Language Poses Threat To Canada's Unity

Canada is in grave danger of breaking up unless major changes take place in public institutions and attitudes, the Royal Commission on Bilingualism and Biculturalism said in its preliminary report issued yesterday.

In the 85,000-word report, tabled in the House of Commons by the Prime Minister, Mr. Lester Pearson, the Commission said it had found a deep gulf between English speaking and French speaking Canadians, deeper than most people realised.

The report stressed three basic conclusions:

1. There was a large dynamic and distinct French-speaking society within Canada, strongly dissatisfied

with present conditions.

2. Wide-ranging negotiations must be initiated between the Federal and provincial Governments to work out a truly equal partnership between the English and French-speaking societies.

Myths and Prejudices

3. All Canadians must overcome the myths, prejudices and ignorance separating them and put the development of a great nation above all other considerations.

The 10-member Commission said Canada's continued existence was in peril because the French Canadians of its

Letters to the Editor

The Language Problem

It is most timely that your editorial in the issue of the Hindu Organ of the 26th February has appeared at this juncture on the eve of the General Elections in Ceylon and when a fresh attempt is being made in India to find a satisfactory solution for the language problem. The insistence by the Hindu Organ that Tamil should be one of the official languages of the country in addition to Sinhala and that provision should be made for the due continuance of English ought to serve as a guide to the whole of Ceylon, and in particular to Tamil political parties, leaders of the Tamil speaking electorates and Tamil speaking public.

I do know what the present views of the Tamil Congress, Federal Party and Eelam Munnani are. It is trusted fervently that the Hindu Organ and the general Tamil public will be successful in persuading our Tamil political parties and leaders in the first instance to accept the suggestion put forward. The B-C Pact which accepted Sinhala Only as the

Quebec no longer accepted the status of an ethnic minority and wanted to be recognised officially as "practically an autonomous society."

"All that we have seen and heard has led us to the conviction that Canada is in the most critical period of its history since confederation" the practically autonomous society."

"We believe that there is a crisis, in the sense that Canada has come to a time when decisions must be taken and developments must occur, leading either to its break-up, or to a new set of conditions for its future existence.

official language and merely relegated Tamil as the language of administration for the North and East and also ignored and gave up English ought to be discarded completely and a fresh foundation laid on which the future linguistic structure of Ceylon ought to be built. It is best that the Tamil speaking voters exert themselves and persuade all candidates for the Tamil speaking constituencies to accept the suggestion without reservation. It is harmful to the Tamil people and to Ceylon if leaders and parties however eminent and influential they may be, are allowed to stand on false prestige and their pet plans. I am not without hope that our leaders and parties will do the right thing if the voters sufficiently exert themselves in time before Polling Day and try to obtain the necessary pledges. This humble submission is made without any intention to detract from the existing support which respective candidates would be otherwise having. So far as the Tamil people are concerned, the coming General Election would have taken place in vain if the necessary pledges and assurances in specific terms are not obtained from all candidates in the Northern and Eastern Provinces in connection with the Language Problem.

Assurances in vague and general terms by candidates that they would fight for the Tamil language and also die for the language are entirely illusory and useless. Let everybody live, and live long and well to serve the people and the country.

Achievement of A Ceylonese in England

A Ceylonese who is at Cambridge University, England next week equal a feat achieved only once before—and that 55 years ago.

He is Ponnambalam Rajendram, of Colombo, who represented Cambridge in the University Boxing Match against Oxford for the fourth time. Should he win, he will equal the record of Professor D. Portway, Master of St. Catherine's College, Cambridge, from 1906-07, who won four contests at middleweight against Oxford between 1907 and 1910.

Of his previous three contests in the University match at featherweight, Ponnambalam Rajendram won the first on points, stopped the same opponent a year later in the first round, and last year scored a knockout victory in one minute and 25 seconds.

This year Rajendram steps up to the lightweight class. Should the move prove too much for him, he will still have equalled the record of his boxing coach in Ceylon, Mr. Danton Obeyasekera, who represented Cambridge four times between 1928 and 1931 losing one contest.

Having gained a B. Sc. in Civil engineering in Ceylon, Mr. Rajendram went to Pembroke College, Cambridge; on a Ceylon Government scholarship to study estate management. He was awarded his B. A. last year and then stayed on a Colombo Plan Fellowship to take a year's post-graduate course in estate management which will culminate in July with a concentrated course arranged for him by the British Council in Birmingham.

On his return to Ceylon he expects to specialise in civil engineering valuation with the Government Valuation Department in Ceylon.

LANGUAGES TO LINK THE PEOPLE

The views that are expressed in a letter which appears in this issue sufficiently clarify and explain the immediate need for a forthright policy to be stated by the parties that represent the Tamil-speaking people regarding the problem of language. Apart from the text-book theories on the question of official language in a multi-racial and multi-lingual state the exigencies of the administrative requirements in both the political and social spheres of the people compel the acceptance of bilingualism or trilingualism as a necessary arrangement. In particular reference to Lanka the position is well within the bounds of practicability more because the equitable formula will be merely the return to the *status quo* that obtained before the Sinhala Only Act had found a place in the statute book. The history of the struggle for freedom from foreign rule clearly indicates how the Tamil speaking people and the Sinhala-speaking people inspired by their so-called leaders unitedly and in a unified manner had patriotically served the country. The political implication of that patriotic campaign could not have been anything but the return to the glorious past when Tamil and Sinhala obtained in the country both as sister languages absolutely essential for the conduct of the affairs of the people.

To free the people from the distress of discontent and confusion leaders must exhibit a spirit of heroism dedicating themselves in a determined effort to regain the reality of nation-

The worship of Lord Shiva was once prevalent not only in India and Ceylon but also in countries such as China, Japan, Burma, Siam, Java, Arabia, Phoenicia, Babylon, Aboynia, New Guinea, Egypt, Syria, Asia Minor, Greece, Italy, Ethiopia, Europe, Mexico, Peru, America. 'Rig Vedic India' Abinas Chandradas, says that the Chaldeans, who settled in West Asia, were the emigrants from the Chola country. The ancestors of the Chaldeans were Dravidians.

Says Radhakrishnan, that eminent Professor of India:—

'The Vedic Culture..... becomes transformed in the epics into the Hindu Culture through the influence of the Dravidians.'

The rise of the cult of Siva was an instance when the Aryan yielded to the non-Aryan—here it was the Dravidian. Puja worship took the place of Homa or Sacrifice. Image worship was a striking feature of the Dravidian faith and was accepted by the Aryans. The ideals of vegetarianism and non violence (Ahimsa) also developed.

The Tholbappiam, the most ancient of the Sangam works refers to Lord Shiva as the one whose half was the Shakti and enjoins the people to worship him. The Thirumanthiram of Thirumozalar speaks of Lord Shiva as the author of the Vedas. "Kalithokai", "Aha-Nannoru" & "Paranannoru"—Sangam works contain reference to Lord Shiva.

The Panchadsara Thirupathikam of St. Sambandar says:—

The "Sirupanatup-padai speaks of Lord Shiva as 'Alamar Selvan'. So do the Kalithurai and Manimekalai.

St. Manikka - vasagar makes a reference to the devotion of Mandothari, (one of the chaste women of the world, Ravana's queen) to Lord Shiva in his "Thiruvasagam" (Koil Pattu No. 2).

The "Silappadikaram" a Tamil epic has a reference to Lord Shiva."

The "Periyapuranam" contains the lives of sixty three Saints—all devotees of Lord Shiva. The temples of Lord Shiva hallowed by the feet of these Saints—are the most holy shrines of India. Rameshwaram, Chidambaram, Benares, Madurai, Bhuvaneshwar, Somanath, Kanchipuranam, Pasupathinath temple (Nepal) the temple of Lord Pasupathy and hundreds of others are in Chola Nadu, Pandi Nadu and Chera Nadu. These are places of pilgrimage on "Shiva Rathri" and the the whole night is spent there on meditation and fastiog.

Saivaites worship Shiva with flowers and incense. The flowers represent the heart, and the incense the melting of the heart.

On this night of Shiva Rathri Abishekam is performed during the four "yamas" periods. During the first yama, the lingam is bathed with milk, in the second yama with curd and in the third yama with clarified butter and in the last yama with honey.

Ceylon is a holy land where there are "Esuarams about which Devarams have been sung by Saints. Sundaramoorthigal and Thirugnanasambandar. Thiruketeeswaram and Thirukkoneshwaram are the two places referred to in the above. These two are like the two eyes of Eealam according Sri la Sri Arumuga Navalar. One night vigil (on March 1st will earn great merit. We recommend this idea to our Hindu brethren.

SOME POETS OF NALLUR AND THEIR DISCIPLES

4. SenathirajaMudaliyar (1750 - 1840)

We once again mention this scholar who was the son of Nellainathar. He studied under Kulangai Thambiran and Mathagal Sittampala pulavar. He was the Guru of Sri la Sri Arumuga Navalar, Saravanamuttu pulavar, Ambalavana Pandithar of Copay, Sambanda pulavar, Ehambarap - pulavar and Neerveli Peethambarapular. He was the chief of scholars who compiled the Tamil Dictionary. We cite here a stanza from his "Nallai Venba."

5. Paramanathar Kanthap-pillai (1766 - 1842)

Paramanathar Kanthap-pillai belonged to Nallur and was the father of Sri la Sri Arumuga Navalar. He learnt Tamil under Koolangai Thambiran and Sanmuga Chaddambiyar. Kanthapillai had studied medicine too. It is said that he was an Aratchi under the Government of his time. He was reputed to have written twenty-one dramas in Tamil. A few of these were Rama Vilasam, Erudu Nadagam (story of Herod), Sandi Nadagam, Santthirakasa Nadagam, Nikilar Nadagam etc. He wrote the Nallainathar Kuravanchi. The drama "Ratna Vilasam" which was commenced by him was completed by his son.

6. Appucutty Iyer (1295 - ?)

Appucutty Iyer's birthplace was Nallur. He knew Tamil and Sanscrit very well. He wrote the "Soothu Puranam", and the Nallur Subramaniya Pillai Tamil. This is a book of verses about the Lord of Nallur.

7 Saravanamuttu Pulavar (1802-1845)

Saravanamuttu Pulavar was born at Nallur. He

studied under Senathiraja Mudaliyar. He carried on lively controversies in Tamil grammar and literature with Vedagiri Mudaliyar and others in the "Uthaya Darakai. He was deeply versed in Saiva Siddhanta. He wrote the Vedanta Nayanjothi "Athma Pothap Pirakasi-kai" and Nallai Velavar Ula. His students were Arumuga Navalar, Sambanda Pulavar, Karthikeya Upadyayar and Sivasambu Pulavar of Uduppiddi (1830—1909).
