Thoughts On The Political Situation (3)

By S. Sivasubramaniam

Democracy is considered to be the best political ideal both on grounds of practical expediency and ethical value. It gives the highest place to the worth of the individual and paves the way for his advancement, enlightenment and material progress and that of the community and country.

In a democracy, it is recognised that people with different experiences and interests have different political aims and that such differences must be given free expression. In the United States and Great Britain there are two major parties with lesser parties appearing from time to time. The existence of at least two major parties in democracy rests on the principle that "the other side must also be heard."

On earlier occasions, I have already maintained that party system is not suitable for Ceylon and for the Tamils, while democracy is eminently suitable.

The independent voter in a free society typifies the person who reflects the unwillingness to support any one political party at all times.

In a free society, the independent voter assumes that neither party is always right or always wrong.

The peculiar circumstances in which the Tamils are placed vis-a-vis the Singhalese and the geographical distribution of the two communities in different parts of Ceylon and the want of a suitable political Constitution for the entire country have inevitably resulted in three different political parties arising among the Tamils. They are as follows:-

(1) The AM Ceylon Tamil Congress whose present policy is a unitary

form of government for the entire country based inter alia on effective distribution of political power for the Tamils and allied safeguards. This policy forms the basis of the present program of the Congress. I believe it is open for this institution on a future date if circumstances so require to give up its present policy and adopt a federal form of government or division of Ceylon with an independent Tamil state, as either of its aim.

(2) The Federal Party which as its name connotes stands for a Federal form of government for Ceylon consisting of Sinhalese, Tamil and Muslim states with a Central Government.

(3) The Eela Thamilan Ostunai Mannani which stands for complete division of Ceylon with an independent Tamil State, in accordance with ancient historical and political traditions and as now reiterated by Mr. Santhoralingam. Thus it would seem that there is sufficient basis for agreement between the three main Tamil political parties. Further, the Federal Party seems prepared in the first instance to accept Regional Councils. The Tamil Congress and the Tamil Mannani have not expressed their disagreement with the proposal for Regional Councils. Everything taken into account, for practical purposes in the immediate future there is not much difference between the three parties; though the parties and their leaders will not and cannot so admit openly particularly in the midst of an election campaign.

In view of these circumstances arising from general political theory and local Ceylon requirements, it would be prudent for the average Tamil voter to concentrate on

NALLUR And Its Cultural Heritage—VI

1. Thambu Kailasapillai

T. Kailasapillai was the son of the brother of Arumuga Navalar—a nephew, and also his disciple and admirer. Kailasapillai wrote the life of Arumuga Navalar in 1916. It makes delightful reading, his style being charming.

As a child I knew the "Manager" as he was popularly called. He was the Manager of the Navalar School from 1910. The Manager used to speak with great feelings of regard, about my grand-uncle the late Dr. A. Mootootambipillai. When the Jaffna Tamil Sangam was founded in 1898, T. Kailasapillai was President and A. Mootootambipillai of Navalar Kottam and A. Cumaraswamy Palavar of Chunnagam were the pillars of the Sangam. This Sangam held examinations for the Pundit and Bala Pundit classes in Tamil and awarded degrees such as "Bharati".

T. Kailasapillai was held in great esteem next to N. S. Ponnampalappillai. He was one of the founders of the Saiva Paripalana Sabhai. He was an assistant Secretary of the Sabhai and the first Editor of the *Inthusaathanam*. (1889—

He published the "Sivagnana Siddhiyar Supakam" a Saiva Siddhantic work in 1883. He wrote and published *Kreethupala-privinai* in 1889 and also "Netkolu vyavara Pathikam" in 1889. He published the *Kailasa Malai* in 1906, written by Muthurasa Kavirayer between 1604 A. D. to 1679 A. D. about the Kailasa Nathar Kovil at Nallur.

T. Kailasapillai wrote the *Siva Kathai* and also "Vacana Thodai." He

published a collection of his articles, letters etc. sent to the Press. That he commanded a vigorous style is beyond doubt. His pen was dipped in vinegar and when he wrote he did not hesitate to attack even the highest in the land. One of his letters was an attack on a book by an Inspector of Schools. All these letters were printed as a collection of his work in two parts. There was an Inspector of Schools, who had written a Grammar for Std. IV. Sentences from this book were criticised as containing grammatical errors.

He did not hesitate to point out the faults and foibles of his time. Mahatma Gandhi visited Jaffna in 1925 and collected money from the people for some public cause in India. T. Kailasapillai did not like Gandhiji taking money to India.

At Sri Kailasanathak-Kurukkal's house, long ago I remember somebody said that the "Abhidhana Kosam"—the first Cyclopaedia in Tamil—was a work of Navalar and not A. Mootootambipillai's. I was rather upset by this remark and asked the Kurukkal for full information. Kailasapillai wrote a letter to the "Inthusaathanam" confirming the fact that "Abhidhana Kosam" was written by A. Mootootambipillai.

T. Kailasapillai in his Biography of Navalar, (Page 94) says:- "As his (Navalar's) illness became worse (1879) Navalar's pupils and relatives approached Navalar and asked him what should be done. He said "Call Kailasapillai". These were his (Navalar's) last words. In accordance with the (Continued on page 3)

CALL OF DUTY
TO COUNTRY

March 22 is fast approaching. By now the minds of the masses must have been definitely fixed on the candidates of their choice. What remains is the final consummation of the determination of the voter to help the nation form a Government in the best tradition of democratic concepts and practice. Hence the obligation of the elector to himself and to all other electors who both form the nation. In simpler language the call of duty must be answered by every voter notwithstanding inconvenient circumstances or even obstacles.

For the first time in the history of Parliamentary Election the voter has been confronted with special laws that govern the procedure of voting. Transport of voters to polling stations has been rightly prohibited. But the principle of this prohibition must be clearly understood by the electors and the candidates.

It may be argued that where voters openly declare their political leanings the practice of the favoured party transporting their supporters to the polling station cannot be in violation of the principle of the freedom of voting. But the fact cannot be gainsaid that the secrecy that is vitally necessary for the casting of the ballot paper demands that the voter must be left to himself or herself

to exercise his vote unaided by any other person. Thus it is of paramount importance that the voter must not be transported to the polls. Here, however, arises the need for a legal clarification of the implication of the statement 'to the polls'. The uncharitable view that no private transport of any kind on any mission can be permitted on the day of polling has created much confusion. Hence it is necessary for voters to regard the polling as a political pilgrimage on foot and perform the national duty. Invalids have however the privilege of special concessions. The chief concern of the voter must be to guard himself against even far-fetched charges that may be brought against him in the context of polling day procedure and steer clear of disturbing circumstances.

Care taker Premier Sri-mavo Bandaranaike in her appeal to all citizens for restraint in their conduct has significantly avoided making mention of the menacing call of the Marxist Care-taker Minister of Finance for stone-throwing. The restraint must be exercised first at Cabinet level for the country to follow the example. However we are confident that the overwhelming democratic sections of the people will respond to the call of the country unmindful of the call of N. M. for convulsive confusion.

or caste laws, Ashrama acharas due to civil status. Vaidika acharas or religious laws, Samaya acharas or laws of different sects and Desa acharas or laws of the land e.g. Desavalamai. The rulers often get these laws codified to make it easy for the administration of justice. Whenever there is any doubt the elders of the community meet and decide on the correct line of conduct, and the people look up to the conduct of a great man for guidance. When justice is demanded one has to go to the courts where judges dispense justice according to the Law on evidence placed before them. Whatever is good for the society is to be accepted and whatever is harmful to society has to be rejected. Blind following the custom will only make people break sound rules indiscriminately and society will suffer no doubt.

deed drawn by Navalar be included Ambalavand on 29-1-1871, he stated that his school should be managed by a body of his pupils and their generation (Deed No. 10261). It felt to N. K. Sathasivampillai, one of Arumuga Navala's pupils—to be a dual Manager of the Saiva prakasa Vidyalaya at Vannarponnai as the one at Chidambaram. Sathasivampillai before he died on 20-10-1910, wrote his last will leaving the entire management to Thambu Kailasapillai. Thus he became the Manager of this School and continued to do so for nearly two decades.

It is well known that T. Kailasapillai zealously guarded the traditions of his father's brother—Sri la Sri Arumuga Navalar. Once Navalar had sung elegies on the death of his pupil Subramaniyapillai. This T. Kailasapillai considered as short of the ideals of "Navalar". It is said that he did not allow those poems to be published.

Navalar's personal belongings were kept at Kailasapillai's house, near the Nallur Kailasanatha Pillaiyar Temple.

Kailasapillai was a writer of prose of a high order. He wrote pamphlets very often. He used sarcasm and irony quite effectively in his leaflets containing criticisms.

One of T. Kailasapillai's essay on 'Then Thisai Thamil' is included in the collection entitled 'Eelanaadhu Thamil Virunthu' published by the Sanmuganathan Press, Jaffna. This will serve as a specimen for everybody to know the style of Kailasapillai, who stood as a champion of Truth and "Vytheeka Dharma". I like to think of Kailasapillai as the Boswell of Dr. Johnson—of Sri la Sri Arumuga Navalar who bestrode the world of letters in the half of the nineteenth century like a colossus.

Kailasapillai established the Nallur Kailasanatha Pillaiyar temple. In a panel in the car of this temple is depicted a scene portraying him as the original founder of the present temple.

2 Ambalavana Pandithar
(1814 - 1879)

In the list of poets associated with Nallur, may

be included Ambalavand Pandithar, who printed the 'Nallai Venba'. He was born at Tellipallai. He was the son of Aru lambala Mudaliyar. He was a student of Senathiraja Mudaliyar—the Guru of Arumuga Navalar—and took great interest in printing his Guru's works—'Nallai Venba' and "Neeranik - Kali Venba."

3. Sevvanthinatha
[Thesikar (1907-1932)]

Sevvanthinatha Thesikar has to be included in our list as a poet who wrote the 'Nalai Kanthaswamy Kovai'. He was a Saiva Kurukkal of Karanavai and was a student of Vidwan S. Ganesha Iyer.

sending a composite and balanced group of Tamil representatives who would serve the community with efficiency, fidelity and dignity.

Such a combined group of representatives would be analogous to a coalition government formed by different political parties to face a crisis as has been done in England on occasions. A composite ministry has also been formed in India when the Central government under the leadership of Shri Jawaharlal Nehru included non Congress representatives in the ministry along with Congress representatives.

There is one very important matter in relation to the present electioneering campaign in the Northern and Eastern provinces. The Federal Party which had returned representatives to Parliament in overwhelming numbers has been enjoining other Tamil leaders including Messrs. Santheralingam and G. G. Ponnambalam to keep silent without expressing any contrary opinion against the views of the Federal Party. Rightly or wrongly Messrs. Santheralingam and Ponnambalam have on the whole maintained silence for a considerable length of time and the Tamil Congress and the Eela Munnani were thus in a dormant state. tions are in Arunattarmalai, a small hillock near the village of Pugalur about ten miles from Karur. I had read in the annual report on South Indian Epigraphy (1927-28) that some inscriptions in the Brahmi script were discovered in that year at Pugalur. The report described the inscriptions as 'mostly damaged' and made particular mention of 'a comparatively long record of four lines' which could not be made out as the rock was very much weather-beaten. Last year two more Brahmi inscriptions were again discovered at this place.

There are two large natural caverns formed under overhanging boulders on the southern side of the hill. The caverns are midway up the hill and have a commanding view of the countryside and the distant Cauvery River.

CHERA INSCRIPTIONS OF SANGAM AGE

A Group of rock inscriptions of the Chera Kings of the Sangam Age has been discovered recently. The inscriptions are in Tamil and written in Brahmi script and can be dated in the second century A. D. This is probably the

most important epigraphical discovery made in the Tamil country in recent years and will have far-reaching effects on the history of the Tamil people and language and literature of the Sangam Age.
