Some Aspects of Mental Health

"The cause of all the troubles and social ills in society today is the failure of the educational system to place adequate emphasis on the training of children and the youth to learn to adapt themselves to the environment which according to a school of educationists is the first and last aim of education said Mr. Siva U. Somasegaram in his Presidential address at a meeting of the Institute held in the Hindu College Hall on 27th January.

Seeing the world in the true perspective is the best way to lead a happy life. False values and the hankering after the pleasures of the senses, even while one is fully conscious of the harmful effects of overindulgence are other factors that disturb the happiness of humanity and a source of many of the worries in life. The seeker after realisation and happiness should therefore seek the foundations for it in the mind and build it up in the right way, even from infancy.

The religious man believing in psychic powers, as displayed by the great leaders of religion like Buddha and Christ, considers that the Atman is the source of all powers and controls the human body while the western scientist seeks to cure the troubles by dealing with the human machinery with drugs and other external methods. Some believe and hold that even the highest of spiritual experiences could be obtained through the use of drugs and this has become a craze in western society.

The medical department tied so closely to material belief and concepts while acknowledging the power of the Atman to control the

human mind has naturally to hold, that, for the ordinary human being, the use of medicines and other physical methods like electric shocks, would be the best way to deal with certain diseases that could be attributed to mental causes.

Child care and training requires the highest of skills and study of the human mind and the human responses to the tensions in the world and society. It is therefore of great importance that parents and teachers should pay some attention to this aspect of their training for the important task of building up the nation through its children and youths, it is with the purpose of introducing this very vital responsibility that this Institute has arranged this talk today by a medical man one of our old boys and the son of a popular teacher of this College, Dr. Arulampalam who has come to Jaffna as the pioneer of this branch of medicine in this part of the country. We had our Ayurvedic physicians and our specialists who had in their own way attempted this method but they would stand no comparison to this modern scientifically trained doctor who from his younger days is reported to have taken a keen interest in this branch of medical science. He believes with us that prevention is better than cure and the wide dissemination of psychiatric knowledge and thought would go far to relieve lot of human suffering, particularly among the youths, and thereby solve many of the problems that face us today. Psychiatric clinics are held by this specialist for two days in the Jaffna Hospital, 2 days at Paloly and one day at Kankasanturai. His services should be a great boon to the country.

Sacrifice of Animals in Shrines

The Management of the Alaveddy South Shri Muttumari Amman Temple deserves the thanks of all Hindus for the great interest taken in stopping sacrifice of animals at this temple (பாலவெட்டி) which had been going on for several years.

The agitation for stopping the sacrifice of animals at this ancient shrine began some years ago but could not be effected owing to lack of co-operation among the members of the congregation.

The success of the campaign was celebrated at a public meeting held at the temple premises last week. Mr. T. Murgesampillai D R. O. Valigamam North presided. Mr. V. Tharmalingam, M. P., Senator S. Nadasarajah. Pandit S. Nagalingam and Mr. R. N. Sivapirakasam congratulated the Manager and the congregation. Shri S. Vinasithamby popularly known as 'Aruldkavi' composed songs for prayer at the shrine and the release of the composition was announced by the Chairman. Later Shri Vinasithamby gave a music discourse Mr. Shanmugathan the Manager of the Temple proposed a vote of thanks.

Ceylonese Honoured

Mrs. Sivanandam Tambyah, the Patron of the Colombo Divine Life Society and a lay disciple of His Holiness Sri Swami Sivananda Saraswathi Maharaj, the founder of the International Divine Life Movement has been appointed as a member of the Council of Management of the Divine Life Society Headquarters in Rishikesh, Himalayas, in recognition of her services to the Divine Life Movement in Ceylon.

NEED FOR NEW ENTHUSIASM

Sir,—The Old Boys of the Jaffna Hindu College should be congratulated on the frank way in which they exposed their own weaknesses in Public Associations in Jaffna. As Dr. V. T. Pasupathy mentioned in his address the tendency is for holders of posts in Tamil Associations to stick on to the posts for very long periods. It was unfortunate that only about seventy were present at this important Annual General Meeting. If fresh blood had been introduced many more would take interest in the activities of the Association. He declined to stand for any Office again. The Secretary and Treasurer followed his example. He was elected a member of the Committee and agreed to give his full co-operation to the activities of the Old Boys. Dr. K. Sivagnanaretnam was elected President and he is taking a lively interest in the activities of the Association. We hope other Societies including cooperative societies will take the learned Doctor's sane advice and get larger numbers interested in the the Societies. The O.B.A. proposes to include this new rule in its constitution.

Sacred Hindu Shrines

South India and Ceylon are well known for their famous Hindu Shrines. But it may not be known to all Hindus that sacred Hindu shrines also exist in other parts of the world. For instance a famous Hindu temple, exists at Batu Caves in Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia, which is well known to Ceylonese Hindus who had been resident in that country.

It would be heartening for us Hindus in Ceylon to know, that an ancient sacred Hindu temple exists in the African Continent. That temple is the Umbile Shree Ambalavanar Alayam, more popularly known as the Umbilo Hindu temple. It was the first Hindu temple to have been built in the African continent. The significance attached to the site of this temple (the bank of the Umbilo River at Rossburgh, urban) was that a Hindu diving casually into the Umbilo River brought up a spear resembling the "Vel" of Lord Murugan.

The original temple built in 1875 was damaged beyond repair by severe floods in 1905 and the new temple that now exists is considered to be a unique in the whole of Africa. Sculptors were brought out from India to design and construct the ornate temple.

The principal deity at this temple is Lord Nataraja, the God of Dance, including Parasakthi as Sivagama Sundari. This temple is the only temple in South Africa with the Ananda Tandava symbolism.

This temple should be a very sacred place for pilgrimage and worship for all devout Hindus, who should have deep spiritual yearnings to visit this holy shrine.

THE OCCASION DEMANDS IT— LET US OBEY

Change follows crisis and reorganisation brings about reform. This is the order of nature. Today the youth of this country have been called upon to do their duty. It is for them to respond and rise to the occasion.

The enlistment in the Land Army has not made a significant progress perhaps due to the paucity of publicity and insufficient inspiration. The educational establishments where the normal work begins with religious prayers may also supplement this invocation to God with a five-minute exhortation on the value of production of articles of food. The Village Council, the Rural Development Society, the Community Centre, the Co-operative Society and other similar organisations can by arrangement with one another organise a people's day for the village with a view to raising a local unit of the Land Army on behalf of the Government. Young men do not seem to have sufficiently appreciated the idea of compulsory service in the fields with the aid of the national weapons the plough, the hammer and the sickle which have been hitherto misused for purposes of revolutionary propaganda.

The Government Agent the Additional Government Agent and their assistants with the Divisional Revenue Officers can well get into direct touch with the people of the rural areas and make them un-

derstand for what the Land Army is being raised.

The occasion demands the mobilising of all energy, enthusiasm, talent and resources in order that the Land Army in the making will be the Peoples Pioneer Unit in the Food Front. Let us all obey the command and make Lanka once again the Granary of the Grand East.

MORE DEPOTS FOR BETTER DISTRIBUTION

It is indeed gratifying to note that the Minister of Food has, though very much late in the day, thought of turning round to the Co-operative Society for distribution of articles of food and subsidiary foodstuffs. There is however one difficulty in this arrangement. The queue cannot be shortened except by opening more Co-operative stores. Statistics can tell the Officials of the Food Department that only a limited number of coupon-holders can be supplied with their rations at one depot without being open to the continuing complaint of delays and denials in the issue of articles. We venture to suggest that the Co-operative Stores Societies can be multiplied without any additional burden on the Administration by splitting existing societies into two or even three branches. Such a step will also minimize if not entirely eradicate any tendency for corrupt practice despite the provision of disciplinary action against miscreants. Self-contained units of supply in every village will be conducive to better co-operative effort and greater willingness to become patriotic.

FREEDOM FROM FEAR

The Fourth of February may be significant to the people of Lanka from the point of view of the freedom from foreign rule that had existed for four centuries or more. But the real meaning of the change from the Colonial to the Constitutional method of Government can be understood only when the people express their views of parliamentary form of rule during the past eighteen years.

Problems have become more and more intriguing

and involved. Racial, communal, religious and other differences have become wider and wider. Why?

Government by the people is the ideal to which most countries subscribe. And Lanka too toes this lofty line of liberal views. But why do not the people inhabiting a lovely Isle with a very ancient heritage of religious and cultural enlightenment get closer and closer to the ideal of selfless service? This is a question that has to be answered by all political leaders. And this is the poser for the Fourth of February Celebrations. Have we realised freedom from fear of subjugation?

TRYING TIMES FOR TAMIL LEADERS

The political whirlwind that is blowing all over the world is also threatening to hit Lanka if not sweep it according to current indications in the Head Quarters of the different political parties. The Federal Party is confronted with the most intriguing situation as a result of its alliance with the U N. P. in the context of the interpretation of the Srimavo-Shastri Pact. The proposal to set up District Councils also has created misgivings in the minds of the leaders of the National Government. The Tamil Congress is also directly involved in these two issues but no understanding has ever been reached between the U N P. and the T C on these important questions.

The Tamil speaking people as a whole have to view the present situation in a more realistic manner with due emphasis on the need for the National Government to continue to be in power for first reshaping the economy of the country and then settling all outstanding questions on equitable terms. The times are trying and therefore we would advise the Parties and their leaders not to think aloud but to give silent thought to the pressing problems and then tell the people what their views are.

Transport Time Table

Sir,—I have read with interest your leading article in the Hindu Organ some time back suggesting that the C. T. B should publish a pocket time table describing the various routes with the code numbers and the time of departure from important towns and time of arrival at the destination.

The passengers of the C. T. B number more than a million a week and deserve to be treated with more pity. At the principal Bus stands the passengers are left to the mercy of all and sundry all owing to the lack of correct information about the movement of buses. You, sir, also suggested the installation of a micro-phone by means of which the vast numbers of passengers could be instructed about the route—numbers and time of departure. So far this has not been considered by the C. T. B. It is not enough if new buses are periodically imported. The buses that run must satisfy the needs of the travelling public. The passengers should be able to know all details about the bus service if it has to cater for them.

It is to be hoped that the Regional Office in Jaffna will help the public by supplying you with a detailed time table for publication in your journal as a news item. Reprints of the published news can be made available at the various bus-stands in the Peninsula.
