THOUGHTS ON THE POLITICAL SITUATION

The General Election provides an occasion for a conscientious examination of current political ideas and methods.

The talk of the balance of power for Tamil members in Parliament is not helpful to the Tamil community and to Ceylon and is misleading. The Tamils have no power under the present Constitution and under prevailing conditions. They are in a permanent and hopeless minority in Parliament. They have no Constitutional safeguards either. Even the meagre rights provided for under section 29 of the Constitution have not been legally availed of by any of the Tamil political parties.

In the circumstances, it is a misnomer to speak of the Balance of Power for the Tamils.

What is required for them is opportunity for service to Ceylon and to themselves (The Tamils). This opportunity is absent owing to the Constitution and the scheme of Parliamentary representation and the manner in which they have been used. The Tamils have to make an effort to serve on the basis one for all, and all for one. This is a real and lasting remedy; not the mirage of Balance of Power.

It is claimed that if the Tamil members of Parliament are united as a solid phalanx, they will wield a Balance of Power and thus be able to serve the community. Neither the Federal Party nor the Tamil Congress will have any Balance of Power for them to exercise because there is none for them to exercise. Past experiences completely negative the contention that the Tamils have any Balance of Power. No single occasion could be given when Tamil Parliamentary representatives were able to exercise the so called Balance of Power for the

Community's welfare since the inauguration of the present Constitution or even earlier in the history of the Ceylon Legislature.

It is good to remember that even if all the Tamil Members of Parliament are united as a single unit, they will always be in a minority owing to the scheme and quantum of representation in Parliament. It is also good to remember that the Sinhalese can get united even as Tamils are enjoined to get united.

At a certain stage of India's political evolution, an intimate friend of Shri Jawaharlal Nehru remarked of the latter that—

"he is now seeking footholds to scale the walls instead of smashing his head against the walls as in the past".

It is best that the idea contained in this sentence is applied by Tamils in Ceylon. This could only be done by employing the methods of persuasion, co-operation and joint collaboration.

Regarding the plea for unity, the following advice from Shri Nehru is apposite:—

"It is of course absurd to say that there should be unity at any cost. It all depends on the circumstances".

This advice was given by him in regard to some aspects of Indian affairs during the time of Mahatma Gandhi.

It would be instructive to remember at this stage that when all the Jaffna Constituencies unitedly boycotted the first Parliamentary election under the Donoughmore Constitution in 1931, Shri Nehru who was in Ceylon about that time, expressed his opinion against the

Kulangai Thambiran (1699-1795) the Guru of Gurus

A poet from Thondai Nadu, one who earned the sobriquet of Koolangai Thambiran of Kanchipuram, came to our land of Eealam, in the early eighteenth century. Once this poet was at the Thirup-pananthai Math. The Head of this Math having had his "kandikai" (a necklace of beads worn by mendicants) stolen, wrongly thought that this Thambiran might have done so and asked him to swear to his innocence. The Thambiran said that even if he were asked to plunge his hand in molten ghee he would do so and prove his honesty. This he did, and proved his innocence. But his hands became slightly twisted, so much so people called him "Kulaugai Thambiran"

Koolangai Thambiran did not like to be in Thondai Nadu, where he was not given the respect due to him so he decided to leave for Jaffna - which was well known to him as a land which fostered Tamil learning where Nallur was the last capital of the Tamil Kings.

During the Dutch period one Gopala Chettyar had come from the land of Chola, to seek his fortune here. At that time one Kochi Ganesha Aiyer was translator to the Dutch and the Aiyer took Gopala Chettyar under his umbrage. Shortly the Chettyar quitted Aiyer's services, as he could not stand Aiyer's rebukes. Gopala Chettyar now set up a business himself, and he became a dealer in

provisions. He supplied Samba rice to the Dutch Governor's house-hold, Koolangai Tambiran was befriended by Gopal Chettyar - now ensconced in the heart of Jaffna - in Vannarpannai.

In the course of time, Gopala Chettyar was blessed with a son whom Koolangai Thambiran, a family friend named as "Vythialingam". Young Vythialingam was an intelligent child and good looking withal. The Dutch Governor and his wife, who had no children persuaded Gopal Chettyar, to allow Vythialingam to live with them. Gradually "Vythialingam" picked up the intricacies of business, and when a Pearl Fishery was to be held, he secured from the Government Agent special rights to fish for pearls. Vythialinga Chettyar reaped a good harvest of pearls.

Koolangai Thambiran who had become a "mentor" of Vythialingam Chettyar requested him to build a Temple for Lord Shiva - This was built by him in 1787. Koolangai Thambiran was not only a great Tamil poet, but he was a good Saiva Siddhanta Scholar and a pious devotee of Lord Shiva. Vythialinga Chettyar's house at Vannarponnai was open for hospitality to the learned poets of Jaffna at that time.

Nellainathar, of Irupalai, had the unique gift of repeating by heart any poem that he heard once. He was a friend of Vythialinga Chettyar, and used to go to his house at Vannarpannai Mailvagana Pulavar a Tamil poet of Mathagal, also used to go to Vythialingam Chettyar's house. The Chettyar used to receive his lessons from Koolangai Tambiran, in the presence of Mailvagana Pulavar. Thus his house became a sanctuary for scholars. The

He said "How could you know this Sir, when I have just composed this and recited to you? Nellainathar by way of reply gracefully and effortlessly repeated the verses sung by Senthil Kavi. Now Senthil Kavi was taken aback, and admired the Ceylon poet's gift of quick memory. He did not give in and repeated another verse, this time quickly. Nellainathar again said "I am familiar with this verse" and recited off the verse, much to the amazement of the hearers. Senthil Kavi recognized the poet's astounding memory power, and bowed in obeisance to him; and said "I salute you, O poet of extraordinary memory."

Nellainathar turning to Vythalingam Chettyar remarked. "Sir! These verses are not old, I just repeated these verses, in order to show Senthil Kavi my ability of memorizing the verses. Do not doubt him, he is a great poet; pray reward him. The Chettyar was so pleased that he said "O! King of poets, I wanted to give you half of what I am giving you, but I give you the other half in the name of Punditha Siromani Nellainathar", and give him double the amount as a gift.

Nellainathar belonged to the dynasty of men who awarded prizes to Kambar. His son was Senathiraja Mudaliyar, (the Guru of Sri Arumuga Navalar of Nallur) who was proficient in Tamil, Dutch and the English languages. It was he who was translator of Tamil to the Dutch Government and in the early stages of English Government. He sang the 'Nallai Vemba' in honour of the Lord of Nallur. Thus we identify this poet who praised the Lord of Nallur with the cultural heritage of Nallur.

boycott in spite of the so-called unity.

Shri Nebru's opinion is worthy of consideration even though some people in Ceylon are bitter in their estimate of him.

Uniformity cannot be mistaken for real unity.

Further, the Tamil opinion of Ceylon is not restricted to the opinion of the Tamils in the Northern and Eastern Provinces only and to the opinion of candidates from these two Provinces successful at an Election. It will be dividing the Tamils arbitrarily if we proceed on this wrong assumption. Even as it is deemed desirable to unite the Tamils of these two Provinces, it is still more necessary to think of the Tamils in Ceylon as a whole.
