PALLIS AND PALLAR

Sir.—I have read the as agriculturists and letters of Mr. C. Sivaratnam and Mr. C. Nagalingam which appeared in your issues of 30th ultimo and 14th instant. I have just a few comments to make on the former. His letter appears to follow the conclusions arrived at by Rajanayaga Mudaliyar. He however states that the first batch of Vannians came to Ceylon during the time of Kulakkodan, rightly said to be a Cholan Prince. He does not give the time, but according to Rajanayaga Mudaliyar it was circa 436 A. D. my view is that the Vanniyar, horsemen (vanni=horse) Generals, Sub-kings, came to Ceylon as mercenaries during the period of the Naga Kings who ruled Jaffna and N. W. Ceylon during the Vijayan and subsequent period also and as mercenaries in the Cholan Armies of the pre and Christian eras and settled down in the Northern Province, Trinco. District. The Raja-Wanni, the Wanni-Hathpattas and the Demala-Hathpattas (hath=seven) in the N. W. Province. They also must have come with Vijaya's Pandyan Queen, her Ladies in waiting and their families, the Noble Ladies intended for the 700 followers of Vijaya, and their Ladies-in-waiting and their families, 'Kottis' of Nagas are said to have welcomed the Buddha when he came to settle a dispute between two Naga (Deva) Kings. I cannot believe that the North became a barren waste; before the rule of the Arya Chakkrawarthies of Jaffna. Prince Kulakkodan must have employed the Vanniar and the other people in developing the Tambalagam District west of Konesar Temple into beautiful groves and extensive paddy fields. The Cholians at that time were an Imperial Power and did not go to countries conquered by them.

Regarding the Pallar, Mr. Sivaratnam states that the Pallar came along with the Vellalas from the Chola Kingdom during the time of the Arya Chakkrawarthies. The Pallar became Vanniar in the process of centuries. This is admitted by Mr. C. Nagalingam also—vide his rhyme. I therefore state that what is said about the Vanniar applies to the Pallar also. Pallar and Pallias (Palla women) are referred in the ancient pallus of Jaffna viz. Kanagarayan Pallu, Paralai, Vinayagar Pallu, Karavai (Karaveddy) Velan Pallu, Vaddukkodai Pallu, Kathirgamap Pallu &c. Nagan is a name common among the Pallar. They have contributed Nahan and Vannian to our Siddha Medicine. I am beginning to wonder whether they are not a Naga tribe. Mr. Sivaratnam is right when he states that Pallar are not adimai but kudimai, tenants not slaves. The Vellalas who had palla tenants were considered better in Jaffna.

Mr. Sivaratnam says that kovilar, those who worked in the Hindu Temples destroyed by the Portuguese became Koviar. This may be true of Trincomalee District. I wonder whether there are any Koviar in Trincomalee. As far as Jaffna is concerned, the kovilar are Sinhalese goyas who became 'captives', 'wabaloes', and who in recent times became free Tamils. Tamil captives in the South became Sinhalese freemen.

Regarding Mr. Nagalingam's letter, I have stated above that Prince Kulakkodan came to Ceylon circa 436 A. D. He is not one of the Cholan Viceroy of the eleventh century, A. D. Rajanayaga Mudaliyar's Ancient Jaffna which he has had for forty years must have helped him to find out

The Shiva Temple of Indonesia

It has ever been the pride of the Indonesians who to this very day proclaim that even in this modern time, no nation can match the skill, such as we see at Prambanan. Since 1918 the Archaeological Service of Indonesia has been busy restoring the colossal central temple of Shiva by the system whereby each and every stone that is lying fallen near the temple or has been carried away by the village folk has to be collected, photographed and jigsawed into its appropriate placement by a painstaking and thorough study of the joinings, chisel-marks, the depicted legends and stylistic patterns. By December 1953 the reconstruction of the main Shiva temple was completed—a marvel of archaeological engineering.

In the Prambanan complex, Hindu-Javanese art reached the culmination of its florescence. In largeness of conception and daring in composition it surpassed all former creations. The 224 peripheral temples reach an imposing height of 45 feet and represent the 224 universes of the cosmological system of the Shaiva Siddhanta according to Bhuvanakosha. I was able to obtain a palmleaf manuscript of this Bhuvanakosha from a learned Brahmin at Denpasar (Bali.) While these peripheral temples may correspond to the Chakravada mountains, the eight temples in the inner court may be the eight pinnacles of the Manasa mountains. Though a precise interpretation awaits research, it is certain that the temples and sub-temples reflect the cosmography of intuition, the symbolisation of the infinite possibilities of experience lying in the depths of our subconscious whereby we may cross over the world of time and form.

Winding through the sub temples architecturing the manifoldness of the inner world, the visitor

moves on into the unity of primordial consciousness symbolised in Shiva in the central temple. It is like a journey along the spiritual path, away from the world of space and time to the timeless omnipresence of cosmic consciousness. There we stood in front of the statue of Shiva, towering over us and over the moulds of time and space. In the soft transparency of the twilight of this sanctum sanctorum, we could feel the music of Sanskrit stotras sung centuries ago.

As I myself recited a Sanskrit sloka, it resounded back sinking into the depths of a mysterious well-spring of spiritual strata. The acoustics of the soaring spire enriched by the melodies of a millennium, has a lyrical way of growing on you. There I stood in the eternal serenity of the statue of Lord Shiva, consubstantiated in Supreme Vision, I and my Shiva alone—This Shiva of Prambanan summons you, brothers, to the serene beatitude of ecstasy. Let us go and kindle a lamp unto the sombre shades of this sanctum.

Festivals in any place of worship whether Hindu or Christian or Buddhist or Muslim, are conducted for the betterment of the lot of not only the worshippers but also the people in general. If however, through strange notions of individual pride or sectional self-importance, these ceremonies are affected by feelings of anxiety over possible and probable breach of the peace then the very congregation stands self-condemned and religion runs the risk of being brought to ridicule.

A state of serious tension is reported to be interfering with the smooth and serene conduct of High Festivals all over the Peninsula as a result of certain developments in the question of entry into Temples by Harijans. No one would welcome a remedy that would ultimately threaten the development of other diseases. Hence it becomes a matter of paramount concern for all genuine Saiva Organisations to study the present situation and evolve a formula for avoiding unpleasant developments. Temples are the beacon lights of spiritual and cultural progress. They must continue to shed lustre. Under no circumstance should a single temple be forced by compulsory changes to remain closed.

though he has not committed himself yet he has hinted that their origin was agricultural and not maritime carayar - as stated by me."

From the above quotation it is clear that he is doing his best to find out the carayara origin of the Vanniyar. He has not himself a very difficult task. The carayar (karayars) did not do fishing only, but also did farming, boat-building, ship-building, owned fleets and transported Kings, Viceroy, armies, colonists and food supplies between India and Ceylon and took part in the trade with the Arabs, Greeks, Indians and Chinese. Like the others they received lands for services rendered and they cultivated them. They claimed descent from Kuru who ruled at Old Delhi 5000 years ago like the Kauras of N. India and the Kurukulasooriyas of Ceylon. Is this not enough?

I thank Mr. Nagalingam for the list of books which however have not helped him very much!

Ancient Grave

Sir.—The reference to "First Britain under Ceylon sod" in an article headed "Ancient grave" in the press recently, reminds me of an Englishman who lived and died in Ceylon early in the 17th Century.

I infer this from a record in the "Portuguese Conquest of Ceylon" by the erudite historian "De Queros", where he says "Only two religious men...of St. Francis named Friar Amador Rangel and Friar Andre the Englishman...because they did not retire in time and the two Fathers of the Society who were in these Parishes, were killed by the enemies.... This was the last battle in the conquest of Jaffna-patao".

Father S. G. Perera who translated De Queros's work into English says in a footnote that he was the first Englishman to live in Ceylon.

The reference to "the last battle in the conquest of Jaffna-patao" is of interest. It was an endeavour on the part of the King of Kandy to

reorganisation of the school library, its basic organization, classification, cataloguing of books and book selection. wrest back the kingdom of Jaffna, which the King of Jaffna lost along with his life, for assisting the King of Kandy in his wars with the Portuguese. This can be inferred from the record left behind by "An officer of the Ceylon Rifle" in his book on Ceylon where he says "After a long siege, during which the Portuguese lost many distinguished chiefs, the town of Jaffna was carried by storm in 1560... The loss of his capital forced the Raja of Jaffna to make peace and pay them 80,000 cruzados. In 1604 the Raja was again chastised for assisting the King of Kandy; and the Portuguese, according to Faria, might have taken possession of his dominions, only they were not at that time in a position to do so, but it was subsequently accomplished 1617, when the Governor of Ceylon, Constantine de Saa, hearing that the Raja was corresponding with the King of Kandy had him captured and sent to Goa where he was deposed and executed."
