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SWAMY YOGAR

A Radio Talk given by
DR. T NALLANATHAN
on 22 - 3 - 67

To one who considers one self as the physical body the world looks murky, dark and beyond hope of redemption. Life becomes miserable; like the animals in the jungle it becomes a question of the survival of the fittest. Might is right; there is no considerable joy in living, especially for the poor man. But when one looks upon one-self as soul or spirit wearing the physical body as a coat life looks very different. It must not be mere intellectual conception as is the case with most of us. It must be a realised conception put into daily practice. So one day the writer asked Swamy Yogar if he felt himself as the soul all the 24 hours of the day. Right straight came the answer "yes", "Even if I am out into a thousand pieces I will feel myself as the soul". This spontaneous outburst showed his spiritual experience and it went right into my being. It is constant association with such great realised souls that will bring the necessary transformation in us. No amount of study can do that. With the educated it is all intellectual understanding without an iota of practical living. In his living one could clearly see that he did not identify himself with his body. For example when he refers to past incidents in his life he would do so without the slightest emotion. Once a well known Jaffnese had him (Swami) insulted by a thug, but whenever he returned to that gentleman he would do so with the same affection and regard that he would give to a devotee of his. He would refer to his visits to Ramana Rishi in the most detached way. He would say that he went there, stood for a few minutes, that there was nothing to be spoken, that Ramana Rishi did not look at him and that he returned soon after.

He would not dogmatically stick to his views on

the burning question of the day. For example on the question of Harijan entry into temples he sincerely held the view that they should not, but later he changed and blessed the efforts of the writer when he opened the Saddanatha Swamy Temple to the Harijans in 1954. It is interesting to note that the late Sir Waitialingam Duraiswamy also changed his views when his Guru changed.

In his early years he did rigorous sadhana. In every week he would spend 3 days, 3 nights in Samadhi. The 4th day he would descend into waking consciousness, take a meal and move with religious people for a few hours; the next 3 days and 3 nights he would again go into Samadhi. He spent many years in this way till he attained God consciousness, which lasted continuously for 6 months. In this state the whole world was an open book. Before a devotee would enter the compound he would give the answer to the mental question which the devotee had not expressed. He was full of celestial joy. Sorrow was unknown. Sri Ramakrishna Paramahansa also had a six month continuous God consciousness but most of the time the Paramahansa was dead to the outer world. A Sadhu had to come and feed him. Here there was no such contingency. If he felt hungry he would accept food. In 1922 when the Swami related these experiences to the writer he had already given up the rigid sadhana. As a result of his attainment of Samadhi he developed, we presume the 8 Siddhis, many of which he demonstrated to those worldly of them. I shall cite a few— He could be in more than one place at a time. I shall give two instances. One evening a young Sannyasin was with

him for a long time. Though Swamy Yogar was seated in the the ashram he had apparently gone to a nearby householder and requested him to prepare a dinner for the Sannyasin. After the meal was ready the householder went to the ashram to pick up the Sannyasin.

A 2nd instance is as follows:— 4 young devotees went in a car with Yogar Swami from the Ashram to Tellipalai to have a lunch at a Christian teacher's house. However after an hour the Swamy sent 2 of these devotees to his Colombogam Ashram in the same car, and half an hour later the Swami himself went to the ashram and attended to the devotees who were waiting for him. After about two hours the Swamy sent them all away, one of these two devotees was in his Tellipalai printing Press at about 4 p.m. when he saw Swamy Yogar and the other two devotees returning to Colombogam in a car. So he made enquiries the next day and found that Swamy Yogar did not leave the Christian teacher's home earlier than 4 p.m.

One explanation of such a phenomenon is that the Sukshma Sarira leaves the owner who apparently sleeps and at the new destination it is made to materialise into a physical body by force of will. Swamy Yogar told the

SICKENING FOR THE SICK

It cannot be denied that the Jaffna General Hospital has grown several fold in space and scope during the last decade. As the principal institution for medical and surgical treatment in the North patients seek attention there in large numbers and the medical authorities are unable to cope with the demand. Thus a big problem has been created for the patients and the physicians as to how the conditions of medical and surgical treatment can be made more congenial to the sick and the infirm. Day in and day out it is being freely said that the conditions and circumstances in which the patients who are admitted to this Hospital receive treatment are simply sickening, capable of making the sick worse and those parents and relations who visit the patients themselves feel indisposed.

There is only one feeling of relief, the availability of talented and specialist Doctors. But the sick are not always privileged to enjoy the advantage of this efficient medical attention owing to the red-tapism that obtains at this institution. They who are in immediate charge of admitting patients and finding them beds seem to constitute themselves as a distinct group of dictatorial officers, arrogating to themselves powers that have never been delegated to them by the proper authorities. We refer to the subject of bed accommodation for those admitted for treatment. Admission not merely implies but also carries with it the obligation of the authorities to find the necessary accommodation in the wards. No patient who has been assigned a bed

can be ordered or compelled to vacate his or her seat before he or she has been ordered to be discharged from the Hospital by the competent authority. The nurses and the attendants who are charged with and trained for the care of the sick and the decrepit by the very nature of their duties cannot assume the role of administrative officers and coerce patients to surrender their beds for those admitted later. Patients cannot be classified into grades according to their adaptability to conditions of sleeping on the cemented floor along the corridors open to the danger of being trampled on by those who frequently use the passage. More than the provision of remedial substances the care and the attention a patient must receive at the Hospital go a great way in the curing of diseases. If a patient has sufficiently benefitted by attention at the Hospital and could continue the treatment as an out door patient he or she must be discharged and not relegated to the rough and tumble treatment at the feet of those who walk hither and thither on the floor of the ward. Everyone knows that there are more patients than beds in Hospitals but that does not mean that patients should be subjected to the indignity of inferior attention and that at the unauthorised demand of nurses accommodation is a problem as much as the insufficiency of drugs and other medical needs. Certainly the problem cannot be abandoned as beyond solution. Doctors have a duty to perform by their patients, and primarily their obligation is to make the patients at least mentally satisfied that he or she is being attended to.

There is the Hospital Committee which meets occasionally to pass a few resolutions and more specifically to discuss the extant aspect of how minutes of meetings and records of proceedings should be kept and in what language. The matter is not merely for the Hospital Committee, it is for everyone who feels he is a human being. Members of Parliament, Societies, and Committees must therefore discuss with the authorities the question of making the Hospital fit for patients to seek treatment and put forward short-term and long-term proposals. Doctors, their assistants and Members of Parliament would do well to enter the Hospital as 'mock' patients

writer that he does not use this method. On the other hand he projects himself.

This theory of projection is applicable in the following instance. Swamy Sankara Suppiar was returning one night after a Kathaprasangam in Ellalalai by car. There was a little rain and the car skidded and ran head-long against a tree. Suddenly he saw a flash of light which stopped the force of the impact almost completely. There was just a little bending of a mud-guard and the buffer. Just at that time Swamy Yogar from his ashram was hinting at this accident to a devotee (a proctor) from Nallur who was asked by Yogar to see Swamy Sankara Suppiar in the latter's ashram in Nallur.

He healed the diseases of many of his devotees by spiritual means. He once developed a malignant cyst in his chin. On examination under the microscope it was found to be cancerous. He healed it completely by his yogic power, the cure was so quick and complete that many devotees do not know if he ever suffered from a cancerous growth.

When he had a fracture of the neck of the Femur

and subject themselves to the ordeal of sleepless nights beneath the beds of patients and along the byways (corridors) Cannot some flash of thought occur to them in those agonizing circumstances that the conditions now obtaining at the Hospital require remedying forth-with? Will not that light of experience dawn on them and make them suggest improved conditions—say provision of broad benches along the corridors away from the feet of passers-by for patients who cannot enjoy the luxury of a bed? The question whether a patient who has gained admission and a bed can be summarily ordered or compelled by anybody not merely the minor staff to vacate his or her seat for accommodating another remains to be answered by the authorities. What will be the position if the patient obstinately refuses to budge from the bed? Discharge is the only remedy!

we medical men are not surprised that the two ends would not unite. His age was, in our opinion, the cause of the non union. But to a Yogi who could cure cancer it ought to be quite easy to make the bones young. The late Sir Wytialingam Duraiswamy told the writer that by mixing too freely with house-holders he had come down one step. That is the explanation for his not having been able to make the two fractured ends unite.

Yogar Swamy selected a few of his very devoted followers and looked after their welfare both temporal and spiritual. Such are called Ankita children. For example a school boy was very poor in one subject that he became proficient in it and passed the examination creditably. After leaving school he applied for a job. There were many applicants. The Swamy advised him not to despair and he got the job. After he was married the Swamy requested a rich devotee of his to lend him enough money to buy a plot of land and build a small house. The money was paid back in easy instalments without interest. He had shown similar token of love to elderly devotees also. Sir Wytialingam Duraiswamy was extremely devoted to him. When he contested the Speakership against Sir Gerard Wijeyekoon there was a keen contest; just before the election the Swamy called on me and after being silent for a few minutes put on the switch of the light in the drawing room. We immediately asked him if it was a sign that Sir Wytialingam had won. He smiled. On ringing up the Parliament House we found it to be true. The members of Sir Wytialingam's family looked upon him as their family deity. I have given only two instances where he had helped in temporal matters also. There are many such cases. That is why such a large number bemoan his loss.

He was a great yogi, who wrote in his book 'Natchintanai' that he knew nothing of yoga! He could raise his Kundalini Shakti to the highest chakra viz. Brahma, Raandra or Sahasrara at will. When Swamy Sankara Suppiar was return-

ing to Jaffna after 12 years' training as a Sannyasin in India, he suddenly saw a beam of light falling on his face at Pallai. The strangest point was that the light was being focussed on him right through his journey by train. He instantly knew it was the work of a great Yogi, who he thought was unknown to him. When he was nearing the the Jaffna station he saw the beam of light emanating from the Ajna Chakra of Swami Yogar who was standing on the road by the side of the railway crossing. When he went to India he never suspected that Swami Yogar was so great. Ever since he looked upon Yogar as an avatar of God. On another occasion in the middle of the night he saw Yogar raising the Kundalini not only to Sahasrara but about 20 feet above his head. It was seen as a golden yellow column of light; incidentally it must be observed that the ordinary man cannot see it. Either the man must be himself used to yogic practices or the guru must temporarily give that divine vision to see it.

Though Swami Yogar has passed away, he is not dead. He is very active now even more so than before. I may be pardoned for the narration of the following; about a year before his mahasamadhi he told me "Because I am, this light burns" pointing to the light in the Ashram I asked him to demonstrate it "because I had heard him tell me that at will he could make an electric bulb glow or fade. But that day he seemed to have been unable to do so. As I said earlier he had come down a step. It was a sad episode that his devotees forced him by their devotion to eat solid food at night. It was against his yogic way of life. However, to continue the narrative the Swami woke me up some months after his mahasamadhi at midnight by clasping my ankles with his two hands and then made my bedroom bulb glow or fade by his will power. The details of the incident are avoided for want of space. Such is the great love he bears towards his devotees. Ever when he was alone he liked to give his initiation during the so-called sleeping hours when the Guru and disciple were many miles apart even as many as 250 miles. Only those who had such initiation can bear testimony to it.
