Lessons To Be Learnt Not To Be Forgotten

Transport And Communication Service For Thorough Repairing

With the startling revolt of nature almost daily and all over the world, the people of Lanka must not now dismiss the recent flood-disaster as a thing of the past in the thought that the next deluge would be two decades hence. The recurrence of floods must be expected every hour. Hence the need for the Government and the people to learn and re-learn the grim lessons of the recent disaster and set about the imperative duty of reconstructing the transport and communication service in the light of hard and immediate experience.

The present position is precarious and whatever attention that requires to be paid must be given to the problem almost immediately. The telephone and the telegraph, the most vital link in the Communication Service, now unfortunately subject to traitorous sabotage, must be taken up for special consideration. The road and the rail services have become seriously disrupted, disorganised and damaged by not merely the sudden upsurge of ceaseless showers but also by the ununderstandable negligence on the part of the administration. Closely connected to the road and the rail services is the canal and water channel drain system which thanks to the diligence of the first foreign rulers was efficiently laid out. Never for a moment could have the alien rulers, the Portuguese and the Dutch, even dreamt that the succeeding Governments would be so foolishly negligent as to allow the system of irrigation and drains fall into decay or disuse.

Coming to the present administration, the question immediately arises whether the P. W. D. the Irrigation Department, the C. G. R. and the C. T. B. have any co-ordinated scheme on the common ground that the roads, the railway track, the tanks, and the drains require combined consideration.

The Keerimalai Tank

Over fifty years back a philanthropic Hindu, Mr. Vallipuram of Tea Kiosk fame, built the Keerimalai tank for pious Hindus to have their Theertham bath before their rites and rituals. But now the local Village Council has taken over the upkeep and maintenance of the tank which is no longer a close preserve of the Hindu public. On festival days the water becomes disgustingly dirty that many Hindus do refrain from bathing in the Tank preferring to do so in the open sea. It would be more hygienic if the water from the spring is pumped to an overhead tank and led out by pipes to showers where pilgrims can bathe without being exposed to infection from other bathers. This will prevent bathers from catching infection from fellow bathers in a common tank where they wash off their sins and leave all their dirt for fellow pilgrims to wallow in. I wish a philanthropist or a common body takes up the matter and provides a clean bath for one and all even at a nominal price, eg 10 cents for a shower of ten minutes. As it is, few people escape infection from skin and respiratory diseases after a bath in the tank. Be-

Flood and Its Prevention In Jaffna

Jaffna is a flat land surrounded by the sea and there is no place in it which is not within five miles of the sea. There are no mountains and rivers within its boundaries. I had a natural drainage system that has been interfered with by road ways, railway and buildings which have obstructed the natural water ways. It is high time that the people and the Government studied the problem of flood prevention. Floods occur owing to heavy rains during the North East monsoon mostly in the months of November and December. It was the custom of our ancestors to build bunds round their lands to prevent the waters that fall on it running to waste and allowing the precious water to soak through the soil for nourishing the vegetation during the dry month. Their life was co-operative and what was good to the people was done by all and the present day individualism was not observed. If the water that falls on the land is conserved by bunds it will not flow out and join that from other lands to form flood waters. Even if these flood waters come they can be turned into wells and channels that lead them to the sea. It is high time a body of expert irrigation engineers was appointed to study the question of floods and adopt measures to prevent them. This is a matter worthy of attention by our parliamentarians, some of whom had to abandon their houses when flood waters entered them.

Fridays and Poya Days As Holidays

Sir,—In the event of Government deciding to have the five-day week, I would like to plead with the Government that it be pleased to declare that Fridays and Poya Days be the two holidays of the week.

I am writing this letter as a Hindu after much thought and searching of the heart, because we Hindus have been greatly agitated and worried for a very long time over the present sad fate of the Tamils, and their gradual decline and fall over the years in Ceylon.

It is an admitted and well known fact that the Tamils were all originally Hindus and that Tamil culture is Hindu culture.

The richness and greatness of the Tamil Language, Tamil Culture and Tamil Music is all due to the original influence and inspiration of Hinduism in its purest form based on the Hindu Scriptures composed of the Vedas, the Agamas, the Puranas, Itihāsams, Thirumurai, the Upanishads and the Bhagavad Gita.

The present decline, disintegration and consequent downfall of the Tamils in Ceylon who were once a respected powerful, prosperous and progressive Community in Ceylon, is due to the fact that the Tamils, the very large majority of whom still are Hindus, have ever since the advent of the foreigners—the Portuguese, the Dutch and the British—been weaned away and discouraged from the study and practice of the Fundamentals of Hinduism as laid down in the very ancient and sacred Hindu Scriptures.

After Ceylon was granted Independence by the British, the Sinhalese and the Buddhists have rightly and happily claimed and recovered many of their

long lost Rights and Privileges and they are now happily rebuilding themselves, and there is a remarkable and very pleasing Buddhist Religious Revival taking place after the declaration of the Poya days as public holidays, because the large majority of the Sinhalese who are Buddhists are now able to devote Poya holidays for Buddhist Religious observances.

But, it is sad to say, the same could not be said of the Tamils and the Hindus who form the second largest Community in Ceylon.

The Tamils and the Hindus have not been able to revive and rebuild themselves in any way like their Sinhalese and Buddhist brothers and sisters, although we are all supposed to have won our so-called Independence simultaneously from the British, because we have not only lost parity of status for our Language, but we have not even been given the privilege of having Friday (which is the holiest day of the week for Hindus) as holiday, so that Hindu parents and their children could also properly and efficiently organise Hindu Religious Classes on Fridays and attend religious observances and prayers in Hindu Temples and thereby revive and rebuild themselves like the Buddhists.

I will therefore plead most earnestly with this National Government to declare Friday as the second holiday of the proposed Five-day Week for the benefit of the Tamils and the Hindus who form the second largest Community in Ceylon.

Such a declaration of Friday as a holiday may also suit and please the Muslims to whom also Friday is said to be a day of Special religious significance.

TRAITOROUS TRADERS

Floods have slowly subsided but pernicious profiteers have quickly moved in more menacingly than the furious floods. But where floods show mercy by being considerate in receding, the profiteer remorselessly stays on repulsing legal action and administrative prohibition. In this he is unwittingly assisted by the lethargy and negligence of those who are charged with the responsibility of maintaining law and order.

The administration should have taken immediate steps to post the Police and the Price Control Officers at every provision store so that sales could be conducted under the strictest supervision. The mere presence of these officers would have acted as a certain check on the vicious activities of traders. A mobile Police Unit must parade the streets announcing by means of the microphone the prices controlled by the Government and warning both sellers and buyers of the immorality and illegality of the infringement of the orders of the Price Controller. The Divisional Revenue Officers along with their Gramasevahas could likewise supervise the sales by suddenly watching the transactions in trading establishments. Bringing to book the offenders must be expeditiously done; where a dealer gets convicted

for profiteering the decision of Court must be exhibited in the particular store by the Price Control Department as a requirement of administrative regulations. A black list of convicted dealers in the Black Market should be published by means of posters in public places. The people must rally round the administration to teach the traitorous traders lessons for their life time. If even after such sustained supervision, detection and punishment, the Black Market should flourish, then there must be something rotten in the state of Denmark.

WORLD TAMIL CONFERENCE AND STATUES

The Jaffna Saiva Paripalana Sabha has taken up the question of installing a statue of Navalar in Madras during the World Tamil Conference this month as a matter of paramount importance in the context of a Conference of Tamil scholars from all over the world. When Mr. A. Viswanathan, the talented Saiva Siddhanta Scholar, had retired from the Government Service as a senior officer of the Jaffna Kachcheri in 1940 we approached him with a brochure containing the subject matter of a talk on the Saiva faith which he delivered in 1923 in the hall of the Naval Saiva Prakasa Vidyasalai where a Saiva Conference was held under the patronage of Sri T. Kailasapillai, a nephew of Sri La Sri Arumuga Navalar and one of the orthodox scions of the Saiva Siddhanta Philosophy. He got it and promised to write some articles on the Saiva faith to be published in the 'Hindu Organ'. The first series of articles formed the contents of a book entitled the Elements of Saiva Siddhanta. Reprints of these articles were compiled in book form and were speedily sold out and a second edition was published in 1955. He continued to write a series of articles under the caption Vedantha Moola Saram with learned commentaries on some important slokas of the Upanishads in the light of Saiva Siddhanta Philosophy depicting the variations between it and the interpretations of Sri Sankara, Madwa and Ramannja. The reprints of these articles were also sold out.

The last of his contributions was a critical study of some selected hymns of Thirumantiram which is one of the oldest of the twelve Thirumurai. It is extremely difficult for any scholar to give a correct interpretation of the sacred hymns of Thirumantiram. An approximate correct interpretation of them is possible only to one who is a real devotee of God, leads an ideal spiritual life and is well versed in Tamil literature, Tamil Grammar, Vedas, Agamas and the Saiva Siddhanta philosophy of St. Meikandar. The author being gifted with these talents had given correct and learned commentaries on several selected hymns. Because he disliked publicity he chose to publish his articles under the

non-de-plume "A Science Graduate."

Just a few days before his passing away he invited his nephew, Mr. A. Nagalingam, to his bed-side and said, "My days are being numbered I am not going to live long. Please get the reprints of my articles on Thirumantiram prepared in a book for the benefit of the Saiva public. Mr. A. Nagalingam and the author's beloved daughter Mrs V. Arulambalam had evinced much keenness in releasing this book.

The author did not write this book with any mercenary motive, but as a labour of love so that his learning and conclusions may reach those who have a liking towards religion and philosophy. We are deeply indebted to the learned author for his self-less service to the Saiva faith. He had always been very loyal and helpful to the Jaffna Saiva Paripalana Sabha like his illustrious brothers Sri A. Thillaiambalam and Sri A. Chellappah.

Taking for instance the present plight of the rail and the road services, it is very much a studied abandonment of the duties and responsibilities of office that neither the C. T. B. nor the P. W. D. could get together to inspect the routes and decide on the immediate course of repair work, nor did the C. G. R. and the Irrigation Department.

The geographical position of this Island as a whole and the distinctive deviations in land must be carefully studied by a team of experts to plan a system of re-organisation and reconstruction of road and rail tracks according to the natural changes that have taken place during the last fifty years.
