Bhagavan Sri Satya Sai Baba His Teachings

The patient who was in Vellore Hospital for 11 months with Tuberculosis and who had undergone operations in his lungs one on his tongue and whose life was critical then was able to return home within twelve days! When I called on this patient I found him smiling and full of hope. Though he was not completely cured he was fit to eat the normal food and go periodically to Vellore for his medicines. The karma he generated in earlier births was not so bad as to be neglected by Bhagavan. I had a letter from this patient last month that his present trouble is the existence of 3 sinusers at the sites of his old operations. When I saw him he was just skin and bone. Tuberculosis sinuses are chronic and as he gets stronger with more intake of nutritious food and tonics he will, I hope, get completely well. I also trust that he is getting periodically holy ash from Bhagavan. Many devotees have asked me where they could have his dharshan. He will be in his ashram for Maha Sivarathri next month. He will be in Madras from April 21st to April 25th inclusive.

The next question is how we in our present state of apparent avidya, are going to realise this great teaching. Bhagavan says that for Kali yuga the easiest method is Namasmarana, i.e. calling on God by His name e.g. call Him Shiva, 'Shiva' as many times as possible every day. Use the name of your Ishta Deity. He advises us to pray as many times as we eat in all six hours a day. Let us begin at least with a few minutes before each meal. It is this principle that is adumbrated in the Japam of the Panchachara. When we call a friend by name in a crowd, he responds, so God who is in our very heart will immediately respond. He advises us

to hold in our mind the picture of the Ishtadeva (or Him) with all the divine attributes when we do Namasmarana. He tells us that the rays of His Sukhma Sarira penetrate the entire earth while those of His Karana Sarira reach the furthest limits of the universe. By this process we can tap His Shanti, Prema, Vairagya, Viveka and Power including riches.

I have written enough to show that by our own wilful cruelty and neglect we have brought upon ourselves diseases. Similarly the cause of illusion was created by ourselves. From the day man appeared the scriptures were also given; but man set his back to the Shastras and led a life opposed to the teachings. When we are caught like a spider in its own web we shed tears wanting to know how this illusion or nescience came into being. Bhagavan's presence as an avatar is to shew man that in his innermost self he is all light, all peace, all divinity, all joy, all reality. He demonstrates to us daily his divine powers to which we are all heirs. We have forgotten our heritage. He has come to remove the evil forces of which there are many kinds; e.g. when the Communist Godless Chinese entered deep into India "A mysterious Force took them by the neck and threw them back into Chinese territory". We his devotees know that he was the mysterious divine Force; This is also one way of protecting us from evil forces. He is daily removing our inner evil anger showering grace on us. They are too numerous for this article. On every Sivarathri he brings out from his stomach Shivalingams for our sake. Thereby does he not show us that even in this very corporeal body divinity crystallises into a physical emblem of Holiness? Maya is made holy.

It is reported in the Indian Press that the French Archaeologist, Professor Dupont Sommer has discovered two inscriptions of Emperor Asoka near Kandahar in Afghanistan.

These inscriptions mention Asoka's title "Piya-darsi" in two languages and say that due to the initiative of the king, the people desisted from meat-eating and had increased their respect for father and mother and other elders.

The discovery of these two inscriptions confirms the belief that Asoka spread the message of the Buddha's Dhamma throughout his dominion, extending to Kandahar.

The substance of the inscriptions of the great Emperor who sent his daughter and son to Ceylon with the Gospel of Lord Buddha merits the fullest consideration by the people of modern Ceylon. Desistence from meat eating and respect for parents and other elders are two points emphasised by the Emperor. It is trusted that these two cardinal principles will find more acceptance among the people of Ceylon and that religious, educational and social organisations would bestow special attention thereto, and give a lead to the rest of the country.

St. Poosalar, The Architect Of The Temple Of The Heart

(A Student of St. Sekkilar)

St. Poosalar was one of the sixty-three saints mentioned in the Peria Puranam composed by the immortal poet, St. Sekkilar. He was born in a Brahmin family in a town called Thiruniriyoor in Thondai Mandalam. He was a pious devotee of Lord Shiva and was yearning to build a temple to Lord Shiva. He had no money to carry out his noble wish and nobody volunteered to help him with money to fulfil his wish. So he sat in contemplation under a holy tree and began to construct a temple in his heart. He secured the necessary materials and the workmen by his imagination and a temple was constructed in his heart according to the tenets prescribed in the Saiva Agamas. The Holy of Holies and the rest of the edifice were com-

pleted. Then he fixed an auspicious day for the consecration of the temple.

Lord Shiva wanted to let the people of the world know the piety and devotion of St. Poosalar.

A king of Kanchipuram called Kadavarkone had built a magnificent temple at Kanchipuram dedicated to Lord Shiva out of his abundant wealth and he had fixed the same day which was chosen by St. Poosalar for the consecration of his temple. Lord Shiva appeared to the king in his dream on the previous day and said "I have to be present at the consecration ceremony of St. Poosalar's temple. I would therefore request you to have the consecration of your temple on another day". The king woke up and was delighted at his dream. He proceeded to the town called Thiruniriyoor and found there was no temple. He inquired about St. Poosalar and found out where he lived. He met him and asked him where his temple was. He replied that his temple was erected in his heart. The king admired the piety and penance of St. Poosalar.

St. Poosalar performed the consecration ceremony and continued his worship of Lord Shiva in his temple of his heart where he performed all poojabs and festivals in accordance with the requirements of the Saiva Agamas. He continued his worship thus for a long time and finally obtained Eternal Bliss or Mukthi.

This inspiring account of St. Poosalar shows us that the worship of Lord Shiva in one's heart is more important and dear to Him and that this kind of worship needs no wealth and is within the reach of all and all.

Hinduism. A large number of pupils offered Hinduism as a subject and secured distinctions and credit passes. As a result of our agitation Hinduism was included in the curriculum of the G. C. E. Advanced Level classes. Schools did not take this subject up earnestly as there was no provision for it in the University courses. Hindus will be glad to note that from October 1967 provision will be made for a faculty in Hindu Culture at the Ceylon University. Students could offer this as a subject for admission to the University. If this course is popular a separate chair will be established for this subject in a few years. This will be welcomed by all members of the Tamil community. It is hoped that this subject will be in the hands of the right type of lecturers and professors - We are watching the position with interest. It is bound to give a fillip to the teaching of Hinduism in schools.

UNIVERSITY STUDENTS UNDER SEVERE STRESS

Lack of accommodation for residential purposes and lecture halls and abject living conditions seem to be scaring away students from the University of Ceylon. Heart-rending accounts of how University students have been confronted with conditions that tell on their nerves and impair their faculties of studies hit the headlines of newspapers so much that unless something is done to remedy the disgraceful situation higher education in this country would be facing a severe blow. Feeling pity for the sad plight of these students a few generous-hearted persons have volunteered to organise a University Students Fund. The gesture is laudable and deserves to be encouraged by practical response.

However, we are inclined to think that this assistance by voluntary organisations cannot in any reasonable manner offer a solution to the precarious problem of lack of provision of accommodation and suitable living conditions for the cream of our intelligentsia. Higher Education is considered to be the most important aspect in any plan for the economic liberation of Lanka. Hence the need for fully developed Universities with all necessary accessories. The National Council on Higher Education is yet engaged in taking stock of a situation that has grown beyond control during the past decade. The blame for the present conditions may rest with any body and it is unnecessary for a probe into that aspect to be made in the course of planning reforms and re-organisation.

The National Council of Education may take a hint from the suggestion of the Minister of Education that no college shall have more than one thou-

sand two hundred students on its roll. This restriction of number means the establishment of more schools and more staff. It need not be established that school going children are heavily increasing in numbers almost half yearly. The corresponding increase in the number of students who gain admission to the University demands the provision of more Universities and at different places in the Island. Universities have to be established in Jaffna and Galle almost immediately if higher education has to be saved from the obstacles and difficulties in which it is now enveloped. Seeking entry into the University is difficult, gaining it is still more perplexing; but the endeavour by successful students to compose themselves notwithstanding degraded conditions of residential accommodation and other factors for ordinary living and survive the full period of their course appears to be frightfully embarrassing.

It cannot be denied that in the context of modern University education 'residence' of students is a definite requirement. Residence Halls providing for lodging help the students very decisively as it is readily accepted that the students living in dormitories fare far better in their academic achievements than those who are confined to private housing. Students living under the same roof in residence halls will be able to contribute to the education of one another.

In American Universities there are co-operative dormitories where students form an organisation and carry on all the work connected with the maintenance of their own quarters. How far such innovations will be helpful to our students we are unable to say. This system however will reduce the cost of living and contribute to better social adjustment.

We are also reminded of the provision in the universities in foreign countries of loan funds where financial aid to students is available on easy terms. The Minister of Education who is interested in incorporating in his scheme the best of the methods that obtain in such universities will do well to examine this aspect and create loan funds which will be a more satisfactory arrangement than seeking

'gifts' from benefactors for the time being.

Pittance from philanthropists and increase of the scope of bursaries and studentships cannot bring any substantial comfort to the present batch of university students though they may be able to breathe a sigh of slight relief. The Minister of Education must take away his mind, for the moment, from his master plan for a modern scheme of education and pay instant attention to the pressing problem of establishing more universities in the Northern and Southern capitals as a preliminary step in the mighty re-organisation he has in view.

VERDICT ON THE VIRTUES OF UNIVERSAL SUFFRAGE

The mighty Union of India hailed as a symbol of democratic excellence in the art of government is in the process of electing its legislators for the Centre and the States. Multi-racial and multi-lingual, Bharat yet is the example of the integration of noble ideas and ideals that have been handed down to posterity by the preceding ages. The stupendous task of electing a Government that will reflect the inner soul of the great nation has been made more complicated and involved by the disintegration of the Indian National Congress and the Hindu Maha Maha Sabha into a number of off-shoots that by reason of their differences with the parent organisation have dared to oppose the major parties with a feeling of bitterness born of petty considerations.

The results of the General Election can be known only by stages until the entire polling has been concluded. But it is becoming increasingly clear that the future prospects of a stable government even if the ruling party can muster sufficient numerical strength are gloomy. The allegations and counter-allegations of party leaders when analysed betray the existence of an undemocratic trend in the political parties. This is certainly a recent development. Leadership in the accepted sense of democratic conception will be absent. Faith in the capacity and capability of any leader cannot be prominently seen. What will be the result of this dis-

Indian Elections

The General Elections in India are naturally engaging very great interest among all sections of the people of Ceylon. As is felt and has been expressed, the trend of events and the outcome of the elections in India will have their influence on the political ideology of our own people and on our national affairs. Without presuming to refer to the outcome of the election results in terms of the success or failure of parties, it is desirable to draw the attention of the people in Ceylon to some important features. One relates to the working of Democracy in India. To take a pessimistic view of a few incidents that are occurring in such a vast country like India with a population of about five hundred millions and the biggest number of Voters in the world—viz: two hundred and fifty millions, is not warranted taking all circumstances into account. A balanced view of the state of things is expressed by a discerning and fair minded foreign observer namely Mr. John E. P. Grigg (formerly Lord Altrincham). His views are contained in the following report in the Hindu of February 12th.

"Mr John E. P. Grigg (formerly Lord Altrincham) said here yesterday that he was impressed by the *vitality of Indian democracy*. For that matter no democracy in the world is perfect", Mr. Grigg who has just completed a three-week tour of India, said in an obvious reference to an article in the London Times that "so far as the India democracy is concerned I will very boldly say

Let us wait for a graphic study of the full results in the background of policies, past and present of the various parties and scan the statistics for a direct answer to the question about the value of the vote.

that far from the present elections being the last one in India, it would be nearer the truth to say that it is the first in the sense that because the actual working of the Constitution had necessarily suffered owing to the fact that one party and one individual (Jawahar Lal Nehru) was so overwhelmingly powerful until now."

Referring to the violence at election meetings in India, he said this was not something peculiar to this country alone. Violence took place in the U. K. and the U. S. also. Mr. Grigg said violence took place in the U. K. during the last two general elections there and Prime Minister Wilson, his predecessor Sir Alec Douglas-Home had worse experience. Some one, he said spat on Mr. Wilson's face at a meeting during the last general election in the U. K. and Sir Alec was shouted down. And in America two years ago, a President was struck by something much more lethal than the stone or tomato bomb", he added. He said he was struck by the orderliness of the election campaign in India.

With regard to the position of Mrs. Indira Gandhi, it is very illuminating to note what revered Sri Rajagopalachariar, the most outstanding opponent of the Congress Party, of which Mrs. Gandhi is leader, says: Mr. Rajagopalachariar in an interview recently expressed the view that he was prepared to accept Mrs. Gandhi as the next Prime Minister of India. Such an expression of opinion by one political leader regarding the leader of a rival political party is unique and unheard of in the annals of Democracy. Such breadth of view and regard for the personality of an opposing leader augurs very well for the future of Democracy and good Government not only in India but also in the whole world, whilst the compliment itself redounds to the credit of both leaders, and also to the high quality of Indian leadership.
