A PEOPLE AND THEIR LANGUAGE

In view of the interest I have mentioned above shown in the language should disappear. Nehru in his book "Glimpses of World History" written to his daughter, has observed "when the Aryans entered India, India was already civilised.... It is clear that the Dravidians had a rich civilisation than in Southern India and perhaps also in Northern India. Their languages, which are not the daughters of the Aryan Sanskrit, are very old and have given literatures. These languages are Tamil, Telugu, Kanarese and Malayalam. All these languages still flourish in India. Perhaps you know that the National Congress, unlike the British Government, has divided India on the basis of languages. This is far better as it brings one kind of people speaking one language and generally having similar customs into one provincial area. The Congress provinces in the South are the Andhra Desha or the Andhra Province in Northern Madras, where Telugu is spoken, Tamil or the Tamil Province where Tamil is spoken, Karnataka, which is South of Bombay and where Kannada or Kannarese is spoken and Kerala which corresponds roughly with Malabar, where Malayalam is spoken.

There can be no doubt, that in future provincial divisions of India a great deal of attention will be paid to the language of the area.

Hindustanis is understood in most parts of India. It is likely to become the common language of India. But this of course does not mean that the other principal languages, which

With regard to the stone throwing incident, it is very doubtful whether the stone that hit Mrs. Gandhi was really meant for her. Mrs. Gandhi's popularity is such and the respect and affection of the people for her is such that the stone could not possibly have been meant for her; it was evidently meant for others. She received the stone with characteristic dignity and courage. Nothing else could have been expected from her, the daughter of Jawaharlal and Kamala Nehru and the son of the Nehru family. About three days ago, the Indian Press published a letter from Mrs. Sarojini Naidu to Shri Jawaharlal Nehru written 30 years ago, parts of which run as follows:

"I cannot wish you the conventional good gift. I do not think that personal happiness, comfort, leisure, wealth and such normal assets of the ordinary man and woman can have much place in your life. What the patriot poetess of India wrote about the father applies equally well to the daughter, the noble Prime Minister of India, who is handling undauntedly one of the most difficult problems and situations in the world ever handled by any political leader at any time in history.

Irrespective of the measure of success or failure that befalls the contending political parties the trend is that an India more democratized puri-

fied and strengthened will emerge as a result of and out of the present elections, better equipped to look after herself internally and also to contribute still more fruitfully towards the "evolution of a better world", of which its Sage President Dr. Radhakrishnan spoken recently with fond expectation, and which has been the pious aim of her leaders, at all times through its remarkable and noble history; Ceylon too by reason of its close ties ought to derive benefit therefrom.

TV to Detect Street Crime

A unique system to check crimes in the streets by use of a television camera made its debut recently.

The "anticrime TV" camera attached to a tall pole or tower is designed to cover a radius of 50 metres with the remote control system and transmit the picture to a television set at a nearby police box.

Policeman can soon rush to the scene of a crime picked up by the television camera.

An Osaka Prefectural Police spokesman said that the television camera could replace about 50 policemen on patrol.

Seven such TV cameras were set up in Kita and Minami — Osaka's two busiest areas.

This system also features equipment for video tape recording and night shooting.

The "crime prevention television" costs you 2,500,000 for one set, which equals to the cost of two police patrol cars.

INCONGRUITY IN INDIAN ELECTIONS

Now that a complete picture of the final position of parties in the Lok Sabha and the Assemblies of the various States of India is available we are able to comment on the trend of Indian politics in relation to the high tradition that had been built up by All-India leaders of un-impeachable integrity and praise-worthy patriotism. In a cosmopolitan country with four hundred millions of people and numerous creeds, the democratic method of election to the Parliament at the Centre and to the Assemblies in the States is certainly fraught with the danger of incongruity. This aspect has been conclusively proved in the 1967 Elections though during the previous Elections during the first fifteen years of Independent rule the voters had exercised their decision on the orthodox democratic pattern. The ruling party has managed to retain its hold on the Administration of the Union though as many as ten parties of various political persuasions had organised their common opposition merely to oust it from power. The task was not in keeping with the best technique of democratic decency and rightly failed to succeed. The Swatantra, the Jan Sangh, the Communist, the D. M. K. and the Socialist parties even in their combined might could not gather a reasonably sound numerical strength to command the respect of political observers. What is worse is that not a single party so far has been able to collect one tenth of the total number of Lok Sabha seats or one fifth of the numerical strength of the Congress. And the irony of the present Indian trend of political discussion is such that these parties having no All-India backing yet

aspire to leadership at the Centre.

No doubt the incongruousness of the present situation is indicated in the failure of the Congress to secure the support of the major states, Tamil Nad, Kerala, the U. P., West Bengal, Orissa and Bihar. The Tamil Nad has acquired great significance and the D. M. K. has earned prominence and won power. No other party has been able to secure sufficient strength to rule any State. In our editorial of last week we put the question about the value of the vote and wished to wait for an answer from the voters themselves of India. The problem has been solved but the answer is more involved than the question itself. The Jan Sangh a right wing party, the successor to the Hindu Maha Sabha, could not win a single seat in the Tamil Nad though it had put forward twenty two candidates; why? This party was for Hindi and against the anti-Hindi agitation of the South. The Swatantra Party owes its strength to the Maharajahs and Princes of the North. Its leader Sri C. Rajagopalachari is neither for Hindi nor for other Indian Languages but for English. This party is not heard of in the Maharashtra, the Kerala the Punjab and Kashmir. Both the Jan Sangh and the Swatantra are opposed to the Communist ideology and yet what a sitting together of strange bed-fellows! What is the purpose of this astounding alliance? Is it the protection of the people or the propelling of minor parties. Of greater concern is the emergence of the China Wing Communist Party in some strength. That there can breathe in the democratic climate of Bharatha which is the target of Communist China's threatened invasion a single China-wing Communist is not merely a confounding incongruity but also a menacing portent. The Praja Socialist Party which came into the political arena much earlier backed by stalwart political champions such as Acharya Kripalani has been pushed away from the table of priority by Communal and Communist Parties.

The Congress has been castigated; cramped and crippled; but the crown at the Centre is still with this mighty political party that has a brilliant background of heroic achievements of hundreds of world-reputed leaders and thousands of martyrs. The out-side world began

to admire India through the doughty leaders and dedicated campaigns of this party. However the party could not escape committing the blunder of remaining at the helm of activities for twenty long years. The scramble for power within its own ranks has disintegrated it. The Anti Hindi agitation of the South and the Ban-Cow Slaughter brigades of the North conveniently aided by student movements succeeded in creating a political stir of sufficient impact. Single-handed the Congress withstood the full face of the multi-pronged attack of the combined Opposition; it did not capitulate it continues to be the only all India Party of considerable strength. There is no other All India Party worthy of mention.

The verdict is plain, the vote is losing its value. This tragic trend can be arrested and that only by the Congress.

D. M. K. DEMONSTRATES ITS STRENGTH

Even if it be in the first flush of fervent enthusiasm as a result of resounding triumph in the General Election, the statement of the Leader of the Dravida Munetra Kalagam that in Tamil Nad his party by reason of its ruling power would tighten total prohibition and introduce legislation for the banning of racing has captured the imagination of all political observers in Lanka. This trend of thought is a welcome diversion and deserves to be applauded. Though we refuse to believe that Shri C. N. Annadurai, the dynamic leader of the D. M. K. will be able to keep his pre-election promise of three measures of rice for the rupee yet we are confident that the post-election suggestion about the war against the evils of drink and dice would receive legislative approval. The D. M. K. which had its roots deeply embedded in the disturbing features of anti-Brahmin agitation and other similar sectarian issues, has now come of age and therefore has rightly given up its demand for the creation of a separate Dravidian State. This party has exchanged places with the Congress in strength and power in the Tamil Nad Assembly and enjoys the pride of being the only
