## SERVICE TO MAN AS MISSION ON EARTH

### Tribute to Swami Vivekananda at Centenary Celebration in Washington

The continuing significance of the message of tolerance spread by Swami Vivekananda was hailed by speakers on October 4, at the Washington Centenary Celebration honouring the Indian spiritual leader.

Addressing a large gathering at Smithsonian Institution Auditorium, Dr. Grayson Kirk, President of Columbia University, said Vivekananda's teaching of religious toleration has "a broad and general significance today, a significance which is still so greatly needed by the world."

Significant though Vivekananda's thoughts on religious tolerance are to domestic situations, Dr. Kirk said, "Even more important, in the world of today, is the extension of this principle in dealings among nations"

"The world must learn" he continued, "that, small though it is, it is large enough to accommodate peoples who follow many different theories of economic and political organization, just as it has learned, however painfully, that it is large enough to contain peacefully the many religious creeds that once were such a source of discord and bloodshed."

Dr. Kirk, noting that the beneficent influence of a great life can continue through the passing years to exert an even wider effect upon mankind, turned.

To the meaning and significance of Vivekananda's life which "has influenced so many millions of men and women abroad as well as his own country." He spoke of "the historical importance of Vivekananda in the context of Indian-American relations" and said:

"My own conclusion is that he played an interesting, as well as an important, role as an interpreter of the two cultures to each other....."

"In this country; his personal charm, his intellectual brilliance and his spiritual profundity made such an impression that he was listened to with respect when he sought to dispel some of the strange notions hitherto held by Americans about his people and their customs."

Similarly in India, Dr. Kirk added, Vivekananda helped to correct distorted stereotypes of America. "For this service, even if there were not other", he said, "Both countries are indebted to this remarkable and indefatigable man whose intelligence and sympathy enabled him to carry conviction when he sought to demolish the distortions and untruths held by both peoples about each other."

Dr. Kirk noted that in India, people listened to Vivekananda "not only as a spiritual leader, but as a man who gave them a dream of what the India of the future might be."

"Men have dreamed for centuries of the vision of a world of nations living peacefully together, exchanging their products and their ideas, their books and their views in a climate of friendliness", Dr. Kirk concluded. "In such a world, hostility will give way to tolerance, and tolerance will give way to respect. The road is long and difficult, but we should be grateful that in all lands there have been men like Vivekananda who have helped to light us on our way."

Dedication is not determination, a strengthening of the will to achieve certain results at whatever cost. Determination can, depending on its strength, carry through its purposes for good or evil and where necessary also break the opponent to force him to yield. But, unfortunately, in the process, determination also breaks the very person who makes the resolve.

Dedication, on the other hand, is not so much a resolve as a relaxing. When you dedicate, you relax, let go, with quietness and confidence into a source and then all things will flow from the source. A part of the discussion at the meeting on this resolution will help to clarify this.

One speaker pointed out that our immediate need is unity and the call should therefore go for unity rather than dedication. It was then pointed out that unity as an end achieved would be a synthetic product, whereas unity derived from dedication would be a natural product.

It is thus, that not only unity, but all things will flow out as an outcome of such dedication and without effort—correct attitude, capacity to work together, programme together, and readiness to make sacrifices. To these may be added, "alertness, boldness, mercy and astonishing patience", as progressive result of a continuing sense of dedication.

We hope that there will be a sufficient number dedicating themselves to the cause on the first of October so that by the 1st January 1964 we have become a new people, a new unity sharing mutual strength and motive.

"I vow to thee, my country, all earthly things above,

Entire and whole and perfect, the service of my love."

## THE MAGNIFICENCE OF MATHOTTAM

### Industry

The area was world-renowned for iron-ore and gems, gold from the village of Ponparippu, pearls from Marichi kaddy, milk and paddy from Adampan and above all cloth and drapery of the finest and costliest variety. The weaving industry had particularly reached such an advanced stage that their products were termed by foreigners as "Slough of Serpents", "Woven Wind" and "Vapour of milk." According to the Periplus, "a kind of muslin sprinkled with pearls was exported from Epidorus (Mannar). This muslin, which by reason of its fineness and transparency was specially sought after by Roman ladies, who, apparently preferred effect to modesty, fetched fabulous prices in foreign markets. Pliny, the Roman writer has stated "so has toil to be multiplied, so have the ends of the earth to be traversed, and all, that the Roman dame may exhibit her charms in transparent gauze—this drained the Roman Empire annually to the extent of 55,000,000 sesterces (equal to about £487,000) and this is the price we pay for our luxuries and our women."

### Alli and Arjuna

It is believed that Arjuna, the invincible Archer, in his romantic ramblings visited this city also and met and married the Naga princess Alli, the Queen of Amazons. To some extent, proof is lent to this belief by the existence of ruins reputed to be Alli's fortress at Arippu.

### Lion Flag

Ancient History has recorded the fact that Arjuna had occasion to fight against one Vavravahan, the son of a Naga princess. While the battle raged, this Vavravahan is said to have "raised his Standard, which was de-

corated most beautifully and which bore the device of a lion in gold with a palmyra tree in the background". It is interesting to see, that even in remote antiquity, the Flag of the then Naga (Tamil) Rulers of North Ceylon was "the device of a lion" (Yali), similar to the controversial Lion flag now in use.

### Destruction of Old Temple

By noon we reached Thiruketheecharam Temple. The Portuguese on their invasion of Mannar had, as was their modus operandi, looted the original temple of its valuables and destroyed the structure and utilised the rubble to build the present Fort at Mannar. That temple site had got overgrown with jungle and remains a pathetic sight even today.

### Re-building of the New

The efforts of Aramuga Navalar to re-build this temple did not materialise but the agitation had continued. On 13-12-1893, the Hindus of Jaffna along with Nattueottai Chetties were successful in bidding and buying 40 acres of this land for Rs. 3100/- at a public auction conducted by the then G. A. of Jaffna.

Excavations were then carried out and inter alia a Sivalingam was discovered. The Hindus then secured another Lingam from Benares and installed it in a small building and religious worship commenced on 28-6-1903—60 years ago.

### Work of Restoration Society

Since then, many substantial additions have been made to the structure. The systematic performance of pujas, the

## PLACE THE LANGUAGE PROBLEM BEFORE U. N.

The institution that is popularly known as the United Nations Organisation must confess its insufficiency to deal with problems that affect large groups of people who are unfortunately a minority in its member states. If it is so then the U. N. must be fast ceasing to be adequate to the needs of humanity.

A Member State enjoys its place in the U. N. on the principle of sovereign equality with every other Member State. A State also ensures sovereignty for all its citizens. Where, however, in a State that has gained a seat in the U. N. racial tension, religious discrimination and non-recognition of all national languages create a problem, that particular state cannot be in a position to discuss in the General Assembly similar situations that obtain in other member states.

The composition of the U. N. Assembly provides for the Member States being represented by delegates. The party in power certainly exercises its authority by choosing delegates from its membership. In the case of our own country, the delegation that is now functioning in the Assembly represents in fact the ruling party though nominally it may be claimed that the party in power reflects the wishes of the entire nation. There are questions of vital importance where the views of the ruling party cannot be accepted as being identical with those of the rest. The Sinhala Only Act is detrimental to the Tamil-speaking people. It will be idle for Mr. P. de S. Kularatne to say that Lanka has no racial problem or to deny that there is no legislation that is

based on race, religion or language. The problem of the Tamil-speaking people has not been placed before this World Assembly. The representation of States in the U. N. cannot mean representation of peoples. This organisation cannot afford to leave large groups of minorities in Member States in the lurch merely because representatives of such states paint pleasing pictures of the state of affairs in their countries. The voice of the minorities must be heard. The most effective method of placing the grievances of minorities is to provide for a Standing Committee of the U. N. to report annually on the internal problems of each member state. If this is done delegates like Mr. Kularatna will think twice before stating in open assembly that all is well in Lanka.

## Teacher Training Expert

Mr. John A. Smith, Vice-Principal of Jordan hill College, Glasgow, the largest teacher-training college in Britain, arrived in Ceylon over the weekend for a three-week visit to examine local teaching conditions so that teacher-training courses for Ceylonese in Britain can best be adapted to the needs of the country.

His visit, which is under the auspices of the British Council, arises out of a scheme set up under the Commonwealth Scheme for the training overseas teachers in Britain. This provides for a limited number of teacher-training staff to pay short visits to the countries of origin of their students to obtain first-hand knowledge of the educational conditions to which the bursars will return after their training.

Mr. Smith is the first to visit Ceylon under the Scheme. He will carry out a programme of visits to training colleges and other educational institutions arranged by the Department of Education and the British Council.

## An Incorrect Statement

Sir,—It is reported in the Ceylon Press that in an U. N. Assembly debate on racial problems, Mr. P. de S. Kularatne, while complimenting President Kennedy on the efforts of the latter's administration to root out discrimination, made the following statement.

"Ceylon's laws did not tolerate religious or racial discrimination. It was to the credit of the British that racial and religious discrimination which had persisted for nearly 450 years had been virtually eliminated by the time Ceylon gained its Independence in 1948".

The impression sought to be created by the above statement in the minds of people outside Ceylon must be counteracted without delay in the interest of truth and political justice. Mr. Kularatna's statement requires immediate refutation. It is best that the United Nations Organisation and other International Circles are told plainly that Mr. Kularatna's claim is entirely devoid of substance and that, on the contrary, it is erroneous. It is trusted that the Tamil-speaking political parties, organisations, politicians and Members of Parliament would make immediate representations in respect of Mr. Kularatna's statement setting out the real state of affairs in Ceylon, while supporting his request for just treatment for the Buddhist people in Vietnam.
