Kankesanturai Council Grounds Filled To Capacity

On August 23, from Kulapitty in Kokkuvil to Kankesanturai Town Council Grounds, the procession taking Mr. J R Jayawardene, the Minister of State, wended its nine-mile way and the house-model car decorated in oriental style took five hours to cover the distance halting at junctions cheered by a large crowd all along the route. The public meeting began at 10 p.m. and went on till late in the night.

The previous day the Minister was received at the Air Port Palaly by the G. A. Jaffna. Mr. Vernon Abeyasekera and other high officials. Later the F. P. Leaders welcomed the Minister and took him to the Guest House at Kankesanturai in a motorcade.

Mr. C. Rajadurai, M. P. the President of the Youth Front was full of praise for the great statesmanship of Mr. Jayawardene who along with Premier Senanayake made it possible for a National Government to be formed.

What Life Has Taught Me

DR. R. C. MAJUMDAR

I was born in a poor family in an insignificant village, remote from any town or place of importance. Life held out but little prospect for me, and my utmost expectations could not reasonably soar beyond a simple rural life with moderate comforts. If Providence had offered me a boon when I was in my teens, I would not have dreamed of asking anything which makes even a near approach to what I am today.

When I look back upon the seventy two years of my life, this wide gulf between expectation and realities almost overwhelms me. It sets a train of thought in my mind in a vain endeavour to find a solution of the problem or mystery of life. How am I to account for my great success in life, as the term is generally understood? It would be sheer vanity on my part to think that it was solely due to my qualities of head and heart, aided by hard work and strenuous efforts. For others, equally or even more highly gifted than I, have failed to score equal success in spite of their best endeavour. I can still think of a dozen of my fellow-students in schools or colleges, who were better placed or had better start in life, and whose intellectual gifts were alike my envy and despair; yet they have failed to make any mark in life.

So far as my own case is concerned, the things that appeared almost within my grasp have somehow eluded me, and most reasonable expectations have been belied. On the other hand, the unexpected has happened not once or twice, but many times.

Events have occurred which I dared not hope for, unasked favours have

been showered from unknown quarters. Failures which caused almost despair in life have proved to be blessings in disguise. Evil courses which sorely tempted me have been strangely averted, and accidents have placed me on good path. Things, unpleasant and distasteful, which I was forced to do against my will, have sometimes proved to be my salvation.

The most important example is the choice of History as my special subject of study. I did not take it in the Intermediate Examination as I was enamoured of science subjects. But at the insistence of my eldest brother I had to take up Honours in History at the B. A. Today I cannot but regard it as a turning point in my whole career.

Again, I was the first nominee of the University for appointment as a Deputy Magistrate and was called for interview at Darjeeling. But sudden illness prevented me from going to the hills. The loss of such a lucrative post, almost within my grasp cast a gloom over the whole family who looked upon it as a great blow on my future prospects in life. But later, I regarded my illness as a god-send. This episode taught me the great lesson that apparent failures are often but stepping-stones to success.

Many times I have thought of these strange and unexpected turns in my life, and gradually I have been forced to the conviction that it was not my will or judgment, but some unseen power that has been shaping my destiny. So life has taught me that there is a great deal of truth and profound wisdom, if not high philosophy, in the two following lines of the poet:

Many great lessons in life are learnt by contact with men. At every stage of life one has to face the problem of dealing with other men. After various experiments I was reminded of the old saying, 'Do unto others as you would be done by'. I found it to be a golden rule and have tried to follow it in life. Whenever any peculiar situation arose, I asked myself the question, how I would have liked others to deal with me in similar circumstances. I tried to conform my attitude and action to the reply I got from my inner self.

But it often appeared to me that many did not follow this right procedure in their behaviour towards me. In my younger days I was often sorely aggrieved by their conduct. Many were ungrateful, jealous, or deceitful to such a degree that I came to form a very low opinion of mankind, and almost became a misanthrope. (But with advance in age my views

Muslim University

It is reported in the Press that Muslims are seeking for a Muslim University. This is a reasonable request and it is trusted that it will have a universal support. The Vidyalkara and Vidodaya Universities were originally and primarily intended to promote Buddhist and Sinhala Culture and Buddhism. A Muslim University could perform a similar function in respect of the religion and culture of the Muslims and it goes without saying, serve the entire Ceylonese Community as a whole. The world is greatly indebted to Muslim culture and civilisation. Ceylon also, while being predominantly Buddhist, is an important Muslim centre which could contribute its quota to the general educational, cultural and religious welfare of the Muslim world. A Muslim University would also serve as an intellectual and cultural link of Ceylon with many other countries specially in Asia and Africa and make Ceylon still more important in international circles. Tamils and Tamil culture owe a great deal to Muslims and their contribution. It is trusted that Tamils would wholeheartedly support the request for a Muslim University. It is also hoped that the Sinhalese Community which is the custodian of the welfare of the other communities in Ceylon, would also bless the request and thus further

promote inter communal and inter religious harmony and national unity.

Provision for Islamic studies in the Universities of Ceylon, now existing & hereafter to be established could go hand in hand with the establishment of Muslim University. Neither arrangement need stand in the way of the other. The money spent on Education is the greatest of all national investments and the matter of expenditure should not be a bar to adequate and necessary educational facilities being provided for the people.

It is trusted that both the Government and Opposition parties would give unreserved support to the dual arrangement. The country's present financial embarrassment should not preclude the State spending more money and yet still more money on Education. Money well spent on sound educational provision will yield uncalculable good results and will obviate or curtail in due course in the fullness of time very great expenditure in remedial measures. Good education is the best preventive of all our country's ills and will also serve to bring down national expenditure ultimately and permanently for all times.

changed. I found that in judging others we do not often probe into their minds and hence fail to make proper allowance for extenuating circumstances

A man borrowed money and never returned it, and I thought very ill of him. But years later I came to know of the circumstances in which he was placed, and there were at least many excuses for his conduct.

I found that as a general rule men forget in no time the benefits received, but remember for long the denial of further benefits.

I helped one with money to tide over a crisis. I extended similar help for a second and even a third time. But when he asked for the fourth time and I refused, he took it very much to heart and told our common friends, not what he received but what I refused. I used to be annoyed at first, but gradually came to look upon the whole thing in another light. The have-nots possess an innate repugnance to those who have, and not unoften come to believe that they have a right to make demands, and it is the duty of more fortunate ones to grant them. They seem to argue that while the other party can easily afford to pay and would not be much the worse for it, they would have to undergo terrible sufferings and privations if their demands be refused. They think of the day when we all started life together in the same way, and feel that nothing but the caprice of the Goddess of Fortune has placed them wide apart. The more fortunate ones therefore owe it to themselves to do their best to make reparations for the wrong and injustice to which their less fortunate friends have fallen victims. Such arguments may not be very logical and reasonable, but are perhaps not unnatural, — not unnatural for my experience shows that quite a large number of persons are obsessed with such ideas, and sincerely believe in them. I therefore came to regard such thoughts as extenuating factors in forming a judgement of men whose conduct appeared at first to be almost inexcusable.

A similar but much more significant change came over me in respect of the standard of morality. In younger days I had some

fixed ideas on the subject. Certain rules of conduct appeared to me to be so sacrosanct that any deviation from it seemed to deserve strong condemnation. The reason is that the little world in which I was born and brought up took for granted as axiomatic truth, current social laws and practices, without any doubt or question, and I followed suit.

In particular the relations between men and women, between members of the same family and castes were defined with precision, and the resultant picture of social life was deeply engraved in my heart. So much so that no doubt about its propriety occurred to me and no thought of condoning any lapse from the fixed standard in vital matters ever crossed my mind.

But as I grew older, I learnt more and more of mankind and my knowledge of history taught me the diversity in rules and practises among different nations and in the same nation in different ages.

In particular what struck me most was the fact that mankind never followed one uniform standard of morality. What was considered to be an unpardonable moral lapse in our society was treated very lightly in other highly civilized societies. It gradually dawned upon my mind that we shall not judge a man or a woman merely by a set standard fixed by society or religious scriptures. The laws of Man are more important than those of Manu. I ceased to take seriously the generally accepted view that the slightest deviation from Manu's injunctions, particularly in respect of women, would cause the dissolution of the Hindu society. My views of the relative importance of the different classes of virtues and vices have been modified to a very large extent.

NOW WHAT NEXT?

The tumultuous welcome given to the Premier and his worthy lieutenant the Minister of State in the name of the Tamil speaking people by the Tamil Congress and the Federal Party had each excelled itself in the art of according reception. The triumph of the Tamil speaking people may be summed up in one word as impressive. To the leaders of the U. N. P., a party that was decried for nearly a decade, by the Federal Party as reactionary, the significance of the receptions at Kalmunai and Kankasanturai must have created a special meaning namely the admission of the fact that political struggles on ideological slogans must now end. As for the Tamil Congress, the allegation all along against it particularly by the Federal Party has been that it was playing second fiddle to the U. N. P. and therefore the reception to the Premier and other parliamentarians of the National Government recorded only a reiteration of the faith in the policy of progress by undivided Lanka.

The ordinary man who has been amazed by the sudden burst of welcome apparently organized in a competitive pattern to the leaders of the National Government is still wondering what the direct outcome of these triumphant visits may be. The Premier and the Minister of State could only reiterate their faith in concerted efforts to bring about prosperity and stability to this country. We feel it our duty to pose this question at this most opportune moment to both the T. C. and the F. P. on the one side and the National Government on the other.
