





His life was gentle and noble; he served his fellow men and women well and when the time comes for him to step out of the scene of active life, he carries with him a precious memory of duties well done and a life of service to others—such as Jayaratnam are said to wear all through life the white flower of a blameless life. Thuraiappapillai in the year 1910 to provide facilities for Hindu children who did not have equal facilities as the Christians during the colonial era. It provided free education to many deserving poor children up to the eighth standard.


After Mr. Thuraiappapillai died in 1929, the school progressed under the headmastership of Mr. K. Chinnappah. In 1945 Mr. T. T. Jayaratnam, son of the late Thuraiappapillai became the head of the school. Under his able and devoted leadership the school from humble beginnings became one of the leading educational Institutions of Ceylon. Many of the leading educational Institutions of Ceylon were brought up by the dedicated teacher who regarded the teaching profession as a noble calling and not as a means of earning money. It is to great teachers like Mr. Jayaratnam the young men, who are now enjoying the fruits of exemplary service, owe their gratitude. Under the leadership of Mr Jayaratnam, Mahajana College became one of the leading institutions both in studies as well as in extra curricular activities. A perusal of the Mahajana College Golden Jubilee Volume shows the number of distinguished Old Boys the college has produced and the brilliant results produced both in academic and sports activities. The pretentious buildings in the college premises are monuments which speak eloquently of the activities of a Principal whose untiring efforts, indefatigable energy and honesty of purpose had elevated a village school to the ranks of one of the first rate schools of the Island.

I have personally known Mr. Jayaratnam and I have the highest esteem for a man who sacrificed his self interest in order to elevate his fellow countrymen. As stated by him in his farewell speech in Colombo. Mr. Jayaratnam had the cooperation and help of his fellow teachers to accomplish his great task. It is left to the younger generation of teachers to emulate the worthy footsteps of these teachers. I hope the old boys and well wishers of Mahajana College will name one of the neatly built Halls "JAYARATNAM HALL" to honour their worthy Principal.

கல்வி அமைச்சின் நிரந்தரச் செயலாள ராகச் சில ஆண்டுகளுக்கு முன் கடமை யாற்றிய எம். ஜே. பெரேரோ அவர்களேக் கொழும்பில் அவரது இல்லத்தில் ஒருமுறை கண்டபோது மகாஜனக் கல்லூரி பற்றிப் பேச்சு எழுந்தது. அப்போதுதான், அவர் மகாஜனக் கல்லூரிக்குச் சென்று திரும்பி யிருந்தார். அதன் அதிபர் ஜயரத்தினம் அவர்களின் சேவைநலனும், ஆசிரியரின் ஒத்தழைப்பும், மாணவரின் கல்வித் தர மும், கல்லூரியின் சமயச் சூழலும் அவ ரைப் பெரிதும் கவர்ந்திருந்தன. மகா ஜனக் கல்லூரியை நினேக்கும்போது ஜய ரத்தினம் அவர்களே கண்முன் காட்சி யளிக்கின்றுர் எனக் குறிப்பிட்டார். அவ ரைப் போலப் பாடசாலேயின் சேவைக் கெனத் தம்மை அர்ப்பணித்த பல பாட யாழ்ப்பாண த்தில் சாலேத் தேலேவர்கள் இருப்பதனுலேயே அப்பகுதியின் தரம் ஏனேய பகுதிகளின் தரத்திலும் மிக உயர்ந்திருக்கின்றதென ஒழிப்பு மறைப் பில்லாது உண்மையைத் தெரிவித்தார்.

எமது இனஞ் சேராத ஒருவர், அதுவும் கல்வியுலகிலே சிறந்த கல்விமான் என மதிக்கப்பெற்ற உயர்கல் வி அதிகாரி ஒருவர், நேரிலே தான் கண்டதை ஆதாரமாகக் கொண்டு ஐயரத்தினம் அவர்களின் சேவை நலினப் பெரிதும் பாராட்டினரென்றுல், அவருக்கு வேறு புகழுரை எதற்கு? சென்ற 25 ஆண்டு காலமாகக் கவ்வி உலகிலே பீடு நடை போட்டுத் தனக்கெனத் தனியான நிரந்தர இடத்தைப் பெற்று விளங்கும் இப்பெரியார், மகாஜனக் கல்லூரியிலிருந்து தப்மைப் பிரிக்க முடியாதளவிற்குப் பணி செய்திருக்கின்றுர். அங்குள்ள ஒவ்வொரு கட்டிடமும் அவரை நிணவுறுத்திக் கொண்டேயிருக்கும்! நம்பவே முடியாதது! நாம் படிக்கின்ற காலத்தில் எட்டாந்தரத் தோடு 170 பிள்ளாகளுடன் இயங்கிக் கொண்டிருந்த கல்லூரி, இப்போது 1700 க்கு மேற்பட்ட மாணவர் பயிலும் முதற் றரக் கல்லூரியாகக் காட்சிடிளிக்கின்றது!

நாங்கள் தெல்லிப்படையூயிற் கல்வி பயின்ற காலம், துரையைப்பா பள்ளிக்கூடம் உயிர்ப்பிச்சை கேட்டுக்கொண்டிருந்த காலம். எம்போன்ற பலர் அமெரிக்க மீஷன் இருமொழிப் பாடசாஃயில் (இப் போதைய யூனியன் கல்லூரியில்) படித்து வந்தோம். பெரும்பான்மையான மாண வர் ஐந்தாம் தரத்திற்குப் பின் யாழ்ப்பா ணத்திலுள்ள கல்லூரிகளுக்குச் சென்றனர். அப்போது துரையப்பா பள்ளிக் கூடத்தின் தல்லையையுகிரியராகச் சின்னப்பா அவர்கள் கடமையாற்றிஞர். நான் பல்கலேக் கழகத் திற் படிக்கும்போதுதான் மகாஜனக் கல்லூ ரியிற் சிரேஷ்ட தராதர வகுப்புத் தொடங் கப்பட்டது. அச்சமயம் (1943) ஜயரத் தினம் அவர்கள் உதவி ஆசிரியராக அங்கு பணி புரிந்தார்.

இவ்வகுப்புத் தொடங்கி ஈராண்டில், 1945ஆம் ஆண்டில் ஜயரத்தினம் அவர்கள் தல்மையாசிரியராகக் கடமையேற்றுர். அப்போது கல்லூரி மூன்ரும் தரக் கல்லூரி; மாணவர் தொகை 265. ஆனுல், வேறெந் தக் கல்லூரியும் அடையாத வளர்ச்சியை இக்கல்லூரி மிக விரைவில அடைந்தது; 1947ஆம் ஆண்டு இரண்டாம்தரக் கல்லூரி அதன் பின் ஈராண்டுக்குள் யாகவும், (1949) முதலாம் தரக் கல்லூரியாகவும் உயர்ச்சி பெற்றது. 1960ஆம் ஆண்டில் அரசாங்கம் பாடசாஃயை எடுத்தபோது, மாணவர் தொகை 1574: 15 ஆண்டுக ளுக்குள் 1300 மாணவர் கூடுதலாகச் சேர்ந்து விட்டனர். இந்தப் பதினந்தாண் டிற் பல துறைசளிற் கல்லூரி விருத்தி யடைந்தது. விஞ்ஞான ஆய்வுக் கூடம், நூல் நிலேயம், விளேயாட்டு மைதானம், சபாமண்டபம், கைத்தொழிற் கூடங்கள், சமையற்கவே மவோ, திறந்த வெளியரங்கு, விடுதிச்சாவே, கோயில் முதலியன பல, அப் பதிணந்தாண்டு கால எல்லேயுள், கல்லூரி யில் இடம்பெற்றன.

அரசாங்கம் கல்லூரிகீனப் பொறுப் பேற்று நடத்தியதன் காரணமாகக் கல்வித் தரம் பல பாடசாலேகளிற் பாதிக்கப்பட்ட போதும், கடந்த பத்தாண்டாக மகாஜனக் கல்லூரி மேலும் வளர்ச்சியுற்று, இன்று ஈழததிலேயுள்ள தல்லசிறந்த முதற்றரக் கல்லூரிகள் சிலவற்றில் ஒன்றுகத் திகழ் கின்றது. நாங்கள் படித்த காலத்திலே மேற்றரப் படிப்புக்கு யாழ்ப்பாணம் செல்ல வேண்டியிருந்தது; இப்பொழுது அந்நிலே மாறி யாழ்பபாணத்திலிருந்தும் பிற மாகாணங்களிலிருந்தும் பலர் கல்வி பயில மகாஜனக்கல்லூரிக்கு வருகின்றனர்.

மகாஜனக் கல்லூரி இவ்வளவு துரித மாகப் பிறர் வியக்கத்தக்க முறையில் வளர்ச்சி பெற்றமைக்கு ஜயரத்தினம் அவர்களின் சுயநலமற்ற சேலையும் ஆசிரி யர்களின் ஒத்துழைப்புமே காலாக இருந் தன. பாடசாவேயின் சேவைக்கென இவ ரைப் போல வேறெவரும் தம்மை அர்ப் பணிக்கவில்லே வேறெந்தக் கல்லூரியிலும். தவேமையாசிரியருக்கும் ஆசிரியருக்கும் இடையே, இங்கு காணப்பட்ட நல்லெண் ணமும் ஒத்துழைப்பும் இருக்கவில்லே உயரிய குறிக்கோளும், தளராத உறுதியும், அயராத உழைப்பும், களங்கமற்ற சமய நம்பிக்கையும் இவருக்கு மதிப்பையும் புகழையும் அளித்தன. இவரைப் பின் பற்றி ஏனேய ஆசிரியர்களும் கடமை உணர்ச்சியோடு தொண்டாற்றினர்; பெற் ளோர்களும் நன்மக்களும் ஒத்துழைத்தனர்; மாணவர்கள் ஒழுக்கத்துடனும் சமய பத்தியுடனும் கல்வி பயின்று கல்லூரிக்கு இழுக்கு ஏற்படாத வகையில் நடந்து கொண்டனர். இவற்றின் பயതுக மகா ஜனக் கல்லூரி இன்று கல்வி உலகிலே சிறப்பிடம் வகிக்கின்றது.

ஜயரத்தினம் அவர்களின் வெற்றிக்கு உறுதுணேயாக இருந்தவை அவரிடம் காணப்படும் பண்பட்ட குணங்களே. புன் முறுவல் தவழும் பொலிவான மலர்ந்த முகம், எவரையும் கவரும் இன்சொல், கம்பீரமான அடக்கம், சான்ரோர் முன் பணிவு. எவரையும் தன்வசப்படுத்தும் சத்தி, அசையாத கடவுள் நம்பிக்கை-இவையே இவரின் உயர்வின் இரகசி யங்கள். உள்ளத்தில் எழுவது உவகை; அதன் அறிகுறியாக முகத்திலே தோன்று வது நகை. சிரித்த முகம் மனிதத்தன்மை பைக் காட்டுகிறது; ஆண்மையை நிலே நாட்டுகிறது; அன்பை வளர்க்கின்றது; துயரை ஓட்டுகின்றது; பகையை வாட்டு கின்றது; இன்பம் ஊட்டுகின்றது; உற வைக் கூட்டுகின்றது. ஜயரத்தினம் நல்ல பண்புடையவர் என்றும், அவரை யாவரும் நம்பி நெருங்கிப் பழகி உறவாடி அன்பு கொள்ளலாம் என்றும் உலகிற்கு எடுத்துக் காட்டியது அவரது சிரித்த முகம். அவரின் முக மலர்ச்சி பிறரைக் கவரும் வசீகரக் காந்தமாக விளங்கியது.

AN OUTSTANDING PRINCIPAL

I am very happy to be given an opportunity to contribute an article to the Valedictory Number to be published to commemorate the services of Mr. T. T. Jayaratnam to Mahajana College. Mr. T. A. Thuraiappapillai, of illustrious memory, started a school at Tellippalai for the education of Hindu children under a Hindu environment at a time when the Government was interested only in furthering missionary education. It took him eight strenuous years to have the school registered for grant.

Even now we can visualise what indomitable courage and determination were needed to run a school against the obstacles placed by the then powerful forces which were bent on crushing new schools started by Hindus. Mahajana was started in the home of the Founder in 1910, but was shifted to the present site in 1912. The years 1912 & 1913 were critical in the struggle for survival and Lord Natarajah in his infinite mercy blessed the Founder with a son who was destined to translate the dreams of the Founder into reality.

Mr. Jayaratnam has a very unassuming, unruffled, quiet and pleasing personality, and few would have expected him to possess the singleness of purpose. the undaunted courage and determination of his father. Within a few years of his taking over the reins of the school at the comparatively young age of 32 years, he proved his mettle by getting the school approved as a Grade II school in 1947 and a Grade I school in 1949. Guided by his father's vision he set about providing up-to-date buildings, hostels and other fields, Grade I amenities worthy of a school.

The Government decided in 1960 take over all assisted schools and it fell to my lot to take over the schools in the Northern Province on behalf of the government. The permanent education officer fell ill at that crucial period and I was sent post haste to Jaffna to preside over the take over The Grade I schools had the option of keeping out of the scheme Mr. Jayaratnam unhesitatingly decided to hand over the school to the government and the school became a Director-managed school from 1st December 1960. By handing over the school to the government the heirs of the Founder did a distinct service to the student body of Jaffna as it enabled them to continue the benefits of free education in the school which had already been provided with up-to-date facilities.

The testing time, for the bona fides of those who were in charge of private schools, was when the properties of the schools were vested. A good number of proprietors who were only interested in Education gladly disclosed their complete assets and liabilities. While there were others who attempted to hide their assets and adopted various subterfuges, it must be said to the credit of Mr. Jayaratnam that as far as Mahajana was concerned all the assets were disclosed and there was absolutely no attempt to keep back even a small area of land. The father started the school and the son brought it to a pre-eminent position with the sole purpose of benefiting the children and that was clearly evident at the time of the take over. Mr. Jayaratnam continued to be Principal till December 1970 when the government decided to retire all those who had completed 56 years of age. The brilliant, the outstanding on par with the mediocre and the incompetent, were all retired and Mahajana lost Mr. Jayaratnam when he had started another ambitious programme. I am sure some one will fill the breach to realise the dreams of Mr. Jayaratnam

I came to know Mr. Jayaratnam personally from the time I took over the school and I had an opportunity of knowing him intimately for about 10 years since then. Jaffna can be proud of a number of well known schools, a number of devoted Principals and a large number of devoted teachers. Mr. Jayaratnam was one of the most outstanding Principals. It was a pleasure to visit the school. I have gone to the school on a number of occasions without notice and what struck me was the perfect discipline of the school. One could see the whole school at work whatever the time of the visit may be.

School functions were characterised by orderliness, decorum and dignity, giving a feeling that the entire staff and students were involved. As a man Mr. Jayaratnam was the personification, of courtesy and I, as an Assistant Director and later as Regional Director, had his unstinted co-operation both at official and personal levels.

The success of Mr. Jayaratnam was in no small measure due to the co-operation of the staff, the students, the old boys and the parents and he was able to get it by the force of his personality and by his dedication to duty. May Lord Natarajah give his successors strength to carry on the good work. Let us hope that Mr. Jayaratnam's services will be available to the cause of education in some form or other.





T. T. JAYARATNAM - TRIBUTE FROM A FRIEND

Way back in January 1936, a set of forty young men and women, confident, hopeful and perhaps anxious for their future entered the portals of the Government Training College, Colombo, then sited in Thurstan Road, to be trained as "English Teachers". For more than one reason, the mere selection for training as a teacher at the time, was a matter for self-esteem and pride. The numbers selected were a meagre twenty per year from each sex; the number of Training Institutions was just one; its destinies were at the time guided by the greatest educationist Ceylon has yet produced, the late H. S. Perera.

Taylor Jayaratnam was one of the cosmopolitan forty who were selected for the "English Course", 1936/37. Before a few days elapsed friendships were formed among the young people, who fortunately for us hailed from all parts of the Island, from all races and from all creeds, I had the unique fortune of coming to know "Jaye" as we affectionately called him, though as he himself in his inimitable good humour stated. "North and South lie far apart".

Those were days when man-made barriers of race, language and other petty considerations did not in any way deter healthy social intercourse among the youth of our motherland and the lusty friendship we built up between us grew into a lasting bond in life. To us from the South the labours of the two great Tamil Knights Ramanathan and Arunachalam in the cause of Freedom, were yet fresh in our minds. It was therefore revealing that Taylor Jayaratnam was a kinsman of this great duo. All that was lofty and noble in them we found in this young man from the North. Truly, there was no better ambassador of Ceylon Tamil Hindu Culture than Taylor Jayaratnam.

He was loved and respected by all as a serious minded, intelligent student alive and healthily critical of everything academic. Like some of his compatriots he was not the proverbial "book-worm" confined to the narrow world of books and cloistered within the walls of the study. He played lustily, identified himself with every activity that was worthwhile and was a Social asset wherever he was. Above all, in a cosmopolitan society, he was like a sponge that imperceptibly absorbed whatever was

best in others that belonged to other races, other cultures, while he himself squeezed out to others what was indigenous to his own race and culture. There is no doubt that in later life, this aspect of his nature gave him the breadth of vision that enabled him to rise above the pettiness of race and language.

Unlike the writer, he had the fortune of devoting his entire life to the vocation he had chosen. How well he answered the call and served his people and his country are but too well known. Mahajana and Jayaratnam were one entity for a quarter of a century. Be it in the Universities or in the learned professions or in the humbler walks of life all who hailed from this Great Institution consider him their Great Mentor and Guru.

May I as a personal friend and as one who has followed the fortunes of Mahajana College for the last two decades and more add my mite in tribute to a man whose dedication to his cause can seldom find a peer.



A DREAM COMES TRUE

English Education was almost a monopoly of foreign Christian Missions during British times and in the prevailing political climate neither parents nor children could overlook the very obvious benefits that such an education offered. Buddhists and Hindus sent their children to Christian schools and often permitted them to embrace Christianity because the temporal advantages derived from an English education outweighed religious loyalties. Higher education in those times was equivalent to English Education So when Buddhists and Hindus gave thought of higher education it meant setting up English Medium Schools.

Although the state professed religious neutrality, in practice the Christian missionaries belonging particularly to Protestant denominations were often able to get what they wanted from the government. They were also able to obstruct the development of English Medium Schools under Buddhist and Hindu auspices, but big schools like Ananda College and Jaffna Hindu College and smaller schools like Skandavarodaya and Mahajana fought a sustained campaign to provide High School Education to Buddhist and Hindu children without their pupils having to pay the price of religious apostasy.

S. H. T. Taylor, later T. A. Thuraiappahpillai, was himself an offspring of Christian parents and a product of Christian education, who in turn became the head of a Christian school, but Thuraiappahpillai, who was an outstanding intellectual of his time could see the enormity of the price paid by Hindu parents who sent their children to Christian schools. For some reason or other he fell out with the missionaries and started a school of his own which was known in those days as an 'Opposition' school.

Mahojana College is the fulfilment of Thuraiappahpillai's dream. It was given to his son to gauge the needs of a new era and build a school which probably is ten times as large as the structure put up by his father. Jayaratnam was my pupil for a short time at Jaffna College and what struck me most forcibily in those days was the difference between father and son. Thuraiappahpillai was a fighter and propagandist doing battle for Hindu education and Hindu Culture. Jayaratnam's strategy as I came to know him more fully when he became Principal of Mahajana College is that of the still small voice. Jayaratnam and I were thrown together a good deal in the politics of education too. In the Northern Province Teachers' Association, the All Ceylon Union of Teachers, the Northern Province Principals' Association we were both deeply interested. Here too I found the same suavity of manner and deep commitment to conviction. Noisy trumpetings and thunderous pronouncements were no part of his technique. His colleagues and his pupils were not browbeaten but pursuaded. The morality that prevailed under his stewardship was not permissive but persuasive.

The school's achievements in every field that is regarded as meaningful in assessing a school's stature are part of Ceylon's Educational History today. In Athletics, in Educational attainments, in successes in Examinations, Mahajana ranks among the best in the Island. Such success cannot be attributed to the Principal's efforts alone except in the sense that his personality wooed and won the good will, co-operation and dedication of his colleagues, his pupils and the community served by the school.

For nearly three decades I have been a keen observer and silent admirer of Mr. Jayaratnam's heroic efforts to build up Mahajan2. The school has made phenomenal progress under his wise and able guidance. His efforts have been crowned with success.

Sir Malcolm Campbell, the man who once held both the land and water speed records of the world, gave a piece of advice to his son when he was a boy of twelve "Whatever you do in life, never rest on your laurels. Once you have reached a goal, set yourself another". Donald Campbell followed the advice and created better and better water speed records. I have often wondered if Mr. Jayaratnam's illustrious father and Founder of Mahajana ever gave him similar advice. Perhaps he did not in so many words, but I have no doubt that Mr. Taylor Thuraiappahpillai by his own life and example inspired in his youthful son a vision of sacrificial service to the common man through the little school he established sixty years ago.

When Mr. Jayaratnam took charge of the school he proceeded to provide one by one every facility that a first class school needed in order to impart an all-round education to its students. He strove for excellence in studies and excellence in sports. He built not only class-rooms and laboratories but also a temple within the school to give the students the right perspective. He provided a spacious playground and to crown it all he erected a massive and inspiring edifice to house the auditorium, the library and the administrative offices.

Seeing these dreams coming true before their eyes. the boys also were no doubt inspired. And they put forth their best efforts in the class rooms and the playing fields bringing honour upon honour to Mahajana. Victories in sports and distinctions at public examinations almost became an annual feature. Neither the teachers nor the students rested on their laurels. The Principal continually set the sights for them.

"Satisfaction should be a place to pause only – not to stop". This is what Mr. Jayaratnam seems to have kept steadily in mind throughout his career. At every stage Mr. Jayaratnam had cause for great satisfaction; but he did not stop there. He stopped only when an unimaginative government brought his exceptional career to a premature end. When he retired many more dreams must have been awaiting fulfilment. However, Mr. Jayaratnam leaves behind a spirit of a noble adventure and let us hope that some one else will take up the challenge.

Faith can work wonders. Mr. Jayaratnam made bricks without straw. History will acclaim him as one of the greatest benefactors of Tellippalai. Children will rise up and call him blessed.



We worked together in the Northern Province Principals' Association and Mr. Jayaratnam's tact was helpful in bringing schools with conflicting ideologies together. When the association was founded, all schools in Jaffna were assisted schools; but after the take over of the schools in 1961, there came into existence two types of schools, vested schools and private schools. The interests of these two types of schools naturally became quite different and yet the common aim of furthering the cause of education in Jaffna has kept them together. Mr. Jayaratnam played important part in this respect and all members felt assured that as long as there were members like Mr. Jayaratnam, there would be a fair deal to all.

When the Jaffna Hindu Education Society was formed with the late Mr. Natesan as President, Mr. Jayaratnam and I were elected Joint-Secretaries. The aim of this society was the furtherance of the cause of Hindu education and the establishment of a Cultural University in Jaffna. When the late Mr. Bandaranayake offered to set up a Cultural University in Jaffna on the lines of the Vidyalankara and Vidyodaya Uninversities, Mr. Natesan had come forward to place at the disposal of the Government, the Parameswara and Ramanathan Colleges together with their endowments for the establishment of a University. The main work of the Society was to rally the support of the public for the astablishment of the University. We had face the obstacles of a political party and also of a section of the public belonging to a minority religious group. In spite of the large amount of support we could get from leading educationists and from leading men belonging to all walks of life, we could not succeed owing to the opposition of a political party. Now everyone including the politicians who opposed us, regrets the missed opportunity. Professor A. W. Mylvaganam has expressed his regret openly but these regrets have come too late. The history of the Tamil Community in the recent past has been one of missed opportunities.

Mr. Jayaratnam has played important part in the affairs of the Ramanathan Music Academy. Mr. Natesan founded the Ramanathan Music Academy for imparting higher education in Carnatic Music and was managing it for a few years. But he died before even holding the first examination. Soon after the death of Mr. Natesan, the fate of the Academy appeared to be sealed. It was at this juncture that Mr. Jayaratnam stepped in, formed a Parent Teachers Association and made arrangements for conducting the Academy till a Board of Management was formed. It was on his initiative the present Board of Management with Mr. S. R. Kanaganayagam as president has been formed. The public of Jaffna should be grateful to Mr. Jayaratnam for the services he rendered to the Academy at a critical period in its history.

Mr. Jayaratnam is still fit and full of energy and should have been allowed to complete the good work at the School to the service of which he had dedicated his life. But this was not to be. His unexpected retirement has caused a void in the educational sphere, which is difficult to fill.

A LEADING EDUCATIONIST

The retirement of Mr. T. T. Jayaratnam from the post of Principal of Mahajana College after being at its helm for nearly a quarter of a century removes from the scene a great educationist who has laboured selflessly for the love of the School founded by his father, the late Mr. Thuraiappahpillai. The Mahajana English High School founded by his father in 1910 became a great educational institution, the Mahajana College, mainly due to the labour of love and sacrifices made by the son Mr. Jayaratnam, Mr. Jayaratnam made the dreams of his father, the Founder, become a reality.

The noble purpose and ideals that inspired the late Mr. Thuraiappahpillai institution in 1910 to start a new continued to inspire his son throughout the latter's career. Mr. Jayaratnam was born when the School was in its infancy. It was a time when several powerful forces worked against this fledging institution. The area which it served at its inception was predominantly a Hindu area but the average parent of the children who studied at Mahajana was not well off. Hence the spirit of free education prevailed in Mahajana long before the State adopted the principle of Free Education. Under such circumstances the development of Mahajana was slow during its early years.

After the death of Mr. Thuraiappahpillai, Mr. K. Chinnappah became the Head of Mahajana High School. And it was during this time that I had the pleasure and privilege of studying at Mahajana. During my time at Mahajana, Mr. Jayaratnam joined the staff as an English Trained Teacher. Mr. Jayaratnam

taught me English and Latin. He paid special attention to correct pronunciation. In fact, to a good number of his students during our time, he became a star. We made conscious efforts to speak with the same accent as Mr. Jayaratnam. We made efforts to work in such a manner that would meet his approval in our writing. He and speech impeccably dressed. The way he conducted himself was such that all the teachers, some of whom had taught him, had the highest regard for Mr. Jayaratnam. When I left Mahajana in December 1942, Mahajana was struggling with limited buildings and limited equipment. There was a T shaped building with three class rooms and a hall which was partitioned into class rooms with screens. Besides this building there was a reading room which served as a teachers' room as well. The Science Laboratory was housed in a small room in a building which had two other class rooms.

Mr. Jayaratnam was the logical successor as Head of Mahajana when his uncle Mr. K. Cinnappah died. From the time Mr. Jayaratnam became the Mahajana, she started Head of flourishing beyond all expectations. Mr. Javaratnam had only one preoccupation. It may be said that he lived for the school and for the school only. He would even mortgage his house and compound when money was required for the school. He was able to inspire his colleagues on the staff of Mahajana to put in their maximum efforts and to make them work a united team. Though Mr. Jayaratnam is an Arts Graduate himself, Mahajana became famous for its Science edu-The secret of his success was cation. his unerring ability to select the best



teachers available for each subject, and give them all encouragement and at the same time a free hand to teach in their own individual way without any unnecessary interference. The wonderful success of the students of Mahajana at the University Entrance Examinations for selections to the Engineering, the Medical and the Science Faculties made Mahajana famous throughout the Island, and placed her amongst the leading Colleges of Ceylon.

Mr. Jayaratnam did not forget the main object of his father the Founder that the children should be given edutraining in the cation and religious atmosphere. He was responsible for the building of the Temple for the school children and for the observance of all religious festivals by the children. The teaching of the Saiva Religion, the teaching of Thevaram and Thiruvasagam found their due place in the curricula of the school. The students were trained and encouraged to serve as volunteers during the festivals of Maviddapuram Kandaswamy temple. He encouraged the students to do Shramadana in restoration of the Dukkaiyamman Temple at Tellippalai. The students were specially taught and trained to take part in the Religious examinations and contests organised by the Vivekananda Society and the Saivaparipalana Sabhai. But more than all these things he was himself a shining example of a true Saivaite. To him practice was more important than precept. From the time he became principal he became a vegetarian himself, and observed the normal religious practices of a true Saivait.

Mr. Jayaratnam paid attention to all extra curricular activities as well. In the field of sports Mahajana excelled herself, whether it was in Cricket or Football or Athletics. Mahajana became a force to be reckoned with by other leading schools in Jaffna. In the field of Drama and Music Mahajana found a prominent place amongst other leading schools.

Mr. Jayaratnam inspired the old boys of Mahajana and the parents of the children studying at Mahajana and obtained their fullest co-operation. Thus with their assistance and by his selfless devotion and sacrifices he made Mahajana a Great Institution. By the time Mahajana celebrated her Golden Jubilee in 1960, she was equipped with fine buildings, laboratories, a Hostel and a Temple. It is a pity that Mahajana could not remain a privately managed school after 1960. If Mahajana had remained as a private institution, the necessity for Mr. Jayaratnam to retire from the post of Principal under the 55 years rule would not have arisen. By the grace of God Mr. Jayaratnam has retired when he is in very good health. He could have served Mahajana for many more years to come. His experience in the field of education and his ability will not be available to Mahajana anymore, though his good-will and advice will always be available to Mahajana. Let us pray and hope that the good God will give Mr. Jayaratnam good health and long life so that the experience and knowledge of one of the leading educationists of our time will be available to Mahajana and to all other institutions, for many more years to come.

The name T. T. Jayaratnam does really mean Tellippalai Thurai-appahpillai Jayaratnam. The father led the way and chose for the son too. Both were sure of their destination. All foot-paths criss-crossing the fields and gardens, the outer yards of temples and palmyrah groves of the sleepy hamlet of Tellippalai and its surroundings converged at Mahajana: the destination of many a skimply dressed brat. The college which appeared in its present site in 1912 stood unsteadily in the new location for one whole year, because it was gestation for a new project of Mr. Thuraiappahpillai. Thank heavens it was accomplished on that wet October night in 1913. The fullthroated cry of the new born infant would have soothed the cockles of the heart of our Revered Founder. But one shouldn't forget the phenomenon of how the ungainly stance of the spindly shed at Ampanai suddenly gained granite strength when the dark winds trumpeted the news of the birth.

All that happened in October 1913. This is October 1971. How much had lain encompassed in Time's womb and slowly revealed itself. How much has happened. And how much has refused to happen. Any way as expected by the Founder, Mahajana slowly matured. Mr. Jayaratnam grew up, joined the staff in 1932. Became Principal in 1945. The college gained in stature. It celebrated its Golden Jubilee in 1960 and the Diamond in 1970. And then the blatant irony January 1971. Mr Jayaratnam is in pensive retirement tasting to the full his wife's cooking, and sporadically interrupted when the many sons and daughters and grandchildren of Mahajana call on him. But still with the old sense of self possession and suavity he continues to serve directly as well as indirectly the cause of education of the youth of Tellippalai and its environs.





But one can't deny that with his official retirement the landscape has changed, and the prospect seems to have lost its erstwhile charm. Human nature being what it is, when an administrator bows out of office he gets diminished overnight in weight and height. He looks as ridiculous as the king without his clothes. But to me Mr. Jayaratnam has been and will continue to be the finest example of a school administrator — teacher I have had the privilege of working under-He is a real amalgam of all that is valuable and inspiring in man. I remember how he tempered authority with subtle persuasiveness. But still more baffling was the way he brought out the best from those who assisted him, more through an infectious charm than by the orthodox imperatives. One of the first to arrive at school at morning and the last to leave unwillingly the campus late in the evening. Never had I seen one for whom the daily pilgrimage to the school had personally meant so much for nearly three and half decades. He lived and breathed with Mahajana. His life was Mahajana and Mahajana's destiny was his. Each lived in the other. But even the fruit and its seed don't remain one for ever.

It's 10-30 a.m. Invariably each teacher in class observes through the corner of his eye the spruce figure with hat in hand or on head and under arm sometimes the slender cane of gentle authority. The figure wends its way in and out of the classrooms, down the shady trees and round the quadrangle. It poses to listen to a teacher's problem and then silences an impetuous lot without a teacher and sometimes engages them till the bell goes off. Again the figure resumes its ritual. It smiles at a timid face. A word with a labourer. A dialogue with a broken chair or window and the round completes itself.

Mr. Jayaratnam's round at Mahajana has completed itself. The end of his era marks the beginning of another. But the life of an institution is like a circle. It ends where it begins and begins where it ends. To my mind Mr. Jayaratnam is coextensive with this circle. Therefore he can never retire out of Mahajana because he is Mahajana.



THE MAN WHO WORKED MIRACLES

Hindu tradition expects a worthy son to complete any task which his father had to leave undone when final call came to rest in the world beyond. The Sanskrit word Putra is derived by scholars from the word purta meaning completed. My friend Jayaratnam who retired recently from the post of Principal, Mahajana College, measures fully to this high standard set by our ancient sages. Grieved by the plight of Hindu children who could not have English education in an atmosphere fostering their culture and religious traditions, the late Mr. Taylor Thuraiappahpillai founded the Mahajana English High School in 1910. Struggling against heavy odds, he succeeded in establishing it as an Assisted Elementary School, sending students for the E. S. L. C. Examination. His grit and determination clearly evidenced when the destruction by the floods of 1918, of the one and only building in which the school functioned, spurred him to rebuild the school in the same premises and to continue his mission.

The period covered by the regime of Mr. K. Chinnappah saw further progress and consolidation. The institution became a college with secondary school status and additional buildings were put up to meet the increased demand for accommodation. The high water marks of this era were the Silver Jubilee Celebrations of 1935 and the introduction of science education in 1941. Sports and athletic meets came to the fore, but distinctions in this field were limited. Though Mahajana started as a mixed school at the inception it became a boys' school very soon after and remained so till the forties. Shortly after the admission of girls, the first lady teacher was appointed in 1943. This era of progress and consolidation ended with the sudden demise of Mr. Chinnappah in 1945.

Thereafter comes the period challenge and the flowering of Mahajana as an All Island Super Grade College under Mr. Javaratnam. Born in 1913 shortly after the establishment of Mahajana College, he took to teaching fairly early in life after passing the Cambridge Senior Examination. Later he went through the Training College and also obtained his degree by private study, thus qualifying himself as a Trained Graduate eligible to be a Principal of a Grade I College. He had to assume charge of the school in his early thirties. But his teaching experience of more than ten years and his organisational ability, charm and personal qualities more than made up for his youth, From 1946 onwards with the introduction of the free education scheme he had to cope with the ever increasing numbers that sought admission to Mahajana, Not that free education was to Mahajana, where from its inception deserving students were taught free; but the Government policy of free education for all from the Kindergarten to the University set up a new mood and drew more and more children to the schools in the hope of getting white collar jobs at the end of the school career. When Mr. Jayaratnam took charge of the school, the number on roll was a little over 300 and when he left, it had risen to nearly 2000 a phenomenal increase requiring more accommodation, more teachers. more library and laboratory facilities—in short more and more of everything. Storied buildings became necessary and in 1960 there were forty two impressive class rooms tiled, cemented and enclosed. Mr. Jayaratnam's visit to Malaya helped in this great expansion substantially and the old boys and well-wishers alike contributed generously to the building fund.


Unless the organisational details are watched and worked out precisely such an impressive expansion cause a reduction in the quality. But the miracle worked by Mr. Jayaratnam was that the quality instead of declining, kept improving almost keeping pace with the quantitative expansion. As the results in the public examination became spectacular Mr. Javaratnam's problems increased-instead of serving Tellippalai and its environs the school attracted students from all parts of the Peninsula and eventually ended up as an All Island School. A boarding catering for the needs of the students had to be undertaken. Despite all these problems Mr. Jayaratnam took the bold decision of incorporating the primary school Saraswathy Vidyasalai which though in the same premises was run as a separate school, into Mahajana College. Thus students joining kindergarten class could continue their studies up to the University Entrance examination in the same school.

Mr. Jayaratnam has always been a forward looking man. Academic success though a very important criterion, does not perse make a good citizen. Building the body, building the character and giving the boy practical training are equally important. With expanded playgrounds he got the students trained systematically in athletics and games.

Mahajana has excelled in Soccer. For four years running, they have been the champions of Jaffna. In 1965 a Mahajana Hockey player captained the Boys' Ceylon team which a successful tour in India. Games are valuable also in teaching discipline and co-operation to boys. But religious education is most important in developing discipline. Mahajana was started with the object of imparting education in Hindu background, and therefore religious education always received pride of place. Music and practical training have served to round off the education and make it a complete preparation for citizenship.

Mahajana today is what it is solely due to the untiring efforts of Mr. Jaya-His leadership, his easy accessibility, sympathy and consideration for the less fortunate and tact enabled him to build up a first class institution. Soft spoken but firm in decision, Mr. Jayaratnam maintained discipline without harshness and endeared himself to the parents and teachers alike. His wide outlook and desire to ensure Mahajana will be in the forefront of education, gave Tellippalai an excellent school providing training for leadership and citizenship. Already the old students of Mahajana are holding positions of responsiblity in all walks of life-in the professions, in Government Service, in business and industry, so much so that wherever you go, you might knock against an old boy of Mahajana. May 1 add that I too am proud to call myself an old boy of Mahajana and conclude wishing Mr. Jayaratnam many years of service in his retired life.

The wonder is that both had, against all odds, succeeded in their endeavour.

In common with everything material Mahajana too had its share of set backs. The first came with the taking over of all assisted schools by the Government. The Principal, undaunted, carried on his selfless task with unflagging interest and enthusiasm; but the crushing blow to Mahajana and to the Principal came with the compulsory retirement of teachers at 55. The elaborate laboratory he had undertaken to build which by now would have been completed, had come to a grinding halt. It is our hope and prayer that the new Principal now securely, set in saddle, will bring it to fruition before long, so as to maintain the Mahajana tradition.

May Lord give Mr. Jayaratnam peace of mind and prosperity to lead a happy and contented retired life.

I have also to thank the Editor of the 'Mahajanan' for giving me the opportunity to express my admiration of the sterling qualities of Mr. Jayaratnam.

THE ARCHITECT OF MAHAJANA

My association with Mr. T. T. Jayaratnam extends over a period of nearly twenty years. I have worked with him as an assistant for thirteen years and as Deputy Principal for the last seven years. The rapid growth of Mahajana during this period is phenomenal. The period from 1952 - 1962 may be termed the Golden Age of Mahajana. The school was established in 1910 and it had to struggle for its existence against heavy odds. The dynamic leadership of the Founder and his fore-Sight made the institution develop on right lines. He instilled into the children right values and traditions based on Hindu culture. After the demise of the Founder in 1929 the task fell on the ample shoulders of Mr. Chinnappah who to the best of his ability carried on the traditions of the Founder. After his death in 1945 the mantle was taken up by the chip of the old block, the worthy son of the worthy Founder. Rapid progress unprecedented in the annals of any other institution was the order of the day. Science laboratories were put up to cater to the needs of the Advanced Level Students. Under his regime, Mahajana could proudly boast of hundreds of students who entered the portals of the University of Ceylon. Scores of students entered the faculties of Medicine, Physical Science, Engineering and Arts annually from our Institution. In fact Mahajana College became a veritable university shedding its culture and lustre not only on Tellippalai and its environs but far and wide throughout the Island of Lanka. Many a student came to drink at this Fount of knowledge from the far nooks and corners of Cevlon The spacious Assembly Hall and the administration block are an everlasting monument to the dynamic energy of Mr. T. T. Jayaratnam. Whatever he touched he turned into gold. Under his indefatigable leadership our college celebrated its Golden and Diamond Jubilees. Our Principal believed in a Total Education which catered to the whole development of the human personality. He had only one criterion in education which he used to tell us very often-ie. the true interests of the student. That was the measuring rod by which he judged the work of his staff. It was a pleasure to work under such a great and understanding educationist. His ever present smile and encouragement spurred on his co-operating staff to build Mahajana to glorious heights. He himself set an example by toiling hard in the interests of the institution. It is rather unfortunate that such a colourful and dynamic personality should be moved from our midst by the new dispensation to retire teachers before sixty. Though he has retired from the scene, it consoles us a great deal that he is still with us to guide us in running the institution. He will be a guide and source of inspiration to us on whose shoulders has fallen the responsibility of guiding the destinies of Mahajana. May Almighty Shiva shower the choicest blessings on him and his family.

AN ASSESSMENT

Anno Domini 1913. On the 24th of October an event took place at the humble lodging of Mr. Taylor Thuraiappahpillai of Tellippalai and this was to shape the destinies of thousands and thousands yet unborn. A perspiring father was pacing restlessly up and down to hear the outcome of the travails his loving wife was undergoing in one of the inner chambers. With a sigh of relief he heard that he had been blessed with a son. His joy knew no bounds and he thanked the Giver of all good things for His bounties as his prayer had now been answered. He appraised the boy's weight and found him a chubby chap; not merely a chip of the old block or the whole block itself; but much more than the block itself. He then made a tryst with destiny and yclept him Jayaratnam-a nomenclature which was to become famous in the educational circles of Ceylon,

At the age of five, young Jayaratnam followed his father to school. He did not whine nor was he unwilling, for it was only a home from home and the link he formed with Mahajana at that tender age was to last for over half a century during which period he was pupil, teacher and Principal. The teachers who taught him at the beginning later became his willing and admiring assistants when he became the head of the school. The proverbial poverty of the pedagogue pursued Mr. Taylor Thuraiappahpillai and when he died at the comparatively young age of 57, he bequeathed young Jayaratnam a great financial burden and family responsibility. Teaching was and is not a profitable profession and teachers like musicians belonged to the starving They were not sure of fraternity. a regular income and if music meant a dead living, teaching meant a living

death. That was why the sage of Chelsea observed, "It is better to perish than continue school-mastering."

Mr. K. Chinappah who succeeded Mr. Thuraiappahpillai took the orphaned lad under his protective wings and steered a course for him. Therefore as a result of the early demise of his father he became a teacher at the young age of twenty and later entered the one and only Training College for English Teachers in Ceylon, at Thurstan Road, Colombo.

On completion of his training he came back to Mahajana and worked as an assistant teacher under the late Mr. K. Chinnappah.

It was at the time he took unto himself Miss Raniratnam Ponniah, his own cousin, as his partner in life. The alliance was a cent percent success. Mild and homely she with a serene and cheerful disposition proved to be a haven and a comforter to a man worn out with his multiplicity of labours. Under her tender care he settled down to the most significant period of his life—the principalship of Mahajana College- Moreover as the pledges of her affection she gave him four golden-hued cherubs to enhance his happiness.

Absolutely free from any trace of egotism they are all imbued with the spirit of service—the real Taylor tradition.

In Mr. Jayaratnam's life the inevitable does not always occur but the unexpected happens. In the year 1945 Mr. K. Chinnappah, who for all intents and purposes, appeared quite hale and hearty passed away all too suddenly. Mr. Jayaratnam was compelled to accept the

Principalship of the school and he accepted this onerous post in a prayerful attitude From the date of his assumption the school made rapid progress in all spheres and its fame spread to the three corners of the country. In a very short period he achieved what a denominational Board of Directors of an educational institution with modest ambitions would have hoped to achieve in twenty years. The rise was so phenomenal that he came to be regarded as a model. He gave all the facilities that any city college could boast of, to a rural school. In short he brought the city to the country. Without any exaggeration it can be said that at the international conference of Secondary School Heads, if merit is the only consideration, Mr. Jayaratnam has a strong claim to represent Ceylon. It will not be out of place to refer here to Mr. K. Krishnapillai, who was second in command and stood shoulder to shoulder with Mr. Jayaratnam in building Mahajana. Scion of a long line of benefactors who made endowments to temples, schools and other charities, Mr. K. Krishnapillai never stinted anything if it was necessary for the onward march of Mahajana. In fact he overworked himself without any consideration for the drain on his purse or the strain on his health. 

A BORN LEADER AND ADMINISTRATOR

Whatever the yardstick be, Mahajana today stands out pre-eminently as a model institution and bids fair to become a vigorous centre of higher learning.

The success story of Mahajana is almost the success story of Mr. Javaratnam, our Principal Emeritus. Founded and nurtured by an illustrious father, Mahajana has blossomed out into its present form under the care of his illustrious son. He has lived through the College ever since its strides in development. He is there always and one can even say that his blood runs through the veins of the beauty that is Mahajana. A prince among men, a born leader and administrator, he had laid the edifice for the future growth and prosperity of Mahajana. Due to his untiring efforts, a peaceful and serene atmosphere, helpful to the pursuit of education, culture and a harmonious development of the body, mind and soul, pervades the two and a half acre campus.

From the standpoint of the agony of our own involvement in education it is my humble opinion that his contribution to education is beyond evaluation. He never relied on powers of intuition to run the college. Careful planning and consultation of an objective nature preceded all his actions. Once he made up his mind on anything, he carried out his decisions without any mental reservations, come what may. He was never satisfied with passive adjustment to the nature cycle nor was he a mute witness to heinous crimes perpetrated in education. Everybody eagerly looked forward to be enlightened by his pronouncements on educational problems in his Annual Prize Day reports.

A sense of thoroughness, a heart for action, urbane simplicity, affable manners, vision, munificence and eloquence in the mother tongue and in the English language were always his strong points and they endeared him to everyone. Our Principal, illustrated to us by his actions how one could make one's life full of rhythm and music if one took care of every detail.

He gave the lie to the notion that education was meant only for the elite and paved the way for many a son and daughter of the Ampanai farmers to enter the portals of our Universities and thereafter occupy positions of eminence both in the public and the private sector.

Our Principal was never satisfied with basking in the reflected glories of the past. He wanted everyone to get involved in a meaningful way and participate in the making of a glorious present and paved the way for a still more glorious future. He always wanted a thread of continuity to pervade the successes and achievements of Mahajana.

Armed with an extra-ordinary sense of perception he could discern in everyone a latent talent which he harnessed in the service of Mahajana. The unique beauty of his way of doing things was that everyone felt consulted even though one's contribution may have been very little.

By gentle persuasion he has trained many a man who tried to make their personal frustration a rationale for aggressive action and through this process made everybody duty bound.

and deportment, the perfection of courtesy. fortitude. We see in him a happy blend of everything good of the East and the West which charms everyone, who comes into contact with him. Even in anger, our Principal seldom flies into a rage but with his penetrative and radiating smile he is able to convey to others what he exactly feels about a problem. He has pleasing ways of winning people round to his point of view and his powers of gentle persuasion have been able to draw generous benefactions from all sundry. Everybody recognised and respected him as the undisputed head. Everybody felt that the Principal was very close to him while in fact he was almost equi-distant from everyone.

He did not believe in cheap popularity nor did he ever play to the gallery. He has always been keen to give the students and teachers creativity. but at the same time took full precaution to see that they did not succumb to the anarchist view of no syllabus no time table. He channelled the flow of student energies to constructive ways. He tactfully spotted potential law breakers and trained them for citizenship. We could never forget the piety with which he kindled the spiritual consiousness of both students and teachers. The leadership and guidance he has provided for the people and institutions of the area mark him out as a pattern of civic piety.

He has the courage and dexterity to steer through any difficulty. There were times when Mahajana was caught up in the volley and vortex of turmoils but no one ever felt uneasy because our Principal was there to steer

One could always see in his manner through such turmoils with vision and

marvellous growth of the Mahajana campus under his stewardship will ever stand as a monument to his services. Today we see him ripe in years and graciousness. Even today, and for ever I dare say that the College will continue to come first in his daily thoughts. He was born great and he achieved greatness. Therefore the question of greatness being thrust upon him does not arise and will not arise. He will always be great.

Perhaps it is an irony of fate and an indication of the tragedies of our times that Mahajana could not enjoy his services as Principal at least for a few more years.

In conclusion, striking a personal note, I should say in all humility that it was he who shaped my future in full measure. When I was rather reluctant to proceed further after getting through my Senior School Certificate Examination it was he, who, as guide, friend and philosopher, insisted that I must go in for higher education. The guidance he has given me has proved a powerful incentive to my advancement. The Civics and the Logic I studied from him is still fresh in my mind and has always stood me in good stead.

Let us all in our own small way work for the future growth of Mahajana. That and that alone can please him more than anything else.

THE DAWN OF A GOLDEN ERA

T. T. Jayaratnam, son of an illustrious father took up the stewardship of Mahajana at the early age of 32. His dedication to education made the task of building up the school his sole ambition in life. Mr. Jayaratnam inherited from his father his versatility and the noble spirit of service, which earned for him the gratitude and good-will of the public.

I assumed duties as a teacher at Mahajana in the year 1926 and retired in the fulness of time in 1965. So I am in a position to know the many difficulties that confronted the father and the son. For Mr. Jayaratnam life was not a bed of roses. The untimely death of his father cast on his young shoulders a great burden. The ways of God are mysterious and Mr. Jayaratnam joined Mahajana as a teacher. This proved to be a great blessing not only to Tellippalai and its adjoining villages, but also to many other parts of Ceylon. The death of Mr. K. Chinnappah in 1945 came as a great shock to Mr. Jayaratnam, on whom fell the mantle of responsibility. His period of principalship covered a little over quarter of a century. The history of these twenty-five years deserves to be written in letters of gold. The college distinguished itself both in the academic and other spheres of activity. In fact the school became the envy of many older and better endowed schools. As a Principal he had the intuition to select the right man for the right job. He never swerved from the path of duty and this enabled him 10 get the co-operation of the parents and the public. Moreover Mr Jayaratnam watched the interests of all the students and kept in touch with them even after they had left school. I would also like to stress the religious fervour of Mr. Jayaratnam. He is a great observer of Hindu Culture and rites and whenever he launched on any task whether great or small he invoked the benediction of Lord Shiva. His unceasing activity was infectious and his assistants became his willing co-workers. The espirt de corps that prevailed at Mahajana during his regime captured the hearts of all. It is sad to think that he had to retire under the new dispensation of the government. If he had been allowed to continue till his sixtieth year he would have accomplished much more. He had his plains for an up-to-date laboratory, a larger campus and a hostel with all modern facilities, a little away from the college premises. In concluding this article I thought of the following lines from a poem written by him for the Silver Jubilee Number of the Mahojanan.

"If you can fully trust that all you do
Is e'er directed by the Hand of Heaven
If you with truth can tread Great Duty's way
Using the leav'n of love that all doth leaven
And at God's feet the fruits of your toil lay."



- 1946: All available land is cleared, a well right at the centre of the campus is filled and the foundation laid by the Founder for a house for himself at the northern most end, is demolished to provide a playground for the College.

The College enters the J. S. S. A. Soccer Tournament for the first time. Facilities are provided for the teaching of Physics, Chemistry and Biology. The present College Crest is designed.

The Colombo Branch of the Alumni is inaugurated.

The Principal is Hony. Secretary of the Northern Province Teachers' Association.

1947: Teaching of Science begins in right earnest.

Principal flies to India to select Science graduates. The first batch arrives in May.

The School is raised to Grade II status.

1948: H. S. C. Science classes are formed.

The Saraswathy Primary School is amalgamated with the

The Saraswathy Primary School is amalgamated with the College. There are classes now from the Kindergarten to the University Entrance.

Building project is started in a big way. Several classrooms spring up to cope with the rush for admissions.

1949: The College is raised to Grade I status.

The Principal is President of the Northern Province Teachers' Association.

1950: An earnest attempt is made to raise funds by bringing Film Stars from India. The Principal makes two trips to Madras in this connection.

1951: The College Song and the Flag Song take shape.

1952: The new Physics Laboratory is declared open.

Land is acquired on the northern side to extend the playground.

1953: The present Chemistry Laboratory is declared open.

More than half-an-acre of land is acquired for further expansion.

1954: A Carnival and Raffle is organised on a mammoth scale at the Jaffna Esplanade. The Hon'ble the Minister of Education declares it open. The participation of outstanding Indian Artistes makes it the show of the year. The carnival which extends to well nigh a month is an unqualified success. The Principal visits the four corners of the Island to push the raffle ticket sales. Proceeds exceed a lakh.

The College Hostel is started on a modest scale.

This is indeed the Annus Mirabilis of Mahajana College.

1955: The Foundation Stone is laid for the Golden Jubilee Block which is to include the Thuraiappahpillai Assembly Hall and the Library. The old T shaped building makes way for the new structure.

A king size workshop is built to provide courses in Wood work, Claywork. Coir-work and Weaving.

We are runners up at the J. S. S. A. Athletic Meet.

We win the J. S. S. A. Second Eleven Soccer Championship.

Once again we acquire land on the North-eastern side for additional buildings.

1956: The present Biology Laboratory is opened.

We are runners - up at the J. S. S. A. Athletic Meet for the second year in succession.

The Principal is Hony. Secretary of the Northern Province Principals Association.

The Principal leaves for Malaya to raise funds to complete the Golden Jubilee Block.

1957: The Principal returns in February after his successful tour of Malaya.

The Principal celebrates his Silver Jubilee as teacher.

The College comes forward to conduct one of the high festivals at Thiruketheeswaram and one at Maviddapuram Kandaswamy Temple.

Five more class-rooms and an additional dormitory are provided.

We are runners-up at the J. S. S. A. Athletic Meet for the third year in succession.

1958: Half an acre of land is acquired for the extension of the playground.

The Workshop is further extended and a room is provided for Dance classes on the eastern side.

1959: The Western wing of the college with an Open Air Theatre in the middle comes into being.

We come third at the Inter Collegiate Athletic Meet conducted by the

1960: The College celebrates its Golden Jubilee with a Carnival and Educational Exhibition. Distinguished personalities from all over Ceylon participate.

Dr. Nicholas Attygale, Vice-Chancellor, University of Ceylon opens the storeyed structure put up to commemorate the event.

The College Temple dedicated to Lord Natarajan is consecrated with allpomp and ceremony.

The curtain rings down on the Private Aided Schools' system.

The State takes over the Assisted Schools and Mahajana which has now grown into one of the leading schools in the Island becomes a Director managed institution. The number of pupils exceeds 1800.

- 1961: We are Second Eleven champions and First Eleven Finalists in Soccer.

 School is raised to Supra Grade Status.
- 1962: We once again become Second Eleven Champions in Soccer.

The School is vested in the Crown as from 1st February and becomes a Government Institution for all intents and purposes.

Three of our Scouts represent Ceylon at the Asian Scout Jamboree held in Tokyo.

The Principal is President of the Jaffna Schools' Sports Association.

1963: Our Intermediate Girls P. T. Squad ranks first in the All-Island Contest conduct d by the Department of Education and receives the trophy from the Governor-General.

Thirty eight of our students enter the University of Ceylon, the highest for any institution in Jaffna that year. Of these ten are for the Faculty of Medicine—once again the highest for any Jaffna School that year.

Our Group Scout Master Mr. C. S. Subramaniam and Scout K. Vishnubala represent Ceylon at the Eleventh World Jamboree held in Greece.

The Principal continues as President of the Jaffna Schools' Sports Association.

1964: The Government gifts two class rooms.


We are First Eleven Champions in Soccer.





PRINCIPAL'S REPORT - 1970

Worthy Guests, Parents, Old Boys, Old Girls, Ladies and Gentlemen,

It is my proud privilege to welcome you all once again to our Founder's Day and Prize Giving. I need hardly say how mindful we are of the honour you have done us by your presence with us in such large numbers. The interest you always take in the College has been an unfailing source of strength to us. Ladies and gentlemen, you have put us into a deep debt of gratitude.

I have a special word of welcome to our Chief Guest Prof. P. Kanagasabapathy. Sir, it is indeed a pleasure that we have this year a guest of your stature to make the Prize Day Speech. I welcome you, not only as the Head of the Department of Mathematics in the University of Ceylon, Peradeniya, but also as a distinguished parent and a close friend of the College. The unswerving interest you have taken in the intellectual and social welfare of the students in your charge and the appreciation you have shown of their problems and aspirations have earned for vou the esteem and regard of the entire student community at Peradeniva. We are aware also of the important role you played in the construction of a Temple for Murugan in the University Campus. Your presence with us this evening is indeed a source of great inspiration to our students.

We are glad to welcome Mrs. Kanaga-sabapathy as the dutiful architect of her husband's fortunes. As one taking a deep interest in the education of women and a practical exponent of the Hindu way of life, she is undoubtedly a model to our womanhood. The students who will receive their prizes at her hands are indeed privileged.

We are glad to have with us this evening Dr. K. Kailasapathy, Lecturer in Tamil in the University of Ceylon, Colombo, to deliver the Founder Memorial Address. As a rising star in the firmament of Tamil learning and scholarship and as one destined to play a big part in the great Tamil revival that is coming over the country, you have won the hearts and minds of all those interested in Tamil letters both in Ceylon and in India.

We have great pleasure in welcoming Dr. V. Sivagnanavel, a distinguished old student of the College, who has so kindly consented to propose a vote of thanks to-night.

We at Mahajana College look upon the Founder's Day, dedicated to the memory of the late Mr. T. A. Thuraiappapillai, and the Prize Giving which is held along with it, as an occasion of solemn thanks giving. But the function tonight has an aura of special significance. It is associated with the Diamond Jubilee of the College and is a precursor to the festivities that have been planned to celebrate the event. Sixty years is not a very long period in the history of an institution, and we are glad that Mahajana has, during this relatively short period, attained very great heights in both academic and non-academic spheres.

The story of Mahajana College in its early years was one of great trials and tribulations. The peculiar circumstances in which the school came to be founded, the extremely humble beginnings from which it rose to its present position, the courage, faith and determination with which the Founder battled against

heavy odds and the ultimate victory that was his, lend an epic character to its history. If the first twenty years was a period of struggle and sacrifice, the next fifteen years was one of conservation and consolidation. It was during this time that the school got set for its next leap forward. The third stage of about twentyfive years has been an era of dynamic growth and expansion. Mahajana has, during this period, provided itself with adequate grounds and buildings, improved the quality of education and taken its place among the foremost schools of the Island.

It is significant that though the College was the result of individual enterprise the Founder dedicated it to the people and chose to call it "Mahajana". The concern he had for the people and the faith he reposed in them were amply reciprocated by them whenever he had to tide over a crisis. How they rallied round him when he had to carry on the school during the first eight years of its existence without any aid whatsoever from the State, and how readily they came to his help when the entire school building was washed away by the floods of 1918, reveal that the trust was not at all misplaced. More recently the public responded magnificently when we called for funds for the implementation of our programme of expansion. True to its name Mahajana has always borne the stamp of the People's institution.

Another significant feature about Mahajana is its national character. The great religious revival that was ushered in by savants like Sri La Sri Arumuga Navalar in the North and the Ven. Anagarika Dharmapala in the South, found its echo in almost every town, village and hamlet in Ceylon. Institutions for the propagation of religious tenets and the revival of indigenous culture,

sprang up in all parts of the land; and it was in the wake of this renaissance that Secondary Schools of our category came to be started in various parts of the Island. Mahajana College has fervently and consistently kept before it the objective for which it was started. We are glad that the College has over the years maintained its national and religious complexion.

In accordance with the new plan of reorganization we have been progressively dropping our lower classes from Grade 1. In three more years we shall have classes only from Grade 8 to Grade 12.

Staff:

There are 64 teachers on the staff and of these 26 are graduates. The following changes took place during the year.

Mr. S. M. Thillainathan, Specialist Trained in Mathematics, was transferred to a school nearer home in July 1969. Quiet and unostentatious he was an efficient teacher of Mathematics in the Middle School.

Mr. T. Thambirajah B. Sc. (Cey.) was likewise transferred to a school in his home town in November 1969. As a teacher of Chemistry and Zoology in the Advanced Level Classes and as one of the House Masters he proved himself to be a very valuable member of the staff.

Miss G. R. Chellappah, Secondary Trained, went back to join the Staff of the Kopay Teachers' Training College in August last after three years of service here. She was a conscientious and efficient teacher of English. I wish her well in her new sphere of work.

Mr. S. Kanagarajah B. Sc. who was closely connected with the school as student and teacher for over twenty years, was transferred to a School in the Mutur district in October last. As the Prefect of Studies, as the Master in charge of all our school examinations, as a House Master, as a Hostel Warden for some time and as one who helped me ungrudgingly in my administrative work he held a very important place in the life of the school. His transfer has been a great loss to Mahajana in many ways. I wish him every success in his new school.

Mr. N. Thevabalasingam, Specialist Trained in English, joined a school in the Jaffna Circuit in March this year after about three years' stay here. He was in charge of our Training Programme in English Language Skills and was also very helpful in all our extra curricular activities including English Drama and Athletics. I wish him well in his new school.

Mr. P. Kanagasabapathy, B. Sc. (Hons.) left us in May this year on his appointment as principal of Erlalai Government Senior School. As our Senior Zoology Master for 13 years, as a House master,

as the Vice-Patron of our Advanced Level Students' Union and as our Prefect of Discipline he occupied a key position in the School. His transfer has removed from our midst a very valuable member of the staff. He has however, agreed to continue as the General Secretary of our Diamond Jubilee Celebrations. I congratulate him on his well merited promotion and wish him all the best in his new school.

Two of our veteran teachers retired from service during the year. Mr. T. Suntharamoorthy, Teachers' Certificate (Tamil) retired in September last after about seventeen years of devoted service here. As one who was in charge of compiling our school statistics he was of great assistance to me. He also helped it our religious activities in a big way. I wish him a long period of retired life.

Mr. K. Sundarampillai, Teachers' Certificate (English) retired in May this year after over forty years of service. He started teaching here way back in 1929 under the Founder and has since then rendered very loyal and meritorious service to the College. He helped us very much in all our extra curricular activities. I wish him a long spell of happy retired life.

We had the following additions to the staff during the year under review.

Mr. P. Kulanathan B. Sc. (Cey.) joined us in September last. Mr. A. S. Balasubramaniam B. Sc. (Cey.) Dip. in Education came to us in October last. Mrs. M. Thurairajah re-joined our staff in January this year after completing a Specialist Course of Training in English at the Palaly Teachers' Collage. I welcome them all and wish them a pleasant and fruitful stay in our midst.

Mr. A Ramasamy B. A. (Lond.) Dip. in Ed. (Cey.) was promoted to Special Post Grade I with effect from 22-5-1970. I congratulate him on his well-deserved promotion. Mr. C. S. Subramaniam Specialist Science Trained was promoted to Special Post Grade II with effect from 26-5-70. I congratulate him on his well-deserved promotion.

Examination Results:

- 1. J. S. C. Examination held by the Northern Province Teachers' Association:

Religious Education:


Mahajana has always attached great importance to religious education. As a school started primarily for the Hindu children of this area it has strained every nerve to create the necessary religious atmosphere for their education. Apart from teaching them regularly the philosophy of Saiva Siddhanta as laid down in our religious books, we provide them with opportunities for religious practices and observances. We have built for them a Hindu Shrine which really forms the nerve centre of all our religious activities. The daily assembly together with morning poojah is conducted in the temple itself.

Abishegams to Sri Nadarajar, Guru Poojahs of the Saiva Saints and the observance of important days of religious significance are also conducted at the temple. The Navarathiri and the Maha Sivarathiri are observed with special poojahs and celebrations.

We have also been conducting annual festivals at Maviddapuram Kandasamy Temple and at the historic Thiruketheeswaram Temple. All these religious activities are headed by our Hindu Religious Society whose membership is confined to the Hindu teachers Hindu students of the school. Committee consisting of representatives from the staff and students forms the chief Executive. Mr. D. Sundramoorthy lyer and Mr. K. Ratnasingam function as Secretary and Treasurer respectively.

Sports and Games:

We had a heavy programme of Games and Sports activities, during this year.





In the Hockey tournament organized by the Jaffna Schools' Hockey Association our Senior team won three matches and lost two, while our Juniors won three, drew one and lost one. Though neither team reached the championship finals, the performance of several of our players was rated to be of a high order and the following boys were selected to play in the All Jaffna School Boys' team:-S. Santhiralingam (Captain), N. Sribalagengatharan, P. Samarakoddy, P. Rajakanthan, A. Keerthisinghe, T. Kanakeswaran and P. Mahendra. The last named pupil - P. Mahendra - was also chosen to play in the All Ceylon Hockey Eleven in Colombo. My congratulations go to them on their very good peformance.

In soccer we entered three teams for the tournament run by the Jaffina Schools Sports Association Our Senior team Under 19) won the championship, sharing honours with Skandavarodaya College. Our Second team (Under 17) were runners-up and our Third team (Under 16) won two matches, drew two and lost one in their respective divisions.

Our Senior Soccer team also played three matches outside the tournament, winning two of them comfortably and losing the third. Special mention has to be made of K Mohanaram, the Captain who was in top form throughout the season and was selected to Captain the Youth Team sponsored by the Jaffna Foot ball Association. K. Mohanaram, S. Santhiralingam, P. Rajakanthan, T. Kanakeswaran, N. Siribalagengatharan, and P. Tharmakulasingam were also selected to represent All Jaffna.

In Cricket our team played six matches of which we won three, drew one and lost two. P. Rajakanthan was selected to play in the All Jaffna Under 18 team, while A. Sriskanda was chosen to play in the All Jaffna Under 20 team. Both the teams participated in the Inter Zonal tournament and did very well indeed.

Our Volley ball and Net ball teams took part in the knock out competitions organized by the Education Department. We also participated in the Inter School Athletic Meet organized on a Zonal basis. No Championship was declared as it was meant to be only a selection meet for the All Ceylon Schools Athletic Meet to be held in Colombo later on.

Our girls also took part in the Inter School Sports Meet organized by the Jaffna Gifls' Schools' Sports Association and won places.

I have to refer to the good work that is being done in this sphere by our Prefect of Games Mr. A. Jogaratnam ably assisted by Mrs. M. Thurairajah, Mr. T. P. Pathmanathan and Miss P. Rasiah.

Inter House Competitions:

Competitions in Drama, Athletics, Games, Art, Elocution and Essay writing are held every year and the four Houses into which the College is divided, take part in them with enthusiasm. Keen but healthy rivalry prevails and needless to say the pupils stretch themselves to the uttermost. The most thrilling of them is the Annual Inter House Athletic Meet which came off this time on the 10th inst. under the patronage of one of our distinguished Old Boys, Mr. K. E Kathirgama Lingam, Crown Advocate, Jaffna. Mrs. Kathirgama Lingam gave away the trophies and certificates. meet was an unqualified success. Chinniah House became the Athletic Champions for the third time in succession while Arulampalam House came a good second. We are grateful to all the officials who conducted the meet so smoothly and efficiently.

The Annual Drama Competiton is another event which calls for great exertion on the part of the House Masters and of the pupils alike. This year the Competition was in Tamil Drama and the four plays presented reached a very high standard. Arulampalam House once again came first with Thuraiappah a close second.

The All Round championship goes once again to Arulampalam House, the runners-up being Chinniah. I am thankful to the House Masters, Mr. S. Arumugarajah, Mr. S. Pancharatnam, Mr. C. Sandirasegari and Mr L. J. Benedict for all their hard work. I must also thank Mr. V. Thiagarajah, the Organizing Secretary of our extra curricular activities for having conducted the competitions with so much acceptance.

Inter School Competitions:

Besides the Inter School Competitions in games and Athletics to which reference has already been made, we participated in several other contests and won laurels.

In the finals of the Inter School Tamil Drama Competition held by the Arts Council of Ceylon in January 1970 we once again came first and won the much coveted challenge trophy for the fifth year in succession. The play "Guru-Thedchanai" depicting a scene from the Mahabharatha was written and produced by Mr. S. Cathiresarpillai a member of our Staff. To him all honour is due. I must also congratulate the boys and girls who took part in it and brought great credit to themselves and to the

College. Special mention should be made of Mas. S. Subramaniam who was awarded the best actor's prize.

Mrs. G. Y. Veluppillai and Mrs. Ratnavel continue to do very useful work with our Wolf Pack.

Mrs G. Thurairatnam is in charge of a very smart Company of Guides which consists of about 65 girls. They have their regular training classes and are of great help to us at all our school functions. Mrs. S. Thuraisamy takes very good care of our Little Friends, as the Brownies are now called.

Training in Language Skills:

A training programme in English Language skills, similar to the one inaugurated in 1969, is now under way. All the pupils are given an intensive training in certain basic language skills and this is rounded off with competitions held at school levels and later at circuit. regional and All-Island levels. I am glad to find that this scheme has aroused a good deal of interest in schools for the learning and teaching of English. We have just concluded our competitions and are training our students for the circuit contest which is due to be conducted shortly. Mrs. M. Thurairajah. is the chief organizer of this programme here.

A similar training programme in Tamil Language skills is also being carried out all over the Island. Competitions at circuit level are now in progress and our pupils are taking part in them. Mr. V. Ponniah is in charge of this activity.

Unions and Associations:

Active student organizations have all along been a happy feature of our life at Mahajana. They afford students adequate training in leadership and provide them with opportunities to initiate schemes of their own and pilot them

The largely with their own resources. chief among these bodies is the Advanced Level Students' Union. It holds regular meetings, conducts inter-school debates and organizes an Annual Dinner. Dinner last year-the sixteenth of the series - was held in the College Hall on the 9th day of November with Prof. K. S. Gengadharan, Head of the Department of Mathematics, University of Ceylon, Colombo, and Mrs. Gengadharan as the Chief Guests. The other speakers on the occasion were Dr. T. Shanmuga-Mr. K. Somasundaram and nathan, a student representative from Jaffna Central College. Mr. P. Kanagasabapathy, the Vice-Patron, has been guiding the affairs of the Union very enthusiastically and successfully.

The Tamil Manram and the Science. Association are two other student bodies whose membership is confined to the Advanced Level students. They have their meetings and debates under the guidance of Mr. T. Shanmugasundaram and Mr. S. I. Sathiosatham respectively

The Literary Association of the other classes, as also of the Kanishta Section, have their meetings under the leadership of their own Presidents and with the guidance of teachers in charge.

The History and Politics Association, the Hindu Religious Society and the Girls' Union are other student bodies of the Upper School which carry out their own programmes of work under the guidance of responsible teachers.

Parent Teacher Association:

We have an active Parent Teacher Association which co-operates with the College and helps her in many ways. Membership is renewed annually, and we have today 876 members on our register.

The Association is very keen that the school should maintain the same standard of efficiency as during the Assisted School era, and it does all it can to achieve this end.

The Annual Parents' Day, which is held always with the Kanishta School Prize Giving, is one of the major functions of the school and is celebrated with much interest. It was held this year on the 20th of March with Mr. S. Kanthaswamy, Principal of the Sir Ponnambalam Ramanathan Junior University, Palaly, as our Chief Guest. The variety entertainment which the children provided on the occasion reached a very high standard.

Hostel:

Our Hostel is run on very efficient lines. Mr. S. Kathirgamathamby, the Warden, sees to it that the resident pupils live in comfort, do their work systematically and are kept under proper discipline. The meals provided are strictly vegetarian and there is absolutely nothing to complain about its quality. But the only difficulty we experience is the lack of accommodation. We are unable to take in more than 66 boys, though there is much clamour for places and we maintain a long waiting list.

Alumni Association:

The past pupils' association is also a very lively organization. It had its Annual General Meeting on the 13th of April this year. A full day programme, including lunch, evening tea and indoor and out door games, was gone through as usual. Those who participated had a very enjoyable time indeed. Mrs. T. Sundararajah and Mr. A. Ratnam have been re-elected Joint Secretaries for the coming year.

The Branch Association in Colombo had its Annual General Meeting on the 27th of April this year at the Saraswathy Hall, Bambalapitiya. Mr. S. Sittampalam, the Commissioner of Inland Revenue, was the Guest of Honour. The other Guest speakers were Mrs. M. Thiagarajah Lecturer in Tamil, University of Ceylon, Colombo and Mr. S. Krishnarajah, Advocate and a distinguished old boy of the College. Mr. S. Subramaniam and Mr. S. A. Sivapatham were elected joint Secretaries for the current year.

This year we opened a new chapter in the history of our Alma Mater -Alumni relations by starting a branch at Batticaloa. Mr. P. Kanagasabapathy, Mr. A. Ramasamy, Mr. T. P. Murugiah, Mr. N. Sundararajah, Mrs. N. Sundararajah and the Principal represented the parent association at the inaugural meeting at Government College, Batticaloa, on the 27th of February this year. Mr Sankaralingam, Director of Education, Eastern Region was present as one of the guest speakers, Mr. N. S. Subramaniam, Asst. Superintendent of Surveys, Amparai, was elected Hony. Secretary. Great credit is due to him and to the other past pupils in the Batticaloa and Amparai districts for their pioneering work in this direction.

Diamond Jubilee Commemoration Block:

A storeyed building to accommodate the Science Laboratories and the Mathematics Room of the Advanced Level Classes has just been designed to commemorate the Diamond Jubilee of the College. Plans. detailed drawings and estimates have already been prepared. We are thankful to Mr.G. Satkunam, Engineer and a grateful old boy, and his architect friend, Mr. Geevaka de Soyza, for having done for us such a magnificent job of work.

The foundation stone for this building was ceremonially laid on 12th Sept. '69 at 6-00 p. m. by another distinguished old boy Mr. A. Thirugnanasambanther, Proprietor, Dollar Corporation, in the presence of a large gathering of parents, old boys and friends.

Tenders for the construction of the building have been received and we hope to begin work on it very soon. So far we have raised Rs. 53,000/- towards this project. We hope to find the balance needed as we proceed with the work.

Thanks:

Before concluding my report I must express my thanks to all those who have helped me in my work during the year and contributed so much to our allround success. Our Director of Education, Mr. S. Thankasalam and his officers in the Education Department have been very helpful indeed. They have always shown a sympathetic understanding of all our problems and have done a good deal to maintain the efficiency of the College.

I am grateful to my Deputy Principal Mr. M. Mahadevan, and to the Sectional Heads who have shared my work willingly. The teachers in active charge of our co-curricular activities deserve my special thanks for all the time and effort they put into their work. The other members of my teaching staff and those of the non-teaching and minor staff have also been very co-operative. All of them have considerably lightened my burden and made my work very pleasant. Their willingness to help at all times and under any circumstance has been a source of very great encouragement to me.

I am thankful to our College Prefects and to the other student leaders for all the assistance they have given me cheerfully and ungrudginly. I also thank the donors of prizes and all those who have in one way or another assisted me in planning and conducting the Diamond Jubilee Celebrations of the College. And to you, friends, past pupils and parents, I once again offer my sincere thanks for your kind presence and for all your help.
