Towards Educational Revolution

By

SHRIMATI INDIRA GANDHI

(From the inaugural speech to the State Education Ministers' Conference held in New Delhi on 28th April 1967.)

Education is and must be a permanent quest. Education is an investment in man. Unfortunately we have not always looked at it as such and we have dealt with it merely as one other Department or one other subject in a mass of subjects or schemes to be pursued. Education can not be treated as a party-political issue. It is a national issue and our consideration of it must be guided by the national interest.

As the Education Commission itself notes, we have experienced something of an "educational explosion" during the past 16 years, with an increase in total enrolment from around 23 million to nearly 70 million. The greatest boom has naturally been in primary education—both rural and urban, and among girls as well as boys. But it is also reflected in secondary, higher, technical, professional and vocational education.

Democratised

Inevitably, with the rapid growth in numbers, standards have somewhat fallen—of teaching, of teachers training, of books and equipment, of hostel and recreational facilities, and so on. Nevertheless, education has been democratised to a considerable extent. The number of scholarships and stipends have increased.

The pattern of education has undergone change with an increasing bias towards science and technical education. All this is good. But it marks only a small beginning. While general standards may have fallen, I believe, it would be true to say that the level of the top 20 per cent of the student body is far

superior to what prevailed 10 or 20 years ago.

I should like to pay tribute to our young people. I come in contact with large numbers of them and I find that wherever we have provided suitable opportunities, the best among them have attained standards of excellence that can bear comparison with the best in the world.

What is Wrong

Yet, as the Education Minister says, much is wrong with our educational system. Partly because of the system itself and partly because of unavoidable transitional factors, it has resulted in a certain degree of alienation and restlessness. Many young people have been cut adrift from traditional values without being provided the anchorage of an alternative set of constructive modern values.

Education has tended to encourage a white collar mentality which regards the philosophy of dirty hands, of manual effort, as an indignity. Our rules and procedures have also placed undue emphasis on educational certificates—on the formal possession of degrees—with the result that many students are compelled to pursue what they regard as higher learning.

As the Education Commission has noted education has sometimes become a substitute for work, rather than a preparation for work. Examinations have become a ritual and are often a test of memory rather than of learning. The wastage rate in our schools and colleges is appalling.

Quantity with Quality

These are some of the problems. Problems will not become easier with

the passage of time. As our population increases, so will the demand for education at all levels. At the same time, economic growth will make increasing demands on trained manpower of all kinds.

We have to harmonise the conflicting pulls of quantity and quality. There is some validity in the Education Commission's view that traditional societies which desire to modernise themselves should transform their educational system before trying to expand it; because the greater the expansion of the traditional system of education, the more difficult and costly it becomes to change its character.

The many recommendations of the Education Commission are a matter for detailed consideration and judgment; this judgment has naturally to be exercised by the Governments at the Centre and in the States, in expert as well as political terms. I am attracted by many of the ideas contained in the Report—the importance of the teacher, a common school system of public education, the concept of school complexes, the idea of work-experience, the principle of "earn and learn" and of national service, the enlargement of scholarships and the development of centres of excellence. It is for all of you here to determine whether and in what manner or how soon these ideas and recommendations could be given practical shape. Taken together, the recommendations of the Education Commission postulate an educational revolution.

Transition

We are today passing through a transition—from a traditional to a modern society. Education is part of the dynamic of transformation and change. But an educational system cannot be evolved in abstract. It must be related to environment, to culture, to work. In agricultural areas, schooling should have a rural bias. Science and technology are the

Shrimati Indira Gandhi

Mahatma Gandhi once told Shrimati Indira Gandhi, "Indira, there are two kinds of people: those who do the work and those who take the credit. Belong to the first category."

She has always been in that first category.

Behind the soft voice and disarming smile, there is self-assurance, and a mind capable of incisive analysis. Her approach to problems is fundamental, with standpoints defined in clear, unambiguous terms. She has both political sagacity and executive ability.

"I am fundamentally interested in the growth and development of democracy in India and also in its economic development", Shrimati Gandhi has said.

Right from childhood, in one way or other, she has been a participant in India's freedom struggle.

India chose secularism, she believes, not as a denial of religion but as an affirmation of the sacredness of all religions.

To give fullest freedom to the people and to have maximum popular participation in governance, India chose democracy as the political base, according to Shrimati Indira Gandhi.

This purposive outlook is rational, a to-the-point assessment of the political milieu, and a sincere expression of a new generation wedded to pragmatic precepts and practice.

Early Childhood

Shrimati Indira Gandhi was born in Allahabad on November 19, 1917. The atmosphere of intense political activity at Anand Bhawan, the home of the Nehrus, made a profound impression on her and she reminisces that all her "childhood games were political ones."

At an early age, she started the children's

Section of Mahatma Gandhi's Charkha Sangh and: at the age of 12, she founded a children's organisation to help the Indian National Congress during the non-co-operation movement. Her *Vanar Sena* (Monkey Army), as it was called, soon had a membership of 6,000 in Allahabad. This organisation, which had branches in Bombay and some other cities, did many odd jobs such as office work, carrying messages, cooking food, rendering first-aid, and sewing and hanging flags, during the freedom movement, thereby helping the adults to take over more important work.

With her parents, Jawaharlal and Kamala Nehru, and her grand-parents Motilal and Swarup Rani, being in and out of jail, Indira Priyadarshini as she was then called, had a chequered education.

She went to school in Poona for some months and was later at Santiniketan.

During the days she was at Santiniketan, Rabindranath Tagore wrote to Sbi Nehru: "She is such an asset to our place...the teachers all in one voice praise her".

"Letters From Father"

But the major source of her education was the series of letters Jawaharlal Nehru wrote to her from prison, which were later published as two famous books 'Letters From a Father to His Daughter' and 'Glimpses of World History'.

She participated in the Student Movement in India and in England, where she studied at Somerville College, Oxford.

At the age of 21, she became a formal member of the Congress. She returned to India during wartime to take part in the Independence struggle. She married Feroz Gandhi in February 1942. Within

LOYALTY AT ALL LEVELS

'Identify yourselves with Lanka'. It was not merely a piece of advice, it was a spirited appeal to the persons of Indian origin who have already become Citizens of Lanka and to those who have yet to acquire that status by the Indian Premier at a reception given to her by the India Ceylon Association. This wholesome guidance was the keynote of the utterances of Shrimathi Indira Gandhi's illustrious and revered father the first Prime Minister of India, Shri Jawaharlal Nehru.

This direction to the persons of Indian origin by the Indian Premier carries with it the essential back-ground of dignified democratic conception and serves as warning to interested politicians that loyalty must be considered to be a condition precedent to the obtaining of citizenship; moreover the expression of such a lofty idea cannot fail to prick the conscience of the increasing number of citizens by descent who regularly campaign for Communist countries openly allowing themselves to be suspected of divided allegiance.

Faithfulness in allegiance to one's government is almost a duty that is cast on every citizen; so much so that one who propagates policies that go directly contrary to the well being of one's mother country cannot escape the charge of disloyalty. Political leaders who take pride in espousing the cause of Mao the Monster Marxist as against the aspirations of their own country should be disowned by the people lest the menace of revolutionary trend took firm root. The Indian Premier's outspoken opinion on citizenship as offered to persons of Indian origin who are seeking citizenship in Lanka is the sentiment of a truly great democrat.

CONGRATULATIONS TO CULTIVATORS

The frequent reference to the gesture of generosity of our Government in diverting to India two ships carrying rice to our country indicates the significant sense of gratitude of her people while emphasizing on the value of the production of paddy to feed a hungry world.

Acknowledging with pleasure the thanks of the people of India as voiced by their leader, Shrimathi Indra Gandhi, our Premier has called for more, better and quicker production of rice to rescue the country from a declining economy.

Rice has become the staple food of the entire world stealing the show

from wheat and other grains. Thus the economy of a country now depends on the progress of production of paddy. The popularity of paddy as a basic article of food is due to the fact that the yield per acre of rice is greater than that of wheat.

Production of paddy cannot be increased by perorations on the platform during elections Nor can it be realised by publishing theses on how to grow paddy. The people must be willing producers; the Government should place at the disposal of cultivators sufficient acreage and provide them with all facilities. More than everything else the keynote of production must be patriotic duty to feed the hungry and build the nation.

of God, and bear disinterested love towards Him. God pursues outright in order that they may ask something of Him. He waits upon them as an attendant, is afraid of sitting down before them, and sacrifices Himself wholly for their sake" "And when the Saints have sat down quietly in their places and have meditated on Him, ... God on His part has been kind and has fulfilled their desires unasked" "He has lived with His devotees without minding their caste and creed. six months they were both imprisoned during the "Quit India" movement. She remained in jail for 13 months.

In 1947, after the country attained freedom, Shrimathi Indira Gandhi was called upon by Mahatma Gandhi to work in the riot-affected areas of Delhi. By arranging a meeting of leading Hindus and Muslims, she succeeded in easing tension between the two communities. She was also active in village mass contact work.

She has been a member of the Working Committee of the Congress since 1955. Her special charge has been the Women's Department and the Youth Section of the organisation.

Congress President

In 1959, she was elected President of the Indian National Congress— "a crown more of thorns than of roses", as an Indian newspaper observed. She brought great dynamism to the office.

"The nation", she proclaimed, "is in a hurry, and we can't afford to lose time". Later she became Chairman of the National Integration Council of the AICC and a member of the National Integration Council set up by the Government of India.

Interest in Children

In spite of her political pre-occupations she has devoted a great deal of time and energy to the welfare of children and women. She is the Deputy Chairman of the International Union for Child Welfare, patron and member of the Executive Committee of the Indian Council for Child Welfare and Children of the Bal Bhavan and Children's Museum sponsored by the Ministry of Education. She is also the Chairman and Founder of Bal Sahyog, a residential training centre for under privileged boys in Delhi. She is a member of the Board of Trustees of the Kamala Trustees of the Kamala Nehru Memorial Hospital at Allahabad, and Chairman of the Mortal Nehru Gram Bharti, a rural institute at Allahabad.

Srimati Gandhi has special interest in education. She has been a member of the Central Advisory Board of Education and

of the Court of the University of Delhi. She has been closely connected with the work of UNESCO Executive Board during 1960-64. She is Chairman of the Sangeet Natak Akademi.

When the Citizen's Council was formed in 1962 after the Chinese aggression, she was appointed its Chairman. In that capacity she co-ordinated and channelled the civil defence effort to provide amenities to the fighting forces and the welfare of their families. She has also been a member of the Executive Committee of the National Defence Fund.

Awards

The several international awards she has received include the Mothers' Award of the USA (1953) and the Yale University Howland Memorial Prize (1960). She is also the recipient of the Degree of Doctor of Letters (honouris causa) of Agra University and the Isabella D'Este for outstanding work in the field of diplomacy.

Shrimati Indira Gandhi became Information and Broadcasting Minister in the Cabinet of Shri Lal Bahadur Shastri and, on his death, succeeded him as Prime Minister in January 1966.

After the fourth General Election in India, Shrimati Gandhi was re-elected leader of the Congress Parliamentary Group and was sworn-in as Prime Minister on March 13, 1971.

Shrimati Gandhi has two sons, Rajiv and Sanjay. Her husband, Shri Feroz Gandhi, passed away in 1960.

Her special interests are: folk and classical music, folk dances and bird-watching.

Sir Albert Peries Passes Away

tools of modern progress. They hold the key to prosperity and power. Yet, we must strive to develop the total human personality. Concentration or science should not, therefore, entail neglect of the humanities.

One of the great specialists of our times, Albert Einstein has said: "The school should always have as its aim that the young man leaves it as a harmonious personality, not as a specialist. This in my opinion is true in a certain sense even for technical schools. The development of general ability for independent thinking and judgment should always be placed foremost, not the acquisition of special knowledge."

"It is essential that the student acquires an understanding of and a fairly lively feeling for values. He must acquire a vivid sense of the beautiful and of the morally good. Otherwise he—with his specialized knowledge—more closely resembles a well-trained dog than a harmoniously developed person."

Question of Language

The question of language has always evoked considerable emotion. No parent or teacher would like to increase the burden on the child, but the problem has to be viewed as more than merely an educational problem. It has to be viewed in the context of the wider national interest which, I think, in this case is identical with the interests of our young people. i. e., in the interest of their being able to communicate with young people from other parts of the country, of being able to have exchange of thoughts and even of getting employment in areas other than their own State.

The Education Commission has made some reference to the three-language formula. Some other people have expressed other views. I have no doubt that you will give this matter very careful thought and consider it in a wider perspective and in the interest of national integrity and national unity.
