Malaria Eradication Measures Demonstration of Chapel House Modelled After Detection of Disease By Blood Tests Yoga Asanas Hindu Ashram

Detection of Disease By Blood Tests

A sensitive test which can chart the production in human blood of immunising substances (antibodies) against malaria is being used with good preliminary results by scientists at the National Institute of Health, near Washington, D. C. They report that the test could prove helpful in the programme of eradication of malaria, a parasitic disease which afflicts about 200 million people throughout the world.

The test, Dr. Sanford F. Kavin of the National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases pointed out, is the first reliable blood test for investigation of antibody production in malaria infections. Dr. Kavin noted that the test also might be employed to determine the number of people suffering from malaria who do not show symptoms of the disease. Without such a determination, many human carriers of malaria go undetected.

In the absence of a routine, sensitive malaria test for antibody production, it has not been known how currently-used drugs alter the antibody response to the disease. Similarly, there has been no way of knowing how long the antibody-producing cells of the human body can maintain an adequate supply of antibodies when challenged by malaria infection.

In this test the antibody-containing blood serum of a malaria suspect is applied to a blood smear containing malaria parasites. If malaria antibodies are present, they will react to the malaria parasites. Dr. Kavin and his associates have now applied the technique to blood tests of nine normal human volunteers infected with *Plasmodium vivax* and *Plasmodium cynomolgi*

malaria. Thus, they were able to demonstrate antibody reaction about three weeks after infection and found antibodies still detectible in certain cases 325 days after infection.

On the basis of these observations, the scientists may begin studies on the relationship of antibody production to various types of anti-malarial drug treatment. They also plan investigations to determine whether or not different species of malaria share common elements which stimulate production of antibodies.

Malaria research at the National Institute of Health constitutes only a small part of an international drive to wipe out what has been described as the most serious insect-carried disease in the world today. The United States plans to provide more than \$100 million to bring the disease under control.

Malariologists, entomologists, sanitarians, and malaria engineers—many of them drawn from the U. S. Public Health Service—are sent abroad each year by the Agency for International Development to work with local health service officials and experts from international organizations in the anti-malaria drive.

Over the years traveling teams have lent a helping hand in many places. For example, a community in Western Java, with the co-operation of the Indonesian Government, the Agency for International Development and the World Health Organisation, through malaria control increased its rice production by 50 per cent. Spraying brought health to a section of Laos where almost every man, woman and child was infected by malaria. Malaria

eradication measures in Greece have helped bring about 20-fold increase in annual rice production. In these and other countries, united effort is bringing health and economic benefits.

Under the auspices of the Jaffna District Community Centres Union, Mrs (Dr.) S. Kumarasamy Professor and Doctor of Yogasana, Madras, delivered a public lecture on Yoga Asana at the Ariyalai Community Centre on Monday to a crowded assembly. Demonstrations on Yoga Asanas were given by a 65 year old student of hers to prove that any disease could be cured by systematic Asanas.

Mr. S. U. Somasekaram, Assistant Director of Education, presided.

Gate Mudaliyar C. Thiagarajah President of the Jaffna District Community Centres Union stated that Government should not lose time to make the study and practice of Yoga Asanas compulsory in schools which have proved to be a success in the cure of incurable diseases and at the same time made people who practised the Asanas systematically able bodied and perfectly healthy. Adoption of this suggestion by Government should solve soon the problem of shortage of doctors in hospitals etc.

Demonstrations in Yoga Asanas were also displayed by members of the Ariyalai Community Centre, Maveddapuram Central Community Centre and Tholpuram Central Community Centre.

Muhandiram E. P. Rasiah and Mr. T. Thuraisingam also spoke.

The Secretary of the Ariyalai Community Centre proposed a vote of thanks.

The Bhikkhu returned to the Harvard Center last week after summer stay at Chapel House, a unique meditation center for people of all faiths located on a wooded hill above Colgate University in upstate New York.

A Buddhist monk from Ceylon is continuing for a second year his special studies at the Harvard University Center for the study of world religions.

Under a grant from the Asia foundation of San Francisco, Bhikkhu Vinita of the Vijirarama Monastery in Colombo, has been studying leading world religions and psychology.

The Bhikkhu says that Chapel House, a three year old glass and stone building containing a small chapel in one wing and a library, music room, kitchen and dining room and living accommodations in the other, reminds him of his own monastery in Colombo.

Founder and Director of Chapel House is Kenneth W. Morgan, former Chaplain of Colgate and now a Professor of Religion. He modelled his center after a Hindu Ashram in which he lived for a year and sees it as a place for prayer, meditation and religious study. The library contains 3,000 religious works and the music room is equipped with over 350 recordings of various types of religious music. Religious art objects are on view throughout the building.

The Bhikkhu, during his stay at Chapel House, spent several hours each day in meditation in the chapel which has 35 seats and six small stalls and two oratories. He did a lot of reading, and was available to those who sought him out to learn about Buddhism. He also lectured on Buddhism to the University summer school.

The Bhikkhu is one of several Buddhists who have enjoyed the peace and quiet of Chapel House

and opportunities it offers for thought and study.

The first guest at Chapel House, in February of 1959, was a Buddhist monk from Rangoon. U. Thittila. The building has seven rooms for visitors and now about 25 guests a month make overnight stays.

The Bhikkhu says he has been asked to speak before a number of religious, student and other groups. He believes the world at present is divided, not between various faiths as in past centuries, but between religion and non-religion.

"I think it is important that the religions of the world should seek what they have in common, and do more together", he says.

SAFETY BELT FOR CARS

SAFETY BELT FOR CARS

A new car safety belt which is claimed to allow drivers and passengers complete freedom of movement will soon be available in Britain.

The belt webbing is drawn from an inertia reel mounted inside the door pillar. Light pressure on the belt enables webbing to run off the reel smoothly so that the wearer's normal movements are practically unrestricted.

Under sudden braking or the force of an impact the reel locks instantly, holding the wearer securely in his seat.

The inertia reel system overcomes two major objections to conventional belts with fixed anchorages; in some cars fitted with conventional belts it is impossible to work all the controls when a belt is worn, and the webbing creates an untidy jumble.

The new harness was devised by a former R. A. F. fighter bomber pilot, Mr. W. E. Rand, and is expected to cost under £6. It will be marketed by Messrs Irving Air Chute of Great Britain Ltd.; Letchworth, Hertfordshire. (B. B.)

Dictator in a Dilemma

The periodical postponement of the evil day cannot help the Finance Minister solve his problem. The hornets' nest has been unwittingly disturbed by him and any amount of intransigence cannot save him from the consequences. It matters little whether the cut in the ration of rice is effected from October or later. All that the people are concerned with is the abandoning for ever of the unwholesome thought of cutting any portion of the present ration at any time.

The rift in the ruling party has widened beyond repair. Every one of the Members of Parliament who chose to keep their conscience clear in defiance of the obligations of the party membership has urged very cogent reasons for his anti-Government attitude and has even suggested alternate proposals with a view to preventing the precipitation of a political crisis. But the Minister of Finance is unable to change his original decision. In other words he has developed a dictatorial mind. Dictators seldom acknowledge situations that present a dilemma. However the growing strength of the anti-rice ration cut group

KATTARA-GAMA

Sir,—In his letter on Kataragama, in the C. D. N., of 15-8-62, Mr Panduka Abayasekera says he was amused by my comment on the subject (7.8.62), and found the derivations of the words Kapurala and Kataragama 'ludicrous'. Far from being amused or annoyed, I have read Mr. P. A.'s etymology with profit and interest. We live to learn.

A. There was a time when Sinhalese writers derived 'Kataragama' from the Pali Kajaragama. Mr. Abayasekera, it is refreshing to note, has taken a new line of action. I derived Kataragama i. e., 'Kathir kamam', from the Tamil Kathir 'rays of the sun', or 'the sun's light' and Kamam — 'village'. Mr. P. A. derives it from 'Kattara'; which he says, means 'a large track of land' i. e., Veli-Kattara, or 'desert'. But Veli is Tamil word meaning 'open space', 'out in the open'. (c.f. Eli, 'Eliate' in Elu i. e., 'light or out in the open'). 'Kattara' again resembles Kattam or Kadu in Tamil, meaning 'a forest' i. e. 'Kattu Tarai'. But the Deity's shrine is generally, as in this instance too, on a hill by a river (Manika-Kankai written 'Menik Ganga' in Sinhalese) 'the sparkling rill,' and not in 'a large track of land', Kamam 'village' already indicates 'an inhabited place', and not 'a desert'. Gama again, is not Sinhalese i. e. Elu-but Pali, from the Sanskrit Grama which in turn came from the Dravidian 'Kiramam' 'that which is ordered', and 'Kamam' a cultivated field. Durava, similarly is derived from the Tamil 'Theoram' 'distance'. A Durava (Thoora-van) is 'one who comes from a distance,' 'a caste of persons'.

B. I believe Mr. P. A. knows that even Sri Ra-

in the ruling party must be able to force a decision. It is to be hoped that this saner opinion will prevail. This will also serve as a grim reminder to the irrepressible Minister of Finance that his colleagues are not ready to support his dictatorial policies.

hala wrote in Elu not in Sinhalese, and that 'Yapa Pattun' (Elu), is the same as the Tamil 'Vyapu Pattanam', the beautiful city'—not Jaffna, a coastal settlement occupied by the Portuguese. Compare Yapa Huva which means Vyapu — beautiful; and Hava 'Suvar' i. e., a fortification 'a wall'. The S in Tamil becomes H in Sinhalese with the final consonant dropped. Incidentally Rahula himself in his 'Selalihini Sandesa', speaks of Sivan temples and of Muruga shrines with the Cock Banner, and refers to the song and dance of Tamil girls, in these temples.

C. The word Rala, I suggest, is the Sinhalese form of the Tamil 'Ari' or 'Aria'. 'Ari (n) means 'a person'; and 'Aria (v) 'to rule'. Mr. P. A. asserts that Rala is an 'honorific' and gives Veda-Rala, Govi-Rala, as instances. The 'Rala' in these instances, as in 'Panchirala' or 'Kapurala' merely means 'a person'—'one who practices' or is 'in charge of medicine'; 'one who belongs to the Govi' or 'Patti class'. Compare the term Ralahamy (an Euphemism for a constable in Sinhalese, if Rala were an 'honorific', Hamy or Samy too is one—a double honorific! Ralahamy implies 'a person who belongs to the rulers', 'a guardian of the law.'

Take the word Alari (Oleander), a Tamil word. It becomes Arali in Sinhalese even as Arla—becomes Rala, and samy becomes hamy.

D. Kapu * (காபு) in Tamil means 'caution', 'watching' and Kaparlar 'a watcher' 'a guardian'. The Sinhalese Magul-Kapuva consists of Magul (Sanskrit conveying the sense 'happiness', and the Tamil Kapu—'a watcher' or 'Guardian'—'one who brings about or is 'on the look out for marriages', in a village. Take the word Kapu - Kottuwa, Kapu—'Guardian' and Kottuwa (from the Tamil Kottai) 'a Fort. In Tamil the name would mean a 'Guardian of the Fort' not 'an intermediary of the Fort', as Mr. P. A. would say similarly Kapuwatte means a guardian of a Watte a 'Vattaram' (Tamil).

Sami Dapula, a chief of Ruhuna, is said to have built Kadir-oli, a temple dedicated to the same deity as that of Kataragama. Kadir-oli — 'the

light of the sun',—is in this case, spelt nearly like the Tamil form. I wonder whether—Kataragama (an English rendering of the shrine), is spelt in Elu exactly as it has been spelt in English for Mr. P. A. to take the word as it has been spelt in English? Any how let us study more Elu and Sinhalese and a little Tamil at least, and we shall know how closely related these languages are.

Saiva Paripalana Sabhai Resolutions

The Jaffna Saiva Paripalana Sabhai at a meeting held on 12-8-62 unanimously resolved that the traditional vegetarian hostels which functioned as an integral part in the Saiva schools taken by the Government be allowed to continue as such without any attempt to introduced non-vegetarian diet there and the Sabhai further resolved to request the Government to serve vegetarian diet in the hostels of the Government and Director-managed schools, if no such provision has not been made already.

A vast gathering greeted the space pair along with the former cosmonauts Titov and Gagarin at the Red Square in Moscow.

Chemical Treatment of Cancer

Doctors who attended the British Medical Association's annual meeting at Belfast were told of progress made in the understanding of hereditary disorders and of techniques developed for the chemical treatment of cancer.

Dr. A. G. Baikie, of Edinburgh, told delegates that hereditary defects in humans caused sexual abnormalities, leukaemia and the production of mentally defective babies known as mongols.

Study of the babies had shown that they were more often produced by mothers approaching 40 years of age, but that a significant proportion were born to young mothers in their twenties. In the former the responsible agent was the development with age of a defect in the hereditary mechanism of the egg, in the latter this defect was always present in all cells of the body.

What this meant, said Dr. Baikie, was that a test based on an examination of the hereditary mechanism of cells taken from the mucous membrane in the mouth would show if the young mother had any cell defect and if so, what her chances were of producing abnormal babies.

Use of the test to decide against having babies would reduce the incidence of mongols, but because the cell change could occur naturally through mutation there would always be some mongols born.

Delegates were also shown methods used for treating advanced cancers with new drugs. In one of the techniques to introduce the drug in the highest concentration to the affected limb, a tourniquet was used to isolate the limb as much as possible from the rest of the body.

The blood in the limb was drawn off, circulated through an oxygenator and heater and returned with the drug to the limb. In this way high concentrations of the drug were prevented from entering most of the body, so eliminating general adverse side effects.

This technique has made it possible to treat a number of cancerous conditions and to increase the average time of freedom from disease from one to two years in some cases to five years.
