## SWABASHA FOR SCIENCE

### Stressed at the Jaffna Hindu College 75th Anniversary Prize-Giving

In connection with the celebration of the above anniversary a prize giving function was held in the Comaraswamy Hall on Saturday 12-9-65 commencing at 6 P. M. The Principal Jaffna Hindu Ladies College gave away the prizes. Professor A. W. Mylvaganam the Chief Guest while delivering the Prize Day address remarked that Swabasha is the most natural medium for scientific education. The best way to popularise and preserve the Tamil language is to learn and follow one's own religion in one's own language.

He continued that it was his view that scientific education even at the University level could be imparted through the mother tongue. The young graduates who went out of the universities were not happy with the switch-over to Swabasha and were not even convinced that the Tamil language could be adaptable to convey modern scientific and technological knowledge. On the contrary it was his firm conviction that the Tamil language was most suitable to scientific instruction and adaptable to modern needs.

A knowledge of English was essential and that children should learn it as a compulsory second language. The Tamil language he added was part and parcel of the Saiva religion. It was so intertwined and inseparable that the study of the Saiva religion alone would promote the preservation and growth of the Tamil language. Therefore he urged the children to learn their religion. He regretted that modern trends among young men to condemn their religion as a bundle of superstition. He exhorted children not to be misled by false propaganda and by the sayings of the Marxists who considered religion as the opium of the masses. He congratulated the school for having completed seventy-five years of devoted service

to the ideals of the founders of the institution.

#### Tradition of the Hindu College

The principal while dwelling on the growth of the institution further added.

Progress in the early years, in the face of competition offered by schools of longer standing and of greater acceptance to the powers that were, was slow and difficult. But since ideas and ideals have a momentum of their own Jaffna Hindu moved down the years to a period when the ideals for which it had been founded began to assert themselves on a national scale and at governmental level.

Then, with the inauguration of the free education scheme which Jaffna Hindu accepted as an essential stage in Ceylon's democratic evolution, our College began to make significant progress, quantitatively in the number on roll and qualitatively in the successes that it achieved. Later, when assisted schools were absorbed into the state system of education, Jaffna Hindu did not find itself out of step: It was not afraid that it would lose its identity in what others feared would be an amorphous, unattractive mass. Nor again was it reluctant in the switch-over to Swabasha even for science in the higher forms; for, to Jaffna Hindu standing on

its popular, national traditions, this was yet another step to spreading education to all in all fields of study.

It is our belief that, in the midst of all these changes: Jaffna Hindu College has not departed from the ideals for which that small but worthy band of benefactors founded it. Rather, these changes with which our College has never found itself out of tune have helped it to interpret the ideals of the founders against a background broader if not brighter.

Nevertheless, the course the future holds for us or rather the course that we might set ourselves at Jaffna Hindu is not so clearly charted as to leave us no cause for thought or discussion. In an age when science has become so integral a part of everyday life it would be foolhardy to maintain the watertight division of education into the humanities on the one hand and the sciences on the other. Such division has been frustrating if not futile. Hence, a reorganisation of education is urgently needed.

If fond parents and their charges were consulted on this matter they would not hesitate to suggest science for all, with the humanities allowed to survive as best they can. Such a solution would eliminate the segregation that so hampers present-day education. But as a solution it is too simple to solve a problem that is so complex. The solution, if I may venture to suggest one, is not the mere combination of the sciences and the humanities in the curriculum. This would be only plastic surgery in education. What may be attempted and what we at Jaffna Hindu think is worth attempting, is the humanizing of the sciences so that in adapting himself to matter or even in mastering it man does not forget what matters even more his fellow man and

## THIRUKETHEESWARA THIRUPANI

Thiruketheeswara Thirupani is engaging the attention of the Hindu public. A certain degree of anxiety is also caused in the minds of people. Concern and anxiety are natural. There, however, is no reason at all for defeatism. The Thirupani relates to the construction of God's temple. It is a highly spiritual and religious undertaking in a most concentrated form, unlike many other human undertakings. It is the re-construction of a sacred shrine, almost coeval with the Hindu religion as it were, whose praise has been sung by the great Saiva Saints Thirugnanasambantha Swamikal and Sunderamoorthy Swamikal, and whose restoration has been pleaded for by the revered Sri La Sri Arumuga Navalar Avergal. It is God's own work. He will have his temple built, if he wishes. We, mortals, individuals, associations and office bearers connected with the Thirupani are mere worms. Let us have faith in Him and eschew ideas of our importance, and also cast away doubts, and continue to serve the holy cause.

These are some observations which I venture to make as in duty bound and as part and parcel of the Thirupani work and in humble furtherance thereof. The death of the former President of the Thiruketheeswaram Temple Restoration Society need not cause fears and doubts. Human beings in the very nature of existence come and go, but the Thirupani has to go on. Certain administrative, procedural and substantive steps have become necessary by reason of the death of the respected President. Among such steps are division of labour, res-

ponsibility, duties and powers; the last being not a happy word to use in a religious context, but its use is unavoidable. For this purpose, a number of sub-committees to carry on the work of Restoration Society is required. Office bearers are also required. Paid employees are further required. The Hindu community is not bereft of suitable devotees for these purposes. The Hindu community as a whole in Ceylon, belonging to the indigenous Tamil race as well as the Indian Tamil and Indian Hindu Community resident in Ceylon, and Hindus in India Malaya and other countries could well consider it their sacred obligation to do whatever is possible for the reconstruction, maintenance and worship of this holy and ancient shrine. The Government which has quite appropriately contributed towards the reconstruction of Mahiyangana Temple, another of Ceylon's ancient and holy shrine could render similar assistance to Thiruketheeswaram. Non-Hindu Communities also could give help for this excellent cause.

If the Hindu public and Thiruketheeswaram devotees set about the task with Faith in God and in a spirit of humility and self-effacement, then as the day follows the night, and the night follows the day, the completion of the Thirupani is certain. This sentiment is the one and only sure Foundation on which the Blessed Thirupani work depends.

A fortnight prior to his passing away in August Sir Vaithianathan in a letter written to me by him regarding an article from me to the President on Thiruketheeswaram

## POYA HOLIDAYS AND HINDUS

Poya holidays are determined by the phases of the moon e. g. Amavasyai, Attami, Poorana and Attami, altogether four in a month. On these days people abstained from work to gain rest and performed religious obligations. Probably there was a pre-Buddhistic Hindu custom, the sun and moon were regarded to govern all living beings including man. Among the Tamils Saturday was observed as a day of rest when people have their oil baths and abstained from physical and mental exertion. Every Saturday a Thirumulukku has been observed in the sacred shrine of Skanda at Kataragama from the remotest times. The Hindu has so many days of religious significance both obligatory and optional that he can make use of any day as a holiday or holy day. Sunday is sacred to the sun, Monday to Siva, Tuesday for Skanda and Gouri, Wednesday for Vishnu, Thursday for Dakshnamoorthy-Siva, Friday for the Divine Mother and Skanda. Saturday for Saturn and Ishwara and Vishnu, and so on. Amavasyai day is sacred to the piturs, astami for Ambal, Poornima for the Divine mother when Sri Sakra pooja with Lalitha Saharanama are performed by Her devotees. It is obligatory to worship God at dawn and dusk and the midday daily. If one cannot do this in the temple then it can be done in the house. Every Sankranthi day when the sun moves into one of the twelve signs of the zodiac it is incumbent on all Hindus to offer worship to God especially by the Grabastha or householder. Hindus need not be alarmed by the

imposition of Poya holidays as we can make use of them for our religious obligations. But for a day of rest we would prefer a Saturday the whole day or at least a part of it to have our mulukku and rest. For mulukku the morning is the most suitable as it can be done on empty stomach. An evil custom has crept in to our society in which meat and drink enter into the muluku. It is dangerous to have a cold bath after drinks and gormandise with meat particularly mutton or goat's flesh, pork or beef which often leads to indigestion and other complication. Easily digestible vegetables are to be preferred for muluku. The muluku on Deepavali day has degenerated into an orgy of drinking and eating. As in everything moderation and prudence should be practised in these matters and we Hindus should not stand in the way of progress of the majority community.

### SECURITY COUNCIL MUST SECURE PEACE IN ASIA

The precariousness of the Indo-Pakistan conflict is now fully betrayed by the failure of U. Thant's mission. Despite the fact that every sane and sober statesman regrets that a war is being ferociously waged between two neighbouring nations having a common heritage and now enjoying membership in the Commonwealth which by common consent is pledged to maintain peace in the world, it is inexplicable how the undeclared war has been allowed to continue unabated. Premier Shastri in his statement to the Lok Sabha made it clear that India welcomed moves for peace but firmly denounced that conditions for termination of hostilities should be imposed and that by Pakistan, the aggressor. This plain view is the only view that can be taken by any nation that has been forced into a vicious war by a belligerent neighbour.

The United Nations can no longer allow this issue to take the routine course of negative negotiations. The moral strength of the comity of nations must be brought to bear on the nations that are locked up in a dangerous warfare that has every risk of being extended and intensified into a conflagration encircling the entire globe. The frantic and foolhardy efforts that are being attempted by Indonesia, Iran and China to make this mad venture of Pakistan a convenient method of solving their problems should be deprecated by the U. N.
