## Disarmament and International Relations

Ever since the destructive potential of atomic weapons was successfully demonstrated at the expense of the unfortunate inhabitants of Hiroshima and Nagasaki and the ending of the second world war through this action, such weapons have come to play a special role in 'Power Politics' and National Defence programmes. After the war America and Russia came out of their shells but fell apart and the decade following the war witnessed a mad race for nuclear stockpiling by these two and to a lesser extent by Britain. In more recent years the rivalry between America and Russia has extended to making spectacular space flight and now and then it looked as though the world was heading for a "Show-down" between the (Free) West and the communist powers. The rise of Red China complicated matters and it was feared that development in some trouble spot or other could lead to a nuclear war. However, fear of one another's strength on the part of the nuclear stalwarts, the existence of the U. N. O. the rise of a group of 'neutral' nations, and similar factors have tended to work towards peaceful solution of international issues and in spite of the present Berlin crisis and the recent resumption of nuclear tests by Russia, there is a 'Disarmament Conference' (at foreign ministers' level) now on at Geneva, under the aegis of the United Nations.

It is only at the idealistic level that Disarmament means the total giving up of arms and armed forces and renunciation of war by countries. Modern conditions force even avowedly neutral nations like India to maintain a certain degree of military strength. What nations

are aiming at is partial disarmament or reduction in the size of armed forces and the amount of weapons (both nuclear and conventional) countries possess. Halting (further) production of nuclear weapons and rendering non-effective or transforming for peaceful purposes part of the existing stock and technical difficulties connected with these are some issues connected with Disarmament. The effects of a sudden halt (even partial) to an industry employing a large amount of capital and multi-talented labour on a country's economy and factors like the loss of 'Prestige' involved if the so called 'nuclear Deterrent' has to give way to 'traditional Diplomacy' in the expression of national ambition at foreign level, have also to be considered. The 'soldier' may look upon disarmament as an unwarranted reduction in military efficiency. To those of them who take great pride in being 'At the Ready' to launch a nuclear first strike or counter strike, any attempt at Disarmament may appear to be a step backward which may result in unduly prolonging future wars. Thus while American policy makers have to resist undue pressures from the Pentagon and Big business circles, the 'Kremlin Bosses' attitude may be influenced by political needs peculiar to them.

Partial Disarmament has been tried earlier (in the uneasy years preceding the first world war) and later under the aegis of the League of Nations. Failure of Disarmament conferences and lack of force to enforce its decisions were chiefly responsible for the end of the League itself and it remains to be seen whether (an already tottering) U. N. O. will get a new lease of life from

some successful outcome from the present Disarmament Conference and others to follow.

A guiding principle which held good then was 'Reduction to the lowest point consistent with national safety'. In the context of the present day world this principle can be adopted by neutral nations like India. Major powers have world-wide interests and commitments, that from their point of view, 'National Safety' and 'National ambitions and interests' are closely mixed. However let us hope that with some satisfactory degree of disarmament all round and the easing of international tension this will bring about, this principle would be widely adopted.

The chances for an East-West understanding are brighter than they were, but some of the factors which would help here may also complicate matters and create new problems. The 'west' has abandoned the idea of ending communism in Russia once and for all through collective action but against this is the fear of Red China becoming a nuclear power and a law unto herself. Communist China is forging ahead under her own steam and her growing influence in Eastern affairs may draw Russia and the West closer. The Chinese have now what they formerly lacked—modern military strength and should feelings of national greatness and political needs of Red China's Bosses merge to produce a 'War of Revenge' on China's former oppressors, a third world war will be the result. It is imperative that future Disarmament talks should include China as well and (a non nuclear) China should be admitted to the U. N. O.

President Kennedy has openly chastised self-interested groups trying to mislead 'White House' and the success of John

## A NEW ASSOCIATION

As the result of a feeling among sections of the Tamil public that there is urgent need for an organisation to work for the general welfare of the country and at the same time to attend to the requirements of the Tamil people in a spirit of co-operation with other communities and existing organisations, there is a proposal to inaugurate such an organisation early. One method of service contemplated would be to try to adjust and reconcile whatever differences there might be in the Tamil community itself and further to work for harmony among the different communities in the Island and for national integration. A second would be to

devise ways and means of advancing the agricultural, industrial, economic, social and cultural progress of the country. Study circles would be organised and research work undertaken for the furtherance of the objects of the association. A third method would be to express opinion and views for the information of the general public and the government. The association would refrain from running or supporting candidates for Parliamentary or Local Government elections.

The express objects of the association are:-

1. To work for the general welfare of the

Glen's orbital flight would lead one to believe that American national hysteria motivated by jealousy of earlier Russian success would have cooled down. This is so but military exploitation of space is a matter on which both America and Russia have secret plans.

President Korushev seems to be more interested in 'advertising' communism through providing more and better consumer goods and comforts for Soviet citizens than in military threats. However he still enjoys theatrical gestures like handing over paper and pen to Nehru and telling him that if he gets others to agree to total disarmament Russia was only too ready to sign for same, when Nehru visited him as a messenger of the neutrals who met at Belgrade.

The attitude of the French towards Disarmament is caused more by the past than by the realities of the present. France has the technical know how but internal strife caused mainly by unsatisfactory relations with the North African members of the French community of nations and lack of finances may prevent her possessing great nuclear strength. French fear of German aggression is not without any justification (she has been invaded thrice by Germany in the period 1970-'45) and the possibility of (West) Germany gaining control over nuclear weapons under cover of N. A. T. O. commitments may drive the French to seek special safeguards for her. France and Britain may 'Pair' to exercise a special voice in European affairs as they did during the Inter-war period. Today both are second rate powers and scope for independent action on their part is limited. France must be persuaded to join future general disarmament conferences and accept international guarantees of her frontiers as good safeguards. Some definite agreement on disarmament must be arrived at for a settlement of the German problem

3. To work towards the ideal of One World and for the principle of honourable and peaceful co-existence.

4. To seek the co-operation and assistance of all sections of the people, of organisations and institutions and individuals and to take steps that are necessary for the achievement of these objectives.

It is likely that the Inaugural Meeting will be held sometime after the Tamil and Sinhalese New Year in Colombo, to be followed by meetings at other centres in Ceylon.

It is proposed to call the association as 'Ceylon Association for National and Tamil Affairs.'

NATIONAL INTEGRATION

Sir,

The task of national integration requires more efforts. Among other things, the following point might, perhaps, prove helpful in bringing about greater harmony and co-operation among various sections of the people.

Language Problem

1. It is desirable for Ceylon to make use of three languages, Sinhala, Tamil and English.

2. In addition to Sinhala, it is desirable to give recognition to Tamil as a national and official language. It is desirable for Tamil people to know Sinhala and Sinhalese people to know Tamil in addition to the mother tongue. Nothing could be lost by the acquisition of such knowledge. Knowledge leads to virtue, power and service.

3. Provision could be made in Educational institutions for the acquisition of such knowledge as referred to above.

4. Efforts to acquire knowledge of either language need not be bilateral. They could be unilateral. That is to say, that even if Sinhalese students do not take to the study of Tamil, Tamil students could study Sinhala, and vice versa. The highest form of national service would be rendered by the adoption of this procedure.

5. The same procedure could be adopted by public servants of both Communities provided, age health and other limitations of a similar nature, permit.

6. Standing Committees of representatives of various religious denominations would be helpful at this juncture to deal with some of our national problems.

7. Similarly, standing committees of representatives of various Communities would be helpful in the same context.

8. Generally speaking, constructive efforts and movements for co-operation and collaboration could be attempted with advantage to the country as a whole and to the component sections.

The Department of Education has made religion as a compulsory subject for G. C. E in 1965. This augurs well for the future. It is hoped that the Department will make adequate provision for the teaching of Religion in all schools in consultation with the Cultural Ministry with regard to the choice of books.

There are three Universities in Ceylon today. The Ceylon University came into existence in 1942. The Vidyodaya University and Vidyalandara Universities came into existence in 1959. The last two are Cultural Universities. For a national integration a study of all religions is very desirable. Buddhism is an allied religion of Hinduism. After Independence it has strived to gain its pristine glory.

Just as the two Cultural Universities strengthen Buddhist culture, Ceylon needs a Cultural University for Hindu Culture. There was a move to provide one at Jaffna, and the Hon'ble the Minister was to have made a beginning last year itself. It is hoped that there will be no further delay and at least a small beginning made before the next budget.

**Estate Kids And Language**

Sir,—It is an accepted and civilised principle that a child should be educated in its mother tongue, though in a country like ours with a linguistic and religious majority, special provision may be made to preserve the cultural heritage of the ruling class, (a contradiction in terms in relation to Democracy.)

The recommendation of 'A Sub Committee of the National Commission of Education' (Times 30-3-62) that children of Estate Tamil workers should be provided education only in the medium of the 'Official Language' (i.e., Sinhalese and not in Tamil, their mother tongue), could have proceeded only from a body consisting of men who do not apparently understand or are not in a mood to accept the fundamental requirements of human rights and civilised administration.

Why are the Sinhalese politicians and their Muslim ('Arabic Tamil speaking') Education Chief, trying to absorb the Tamil population in the Estates against their wish? If as in a land like North America, the people in Ceylon are designated Ceylonese (after the name of the country without a racial appellation), and equal

opportunities are given to every Ceylonese irrespective of his race or religion, then it would be reasonable to expect every citizen to study one Language, whether it be Sinhalese, Hela Basha Tamil or English. Why should children of an important section of the Island's community (with an admittedly rich and ancient tongue) be compelled to study a Language still in the making—just because the majority community happen to speak it?

Is it not a form of genocide to require a people to forget that language and literature—which are at the same time the source and inspiration of their religious beliefs? The Sinhalese Buddhists who form the ruling class do not believe in God, while the Tamils and their literature are steeped in the knowledge, the love of and devotion to a Divine Creator and Preserver of the Universe.

To suggest that the Estate Tamil workers are paid more than what they could expect in their country of origin is to exhibit a form of meaninglessness which might react on the many Ceylonese who have found really lucrative employment outside the Island.

It is no matter for surprise that even the most humble and hardworking sections of the Tamils in Ceylon should show an aversion to be associated with the much advertised culture and language of a section of the people who would seek to deprive them of their most cherished heritage!

As a full-fledged citizen of Ceylon and a lover of my country I must confess, I am ashamed of myself that some of my countrymen should want to think and act in this manner.
