Friendship Without Personal Contact

There once lived in the District of Tanjore a pious Saiva Saint by name Appoothiyar. He heard of the miracle performed by Saint Appar alias Thirunavukkarasar who is one of the four Saiva Samayacharias and who when cast on the sea by the orders of the Pallava King Mahendra Varman, who was a Jain by religious persuasion, reached ashore using as a float the very stone he was tied to as a punishment for having renounced the Jain faith and espoused the Saiva religion. Saint Appothi was wonder-struck and his ardent admiration for the miracle-doer led him to name whatever owned by him after the famous saint. He named even his sons Tirunavukkarasu, calling them by the serial numbers one, two and so on. Being of a highly charitable disposition he put up a water-shed in an important locality situated where four roads met in his village in order to supply water for thirsty wayfarers and named the shed as Tirunavukkarasu Water-shed.

Now it so happened that Saint Appar who went about shrine after shrine singing Tevaram hymns on the places he visited, came to the native place of Appoothiyar. On reaching the village he saw the name Tirunavukkarasu prominently displayed on the water-shed. He stood in surprise as that name was given to him by Lord Shiva himself for his divine hymns and as there could be no second person bearing that name. He immediately asked the people nearby who that person was who put up the shed. They told him that it was the highly magnificent Saint Appoothiyar and that he could find in its vicinity many roads, groves and tanks laid nurtured and dug by him, adding that he went home just a while ago

and that he could see him at his house if he proceeded without delay.

On hearing these words Saint Appar went to his residence and Appoothiyar received him with sincere love and devotion. Saint Appar asked him how it was he had inscribed some other name and not his own on the water-shed he had put up. Appothi Adigal at once got wild and exclaimed how it was he was blissfully ignorant of that reputed saint for all time who reached ashore utilising a stone as a float and how it happened that though he was in the auspicious garb of a Saiva devotee he could put him such a strange query and asked him who he was and what quarter of the globe he was coming from. Appar Adigal who realised his greatness replied in all humility that he was the same ignorant and insignificant creature who was reclaimed from a non vedic faith by Siva after subjecting him to the terrible malady that goes by the name of Soolai.

Now what should have been the ecstasy of Appoothiyar on hearing these words and on beholding before his very eyes one who was the object of his imagination and whom he knew till then only by his achievement. He fell prostrate at his feet and when lifted by Saint Appar danced in joy and ran about helter skelter like a frenzied impecunious person, who hit on a big treasure unexpectedly. He at once introduced the saint to the members of his household received him with the reference due to an Athithi, cleansed his feet sprinkling the water so washed on his head and body. He then thought of entertaining him and told his wife that they were indeed extremely fortunate to have

Telecommunication Strikes

The All Ceylon Telecommunication Engineering Workers' Union and the Telecommunication Inspectors' Union had made threats of strike in 1965 and 1966. Such of the demands which, in the opinion of the Hon'ble the Minister of Public Works Posts and Telecommunications were reasonable were then granted. This had caused the government a lot of labour and an expenditure of over 8 lakhs of rupees. These unions have now made further representations on some earlier of the issues which were not then settled and put forward certain reforms. The Prime Minister and the Minister of Public Works and Posts and Telecommunications conferred with the representatives of these unions in a spirit of cordiality and gave favourable orders on ten of the demands. The items on which final decisions were not possible are (a) the demand of 3 increments to certain labour grades (b) a request for quarters for all Engineering Division field staff (c) the request for a risk allowance of 15 per cent of salary (d) objection to the re-employment of officers over 60.

The Post Master General and Director of Telecommunication has sent a circular informing the subscribers the history of this strike and the decision of the government. He states in his circular that the government in the present situation was faced with one of two alternatives—to give in to the continuing demands of the two unions with the prospects of further demands in the future and increasing losses over the years resulting in additional cost to the subscriber or to refuse to do so and face the consequences. The Government felt that a halt had to be called to the incessant demands of these Unions and the latter was the only course

DUMMY DRAINS

It might have been an act of God, the expression of enraged elements, on December 6 and 7. The exciting experience of the people in the North, the East and the North-West of our Island brings in its train another term of soaring prices of the necessaries of life in the wake of the weakening of the worth of the Rupee.

Devaluation and deluge in quick succession have caused distress and damage beyond the limit of endurance of the people who have already been subjected to a severe strain of financial pressure.

Be it the nefarious activity of nature or not, the problem of the utter faultiness of facilities for rain water to be drained away requires to be studied at the official level. The cause of the failure must be investigated; the officials responsible for this criminal negligence must be dealt with.

Previously too the Peninsula had been devastated by floods but that was in 1918 and 1933 when the facilities for technical training were not available as at present. Decades have rolled by and the North and the East have become more liable to be lashed by deluges. Thirteen inches of rainfall on one single day was the experience of the North this week and the waters rushed hither and thither unable to find the drains and channels. The danger of every compound being inundated was there and the bewildered householder could not but cut open the roads for the floods to flow. The process was followed till the waters could not make any headway. The result was the rendering of thousands of the people homeless.

During this forty eight hour fight with the floods not a single official of the P. W. D. or the Irrigation

Department could be seen giving any direction to the flood-stricken men and women how best the problem could be tackled. It is a sad reflection on these two Departments that there is not one reliable chain of drains anywhere in the Peninsula. Several drains had been allowed to be closed, many culverts have been rendered unserviceable and in general the country has been exposed to the dangers of floods.

We appeal to the Government to appoint a Commission to probe into the causes of the failure of the system of drains in the Peninsula,

SUPER MARKET

Last week in pouring rain accompanied by the leaders of the Federal and the Tamil Congress Parties the Premier at the request of the Minister of Local Government laid the foundation stone for the Jaffna Super Market. The show of political accommodation was so spectacular as to provoke the Prime Minister into the practical fun of bringing the Party Leaders physically close to each other. That was more than a gesture of a desire to see that the ultimate unity of the progressive Parties secured by the first step of a fraternization of the component units of the National Government. It was a genuine wish of Mr. Dudley Senanayake to ensure that his colleagues in the Government Group enabled him achieve real unity of purpose and plan.

The Super Market which was long over due has now become a reality and more than that the site for it has been permanently fixed beyond the bounds of interfering City Fathers. The chess game of sites for the Super Market and the Central Bus Stand was brought to a close with the foundation stone laying function. It is to be hoped that the Super Market will now become a reality before any designing wire-puller of Municipal politics can dare set back the clock of progress.

In this connection we wish to impress on the Local Authorities that the Super Market should not be a mere ornamental structure but also should be such as to cater for the needs of the people. Super Market should not mean super prices. Should that be so the welcome that was extended to the Premier would be meaningless.

A Social Revolution Is A sine-qua-non Of Any Political Or Economic Regeneration Of Any Community

Sir, — The Tamil, as everybody knows, is politically a back-number in Ceylon today. A careful examination of our political and economic backwardness will reveal that not merely the fact of being a minority alone but also the fact of our being hopelessly divided as a result of senseless caste divisions and distinctions is the real cause of all our ills.

Our Leaders who mostly come from from the upper classes of the community have grievously failed to realise that our real strength lies in harnessing the man-power and resources of a section of the community contemptuously termed the 'Minority Tamils', who in the history of our country were the props and backbones of the Agricultural Classes and the defenders of the Tamil Kingdom against enemies both local and foreign. These useful heroic members of the Community are the ancestors of the Harijans of today. Even today we will be hard put to it to till our fields and cultivate our lands without the labour of these folks nor can we get our palmyrah palms tapped and pruned periodically for an abundant harvest. The palmyrah palm is aptly called the Katpaka-Tharu (the tree of plenty and of manifold uses). It sustains man and beast in various ways. More than half of the rural population of Jaffna depend on this tree for more than half the year for their sustenance. Without the labour of these humble folk the palmyrah palm will become of no use to the rest of the community. Such useful members are being despised today. The Vellala man's sense of gratitude has sunk so low as that. Even at this hour of peril our leaders will not open their eyes and see the oncoming danger. It is indeed a tragedy of tragedies. Let them if they have any love of country realise that their real strength lies in enlisting the sympathy and goodwill of the Harijans. If our Leaders succeed in doing this they can achieve anything and

everything in the twinkling of an eye. The Marxist foxes who are on the prowl to create discord and Red Revolution are taking advantage of our disunity to advance their nefarious activities. The recent Communal troubles in Jaffna, we all know, were engineered by Marxists.

I am not at all satisfied with the politics either of the Federal Party or the All Ceylon Tamil Congress. Both seem to be Feudalistic and Bourgeois in their mental outlook, however much they might try to disguise the fact. These parties do not function democratically. They don't allow depressed class members to play a dominant part in political or social affairs. If any good is to flow from these two organisations they must become real Mass movements embracing the entire Tamil community. The Hindu and the Christian and the Harijans must be made to feel that they have a stake in the country. Before the advent of Mahatma Gandhi into Indian politics the Indian National Congress was dominated by the English speaking, the rich and the aristocratic section of the Indian people whose only and chief business was to annually meet during the month of December and pass pious resolutions and make humble representations to the British Authorities both in India and in England and go to sleep during the rest of the year. But as soon as Gandhiji came in the whole outlook of the Congress was changed overnight. He gave the people a new sense of dignity and self-respect and welded the whole Indian humanity into a massive dynamic force which became as firm and unshakable as the mighty Himalayas. Similarly the peasant and the farmer, artisan and the labourer, the aristocrat and the downtrodden untouchable, in fact, the whole Tamil community must be transformed into one massive dynamic and forceful unit, if anything useful or tangible is to be achieved.

But a serious and sincere attempt must be made to outlive the past.

Our present Leaders like Messrs. Chelvanayakam and Ponnambalam have become out of date. A new generation of politicians must take charge of our destinies and take us to our desired goal.
