Temple Entry

Sir,—

I read in the Daily Mirror a statement said to have been made by the Hon. Mr. Thiruchelvam. Minister of Local Government, at a public meeting in Jaffna, that legislation will be enacted under Section 29 of the Constitution with a two third majority to make temple entry a right by law. I do not exactly see why recourse should be had to this section for an enactment of this kind. As I understand it, it is a prohibitory provision to prevent the enactment of an act of a discriminatory nature and not for the conferment of any right of this kind. However that may be, I am only concerned with the proposal of a legislative enactment in connection with the question of temple entry.

The present state of affairs in which certain sections of the Hindu Community are not allowed freely to enter any temple for purposes of worship is undoubtedly a slur on the Hindus at the present time, and personally I feel that all restrictions should be removed, and all who are Hindus should be entitled to enter any temple for worship of God as any other Hindus. I am one of those who took a leading part in the movement a few years ago, which resulted in the opening of some of the chief temples in Jaffna, like the Nallur, Kandasamy temple, Kailasanathar Pillayar temple, the Vannarponnai Sivan temple, Vannarponnai Venkatesa Perumal Kovil and others, for admission of Harijans to worship in those temples. These temples are still open to them. There was great opposition by some Hindus at that time, and I received a number of letters strongly attacking me for the part I took in that movement. I did not feel hurt or annoyed by these attacks. I knew that the writers were all good pious Hindus, honest and sincere in their con-

victions, who believed in the existing Shastras and Agamas which all Hindu temples should follow in the performing of the religious rites and ceremonies and general management. These Shastras and Agamas were no doubt intended to suit the conditions that existed at the time they were enunciated thousands of years ago. Since then times have considerably changed and are changing rapidly, and those religious rules and regulations, or rather some of them, have no doubt become outdated. But who have the right to change them? Unfortunately, the Hindu religion or the different sects that form it have no religious head or institution that could lay down rules and regulations for religious observances. Unfortunately again, the exclusion of Harijans from Hindu temples is itself a part of the religious observances according to existing rules. Then the change must come over by the peoples themselves realising the iniquity of the system in the light of the present conditions. Undoubtedly the change is coming over, and the need is felt more by the younger generation who are more alive to the present conditions. It can be accelerated by propaganda work by Hindu leaders of advanced views. I feel certain that the time is not far off, and I long for the day, when discrimination of any kind against any of our Hindu brothers and sisters will completely disappear. But let us not be in too much of a hurry to do any spectacular action.

On principle I am definitely against any legislation interfering with Hindu temples as regards the management or any other matter which is considered a religious observance. There should be no government interference in

The undernoted extracts from the Annual Report for 1965 issued by Muhandiram E. P. Rasiah the Secretary of the Friend-in-Need Society give interesting reading reflecting the genuine social service rendered by this 126 year old society.

The Hon. Dr. H. W. Tambiah, Puisne Judge, an illustrious son of Jaffna, graced our last Annual General meeting, as Chief Guest. In the course of his Address, he gave us some valuable advice, and commended the work of this Society. "And this Society" he added "had established the First Medical College in Ceylon, and my grand-father—Dr. William Paul—a product of that College, subsequently became a Resident Surgeon of the Jaffna Hospital, founded and run by this Society for about half a century, before the Government took it over. You can well be proud of these."

...The assistance given by us in these matters though comparatively small, proved more or less complementary and not competitive to the State aid. It is heartening to note, that in the midst of distressing and disconcerting economic trends, our society is alive and discharging its obligations although in a restricted way.

A marriageable girl uncared for by anyone was languishing for want of a dowry. Her father had died some years ago. Her mother had eloped with another man, discharging this girl. Her brother, who was supporting her, fell a victim to the cyclone on the high seas and she was stranded without anyone to help her.

On hearing these pathetic circumstances, Justice Dr. H. W. Tambiah (and another anonymous donor) came forward to provide the cash dowry for her. A Post Office Savings Account was opened in her name and the amounts deposited to her credit. The Pass Book

A TANTALIZING EPISODE

(By Muhandiram E. P. Rasiah, J. P.)

The death of Mr. P. M. Vethanayagam, B.A. has given me the freedom to disclose to the public, the details of a drama, where noble souls were participants. In fact, he had forbidden me from giving publicity to them during his life time.

A few years ago, the late Mr. Vethanayagam (then a stranger to me) walked into my office one fine day with my good friend, the late Mr. K. P. Muttiah and sought my advice and assistance to collect money to provide a dowry to a helpless girl. She, he said, was the daughter of his deceased Guru, a talented violinist of Jaffna. Both of them seemed quite earnest and the cause appealed to me. So, we three sat together and explored various ways and means of collecting the necessary funds and finally decided upon "A variety Entertainment" in the Town Hall—most of the items were to be arranged by Mr. K. P. Muttiah or provided by Mr. Vethanayagam with little or no expense.

We then approached the then Govt. Agent to lend his patronage to the Concert. After patiently listening to our proposals, he put us a poser. "This is a bold venture, why not consult Yogar Swamy and obtain his blessings before I could give you my consent."

Who was to bell the cat? Being a Hindu, it fell to my lot although I felt diffident, to lead the party and open the topic with Yogar Swamy. The next day, we all three, with some trepidation, walked into the Swamy's Ashram at Columbhathurai. He was there talking to a Judge (who has since mounted the Supreme Court Bench). With palms held together in worship, we three stood there before him, motionless. Minutes passed. The Swamy took no notice of us. He continued His discourse with the Judge and at last—which seemed

an eternity to me—He turned in our direction and scanned each of us from head to foot. He then closed His eyes and remained silent for a minute or two stroking his beard. I thought we were in for a shelling. He opened his eyes and repeated the process. I quietly nudged at Vethanayagam to open the topic. He was silent. Then I gave a dig to Muttiah, with no response. Words failed me, and I began to perspire.

Then suddenly the Swamy burst out:—

Was it a casual utterance of His? Or, was it pregnant with some mysterious meaning?

Mr. Vethanayagam was an orthodox catholic. Myself a staunch Hindu while Muttiah was the pillar of the Christian Church.

Though poles apart in our religious beliefs, we—a self-appointed Trinity—had got together in a common mission and had gone to Him at the instance of Mr. Sri Khanta!! Or was it thought—reading.

Encouraged by these remarks, Mr. Vethanayagam, haltingly, narrated the purpose of our visit and unfolded to the Swamy our plans to find the money for Dowry, to settle in marriage the daughter of his late Guru. The Swami said

He then turned towards the Judge and remarked:—

MEDIUM OF INSTRUCTION MATTER FOR PARENTS?

The Iriyagolle Line on Educational reforms appears to be a sinister interference, ill-timed and ill advised. Premier Dudley Senanayake himself is unable to clear the present situation of the alarming confusion in the matter of deciding what the medium of instruction shall be. The inability is not due to incapacity. Most unnecessarily a piquant situation has been precipitated by the Minister of Education by throwing the apple of discord among the various communities who have hitherto been remaining satisfied with the golden principle that the medium of instruction shall be the mother tongue. The ingenious device of placing the parent in a peculiar position of choosing the language of instruction for his children where no such choice according to existing educational regulations is possible has raised a more serious matter that might lead to a worsening of inter communal relations.

The ideal of a sound educational policy is always rooted in the cultural and traditional heritage of a community. The term 'Mother tongue' has only one meaning and that has acquired the force of legal interpretation namely one's own tongue—native tongue. Literally it also denotes a language from which other languages have sprung. The parent like any other citizen owes a duty to his country and community. He cannot endeavour to disturb the normal conditions of life by forcing his children to ignore their mother-tongue and adopt by choice another language actuated by self-interest. Patriotism is a duty as much for the parent as for anybody else. The parent's obligations in the cause of his community count more than his own private interest. To tell a parent that notwith-

standing these obligations he has the freedom to choose any language as the medium of instruction for his children is to put into his head a novel idea that is sugar coated with the attraction of a gift-proposal that will enhance his personal power very much.

Will any parent in his normal senses agree to accept this gratuitous gift?

What is lost sight of in this age of tensions, of rush and high pressure living is the pitiful plight of the destitutes, who by reason of infirmity or poverty, are compelled to live on what is tossed their way. These unfortunate people are to be found everywhere around us.

Ignoring the existence of these destitutes does not solve the problem. It is only by providing care and attention, when they need it most, and making them contented that we can really be happy. That being so, the care and attention of the poor and the aged around us must be intensified and enlarged and all concerned should come forward to do their bit. We appeal to all to continue to give their support—moral and financial—to this worthy cause."

Jaffna Hindu College Tops the List

On the results of the G. C. E. (Advanced Level) Examination held in December 1965, Jaffna Hindu College tops the list in Ceylon as regards the total number of admissions to the University of Ceylon. In all 47 students have been successful in gaining admission to the University. The details are as follows: Arts 15; Engineering 23; Medicine 5, Physical Science 4.

As already reported in our columns Jaffna Hindu College also tops the list in the Island as regards the number of admissions to the Faculty of Engineering.

Ramanathan College Chunnakam has sent the highest number of students to the Faculty of Arts. In all 33 students have been admitted to the University from this Girls' College.

any form in any matter of a religious character. Any such interference will, I am afraid, only lead to most undesirable consequences and defeat its own purpose. I would certainly welcome any legislation enabling the minority Tamils to have free access to any other public place or institutions, but in any such legislation Hindu temples should be expressly excluded.

I am leading a retired life and nearing the end of my journey. After much thought I feel it my duty to my community and my religion to give public expression to my views for what they are worth, and give the warning to Government and others of the possible consequences of any hasty spectacular action, especially in view of the part I took in the earlier movement, and, it might be wrongly considered that I and others like me would also welcome legislative action to achieve the end. I am entirely for the removal of all disabilities, but not by legislation or other means of Governmental compulsion in regard to any matter treated as a religious observance.

A Leading Saiva Religious Worker

Mr. S. Annamalai, Malayan Pensioner, Vaddukodai passed away on 3.10.66 at his residence Vel Vasa. His brothers Messrs. S. Mylvaganam and S. Nagalingam had predeceased him. He received his early education at Chulipuram Victoria College where he had the good fortune of receiving Saiva religious education from Sri S. Sivapathasundarampillai who had trained several youths in leading a Saiva religious life. He was employed in Malaya and had served the Saiva religion by taking part in many religious activities, including the establishment of a Kandaswamy Temple at Klang.

When he returned to Jaffna he devoted his leisure time in religious, cultural and social activities. He was a founder member of the Moolai Co-operative Hospital and of the Vaddukkodai Thirugnanasambantha Vidya-salai Vaddukkodai.

He was a member of the Board of Management of the Jaffna Saivaparipalana Sabhai. He had made pilgrimages to holy shrines of India and had helped the religious activities of the Madras Saiva Sithantha Sangam. Towards the latter part of life a sudden change occurred in his mode of life. He decided to lead a life of quietness and did rarely get out of residence. He spent his time mostly in meditation and prayer. He led an exemplary religious life.

SARASWATHY POOJA

It was gratifying to note that Navarathiri Sarasvathy Poojahs had become regular features in all the Educational Institutions in our country where Hindu children are in a majority. Even Christian institutions of repute taken over by the department have fallen in line with this national policy and celebrated these festivals with great zeal. Training Colleges and the training of teachers are also of major importance and most of them are encouraging the trainees to participate in these practices in the best possible manner. It is with great regret that we noted that last year and before, out of these train-

ing colleges, the college at Nallur which had over 99% Hindu trainees had neglected this aspect of training owing to the intransigence of the authorities. We do not accuse the Education Department which had given full encouragement to these activities. The trainees we understand are very keen on getting this training. We hope that the device adopted last year will not be repressed and that this institution situated very close to the Nallur Kandaswamy Temple will give a good lead in this very important matter and give the trainees adequate encouragement to organise this activity. Our Sabhai offers its assistance in organising these activities, if needed.
