## AN INTERNATIONAL AFFAIRS COMMENTARY

The Kingswood (Prize Day) Prologue 1964 (found in both Observer and Times of Sunday July 26th) contains the following lines (after a reference to the deaths of Kennedy and Nehru:-

"But death does not deter the march of men  
The world takes everything within its ken.  
In Africa new nations spring to life  
In Cyprus and Guiana there is strife.  
Malaysia is faced with confrontation  
While fear is in the heart of every nation)  
(Section 6)

The third line refers to a great historical development of recent times—the rise of free states like Ghana, Kenya and the few weeks old republic of Malawi (former Nyasaland) whose Prime Minister attended the Dinner at Buckingham Palace along with other Commonwealth Prime Ministers. These Young African nations find much in common with the Asian nations who now manage their own affairs and the emergence of an Afro-Asian bloc with declared foreign policy principles of neutrality and un-alignment, is a great balancing factor in world politics today. More recently there was held a summit conference of heads of African States at which among other things the creation of a Pan-African Government and common defence force was discussed.

The situations in Cyprus and Guiana are not pleasant to comment upon. An ingenious settlement which provided for a Greek-Cypriot president, a Turkish-Cypriot vice-president and guarantee of Cyprus's security by Britain, Greece and Turkey has not solved all that it set out to solve. Those familiar with European History will see that features of the famous old 'Eastern

Question' are still present and that the Greek War of Independence in which the famous English poet Byron took part did not end Greco-Turkish hostility.

British Guiana is not yet free and here the trouble is between Indians and the indigenous population caused mainly by economic factors. The situation must somehow or other be satisfactorily brought under control and Britain must not delay the granting of Independence on the grounds that her Imperial control is essential for the security and progress of the country. Riots similar to the kind on in Guiana are not beyond occurrence in East Africa and it would be advisable for Indian traders in this part of the world to go back to India if possible or continue their businesses in partnership with local individuals. They should also spread out from the residential angle. What happened in Burma should open the eyes of Indians seeking fortunes abroad.

'Confrontation' is a high sounding term and with Laos once again in world focus as a trouble spot one wonders whether the ultimate outcome South-East Asian Chaos will be a Chino-American Confrontation. Leaving neutrality aside we Ceylonese are in the position of having to sympathise with both national groups—Malaysians and Indonesians. Both territorial entities cannot be found in maps drawn prior to the World War and let us hope for lasting peace in this region soon.

Racialism in various forms continues to hit the world head-lines and America took a step forward in the matter of emancipation of the American Negro with the recent Civic Rights Act. While being happy that the social status of the Negro has received legal

definition, one cannot help reflecting that had American society developed on healthy lines such legislation would be unnecessary. Enforcement of civic rights contained in the Act will not be easy and already newspapers have carried an item about a Test case. At the same time the nomination of a confirmed anti-Negro as the Republican party's candidate for the presidency and rioting in the Negro section of New York—(Harlem) have given America bad publicity. It may be recalled that the city of New York accorded Althea Gibson, the Negress who won the Women Singles Tennis title at Wimbledon, a ticker tape welcome some years back.

Racialism in Africa presents different features. Britain must withhold South Rhodesian independence until the white minority there see reason and agree to a more Democratic political set up. Developments here will have effects on the situation in South Africa. At the recent world conference on economic sanctions against South Africa, economists of the U. S. A. and the U. K. proved clearly that both countries could participate in an economic blockade of South Africa without losing much economically. In so far as 'apartheid' is a threat to world peace and progress, the U. N. O. would be justified in active intervention. Let us continue to hope piously that in America, the integration of Whites and Coloured will be a full reality that the Civic Rights Act would become superfluous and that in South Africa racial peace would be achieved without the use of arms.

The Commonwealth Prime Ministers' Conference ended on a satisfactory note and Australia's victory in the third Cricket Test and the grand performances of her tennis stars at Wimbledon

2633 On emancipation (the soul) becomes satiated with the Lord's Grace, transcends all tatwas (Maya) and all deeds (Karmam), its deeds becoming God's deeds,—Seers who thus become true devotees (of the Lord), they indeed are enjoyers of Supreme Bliss,

Section XXXIII with which the chapter concludes bears the headline Sothanai சேரதனை, literally examining, sifting or purifying:

2635 பெம்மான், பெருநந்தி, பேச்சுற்ற பேரின்பத்(து)  
அம்மான் அடிதந்(து) அருட்கடல் ஆடினும்,  
எம்மாயமும் விடுத்(து), எம்மைக் காரதிட்டுச்,  
சம்மா திருந்திடம் சேரதனை யாமே.

The great Lord, the great Nandi, our Father of infinite Bliss beyond the reach of words,—His Feet did He crown us with, and we bathed in the sea of His Grace. We got rid of all delusion (and other forms of bondage), concealed ourselves (took refuge under His Feet) and became actionless. This reformation (into the state of non-agency) indeed is called Sothanai or purification.

2643 The good Lord, the beginningless Supreme of supremes, my Father,—when He contacted me (as Guru) and examined me, He followed me, He pervaded me, He transcended me, He showed me the way (to emancipation).

2647 அந்தக் கருவை அருவை வினைசெய்தற்  
பந்தம் பணி அச்சம் பல்பிறப்பும் வாட்டிச்  
சந்தை திருத்தலும் சேர்ந்தார், அச்சோதனை

The seed (Anava Malam the root cause of all misery), the formless (Maya seed of the world), the sins wrought by egotistic action (Karmam), fear and the innumerable births resulting thereby,—all these do wise sages destroy and rectify themselves. When such self-examination and purification fructifies, they become (of the nature of) the Supreme Lord.

### NINTH TANTIRAM

And now we come to the last of the nine Tantiras that constitute the Tirumantiram. If the subject-matter of this chapter is to be described in one word, we may say that it speaks of Siva-Bhogam சிவபோகம் (Continued on page 2)

were perhaps quite in the order of things and may be used to emphasise the fact that Commonwealth Premiers are pledged to 'Playing the Game' in the far more serious sphere of International Progress and Friendship. A Commonwealth Secretariat is to be set up and it has also been reported in the papers that steps would be taken to make annual awards on the lines of the Nobel prizes. The communique issued at the end of the Conference contained no suggested solutions to the problems of world interest discussed but indicated possible lines of action. Our Prime Minister put up a good show and the twin faced role of explaining the West to the East and working for world peace which Nehru played with great success, will have to be carried on by our Prime Minister and Mr. Jomo Kenyatta.

I wish to conclude this account with references to two world famous personalities—Sir Winston Churchill, the former British Premier soon to be a managenarian in full retirement and Sri Kamaraj Nadar, the Indian Congress Chief. By the time you read this members of all parties in the British Parliament would have paid tribute in the form of a special motion acknowledging Parliament's great debt to Sir Winston for his illustrious services. Only once before has a politician been honoured thus and that too happened in the (19th) when it honoured the Duke of Wellington—a very distinguished ancestor of Sir Winston. Wellington checked the ambitions of Napoleon while Sir Winston took over control of the affairs of a nation in great peril from the hands of the inept man with the umbrella—Neville Chamberlain, and earned the title of Britain's greatest wartime Premier of all times. Sri Kamaraj's 62nd birthday was celebrated on a grand scale in Madras recently and Ceylon

or enjoyment of Godly Bliss. It forms the coping stone, if we may say so, of the grand edifice of the Dasa-Kariyas or ten themes, the penultimate three of which (Siva-Rupam, Siva-Dharsanam and Siva-Yogam) were dealt with in the three immediately preceding Tantaras. A description of the nature of sanctified souls who enjoy Siva-Bhogam (அனைந்தோர்தன்மை) is included here. And, as such, this concluding Tantariram of the Tirumantiram may be said to correspond to the two concluding Sutras of the Siva Gnana Bodham and Siva Gnana Siddhiyar, the 11th Sutrām which speaks of Siva-Bhogam and the 12th Sutrām which speaks of the nature of the Sanctified.

There are 397 verses in this chapter divided into 28 sections, commencing with Guru-Mutt-Dharsanam குருமடதரிசனம் and Gnana-Guru-Dharsanam ஞானகுருதரிசனம், visions of the spiritual Instructor and of his habitat, and ending with Anainthor-Thammai அனைந்தோர்தன்மை, Stotiram தேரத்திரம் and Sarva-Vyapi சர்வவியாபி, nature of the Sanctified, praises of God and God's Omnipresence, respectively.

Some of these topics may appear to the casual reader to be repetitions of matters already dealt with in earlier parts of the book. The themes of the Guru and or his resting place for instance figured prominently in the introductory chapter and in the sixth and seventh Tantarims under the heads of குருமடவரையடி, குருபாரம்பரியம், சிவகுருதரிசனம், சற்குருநெறி, &c, besides repeated references to them in various other contexts. And their recurrence here once again under குருமடதரிசனம் and ஞானகுருதரிசனம் might appear to be flaws that come under the grammarian's list of ten principal blemishes that mar the literary beauty of a book. But on mature consideration it will be found that the mention of these subjects here,—call them repetitions if you so desire, is really necessary in the context of the description of the attainment and enjoyment of Divine Bliss (Siva-Bhogam). As we had occasion to state in a similar context earlier, we have discussed the question of similar so-called repetitions in our 'Elements' Chapter XIV, under the head of 'a retrospect', to which the readers' attention is invited. The chapter commences describing the holy religious atmosphere associated with Mutts where the Guru and his disciples reside.

2649 Sacrificial offerings, expanding fumes arising (from the burning of frankincense) and the din (of Vedic chanting), (these are characteristic of) holy devotees' Mutts or monasteries where they concentrate their minds on the Lord. Seers of these Mutts go and attain the tender flowery Feet (of the Lord) and rest serene.

God dwells in the heart of the Guru who resides in the Mutt. The Guru and the Lord should be viewed as one, and no distinction made between the two. In speaking of the discovery and worship of the Gnana Guru, the Sruti says:

2656 When the 36 tatwas are brought under control by the Grace of the Supreme Guru, Adwaita Union (with God), Godliness and Supreme Bliss are attained.
