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U. N. O. DISSECTED

Following that timeless message "Peace on Earth and good-will towards men" Nations have toiled for peace on earth, but the dove of peace has eluded their grasp. "The New York Times" has stated that for every year of peace enjoyed by the people, they have had to spend nearly 5 years at war. To rectify this sad state of affairs various methods have been tried to find out an international process to prevent wars and settle disputes between countries.

It was in 1899 that for the first time, the various nations had got together to find a way to maintain peace — 26 States assembling at the Hague Conference. In 1907 the second Peace meeting was held at Hague — 44 States attending. Nevertheless, within a decade these nations were embroiled in the first World War. Following this, an international Peace Organisation — The League of Nations — was formed. And in 1920, 54 Nations solemnly decided "not to resort to war."

Break-down

But in 1931, Japan moved into Manchuria, and in 1935 Italy attacked Ethiopia signalling the break down of the League of Nations. However during the life time of the League of nations several Peace Treaties were signed. In 1925 by the Locarno treaties, Germany had covenanted with France, Belgium, Poland and Czechoslovakia that they would 'in no case attack or invade each other'. But in 1935, Germany moved into Czechoslovakia. According to the Kellogg - Briand Peace Treaty of 1929, 62 nations renounced war; but within 15 years almost all were at war. Russia after signing a non-aggression pact with Finland, Latvia, Estonia and Luthania, had subsequently attacked and annexed these countries. Hitler-Stalin pact of 1939 was broken two years

after it was drawn up and so the record goes on. Politicians' efforts at peace have been a long string of failures,

World Peace and Civilisation

That the survival of civilisation rested on the prevalence of world peace began to dawn on our leaders, when they emerged from the turmoils of the second world war. So, the victorious nations began to think of establishing a stable, permanent World Organisation that could preserve the peace among all nations. It was expected to be a vast improvement over "The League of Nations" in its composition, scope of activities and effectiveness. The United Nations Organisation, thus born had an ambitious programme. It hoped to find means and methods to eliminate mankind's chief enemies—hunger, disease, ignorance and above all injustice. It was created to save succeeding generations from the scourge of war, to practice tolerance and live together in peace with one another as good neighbours... This Organisation is now 21 years old and has about 117 member nations.

In theory, the complex structure of the U. N. is expected to function as a harmonious whole for the good of mankind, but in practice it is torn by dissensions which seriously hamper it in fulfilling its primary function—the maintenance of world peace. It has been repeatedly bypassed by many in favour of force.

Well over 100 times, the Major Powers have stifled the U. N.'s capacity to act, by using the Veto.

In certain places, armed action and repressive measures continue to be taken "with increasing ruthlessness" against dependent peoples, depriving them of their pro-

THE LANGUAGE QUESTION

The sending of Sinhalese teachers to the North and East to teach Sinhalese before finalising the language policy is fraught with many dangers. Language is a matter which should never have been raised by political parties for catching votes at elections. We saw its dangers in 1956—58 when anti-Tamil riots broke out in the South. Language being the means used to convey one's thoughts to another it is essential that both know the language. To transact business with a Sinhalese one should know Sinhalese so with Tamil also. The Britisher insisted on his civil servants studying both Sinhalese and Tamil. He never compelled people to study English the official language, though official business was transacted in English but employed interpreters to interpret into Sinhalese and Tamil for the benefit of the people. Having made Sinhalese as the only official language to send Sinhalese teachers to teach Sinhalese to Tamil children is too crude and unfair to both students and teachers. Only teachers who knew both languages could instruct a student, Sinhalese to Tamil student, through his mother tongue. The Ceylon Tamil, if he is to get on well in Ceylon has to study Sinhalese and it was a good matter that Sinhalese was taught in the Hindu Colleges in Jaffna even before the Sinhalese only Bill was passed. Sensible parents will get their children learn both languages for their benefit. One wonders whether the Sinhalese teachers sent to teach Sinhalese do know Tamil also; otherwise it will be a great handicap. Indeed it would have been far better if a Round Table Conference of Tamil speaking leaders and Sinhalese speaking leaders had been held and a mutually satisfactory policy thrashed out instead of utilizing a steam roller

SKANDA SHASHTI

God Skanda or Shanmuga is said to be an Avatara of Siva or better still, another form of Siva. He is called 'Kaliyuga Varathan' (கலியுகவரதன்) and is worshipped with intense faith and devotion by all Hindus all over India and Ceylon and also by the Sinhalese brothers of Ceylon.

His Form shows the combination of the five elements with the Spirit; every one of the elements has been represented by one face and the Sixth face represents the life-principle or the Spirit. This holy form consists of six faces and twelve hands bearing different kinds of weapons; the most important weapon given to Him by Lord Siva, the *Vel* is kept on the chest. He rides on the pea-cock and holds the banner of the cock. On both sides are His consorts, Valli on the right and Devayanai on the left. The pea-cock stands on a black serpent. The entire Form is the Form of Shanmukam or Subramanya.

The esoteric significance of this Form is given as follows:—

The six faces represent the six attributes viz *Gnana, Vairagya, Balam, Kirthi, Sri* and *Aiswarya*.

The faces also indicate that He is present in the four directions and also above and below. (எந்த முகத்தோடு அதோமுகம்) He is also the Supreme Being sought after by the six means of knowledge. "அறிஞராயோர் சிந்திக்கும் தொல்லைத் திருமுடி ஆறும் கோண்டாய்" (என்று கச்சியடி சிவமகாசாயர்)

The 12 arms show that He alone creates, preserves, destroys, hides and blesses—in fact He does everything in the world where God Subramaniam presides. The devotees who observed the fast and derived immense benefits were Indra, Vishnu, Ardhuna, in the past and many others in the present. The fact that

Desire and Action forces are kept on either side of Him and that Gnana Sakti or the force of Knowledge alone is kept on His chest points out that Knowledge (or *ஞானம்*) is the most important of them all and that it never gets separated from Him. The pea-cock on which He rides shows the Pranava letter 'Om'. When the pea-cock spreads out its tail, it has the round shape of the *Pranava* and within it is the Lord in the form of Subramania. (சு+அரமணிய). The Serpent kept in check by the pea-cock's feet shows that Maya (impurity Anava) is completely subjugated by the power of Pranava.

The cock in the banner signifies the sound form or *நாதம்*. It is the nature of the cock to crow at the moment when the Sun is about to appear in the horizon! Similarly the chanting of the Mantira Om heralds the manifestation of the effulgent Atma or Ultimate Truth i.e. the Almighty.

Of the 3 vratas of God Skanda, Shasti vrata is the most important and it begins on the first day Prathamam or the Poorva Paksha in the month of *Aipasi* (ஐப்பசி). Those who fast for this *விரதம்* may eat *only once* in the whole day for the first five days and should observe complete fast on the sixth day. The devotees who fast should not fluctuate, but concentrate their minds on God Skanda & listen to His stories. Sing His praises. The sixth day sees the victory of God Skanda over Sura Padma who becomes His vehicle and banner (Sura, the vehicle & Padman the banner). This auspicious day is celebrated on a grand scale in every Hindu Temple where God Subramaniam presides. The devotees who observed the fast and derived immense benefits were Indra, Vishnu, Ardhuna, in the past and many others in the present. sent Kaliyuga.

MISGUIDED MOVEMENTS

That Bharatha Bhoomi which captured the imagination of the whole world by the successful use of the unique weapon of soul-force under the true and trusted leadership of Mahatma Gandhi should have been the venue for ghastly scenes of unbridled rioting seems ironical. The irony becomes more pronounced when it is learnt that this dastardly outburst was as a sequel to a mighty procession of men and women marching towards the Houses of the Indian Parliament for demanding a nation-wide ban on cow-slaughter. What is still worse is that the Government of India had not totally banned the slaughtering of cows—a heinous crime particularly in the context of Indian culture and religious requirements. However, it is inexplicable how and why such a fury and rage had been worked up in propagating the cause of protecting cows. What appeared to be a harmless non-violent protest had eventually turned out to be a carefully planned aggressive march after the Communist strategy for the one purpose of discrediting the present Government of India. The Minister for Home Affairs, Mr G. L. Nanda, who by any stretch of clever defence could not justify the devilish development had however acknowledged his blunder by giving up his ministerial post.

A similar situation is being worked up by mischievous elements in Lanka but on a different basis. The diehard communal cry has been raised once again with a determination to set a foot on mischief. But leaders of the different political parties do not seem to have realized the danger that is lurking behind their ill timed, ill advised statements, demands and challenges. The only guarantee against disrup-

tion can be the ability of the parties that constitute the National Government to think more in terms of the country as a whole and evade raising issues that will tend to create contending groups within the ruling party. We appeal to the parties and their leaders in the name of peace and harmony, above all for human considerations, to sit together and devise ways and means for bringing quiet on the economic front and for that purpose to lay by or forget pressure moves for demands that have the potentiality for internal eruption. The common man is already up in arms against any misguided moves within the government ranks and in the Opposition Front Here is a warning to those who rush in where greater people fear to tread.

In these days of severe competition employment opportunities have almost become nil and the army of unemployed is an indication that unless we change our attitude and find sources of employment in other directions such as the pursuit of Agriculture, in Technical jobs, in Engineering, Architecture, Radio Electricity etc., we will be lost.

we should however emphasise that it is not merely as an avenue for the young men of Malaysia that one has to look at the question. There is not the slightest doubt if the independence we have gained is to be worth anything, we must have food. At present we live mostly on imported food stuffs and it is not at all wise for any Nation to depend on the goodwill of its neighbours to appease its hunger.

gative to exercise their rights.

But disappointment over this Organisation too as an effective instrument of peace is steadily increasing. There has been several occasions on which the U. N. O. appears to have veered from its chartered course:—

1. In the field of disarmament it has proved ineffective, for, the world in its overall arms' race spends 14,000,000 dollars an hour.
2. Its failure to take a firm action, when Russia attacked Hungary, disclosed its weakness.
3. When North Korea attacked South Korea, the U. N. settled for a split Korea which appears to be acceptable to none. As a result, Korea is said to be an explosive powder keg—a perpetual threat to world peace.
4. In the Kashmir dispute, and the Indo-China border dispute troops continue to face each other. True there is no war, but neither is there peace.
5. There are many who hold the view that the U. N. O's inaction against India over the seizure of Goa, etc. questionable.

To the question, Has the U. N. O. functioned as an Instrument of Peace, L. S. Amery has answered, "The U. N. O. I fear, is a sham and a dangerous sham because it encourages the illusion that there is a world authority which can take action in preserving peace."

Wishes of Leaders

At the laying of the foundation stone for the permanent Head Quarters of the U. N., President Truman stated "These are the most important buildings in the world, for, they are the centre of man's hope for peace and a better life."

Eisenhower had remarked that "the U. N. was the living sign of all peoples hope for peace. John F. Kennedy in his inaugural address stated "To the World Assembly of Sovereign States the U. N., our last best hope in an age when the instruments of war have far outpaced the ins-
