Rashtrapathi's Visit

Memorable Event

President's Cryptic Statement Here

(From A Correspondent)

"I have been visiting different places in the island during the last five or six days and I feel my visit would have been incomplete had I not included Jaffna in my itinerary and paid even a short visit to this place", said the President of the Republic of India, Dr Rajendra Prasad while replying to the Civic address presented by Jaffna's Mayor on Monday the 22nd inst.

The long-looked-for visit lasted a couple of hours, the Rashtrapathi arriving from Colombo by plane at 9.30 a. m. and leaving by 11.30

At Palali

Dr. Rajendra Prasad was received at the Palali Aerodrome by the Government Agent, Mr. M. Sri Khanta, who was introduced to the distinguished visitor by a Cabinet Minister, Mr. A. P. Jayasuriya. Tamil Members of Parliament were then introduced to him.

Mr. S. Swaminathan, a contemporary of the President at the Calcutta University, was then introduced to him.

Doctor Prasad was then received under a silk canopy by Hindu Temple Priests who chanted sanscrit *slokas* blessing the distinguished visitor.

The thousands of people who assembled at the aerodrome to see the President, both the privileged, the under-privileged and even the unprivileged, had almost a fleeting chance to look India's President squarely in the face there.

The procession to Jaffna, where the only function in which the Rashtrapathi

participated was the civic reception at the Town Hall, then started. The ten mile long route was lined on both sides by eager and enthusiastic school children, boys and girls, and a large number of equally eager and enthusiastic adults.

Disappointed

These had, almost all of them, to go away disappointed because they could not even see the face of the President, speeding along the route, in a closed motor car although the organisers had called it "procession".

I understand the local police insisted that they would not permit the great visitor to be taken in an open car.

Even at the Town Hall it was only the few privileged to gain admission to the Hall who were able to gain *dharsan* of the Rashtrapathi while thousands of others had to return home after long and weary waiting in disgust not having been able to gain a glimpse of the Rastrapathi.

When India's great President left Jaffna from the Palali Aerodrome at a little past 11.30 a. m. on Monday last thus completing his first official visit to this island the usual diplomatic courtesies such as the gun-salutes and guard-of-honour were conspicuous by their absence.

In fact Ceylon's Head of State and the Prime Minister and others bade good-bye to the President in Colombo on the morning of Monday last, to the accompaniment of gun-salutes and the presentation of Guard-of-Honour at the Ratmalana Aerodrome.

The Indian President said good-bye to Ceylon at the Aerodrome at Ratmalana with a farewell message.

The Visit—First Phase

The Indian President's six-day visit to Ceylon commenced on Tuesday the 16th inst. when he arrived by his special

RELIGION AND RUSSIA

More Soviet Attacks

The fight against all forms of religion, a cornerstone of Communism in practice as well as in theory, continues unabated in the Soviet Union. Indeed, since the 21st Congress of the Soviet Communist Party, it has been prosecuted with renewed vigour.

One of the latest moves in this offensive was the taking over, by the Soviet Government in Riga, capital of Soviet Latvia, of the 16th century cathedral of St. Mary and calling it an "historical monument."

One reason—or excuse—given by the Soviet authorities for this act is that the music from the cathedral's famous organ, the largest in the world, can now be made available to the city's music lovers who could not in all conscience—say the authorities—enter a house of prayer to hear it.

Since the cathedral was taken over religious services have been permitted only on national or political anniversaries. On the feast of Pentecost there was merely a secular recital by an atheist organist.

Parodies of Ceremonies

This is part of the current Soviet policy of trying to compete with religion on its own ground. Some time ago the Communists introduced secular ceremonies to replace religious ones and are now endeavouring to make the new ceremonies more colourful and attractive.

But these Communist parodies of christening, confirmation and marriage are not taken very seriously by the public. Even Communist Party members and high Communist

officials, whose position makes it expedient for them to submit to; say, a Red wedding, often have a religious ceremony in secret afterwards.

Recently attempts have been made to introduce a Communist Sunday, with Sunday lectures arranged and delivered by Party and State officials as well as by doctors, teachers and farming experts. The intention is to provide a counter attraction to church services.

Misleading Titles

Despite the increasing flow of anti religious lectures and articles, membership of religious organisations has increased especially in the countryside. The spread of religion among Party and Komsomol members, as well as in the armed forces, is causing grave concern to the authorities.

Because anti-religious literature was not having the desired effect, a Scientific Council was formed in April to co-ordinate propaganda work. One result has been that anti religious books have been published with misleading religious titles to trick believers into reading them. The dearth of genuine religious literature provides its own commentary on religious freedom in the Soviet Union.

The first week of the Orthodox Lent (March 12-6) was designated as a "Week of Atheist Literature" in the Russian Soviet Federative Socialist Republic (RFSR). Meetings were organised at which atheistic literature was distributed. At the same time, representatives of science and culture extolled the achievements of science and technology and the way in which the rockets and satellites ran counter to religious teaching.

An article published in February by a renegade priest in Kazakhstan contained violent personal attacks on dignitaries of the Russian Orthodox Church, including, for the first time, the Archbishop of Alma Ata. The use of

CIVIC ADDRESS PRESENTED

The address read by the Mayor of Jaffna stated:—

The Tamils of Ceylon have lived in this island from time immemorial and have preserved their cultural and religious kinship with their brethren of the Tamil Nad in South India. Jaffna has produced a galaxy of mystics, poets and scholars who have enriched the Tamil Language in the fields of Religion, Literature, Drama, Medical Science (Ayurveda) and Art. Gnanapiragasar, the great philologist of Dravidian Languages, are the gifts of Jaffna to world culture.

"We had the privilege, in the past, to welcome to our city, Srimath Swami Vivekananda, the Patriot—Saint of Modern India; Mahatma Gandhi, the Father of the Indian Nation; Sri Pandit Jawaharlal Nehru, the beloved Prime Minister of India; Sri C. Rajagopalachary, the great statesman and the first Indian Governor-General of India; Srimathi Mrs. Sarojini Naidu, the Nightingale of India; Dr. Rabindranath Tagore, the poet-laureate of Asia, and Dr. S. Radhakrishnan the philosopher-statesman and Vice-president of India; and today, we have the unique opportunity of welcoming your Excellency, the first President of the Republic of India.

"Your Excellency has been hailed as the symbol of Gandhian Dharma, embodying the high and noble spiritual traditions and aspirations of Free India. Your rare intellectual endowments combined with your surpassing sweetness of nature, the nobility of your character and the extra-ordinary gift of self effacement and self-sacrifice have made you the most widely loved leader of India.

Treasure These Thoughts

Love's magic mansion is built in the rose-red light of the morning sky. Love knows no chains nor limitations. It is a flame which casts no shadow.

NEW ELECTORAL AREAS

There are deeper depths even below the deepest depths of Sinhalese machinations in their planned endeavour to enthrone the hegemony of their race eternally in this country. That is the only lesson one has perforce to learn from even the most cursory consideration of the new scheme of representation, in the House of Representatives, which the Delimitation Commission recommended and which the Government have with alacrity made into law through a Proclamation by the Governor-General.

Under the provisions of the Ceylon Constitution (Amendment) Act passed by Parliament recently the next House of Representatives will have 151 elected members. In the report which was submitted to the Governor-General on Tuesday last the Commission recommended the demarcation of 145 electorates, of which five will be multi-member constituencies.

For the purpose of the demarcation of the 145 electorates, so recommended, the Commission had to depend on an assessment of the present population supplied by the Department of Census and Statistics. The present population of the island was assessed to be 9,361,300; and of this the number of citizens (both by descent and through registration) has been estimated at 8,123,800.

The difference between these two totals which amounts to the huge figure of 1,237,500 obviously represents the number of "stateless" inhabitants of Ceylon, who are preponderantly Tamils of "Indian descent". A very large majority of these were born and bred in Ceylon and have lived here continuously, without a break, recognisable in

law, for periods ranging in most cases from twice to thrice or even four times the number of years prescribed as necessary for continuous residence, in all civilized democratic countries, to gain the recognition of the right to citizenship. In most civilized countries the right to citizenship is granted automatically to people who have such compelling qualification. In the case of these Tamils of "Indian descent" however their right to the citizenship of this island has been hanging fire from the very inception of the independence of Ceylon.

First D. S. Senanayake, then Dudley Senanayake, then John Kotelawela and now Solomon Dias Bandaranaike have all been working with the same basic objective, in regard to this simple matter, which has come to be known by the grandiloquent phrase, "the Indo-Ceylon" question. The basic objective of these four successive Sinhalese Prime Ministers has been to keep down to the lowest practicable limit the number of Tamils resident in the up-country areas with the full rights of citizenship. The "practicable limit" will ultimately depend on the determination with which those whose inalienable rights are being denied are prepared to fight for them and not on the arbitrary decision of an obscurantist Government. It will depend too on the willingness of a leader like the Prime Minister of India to refuse any more to be fooled by the pigmy politicians of Ceylon.

It is indeed pathetic to contemplate the position of these Tamils of "Indian descent". The Ceylon Government does not want them here, even should their compulsory emigration from this land of their adoption mean the utter ruination of the planting industries which are the life-blood of Ceylon's economy. The Government of India, who are morally bound and legally entitled to fight for their cause—because they have succeeded to the former British Government of India who came to agreements with the former British Government of Ceylon regarding the future of the Indians they then helped to emigrate to Ceylon in order to prop up what was then a really big British Imperial asset—merely satisfies itself playing the role of the unprejudiced observer of this international scene.

While the inalienable rights of these Tamils of "Indian descent" are thus in the doldrums the un-

principled Government of this country have now decided to take a step such as has not been in the whole course of history in any civilised democratic country in the world. Successive Governments of this country have been dilly-dallying with this problem, year after year for over a decade. Now the present Government have by arbitrary methods decided to grant citizenship rights to only about 50,000 persons of "Indian descent" out of a total of over a million applicants for citizenship.

In the context of the new electorates which have come into being with the proclamation by the Governor-General these 50,000 who have been admitted to citizenship will not, almost certainly, be able to elect even one single representative of their own, for they may be found to be so distributed and dispersed all over the wide and mountainous planting districts. By the same token they may not be able even to gain some influence in the election of a non-Indian—descent-Ceylonese, which of course means a Sinhalese.

The demarcation of electoral areas has not been based on any constant principle of division applied uniformly all over the island. This has resulted in a number of indefensible and utterly wrong decisions. For instance the Commission found that in the up-country areas the number of citizens was not in proportion to the number of seats allotted to them obviously on the basis of population which included the very large number of Tamils of "Indian descent" who have been denied most arbitrarily the rights of citizenship. The Commission had recourse therefore to a sliding scale of citizen-strength in demarcating the electoral areas.

For instance in the Central Province a total of 30,000 citizens has been fixed to demarcate a voting area while in the Western Province voting areas are carved out for every 70,000 citizens which really means that the individual Central Province elector has two votes to every single of his Western Province counterpart. Where then is the principle of one man one vote on which Parliamentary democracy is said to be based? By changing the citizen-strength of electorates from Province to Province the Commission have certainly achieved a certain goal placed before them either *suo moto*

THE PHYSICALLY HANDICAPPED

A probe into History reveals the fact that in ancient times our Kings had looked after the Deaf and the Blind by providing them with asylums; but, after Ceylon came under Foreign domination, the State appears to have neglected this duty.

The Deaf, the Blind and the Crippled have been handicapped as much by the attitude of Society as by their physical limitations. The tendency, in the past, of neglecting the person who was different by reason of a conspicuous physical defect, is being now replaced by a realization that the crippled individual is first and foremost a human being and only secondarily, a handicapped one. It is now acknowledged by all that physical capacity or incapacity is a relative matter—no one is physically perfect and only a few are totally disabled.

What Have We Done?

In a democratic country like ours, it is unfair, that certain rights, privileges, comforts and conveniences should be denied to a section of the populace, though in a very small minority. Equality of opportunity should be extended to every child in a democratic set-up, irrespective of his position, capacity or handicap. Have any of us, or the State done anything substantial to place these exceptional children on an equal footing with our normal children in matters pertaining to education and employment, beyond regarding them as objects of pity, as burdens to their parents and as helpless social outcasts.

It would be admitted that it is our duty and that of the State to bring to fruition the ideal

or by other agencies. They have in the process laid themselves open to the charge of discrimination.

When the time comes for the Voters' Registers to be published the minorities will find that some of them have been entertaining false hopes. The Tamil nation will be confirmed in the realisation of the bitter truth that in the next House of Representatives its own representatives will be more heavily outnumbered by the Sinhalese than even at present and that the over all political position in the country will continue to be overpowered by the passion for Sinhalese hegemony.

of a full and useful life for every handicapped child, according to its capacity. We should be able to train them to become useful citizens, who could contribute their share—however limited it may be—towards the building up of our country's economy.

Missionary Pioneers

Unless Government and employees become aware of their potentialities and feel disposed to accept these Handicapped persons as potential productive members of society (and not merely as cases for an Institution), the future of the exceptional or handicapped children of our country will continue to remain a sadly neglected one.

Had it not been for the pioneering services of some missionary societies no initiative would have been taken in the field of social welfare for these unfortunate victims. As early as 1912, Miss Mary F. Chapman, a missionary lady founded a school for The Deaf and the Blind at Wellawatta. The school commenced catering for 4 children. In 1914, the school moved to Ratmalana to a site donated by Mr A. J. R. de Zoysa, where it has grown to its present proportions.

Two Schools

Some 20 years ago, the Roman Catholic Church started a school of its own and the organisers have a proud record of achievements. Thus two Institutions:—

1. The Ceylon school for the Deaf and Blind, Ratmalana.
2. The Convent school for the Deaf and Blind, Ragama.

are functioning for the education and training of the Deaf and Blind. Finding the accommodation inadequate to meet the increasing demands, the Board of Governors of the Ceylon School for the Deaf and Blind decided to open a school at Kaithadi—a Central spot in the Jaffna District—by utilising the funds generously subscribed by Lord Nuffield, that world-known philanthropist.

Kaithadi School

Accordingly a school was constructed in 1956 at Kaithadi and named after the donor "The Nuffield School for the Deaf and the Blind, Kaithadi". It was opened on 29.2.56 for the education of the Tamil-speaking Deaf and Blind children (Continued on page 5)

renegade clergy to counteract the growing influence of religion marks a return to pre-war practice and the open hostility towards the Orthodox Church and clergy seems to mark the end of the precarious truce which has existed between Church and State since the end of the second World War. Monasteries of the Orthodox Church are also under fire because they attract young people and girls have even left the Komsomol (Communist youth organisation) to enter a convent.

Attacks on Muslims

After the Russian Orthodox Church, the second largest religious community in the Soviet Union is the Islamic. Recently in Soviet Kirghizia, where Press attacks on Moslems are particularly violent, a spontaneous Moslem revival caused great alarm to the Communist authorities who immediately launched a counter-offensive.

Atheistic propaganda establishments already exist in several Moslem areas of the Soviet Union. But, since meetings and lectures are boycotted by believers, anti-religious propagandists are now being sent into the private homes of Moslems, partly, to counteract the influence of the roving "mullahs", or Moslem preachers.

This is part of the two-faced policy towards the Moslems. Moslems of Asia and Africa are constantly told that the Soviet Union favours religious freedom and provides opportunities for Moslems to develop their own national culture. At the same time it conducts a constant vilification campaign against its own 20 million Moslems who have suffered persecution for many years.

Since, in the Soviet Union, religion and the churches have survived 40 years of Communist power and oppression it is unlikely that the present measures will be any more successful than those adopted in the past. But it is important that the free world should realise that religion still constitutes one of the main targets for Communist attack.

of this Island with 30 children in charge of 4 teachers and 2 matrons. It has been registered as an assisted English school and is essentially residential. At present, Mr. N. Ramanaden, a highly qualified graduate of the Gillardet College, Washington, is officiating as Principal here and has 57 deaf children and 12 blind children under his charge. The teachers here are not teachers in the ordinary sense of that word. They are really "master-architects" who mould the lives of these exceptional children and draw out their potentialities, so as to bring them on a par with normal children.

Teaching a Vocation

To prevent these unfortunate handicapped persons from being dependent on public charity throughout their life-time or being a burden to society, they should be taught some sheltered vocation in life. To these who wonder how the handicapped could be effectively trained in any vocation, how they could be made to compete with normal persons in efficiency, we would say

"Every person has strength and limitations so that the differences between handicapped and normal persons are actually quantitative rather than qualitative."

The aim of the education and training of a deaf child should be to make him a well-balanced, well-integrated, happy but deaf individual and not a pale imitation of a hearing person.

Miss Hellen Kelley, a deaf and blind lady, has astonished the world by securing a Doctorate in philosophy.

Rajendra D. Vyas of Bombay, blind at the age of 16, continued his studies and has secured the M. A. & L. L. B. degrees. Recently, for writing a thesis on the social conditions of the Blind he has been awarded a Doctorate.

Call for Justice

It is not charity but Justice that these physically handicapped people want from the State and Society. Legislation, as in the U. K. should be introduced here compelling every trade to employ a certain percentage of handicapped people too. As public opinion is the mother of legislation on social matters, it is imperative that the minds of the members of the public be made receptive to such legislation and their interest stimulated

Cultural Association

"In this context I wish to remind you that mere political connection is not of any value compared with cultural associations which are more valuable and lasting. During the past six or seven months I have been visiting several South-East Asian countries and wherever I went I have found a link established without any political pressure or war from one side or the other. Such

"The relation between India and Ceylon is of that type and there lies the value. I find that our ancestors dared the seas, crossed mountains and countries inaccessible in times when movement was difficult. When they had gone they had left marks which will last till time lasts."

Reference To North

"The relationship between India and Ceylon is through such cultural contact—the northern part, on account of Tamillan culture and the rest on account of Buddhistic influences."

"One of the great characteristics of Indian life is tolerance for others. I doubt if there is any other country in the world which can point to such type of tolerance as exists in India. We have been the recipients of people from different climes and we have received them with open arms. They have become part and parcel of India."

"One single instance which comes to my mind is of a community, which because of persecution left their homes, 1,300 years ago and came to India—they are the Parsee community. They were given not only protection but also freedom of worship and guaranteed all facilities similar to those afforded to Indians. Though they number only a lakh in an ocean of humanity in population, they are not only free to follow their own religion, but also to propagate their religion though not to proselytise."

Composite Culture

"That is true of all religions in India. The Indian culture has affected the culture of all who came and settled down in India. It is now a composite culture, an amalgam of so many cultures."

"You live in a country with several strands of people—Sinhalese, Tamils, Keralas, Muslims and Christians belonging to different churches. Each has its own tradition and value and its responsibilities and duties to discharge. I cannot do better than ask you to make yourselves as serviceable and good as you can. That is a way to serve Ceylon as a whole and your community."

"I believe that in this city of Jaffna you are living as good brothers and sisters and making your contribution towards Ceylon's culture and art. It will go to the credit not only of Ceylon, but of India as well."
