## TAMILS AND SINHALA

In the course of the proceedings in Parliament as recently reported in the Press, Mr. Felix Dias Bandaranaike, M. P. has stated that the S L F. P. while desiring that opportunities be made available to Tamils to study Sinhala, his party does not wish to force the language on the Tamils. This is a reasonable and fair attitude. I believe that the U. N. P. also holds in effect a similar view. Moreover most Sinhalese, whether they belong to political parties or are independents appear to be of the same opinion. Mr. Felix Dias Bandaranaike has also referred to the enlightening example of an important Tamil lady, the representative of two distinguished Tamil families, the Hensman family and the Senathirajah family, who has acquired good knowledge of Sinhala and who is serving the State in an important capacity in the Ministry of External Affairs. The reference is to Miss Naganathan, the talented daughter of one of Ceylon's political leaders, Dr. Naganathan, M. P., who is holding the high position of President of the Federal Party.

Many Tamil parents would like their children to acquire similar knowledge of Sinhala as Miss Naganathan has done and many students also would have the same aspiration.

It is trusted that Sinhalese, Tamil and Muslim leaders would put their heads together and devise ways and means of enabling non-Sinhala students to acquire a sound knowledge of Sinhala as an additional language.

It is heartening that Tamil leadership has acquiesced in Muslims being given the opportunity of studying Sinhala. The leadership has also similarly acquiesced in the Indian Tamil population being given the opportunity to study Sinhala in addition to Tamil. A greater responsibility for the Tamils of Ceylon to study Sinhala from the national, political, cultural and social

point of view lies with them.

It is trusted that leaders of the three communities Sinhala, Muslim and Tamil not necessarily confined to the Parliamentarians would take early steps to get the right and statesmanlike thing done in the right manner. There is talk about Ceylon being getting divided. One way to avoid division is to enable one community to know the language of the other. However, as a Tamil, I do not wish to suggest in the present atmosphere charged with emotion and misunderstanding that Sinhalese could also well study Tamil. My own personal view for about fifty-five years from the time of my school days on coming to Colombo has been that a Ceylonese, be he Sinhalese, Muslim, Burgher, or Tamil could with advantage to himself or herself and the country try to study and know the three languages in use in Ceylon, Sinhala, English and Tamil. But even for propagating a right view, a right moment must present itself. The present, it is sad to say, is not the right moment. Hence it is desirable to wait and in the meanwhile Tamils could well follow Miss Naganathan's statesmanlike and practical example. She would not have studied Sinhala if she had even the remotest fear that the safety of the Tamil language or the dignity and self respect of the Tamil people would be jeopardised. I am referring to Miss Naganathan's case as a precedent in support of a principle.

### The Genesis of Thiruthondathokai

(GANESHAN)

Thiruthondathokai is a collection of eleven hymns sung by St. Suntharar in praise of the congregation of saints who devoted their entire life towards the service of Lord Shiva and were found in the assembly hall known as Thevasiriya Mandapam at Thiruvarur. He once entered the temple of Thiruvarur having noticed these saints and prayed fervently to Lord Thiagarajah, the presiding deity of Thiruvarur temple. His heart was full of ecstasy in the presence of the Lord Thiagarajah whose lotus feet overcame Yama the god of death on behalf of St. Markandar filled with rapture every heart of his sincere devotees enlightened them dispelling their ignorance; lent light to all luminous bodies and were invisible to Vishnu. St. Suntharar then requested a boon, 'Oh Lord, I wish very much to be a servant of these saints assembled in the Thevasiriya Mandapam'.

Lord Thiagarajar then made St. Suntharar realise their wisdom and love of God more and more and requested him to sing hymns in praise of them. St. Suntharar said 'Oh Lord I do not perceive in full their greatness. How can I sing hymns in their praise? Then Lord Shiva suggested the following words 'திருவாரூர் தலம் அடி யார் சேருமாடு தேன்' and requested him to start his hymns using them just as he had suggested to him the words "திந்தி" to sing hymns in His praise at Thiruvennai Nallur. So St. Suntharar composed his hymns which are eleven in number and are known as Thiruthondathokai.

This collection of hymns entitled Thiruthondathokai is of great importance to the Saiva faith. One who chants these hymns piously shall enjoy all wealth in this life and enjoy eternal bliss when one departs from this world. One of

St. Suntharar sings in these hymns that he is a servant to each of the individual saints and to the nine groups of saints known as (தேவசிரியா) Thokai Adiyar. This Thiruthondathokai teaches us the noble lesson that the worship of the sincere devotees of Lord Shiva will grant us all kinds of bliss in this world and the next, for each of them is a replica of Lord Shiva.

The worship of Shiva Bhaktas is also stressed by St. Meykandar in the twelfth sutram of Sivagnana Bodham.

Sivagnanias will uproot the Malas (Anavam, Kamam and Maya) which tend to keep them away from the Lord's feet and will associate with other Sivagnanias (or lovers of God or servants of God). They will also worship Sivathondars and temples as God Himself. They will sing and dance with joy fearing none with the firm belief that they are the servants of God.

CHOSEN TO CONTINUE

Shri Kamraj Nadar, the President of the All India Congress Party, notwithstanding the surprise setback he had received in his own constituency, maintained his hold on the Congress by effecting the election of the Leader of the Congress Parliamentary Party nem con. To the great disappointment of some of the Opposition Parties (not the D. M. K.) Shrimathi Indra Gandhi was unanimously chosen to continue leadership and this resolution was proposed by Shri Moraj Desai himself who it was reported earlier was himself standing for election as Leader. The D. M. K. however, has been from the very moment of its massive triumph advocating the leadership of Shrimathi Indra Gandhi.

The Congress Parliamentary Group must have given serious thought to the bitter lesson learnt at the battle of the ballot and resolved to compose differences within the organization. The huge task of rebuilding the battered Congress is now item No 1 for the Congress leadership.

The New Cabinet must set about the himalayan task of bringing about sufficient understanding between the Centre and the provincial capitals with a view to proving the capacity of India to maintain her position in international affairs. Several outstanding leaders have failed to be re-elected to the Lok Sabha

and have consequently weakened the worth of the ruling party. However, in a crisis the co-operative contribution by every single member of the party must be marshalled in the major interest of the motherland and a new standard of ministerial capabilities must be set up.

DECISION AT DEVINUWARA

Feelings reached the highest peak of party consciousness just before the hour of polling at devinuwara indicating that the present trend lay in the resoluteness of the opposing camps to retain their hold on the electorates that had voted in their favour at the General Election in March 1965. The result was, therefore, a re-iteration of the decision at the General Election, a confirmation which denied to the contending party the pleasure of the pride of dislodging the defending party. The sum total of the inferences from the decisions at the six by-elections after the General Election merely indicates that the people's verdict in 1965 stands confirmed beyond any doubt. Here is a point for general satisfaction that the people have a strong sense of the value of the vote and cannot be easily swayed by the results of election petitions. The Youth whose inclusion in the electoral lists after the General Election has swelled the voting strength have however not shown that much of enthusiasm for the U. N. P. as was evidenced in March 1965. This is a development that must give the U. N. P. leadership much food for thought.

FUNDAMENTALS OF A FREE PRESS

The Minister of State, Mr. J. R. Jayawardene, waxed eloquent when at the Asian Newspaper Conference which was held at Kandy last week he declared that he and therefore the National Government did not believe in suppressing the Free Press and described the freedom of the individual in Lanka as a lofty tradition that had enabled the people choose their Government according to the needs of the nation. We certainly agree with the Minister in his contention that the Press has played a reasonable role in shaping the affairs of this country and is therefore entitled to the right of freedom of expres-

sion unhampered by restraining regulations. However we also wish to point out that the Press has a duty of its own to maintain the prestige of freedom by examining its own affairs in the light of the views of the people. It cannot be denied that a code of conduct for journalists has to be outlined by common consent particularly in the matter of reporting news and proceedings of meetings, conferences and even trials in Courts of Law. There is a general opinion prevailing among the readers of journals that unnecessary emphasis is being placed on events that when reported tend to create the impression that the mischievous mind is being carefully catered for.

The right to enjoy freedom of expression necessarily implied the existence of a duty on the part of the Press to educate the people and leaders on the correct and dignified ways of living and fulfilling the responsibility of citizenship. The Press must not merely reiterate this fundamental conviction but also indicate to the reading public how it is being translated into action.

VIOLENCE THE VOGUE

The dastardly activities of the disturbing elements that bring up the rear of any election campaign seem to be acquiring a certain amount of implied approval everywhere in the world. In India the wildest of wicked demonstrations threatened to nullify the General Election this year. In our country the unscrupulous among the supporters of rival candidates appear to have taken a hint from the mischief makers across the waters and resorted to rowdyism in the Devinuwara electorate despite the net work of police arrangements.

Even in the sphere of sport the harmless fun of a few years ago has taken a dangerous turn often descending into the low depths of depravity of mind. Provoking laughter may be a harmless pastime; but where the school—boy revellers run riot and precipitate a precarious situation that demands the intervention of the Police, the complication must be promptly handled.

Sport is a requirement because of its usefulness for the training of the youth physically and mentally. Sportmanship is first cultivated in the
