## THE WHITE PAPER ON EDUCATION

(Memorandum to the Minister of Education  
BY A. THIAGARAJAH)

I beg to submit the following for your consideration as a means of meeting the critics half-way while retaining the essentials of your proposals. I shall therefore state the suggestions modifying your proposals in some respects.

**1. Preliminary Weeding at Std. 8:** You may request Teachers' Associations or Principals' Associations to hold a test at standard 8 on a Provincial or District basis with a uniform standard. A pupil may take this examination twice. Those who pass will enter the O/L class, and those who fail will either go to technical and practical schools or seek employment. The latter will be of the type who cannot profit even by a general education above the 8th Std. level at present. This test will be of a semi-public nature and the Department will be relieved of several difficulties. Of those who fail some may still be promoted on the basis of records and past performances. Hence your scheme or system of selection as laid down on page 12 para 35 of the Proposals should be retained and improved to supplement the 8th Std. test. Thus this test will satisfy parents, pupils, and teachers, and education in the middle forms will improve. But eventually a greater percentage must be able to seek secondary education.

**2. General Education in the O/L:** The 2 years at the O/L course should be general and wide in scope and contents. At present pupils choose 3 compulsories and 5 optionals, but instead they should choose 5 compulsories and 3 optionals. English, Mother-Tongue, Mathematics or Arithmetic, General Science and Social Studies must be meant for all, while

they may choose 3 optionals from a wide range of subjects. This would help general education up to 15 plus or O/L, and also prepare pupils for the diversification of courses after that. This device will not tamper with the schemes and syllabuses drawn for the various subjects in the O/L, but only add the necessity to draw schemes for General Science and Social Studies which are necessary to provide a General Education. The O/L will thus be a true transition from the Middle School to the A/L, or Technical Courses without causing a break at Standard 8. Diversification and specialisation become easier after the O/L than after standard 8. Thus the O/L provides a general education even for those who may eventually get diverted to technical and special courses.

**3. The G.C.E. (O/L) Examination:** The reality unit would have been weeded at Standard 8. Principals must have the power to keep back pupils who do not satisfy in five subjects at the application test. Private candidates should not be allowed for the December Examination, but examined separately in April or August. These three steps would make the O/L Examination healthy and sound, and produce at least 80% results. Examination results will be out early and studies will continue without interruption because private students will join only after results are known. As the public want to be judged by examinations it would not be wise to do away with them for the time being.

**4. Advanced Level Courses:** With improved O/L courses and examination, and stricter conditions of admission to

## Religious Festivals Should Develop Bhakthi

"Religious festivals in some Hindu temples become a farce on account of using records of indecent cinema songs amplified by loud speakers. Such songs will not be helpful to the devotees to worship God with piety and would disturb their meditation. Recital of Thevaram, Thiruvassakam' etc. should take their place. ## Navalar and His Mind

V. MUTTUCUMARASWAMY B. A.

Sri la Sri Arumuga Navalar's 87th death anniversary  
fell on 4-12-66

In the first quarter of the 19th century, the Hindus in Ceylon, had in great measure lost the ideals of their religion, nationality and language. And they had lost sight of their ancient heritage. The English rulers were oblivious of the Hindu culture, religion and the Tamil language. Came Sri la Sri Arumuga Navalar.

Navalar had two ideals. One was to raise the Shai-va religion to its pristine splendour. The second was to wield a powerful Tamil prose-style. In order to achieve these, he had some inherent good qualities, such as patriotism, love of one's religion, devotion to God, selflessness; and in achieving his ends he did not care even for his life. Above all he had intelligence of a very high order, a vast storehouse of knowledge including worldly wisdom.

He was the first Shai-vaite to establish a printing press, and publish innumerable tracts — to counter the effect of Christian propaganda. He was the first to publish ancient Tamil works such as the "Kandapuramam", "Periyapuramam", "Thiruvilaiyadat - puranam",

"Thirukkural" with the commentary of Parimalalahar. Nanool Kandihai Urai, Saiva Samaya Neri and Thiruvassagam—all of which had been in "ola" form; and which had been jealously kept by scholars and savants, removed from public gaze.

Navalar was a philanthropist in the dispensation of his riches. He did not hesitate to collect money for public purposes, but never for his own. His main idea was to establish schools (mainly Tamil) and spread Hindu religious knowledge. He wanted to do Hindu propaganda, through the Hindu temples, which he considered

a very holy ideal. He wanted to disseminate the Hindu Agamas and Dharma Shastras. He wanted the Hindus to observe Hinduism in a proper manner. Likewise he expected every religionist to follow the path of his religion fervently. He appealed to the people to help him in the work of establishing schools. He exhorted the public to buy the Tamil classical books and be familiar with them. He expounded the virtues of "Siva Deeksha". He wanted Saiva preachers who had studied Saiva Siddhantism fairly well. He wanted the Shavaitees to foregather and conduct Poojahs and festivals as enjoined by the Agamas by the help of Saiva preachers. He wanted the temple authorities to appoint "Othuvans" who could sing Devarams in a perfect manner, so that the other devotees could sing clearly.

It was due to Navalar's inspiration that there was a Tamil Sangam at Jaffna which was established in 1899 (prior to the establishment of the Madurai Tamil Sangam by Pandithurai Devar.) The Saiva paripalana Sabai, the Hindu Organ, the Inthusathanam which were started in 1889—were all ideals conceived by Navalar. The Jaffna Hindu College established in 1890 was an outcome of Navalar's vision.

Navalar wanted to establish Savings banks—to improve the economic welfare of the people.

It was he who wanted examinations to be conducted in Tamil and degrees conferred in Tamil. It will be fitting to establish a University after Navalar's name—by the Government, — which would foster Tamil and Hinduism.

Navalar never coveted anybody's wealth. He se-

LITTLE AVAIL

Two great events, the anniversaries of the passing away of the Champion Ceylonese, Sir P. Ramanathan, and the Champion Reformer of Hindus—Sri la Sri Arumuga Navalar, occur during the same month one following the other in its wake. There is a significance in this great occurrence. The people and the country to whom these peerless patriots belonged and for whom they lived perhaps require to be reminded in quick succession of the virtue of gratitude and the worth of the leaders of the past. Even this emphasis by way of the two great anniversaries being celebrated in close succession does not seem to have created the correct interpretation of the services of these two champions to the cause of Saivism.

People have become so much politically minded that they do not hesitate to interpret their religious teachers who quite appropriately happened to be their national leaders in the light of politics.

The Great Navalar was aptly described by Patriot Ramanathan as the Champion Reformer of the Hindus. The subtle indication was that his service was for Saivism. To describe the Champion Reformer as only Litterateur cannot be a correct statement. The Saiva Religion and the Tamil Language are inter-woven and inseparable. No Tamil who lived in this lovely Isle of Lanka before the advent of foreign religions could have been anybody but a Saivaite in the same sense as no Sinhalese could have been but a Buddhist. Fervent and true nationalism inspired by a sincere sense of patriotism has made many a Sinhalese Christian become Buddhist and climb to Sinhalese political leadership. Hence the

equipment and specialists are made available. The A/L course must be had in all secondary schools with O/L classes only, but only in some schools with middle forms and O/L classes.

**5. Organisation of Schools:** Most primary schools are unfit to have classes above 5th Std., while only few can have the 6th, 7th, and 8th standards. Secondary schools having the O/L classes may have the middle forms and/or A/L classes. There is great scope for economy by re-organisation and elimination of classes with small numbers. Many primary schools could be amalgamated and some bigger schools could be converted for technical and practical education.

**6. Technical Education:** Junior Technical Schools (Trades and Crafts) should provide a 4-year Course for 8th Std. leavers or 3-year course for O/L leavers, while Senior Technical Schools should provide a 4-year course for O/L leavers or a 3-year course for A/L leavers. Junior Technical Schools (Agriculture and Fisheries) should provide only a 2-year Course for O/L leavers. It is not likely that 8 Std. leavers will patronise such schools. Moreover there would not be any need to provide for Agriculture and Fisheries as an A/L Course. Separate special schools may be provided for it. Technical education must be further examined and expended paripasu with economic development.

**7. Comprehensiveness of Schools:** While the O/L will be general for all pupils entering secondary schools, the A/L Course will provide a multiplicity of courses according to the availability of equipment and specialists. It is hoped

that facilities for all the diversified courses will be provided in every secondary school in course of time with better prosperity. But meanwhile the courses will have to be distributed to various schools within the same zone. Agriculture and Fisheries require special schools for those who leave after the O/L for such a course of study, for which 2 years is enough. Otherwise, most of those who leave at 8th Std. are fit for Local Practical Schools, at O/L for Junior Technical School (Trades and Crafts and Colleges of Fine Arts, and at A/L for Polytechnics or Senior Technicals Schools. In fact the present practice is for many students to enter Junior Technical Schools after the O/L, and Polytechnics after A/L. Though in the West even technical education is part of the comprehensive school, we here cannot afford to include it as a course in the secondary school. Our secondary schools can be comprehensive to the extent of providing a general education with optional subjects in the O/L course, and of providing a diversified course at the A/L excluding that of technical and agricultural education. It is not possible to suppress the feeling of "rejection" beyond the O/L course even though it may be avoided to some extent at the Std. 8 level. At any rate it is necessary to appoint specialists in every secondary school for Music, Dancing, Art, Commerce, Home Science, Physical Education, Handicrafts, Agriculture, etc. as early as possible.

verely reprimanded those who tried to use money collected in the name of Shiva for their own sake. He fought tooth and nail to get such wealth and channelled the same in the correct direction. He renounced marriage and consecrated his whole life for the sake of his religion and language. He insisted that the Shaiva preachers should be men well conversant in grammar and literature and Saiva religious lore.

He never hesitated to suggest reforms whether it was at the temple at Nallur, or at Chidambaram where some Brahmins officiated without receiving "Siva Deeksha".

Navalar had a marvellous memory. He could compose verses, at the spur of the moment, if needed. He had good powers of repartee, his talk was invariably illuminated with wit and wisdom.

Navalar in one of his last utterances delivered at Jaffna in 1879 said:—

'Every one follows a particular religion. It is the prerogative of man to select a religion that he likes. But greater than this is for every religionist to live his religion and serve the world. Christians should love Lord Jesus and follow the principles of their religion. The followers of Islam should love Prophet Mohammed and follow the path laid by him. Buddhists should practise the golden precepts of Lord Buddha. The Shaivaites should love their faith and follow the path prescribed by Meilanda Devar and others of his school. So should the Jains, Vaishnavaites and others follow their own path. All conceptions of egoists "I" and selfish "mine" should be utterly eradicated from one's mind. The followers of one religion should not decry other religions. Shun and banish all ideas of humiliating and thinking lowly of other castes. Root out altogether differences that stem from Shastras and genealogy. Peace and good will are greater than wars that spring from differences of caste, religion, shastras and family pedigree.'

Nothing could be more inspiring or nobler than the above words of wisdom for the guidance of people all over the world and for all ages.
