries of the Commonwealth assured Dr. Nkrumah that the present relations between their countries and Ghana would remain unaffected by the constitutional change; and they declared that their Governments would accept and recognise Ghana's continued membership of the Commonwealth, freely co-operating with the other members in the pursuit of peace, liberty and progress."

Prime Ministers welcomed Ghana's participation in a meeting of Commonwealth Prime Ministers for the first time in 1957 and her decision to become a republic within the Commonwealth has been known for a long time.

The pattern as laid down for her continuing membership follows closely on that devised for continued participation in 1949. A similar declaration relating to Pakistan was issued in 1955.

At this meeting the question of South Africa's position in the Commonwealth in the event of her becoming a republic was also raised at Mr. Louw's request. The Commonwealth Correspondent of the London Press Service understands that the discussion, although it ranged widely over the issues involved, including the position of South-West Africa, was not concluded.

The evolution of the Commonwealth and the problems which might

arise in the probable event of a number of smaller and less viable States applying for membership led to an interesting discussion in which most of the Prime Ministers took part, adds the correspondent. The Foreign Secretary, Mr. Selwyn Lloyd, the Secretary of State for Commonwealth Relations, Lord Home, and the Secretary of State for the Colonies, Mr. Iain Macleod, were also present.

Countries which might in the foreseeable future apply for membership include the West Indies, Central Africa, Kenya, Uganda and Tanganyika. Such applications would no doubt be welcomed and would not lead to difficulties which might affect the nature of the confidential exchanges which now take place within the Commonwealth. But, if a number of very small former British colonial territories, with populations of around 500,000 on gaining independence were to seek Commonwealth membership, possibly new issues would arise.

The views expressed at yesterday's meeting have not been revealed but the correspondent understands that the probable outcome will be the setting up of a committee of officials, on which most Commonwealth countries will be represented, to go into this question.
