## KATHIRGAMAM

### Muthulingaswamy

One Kalyanagiri alias Kalyana-natha of Kashmere being distressed at Subramaniam making Kathirgamam His permanent abode, came over to Kathirgamam with a view to taking Subramaniam back to India and retaining Him permanently there.

Desirous of getting His dharsan in person, this Kalyanagiri is said to have started a life of fasting and prayer. As he remained in a yogic posture at one spot for long periods, two Veddha urchins (a boy and a girl) came and volunteered to serve him and attend to his needs. Although for 12 years he continued his fervent prayers, yet the Lord did not bless him with His vision. Being disappointed and perturbed at His failure to give him dharsan, he took a bold step. He secured a small gold plate and on it inscribed Lord Subramaniam's Yantra (the Divine personification of Subramaniam) and recited the prescribed Mantras for about 40 days in all devotion and infused into it not only the Lord's supernatural vitality but also His mystic Power. He then locked up this Yantra in a small strong Box and made preparations to transport it to India,

One day, however, his veddha servant girl stealthily got hold of this Box and took to her heels. Noticing this, Kalyanagiri gave her chase. She ran all over followed by Kalyanagiri. Unable to evade him and escape being caught, she finally ran inside the temple and disappeared behind the curtains. Almost behind her ran Kalyanagiri clearing curtain after curtain and dashed even unto the sanctum sanctorum. There, to his astonishment, he saw Lord Subramaniam with His veddha consort, Valli seated over his Box containing the Yantra

The resplendent vision unnerved him and he remained transfixed there for some time worshipping them. Only after some time did it dawn on him that for 12 long years, true to the saying "அந்தணர் தம் அடியாற்றும் அடியேன்...", this mighty Murugan and His Love in the guise of veddha urchins had served him as menials during the 12 years of his fasting.

Thereafter, he changed his mind and decided to make Kathirgamam his permanent abode and serve the Lord devotedly. Accordingly, he built a madam—called the Kalyana Madam—and lived praying and conducting an omakundan and worshipping Murugan. In this Madam, one day, the people of the place found that he had gone into a state of Samadhi. As his body had reached a pearl-white hue, he was called 'Muthulinga-swami' and enshrined by his followers in that madam now called after him, as Muthulingaswami madam. The fire lit by him in his Oma-kundan is kept smouldering even to this day, without ever being extinguished.

According to Dr. Daviz who had accompanied the then Governor, General Robert Browning to Kathirgamam:—

"the Kalyanamadam is greatly respected and is the chief curiosity at Kathirgamam.....it belonged to KalyanaNatha the first priest of the Temple, who on account of his great piety passed immediately to Heaven without experiencing Death."

### Yantra

The magnetic Yantra given vim and vitality by this devotee, Kalyanagiri alias Muthulingaswamy, radiates its mystic Power even to this day. It is this Yantra that adorns the Holy of Holies and thus attracts thousands of

devotees to go and pay their homage. It is this Box wrapped in cloth that is brought out on festive days to majestically mount the elephant and go round the Temple. There are no idols or images here for the eyes to see.

"Whenever a devotee wishes with devotion to adore me in any Form he likes into that Form I infuse myself and give him unshakeable faith."

### Mouna - Mantram

The Pujas are performed by the Children of the Forest, the Sinhalese Kapurals. They know not and chant not any mantrams. They bandage their mouths with a piece of saffron-tinted cloth and get in behind the curtains and wave the light and mounam (silence) appears to be the mantra used by them here. "The voice of silence is perhaps more eloquent than the spoken word."

The people who have feasted their eyes on the rich treasures of art amidst the magnificent Pagodas of South India and Jaffna, with their Gopurams projecting into the sky, and their golden deities, the sight at Kathirgamam would first produce a sense of frustration. They would seek in vain for the pomp and style of ornamented idols and their paraphernalia of worship as is the common feature of temple worship in South India and here.

### God in Hiding

The Lord of Kathirgamam is God in the hiding. It is a Play of Hide and Seek. The Lord had gone into hiding and the true devotee's part is to seek. The joy of true religious Life is in the zest of the search and the Great Find, if you are fortunate to find it. The Holy of Holies is hidden by curtains. The pilgrim, the worshipper, the seeker, the sadhu sees but the last curtain on which is painted the portrait of Subramaniam with His Consorts, Valli and Dheivayanai. The suggestion here seems to be that the devotees should look be-

## Citizens With Civic Sense And Responsibility

### Must be Main Aim of Students

In the course of his scholarly Prize-day address at the Jaffna Hindu College Prize giving, Mr. V. Sivabramaniam, District Judge, Kandy cautioned the students of his Alma Mater against the tendency of being involved in political activities while at school and exhorted them to mould themselves into worthy citizens avoiding the many pitfalls that hinder such progress.

We are passing through a most difficult period of our history. One notices an atmosphere of growth wherever one goes. There are rumblings of boycotts and civil disobedience movements. A big question mark hangs about the future of a large number of public servants. Opportunities for employment which were always few have become fewer. Govt. service as an avenue of employment is practically closed. The political sky is overcast. Yet we need not give way to despair. It is our duty to face the situation resolutely and calmly.

In moments of despondency, one may recall and reflect on the beautiful lines from Wordsworth which seem to echo the teachings of our own religion:—

"One adequate support  
For the calamities of mortal life  
Exists—one only; an assured belief  
That the procession of our fate, however  
Sad or disturbed, is ordered  
By a Being  
Of infinite benevolence  
and power;  
Whose everlasting purposes embrace  
All accidents, converting  
them to good."

In one sense, we are victims of the past. The system of education we then had was intended mainly to produce clerks for the colonial regime. Even after independence, the system did not show any national change. This couple with a desire for security, made us look to Govt. Service as the main source of employment. The economic poverty of our

people as a whole is principally attributable to the craze for Govt. jobs. Perhaps I should plead guilty myself to having been a victim of that craze. The virtual closure of that source, does not necessarily speak the doom of the people. On the contrary, it should be regarded as a blessing in disguise.

If we are to progress economically, we must, out of necessity, turn to industry and agriculture. We must pay more and more attention to scientific and technical education which is of vital importance to us at the present day. I would strongly urge those of you who have the aptitude for it to concentrate on the study of scientific and technical subjects. You will then find that there will be ample opportunities before you. You will be able to wrest opportunities even from unwilling hands, I am happy to find from the Principal's Report that the proper emphasis is being placed on the teaching of science subjects in the school

In keeping with the views of leading educationists the world over, the Govt. has laid down that education should be in the child's mother tongue. None will deny that the policy of ignoring the pupil's mother tongue is educationally vicious and impedes the due development of his mind. You are therefore more fortunate than those of our generation were. Had we enjoyed the same facilities, I should have been happier to have addressed you today in our mother tongue. We can

### WHOLESOME WORDS

The end of education as all eminent thinkers and educationists have often declared must be to make man develop the best in him. This axiomatic conclusion was the theme of the scintillating speech that was delivered by a distinguished old boy of a famous educational institution at the Annual Prize day. Differing from the stereotyped prize-day perorations that have become a usual feature of this country's efforts in the sphere of cultural activities, the address of the eminent *alumnus* of the Jaffna Hindu College, Mr. V. Sivasubramaniam, District Judge, Kandy, was in effect a heart-to-heart talk to the younger generation on the better way of learning and living. Reminding the prize-day audience of the need for religion and abiding faith in the Almighty the learned speaker declared that submission to despair should be resisted by calm determination to face any situation.

Making useful suggestions on the necessity for 'more and more attention to scientific and technical education, Mr. Sivasubramaniam, unequivocally stated the case for the study of English without prejudice to the principle of the 'mother-tongue policy. The quintessence of the lecture was best seen in the plea for students steering clear of political pursuits in educational establishments. It was a fervent appeal, sublime in concept and expression, made in the interest of the nation by one who has lived up to that lofty ideal in the true tradition of scholarship. Here was a stirring ap-

take pride in the fact that Tamil literature goes back at least four thousand years and had already reached a high standard of excellence at the beginning of the Christian era. Nevertheless, it is essential that, while paying due attention to the mother tongue, you do not neglect the study of the English language. English is no longer the language of any one country. It has become an international language. If we are to keep abreast of modern scientific thought and the advances in science, in medicine, in engineering, in technology, if we are not to lose contact with the great currents of Western thought and culture and to benefit by their quickening influence, if we are not to isolate ourselves from the rest of the world, it is necessary that we should have an adequate knowledge of the English language. Our mother tongue alone will not suffice at present. It may well be that in course of time all that information will be available in our mother tongue as well. Until then, let not a false sense of nationalism stand in the way of your developing the study of English.

Sometime ago I was reading a volume of the speeches made by Swami Sivanandaji of Rishikesh, when he visited Ceylon a few years back, and one of his injunctions impressed itself on my mind. That was "Talk a little". I do not therefore propose to inflict a long speech on you.

But before I conclude there is one advice I wish to give you, especially to the boys of the upper school. That is, to eschew politics altogether

and appeal to students to realise the significance of real strength, "the strength of soul, the strength of mind and the strength of body—hereft of all pettiness of purpose and narrowness of thought".

A prize in a Prize-giving is naturally a highly valued possession for the recipient and so will be the wholesome words of advice of the distinguished judge as the collective prize for both pupils and pedagogues. We commend every word of this useful speech to all the students of this country.

while at school. I do not mean that you should close your eyes to what is happening around you or that you should live in an ivory tower. Be alive to events that are taking place but avoid active participation in politics or political agitation. More especially, do not allow yourselves to be made tools or catpaws of designing politicians. You, no doubt, are the leaders, of tomorrow but you must first be equipped to assume the leadership. Devote all your attention, therefore, to the building up of knowledge, to the building up of character and to the building up of your physiques. The last is as important as the other two. Cultivate self discipline. Most of the ills to which this country is subject today may be traced to a lack of discipline among the people, to an absence of respect for law and order and to a spirit of intolerance. Avoid these pitfalls therefore, and mould yourselves into citizens with a civic sense and a civic responsibility. Tolerance is a great asset. Always try to understand and appreciate the other man's point of view. That way lies the elimination of misunderstanding and the promotion of goodwill and harmony. Cultivate the qualities of self-reliance, initiative, manliness and patriotism and you will then be fit to be leaders of the people and you will render yourselves worthy of their esteem.

A distinguished American educationist Dr. Starr Jordon who was the builder of two Universities in America had a favourite saying: "The world stands aside to let any man pass who knows where he is going". I commend those words to you.

Earlier, Mr. Sivasubramaniam said

A couple of years ago, when the question whether this College should voluntarily become Director-managed was in the balance and some of the members of the Board, no doubt with the best intentions, urged that it should remain a private non-fee levy institution, I happened to be a member of the Board of Directors myself and urged very strongly the contrary view. I felt then, as I feel now, that education is the root of national life and progress and the responsibility for public education should be with the State.

That was a view propounded originally by Plato, the famous Greek philosopher, who said that the chief dictatorship of the education of boys and girls was the most important of all the chief offices of state. The passage of time has not altered the soundness of that view but has only re-emphasized it, especially with the modern concept of Governments as welfare States. During the colonial days this responsibility was shifted to private bodies and individuals, often ill equipped for the discharge of this important duty and, by diversity of aims and practice, introducing an atmosphere of competition, unfavourable to the interests of education. It was therefore a step in the right direction for the State to have assured its proper responsibility. We would not have acted in the best interests of the school or of the education of the children of this area if we had decided to cut ourselves adrift from State assistance, we must necessarily be prepared to submit to State control as well. In retrospect, I think there can be no question that our decision was right.

One of the first duties of the new management in regard to this school was the appointment of a Principal and in its choice for the post, it showed its wisdom. This school is certainly fortunate that the person in charge of education in this Province Mr. Somasegaram is an old boy who has always taken the deepest interest in its welfare. We do hope that before he lays down the reins of office he will see to it that the programmes referred to by the Principal in his report are all accomplished facts.

hind the curtains of Nature and the illusion of Maya. You are told to rip asunder the curtains of the Koses with which you have unwittingly hidden the Lord within your very heart. We have heard of the Rahasiyam (secret) at Chidambaram. Methinks, at Kathirgamam, one saw the Rahasiyam of Guba, because he inhabits the caves, or the recesses of the human heart. And you are asked to peer within.

According to Dr. M. Covington—

"It would appear that this solitary and barren

village, situated, as it is, in a malarial District without any natural advantages, is entitled to no distinction, except in connection with its holy shrine which itself has no artificial or architectural attractions... Its only attraction consists in its sanctity."

### Administration

From the point of management of these temples, they could be divided into three groups;

(1) The Maha Dewale, Valliamman Temple and Pathini Kovil which are being administered according to the provisions of the Buddhist Temporalities Ordinance.

(2) Manicka Pillayar Kovil, Deivayanai Amman Kovil, Vairavar Kovil, Muthulingasamy Kovil, Sellakathirgamam and Kathiramalai which are managed by the successors in office of the North Indian Bawa Community according to a deed of Trust executed by Kesapuri alias Paal Kudi Bawa in 1898.

(3) The Kiri Vihare and Perumal Kovil that are managed by the Buddhists Priests.

### Worship

At about 5-30 a.m., I stood in silent worship opposite the sanctum of Deivayanaiamman. I noticed a familiar figure come that way; at first, I could not make him out, for, he was in the garb of a sadhu. But as he smiled and raised his hands in salutation, I recognised him as a retired D. J. from Jaffna. He appeared to have renounced the world and found solace and satisfaction in the seclusion of Kathirgamam.

For a moment I felt an irresistible urge to follow him, renouncing the world myself and seeking refuge at Kathirgamam. I thought of Murugan, closed my eyes in meditation and forgot the world around me. I must have remained in that meditative mood pretty long; then I felt someone give me a dig. I opened my eyes and saw my Param jothi take my hand and lead me through the crowd up the bridge across the river—not to Heaven—but to our car, to be back to the material world and its distractions.

What is this Life; a dream? We were back in Colombo at noon for lunch after a tour lasting 24 hours—glorious hours.
