The Magnificence of Mathottam

(By Muhandiram E. P. Rasiah, J. P.,
Hony. Treasurer, Saiva Paripalana Sabha.)

On the invitation of Mr. N. Sivarajah, A. C. L. G., who sandwiches temple worship in between work and relaxation, I joined him at Vavuniya on his itinerary of Mannar District. As we drove along Mr. Paranjothi and Mr. Sivarajah recounted to me interesting and authoritative facts regarding the past glory of Palavi, the high place that Mathottam had occupied as a trade-centre between the East and the West and how the nearby sea-board area, came to be called, Vankalai—(வங்கம-கப்பல் and காலி—தங்கும் நிலையம்) and the antiquity of Thiruketheecharam temple.

Temple

The construction of the Thiruketheecharam Temple is lost in the mists of antiquity. It is, however believed that the original temple was built by one Mayan, the father-in-law of Ravana and that Mayan's daughter, Mandothari (Ravana's wife) was one of its staunchest devotees:-

".....ஆர்கலி சூழ் தென் னிலங்கை அலகபர் மண் டோதரிக்குப், பேரருள் இன்பமளித்த பெருந்துறை மேய பிரானைச்....."

Mathottam

In India, Towns had sprung up around Temples; likewise, around this Thiruketheecharam Temple too a town had come into being.

Socrapanman's wife's grand-father called Thuvatta, whose prayer for progeny was answered at this Temple, had built a town around this Temple and made it his permanent abode. Hence the place came to be called "Ma-Thuvatta". This, through the passage of time, got converted to "Mathottam". The famed river Palavi had flowed past it. The Roman writers, Ptolemy and Pliny had referred to it as "Palavi-Mandi-Oppidum."

Growth of Mathottam

During 1st century B. C. this Mathottam

was the chief seat of government with a prosperous port. It was the nerve-centre of International trade between China and India on the one side and Rome, Greece, Mesopotamia and Arabia on the other. Being centrally situated, it was able to command the maritime highways of the merchant vessels. According to Cosmos Indicopleustes "the emporium in that place was the greatest in those ports"... "The city had wide streets, well laid out; the palaces and mansions, several storeys high contained terraces and balconies; the State Rooms were supported by pillars covered with gold—the implication being that the city was in those days the supreme example of wealth and magnificence. Royalty rode on elephants and chariots."

The territory all around was inhabited by Nagas (including Ragu and Kaethu) and Asuras and there appears to have been inter-marriages among them. Here was born Viswakarma, the Master-Craftsman and Architect.

Fortifications

In Mathottam, there were three important fortifications one of which was constructed by Viswakarma himself. As it had a high tower projecting towards the sky, people called it "the Hanging Fort". Being a formidable structure with impregnable ramparts, high walls and a deep moat some called it the "Iron Fort"; as it was an object of much attraction and admiration reference had been made of it in Periplus, the Grecian work, as "Sopatama" meaning the "Magnetic Fort". In Viswakarma Nadagam, this Fort has been exaggerated as a magnetic mountain

"செங்கமல மாலைமணி தேவனே! மாந்தை நகர்ப் புங்கலனே! காந்த மலைப் புண்ணு கெயிர மன்னு!"

The occupants of this particular Fort had, however, earned for themselves an ill-repute as inter alia, they had made plunder and piracy their profession and the chief means of livelihood. It was said that while women inveigled the crew of merchant vessels inside the Fort and entertained them during the night, the men boarded the vessels lying in anchor and plundered the merchandise. These acts were exaggerated by the medieval Mohamedan writers, who forcefully depicted in "The Arabian Night" stories "that there was a magnetic mountain which drew towards it ships in its vicinity and wrecked them".

Destruction of Town

The Chinese traveller Hsien Tsang has recorded "that the Iron Fort which continued to be a great menace to the sea-faring trade of Ceylon was destroyed by a King". Probably it fell to the lot of Karikala Chola, a powerful Chola King from South India, to completely destroy this Fort and Town and to take with him about 12000 inhabitants as prisoners to India. He had thus ended the menace to free trade, and earned for himself the sobriquet of "Destroyer of the Hanging Fort."

The credulous believe that the old Temple and the adjoining lands of "milk and honey" were burnt down to ashes by some curse or the wrath of the Gods. Some hold the view that a deluge was responsible for wiping out the entire city. The more probable cause may have been the frequent devastations caused by successive waves of invading forces of Chola Kings from South India. "Those days, it was customary for victors to ensure complete victory

Tamils in London Tell Their Countrymen

Unite to Urge Demands

Whereas the Tamil speaking peoples and other minority groups in Ceylon are at the moment subject to great hardships through discrimination against them in various aspects of life as education, employment, land cultivation, the rule of law, and civic rights; by denying to the Tamil language its rightful place; by interference in religious freedom by a denial of democratic rights to voice their opinion and protests and,

Whereas legislative enactments like the Indian and Pakistani Citizenship Act 1948, disenfranchising one-eighth of the population, the Official Language Act 1956, making Sinhalese the only official language and thus causing hardships to three million people, to mention only two, and administrative regulations continue to be passed, which are discriminatory in the extreme and,

Whereas that as from 1st January 1964, as many as 13,000 public servants are being compelled to vacate office because they lack proficiency in Sinhala, though an assurance that they would not be made to suffer was given by the late Prime Minister, Mr. S. W. R. D. Bandaranaike whose policy the present Government claims to follow and,

Whereas 800,000 Tamils from among those who were from time to time brought from South India, beginning over a century ago, to open up plantations in Ceylon, have been deprived citizenship and franchise and made 'stateless' for a long time now with no prospect in the near future of their gaining civil status and,

Whereas all appeals to reason, constitutional provisions and reference to legal procedures in such other countries where

there are multi-racial and multi-linguistic groups, have failed to make any impact on the present Government of Ceylon and,

Whereas all peaceful demonstrations like Satyagraha have been broken up and the participants cruelly handled by the military at the instance of the Government and,

Whereas it has now become necessary to acquaint all free nations of the world regarding the situation of over three million persons who belong to minority groups in Ceylon and to awaken world consciousness to their plight and,

Whereas it is necessary to build up the solidarity of all Tamil speaking peoples to resist further inroads on their freedom and to regain lost ground and,

Whereas there is need for a united body for all Tamil speaking peoples outside Ceylon, so that it could be the centre of their activities and,

Whereas the non-violent movement to be launched in Ceylon on the 1st of October will require the support of all,

This meeting held in London on the 21st of September, 1963 calls upon all Tamils and their sympathisers, both individuals and similar organizations;

To support, irrespective of political affiliation, the programme of the Committee for Tamil Action in making as widely known as possible the hazardous plight of all minority groups in Ceylon; in resolving to take whatever steps may be necessary in the struggle to regain their lost liberties and in striving to work in conjunction with responsible people among the Sinhalese to restore peace and

KEEPING EVERYONE IN SUSPENSE!

The only achievement of the S. L. F. P. Administration has been its ability to keep every inhabitant of this country in suspense. The student at school remains in blissful ignorance of the scope of educational courses, the candidate for examinations waits in vain for his results, the common man hardly knows what exact amount of taxes he has to pay and, to add only one other category, the clerk is at a loss to proceed with his work owing to ever-changing instructions. But these difficulties do not cause so much anxiety as those with which officers in Government Service are now confronted because of the vagueness of statements that are being issued by the Authorities about the conditions of service affecting the non-Sinhala speaking group.

The Tamil-speaking officer who joined the Government Service at a time when English was the Official Language cannot be under any obligation to study Sinhala. To him the displacement of English may have been certain; but he has been equally sure that the national languages would take the place of the foreign language. The officer who was recruited after the Sinhala Only Act was put in the Statute Book, cannot be compelled to subscribe to the view that the Sinhala Only Act necessarily implies that he shall work in the Sinhalese medium. The right to use one's language is a privilege that cannot be easily destroyed. It will be a calamitous situation for Tamil-speaking Government Officers to

be denied their rights and privileges.

We earnestly appeal to the Premier for a review of the problem of official language in the interest of the nation as a whole. The different communities of this country do not have any ideological dispute, nor do they have a cause for any quarrel. All that they want is that their rights should not be restricted. Even the S.L.F.P. Government cannot deny the basic ideal of democratic nations that 'all men are created equal.' To the Tamil speaking people, Lanka is their home-land where they cannot be denied, among others, the freedom of opportunity. It is the duty of all inhabitants of this country to maintain, guard and re-vitalize Liberty and Peace. The best way for the ruling party to dedicate itself to the ideal of liberty is to grant freedom of opportunity to the Tamil-speaking Government Officers.

Sabhai Resolutions on Pilgrimages

India, being the holy land of the Hindus and the Buddhists, they had been making pilgrimages to the holy shrines of India from time immemorial. Pilgrimages are very useful as they help the pilgrims to purify their mind, lead a spiritual life and achieve divine wisdom. What Buddha Gaya is to the Buddhists are Banares, Chidambaram, Vedaraniyam and Thiruchendur to the Hindus. The religious hymns and puranas of the Hindus enjoin them to visit these holy shrines as often as possible. By the restrictions made at present by the Government on pilgrimages to India the Hindus feel much grieved as they are denied the privilege of making pilgrimages to India for the sake of their spiritual salvation. The Jaffna Saiva Paripalana Sabhai therefore earnestly requests the Hon'ble the Prime Minister of Ceylon to be good enough to relax the present restriction placed on pilgrimages to India and thereby enable the Hindus of Ceylon enjoy the benefit of their freedom of worship.

justice in our land,

The above is the first resolution passed at the meeting mentioned. Copies of this resolution have already been sent to a wide circle of non Tamil friends requesting their help. We now invite your active support to give effect to this resolution.

The meeting was recommended:

a. That wide publicity should be given in the Western world to the events in Ceylon, explaining the nature of the crisis.

b. That future meetings be called as and when necessary.

c. That if the opinion of the donors was required between meetings, the same should be obtained through the post. The Committee should give alternate proposals and ask for a choice.

A second resolution was also passed at this meeting which reads as follows:

This meeting calls upon all Ceylon Tamils, both at home and abroad, to dedicate themselves on the 1st of October, 1963 to the cause of redeeming the unhappy situation in which they find themselves today in their motherland; to work on behalf of all minorities; to strive for peace in Ceylon by all the means available to them, by the exercise of such disciplines as are necessary and by the making of such sacrifices as they may

remote past to those shrines according to certain conditions laid for management of the said endowments. Caretakers are appointed in Jaffna to collect the rent and other income from these properties and remit the amounts thus obtained to the respective shrines for the performance of pujahs and festivals according of the objects of each trust. At present the Government had refused permission to the caretakers to make any remittances out of the revenue of the said trust properties. This decision of the Government thus nullifies the objects of the founders of the various trusts. Therefore the Jaffna Saivaparipalana Sabhai further resolves to request the Hon'ble the Prime Minister to be good enough to lift this ban too.

be called upon to make from time to time.

It is further resolved that this resolution be conveyed only to the Tamils of Ceylon, where ever they are at the moment.

Perhaps a word of explanation is necessary for those who were not present at the meeting. It was pointed out that hitherto the Tamils, in the face of their hardships, had put forward all the arguments, legal, constitutional and moral against the present policies of the Government. All these went unheeded. Then, they had resorted to the only way left to them—satyagraha—to demonstrate their resistance in a peaceful way. The answer they had to this was force. Hence,

Beyond saying and doing we must now go on to "becoming", which is the intent of this resolution

The call to dedication is a solemn, serious call which may sound irrelevant to the majority. Even a minority who would see the need for it and the future possibilities in it, must accept it only after careful consideration.

AN APPRECIATION OF the late Mr. Kanthappar Somasundaram

Kanthappar Somasundaram of Karainagar East passed away on 13th, February, 1963 at his 85th year. He was an old boy of the Jaffna Hindu College and enjoyed the fortune of imbibing noble ideals of life from reputed educationists like the late Mr. S. Sivapathasundarampillai and Mr. Nevins Selvadurai. He participated in the glorious welcome which the Jaffna public afforded to Swamy Vivekananda in 1897 at the Jaffna Hindu College.

After completing his education at the Jaffna Hindu College he proceeded to Malaya and was employed there in the medical department. He spent his leisure time there in religious and educational activities and thereby earned the love and regard of the Malayan public.

His father rendered every help to the late Mr. Sayampu in establishing at Karainagar a school called Thirugnanasampantha Vidyasalai which is now known as the Karainagar Hindu College. When Mr. Somasundaram retired from his service in Malaya he, like his father, was very helpful to the Principal, Mr. A. Thiagarajah, to develop the Karainagar Hindu College by erecting new buildings and acquiring equipments necessary for a secondary school.

He led an exemplary life, his motto in life being, 'simple living and high thinking.' He was an ardent admirer of Mahatma Gandhi and always wore Kadhar clothes. He was also a disciple of Swamy Shivananda of Rishikesh and received his blessings at his Ashramam when he went there on a pilgrimage. He performed Yoga practices regularly and was fully convinced that Yoga was helpful to one to lead a healthy life and attain spiritual bliss. He gave noble advice to young people and impressed on them that purity of mind was essential for their success in life.

He was a life member of the Jaffna Saivaparipalana Sabhai and was a regular subscriber to the 'Hindu Organ' and 'Inthusathanam'. He was always helpful towards the various activities of the Sabhai.
