THE WRITING ON
THE WALL?

The defeat at Dodangaslanda may not be construed as an indication of the view point of the voter in the Island-wide sense. However it will serve as a warning to the National Government that apart from the perorations on the platform during election campaigns great head way has to be made by the UNP in particular to persuade the people to believe that rigorous effort is being employed to cleanse the Augean stables of administration. Certainly the scarcity of groceries, cereals, clothing and other household articles cannot be defended by any Government least by a National Government.

We do not wish to embarrass the Government particularly at this juncture by painting a pathetic picture of the inefficiency of Departmental officers in handling the supply of necessities of life to the people. There is one glaring example of the absurdity of administrative planning, namely the set-up of the Co-operative Wholesale Establishment. The Co-operative Stores Societies and later the Multi-purpose Co-operative Societies have been the accepted channels of distribution of rationed articles. The coupon as a primary basis of distribution cannot be misused unless by the collaboration of all officers who are connected with its working. Why then should the Coupon be ignored and the C. W. E. chosen to

handle articles that are in short supply?

Taking the case of the supply of brown-sugar during the Pongal period this month into consideration it was seen that there had been a dubious arrangement by which the C. W. E. was directed to deal with the distribution almost ignoring the well-tryed coupon system. The queue in front of the C W E was one long-winded congregation of those who actually did not require the supply of brown sugar. The genuine consumer was kept at a distance by the ingenious working of what according to the C W E was a rigorous system of supply. The employees in shops in the Grand Bazaar area of the Jaffna City and the hangers-on who make a living, thanks to queues, were those in whose cause the C W E seemed to have sweated and toiled. Even in the working of the C. W. E. the stray consumer who fighting shy of the ignominious queue-strolled into the C. W. E. late in the afternoon expecting the atmosphere to be agreeable was crudely brushed aside by the rigorous imposition of the time limit of working hours though on special occasions such as the New Year, Thaipongal and Theepavali late hours of shopping were permissible. In one C. W. E. retail centre the clock had just struck five hours thirty minutes in the afternoon on the pre-pongol shopping day but the officer in charge of the shop taking leave of his normal duties exhibited himself on the pavement by the road side and exchanged views on current topics with his friends while the few—the very few who had just arrived at the shop for their ration of brown sugar were summarily dismissed as late-lafiffs deserving of no sympathy even during the prepongol shopping period. This is just one instance of the impudence of high-browed officers in whose inefficient hands the distribution of necessities of life has been left. The C. W. E. may exist if it must to enable some to be employed but let it not usurp the legitimate functions of the Co-operative Stores Societies.

The U. N. P. leaders must go round the country and listen to the talk of the town-folk and the rural masses. There is much to learn that way and such information will be useful to make the Party work more efficiently to clear the economic mess. Let the failure at Dodangaslanda be significant but not ominous

A Tribute to a Nonagenerian

Man

Like the waves of the ocean that sprout up with the coming into being of certain tidal conditions and ebb away with the vanishing of those conditions, so was man a limited force a tiny bubble dependent upon certain conditions, both for his origin and his disappearance. The gusts of lust and ignorance the gales of hatred and malice appear to be responsible for bringing into being the current of life. It was the atmospheric undulations that conditioned "the iceberg" that was man, in the vast ocean of Prapan-chji.

To the Darwinian, man was a product of evolution, a developed Ape. To some others man was a crystallisation of Dhuk-ka (sorrow) his birth a sob, his life a moan and his death a sigh. To the philosopher, man was a manifestation of Karmic energy and like all other forces a flux of movement.

Early Life

The late Mr. Arulampalam Sinnadurai was such a one, who came into this world in 1876, lead a fruitful life and on reaching the ripe age of 90, passed away quite peacefully, surrounded by his kith and kin. He was a six-footer, slim and stately with a towering personality during his adolescent period. With his marriage to Miss Kulanthavelu Valliammai, he took a right turn and settled down to a methodical life marked by unparalleled domestic felicity. He was blessed with 2 dutiful daughters and a serviceable son.

Unlike the average human being who got tossed about with contradictory impulses like a cork upon the Sea of Samsara in a seething turmoil of likes and dislikes, fears and hopes, he had remained unruffled and unaffected by the vagaries and vicissitudes of life.

Counsellor

As a village quire, he became a general landmark to all in distress round about Chavkacheri. Being a practical dependable man, many went to him for advice—in both legal and worldly matters while others went merely to outpour their troubles. All such persons were never turned away. In fact, their troubles became his and he saw to it that all got a

satisfactory solution to their problems or given wise counselling. These had endeared him to all, for,

"He talked with crowds and kept his virtues,
He walked with kings and ne'er lost the common touch"

To me personally, he was ever "a Guide, philosopher and friend". Although at times he violently disagreed with me as with many others, he had no animus against any. He often sizzled with sparks of humour, though he lived a purposeful life of service "filling the unforging minute with sixty second worth of distance run"

Nonagenerian

In these days when flood pre-sure, heart attack etc. claimed premature deaths, it is gratifying to note that Mr. Sinnadurai lived to be a nonagenerian, befitting almost to the last creating a record worthy of emulation by our younger folks

Last Wish

Some years ago, he had with foresight put in black and white detailed instructions regarding his funeral arrangements. He had condemned waste, pomp and show, decried superficialities des red only essentials to be accorded to him and that in all solemnity. His funeral was, therefore, conducted strictly in accordance with his wishes, though it evoked some criticism. It was marked by simplicity and solemnity, without, however, dispensing with the essentials of a decent funeral and a dignified cremation

Funeral

A good number of his grand-children headed by Mrs. Amirthalingam sang Thevarams in all piety. His relations from far and near, men and women of all rank and station, Hindus and Christians attended the funeral and paid their last respects to him

His close relatives—Mr. K. Kandasamy O. A. Jaffna Kacheri, Mr. K. Nadarajah, Proctor, Mr. M. Nallathambi, Retd. Telecomunication Engineer, Mr. N. Kandiah Retd. Health Officer and Mr. R. D. Sivaguru, Chairman Town Council—acted as Pall-bearers, as the hearse wended its way to the crematorium, where

his only son, Mr. S. Kandiah, Chief Clerk I. G. P's office lighted the funeral pyre. As the ruddy flames leapt up to the skies, the glowing sun sank below the horizon, creating a solemn, sombre atmosphere. May his soul rest in Peace! Om Shanthi!! Shanthi!!!
