Discriminatory Policies in Education

Education is something which touches our lives intimately. In the words of a UN Report, "Education lays the foundation of every single form of the struggle against discrimination in general". For discriminatory practices to invade the field of education is therefore to cut the very ground under one's feet. In fact, flowing from the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, the UNESCO convention against Discrimination in Education (1960) requires States "to give foreign nationals resident within their territory the same access to education as that given to their own nationals".

The present move to transfer several teachers of 'A. L. Science out of the Jaffna District must be examined in the light of the total picture of the discriminatory policies that have been followed without abatement since 1956. A clue is supplied in an analysis prepared by the Secondary Education Division (March 1967) which speaks of "the over-supply of Science Graduates in one Region" and "the medium difficulty" that prevents the transfer of these "surplus Science Graduates" to other Regions. According to the same document, the projected teacher requirements for 1967/68 are shown as 642 Graduates (Arts 345, Science 297) for the Jaffna Region against the total requirements for the Island of 6,486 Graduates (Arts 5,710, Science 776). That works out at less than 10%, but the grievance seems to be that this Region (actually the Jaffna District of the Northern Region) has "a supply of (Science) graduates for utilisation of their services at the G. O. E. (O. L.) as well and even lower down", while other Regions are content to do the same mainly with Arts graduates. How unimaginative, even un-

patriotic, it is to think this way when this country's development needs call for a sizeable portion of its work force to have received their secondary education reaching internationally comparable standards and this in turn indicates in the not distant future an all-graduate profession for the entirety of the secondary school in every part of the country. In passing, the somewhat advantageous position of the Jaffna District educationally is due to private and not State effort for over a century (witness the comments of the Colebrooke Commission, 1905). Nor is it necessary to unbuild education in the Jaffna District in order to build it elsewhere, with the hundreds of graduates eagerly awaiting employment as teachers.

The Only Oasis

We may well be pardoned for questioning the bona fides of the present move to lay hands on the only oasis in the desert that is Tamil education in Ceylon today when we view it against earlier actions of commission and omission. During the S. L. F. P. regime, not a single Tamil-medium Government secondary school (outside the N. P. and E. P., and other than a Muslim school) was upgraded, or given a science lab. or a graduate teacher. The policy was hardened after the schools' take-over of 1960, a circular from the Permanent Secretary directing that preference in admissions to Govt. and Director-managed schools should be given to nationals. As the policy became bolder, scores of Tamil streams were closed down, and the process did not easily slow down under the new regime. Even the markedly bilingual City of Colombo is now on the fringe of the Tamil educational desert: witness the drastic reduction in

um pupils at Royal Primary and Royal College and the absence of even a single Govt. Tamil girls' secondary school in the metropolis. Seeing that three-quarters of the Tamil-speaking population of Ceylon live outside the Jaffna District, leave alone the UNESCO principle of 'equal access to equal education' for all, there are lakhs of Tamil children, who are denied even a 'separate and inferior education'. It is true that taking the country as a whole, we are continuing to pay the price of an education that does not adequately answer to the need and opportunities of a developing nation in the Development Decade. But nothing can excuse deliberate discrimination on account of racial origin. The tell-tale figures of school enrolment bear this out: taking the entire population into account, including those of Indian origin, 69% are Sinhala-speaking, 29% Tamil-speaking. The enrolment of Sinhalese children is 76%, that of Tamil-speaking children 25%. At the University of Ceylon the respective percentages are 78% and 21%. Vidyodaya and Vidyalankara have almost 100% Sinhalese enrolment. It is true that in the Science faculties of the University of Ceylon the Tamil enrolment is approximately 40%, drawn mainly from Jaffna schools and to some extent from private schools, but this would be poor comfort to Tamil speakers in the E. P., Vavuniya, Mannar and the remainder of the country. When this policy of racial discrimination is applied to the training of teachers it will have far reaching consequences for the educational system. The present proportion of 70:30 among non-graduate trained teachers reflects the respective strengths of the two linguistic groups. There has, however, been a drastic reduction in the number of Tamil trainees. Of the 5,247 trainees enrolled in the 24 training colleges in 1966, only 963 were in the Tamil medium colleges. Of over 800 teach-

PROBLEM FOR THE PEOPLE

The mischievous mind which is behind the many manoeuvres that have been painstakingly planned to bring intimidatory pressure on the National Government with a view to forcing a political surrender seems to be pinning its hope on the belief that the people can be swayed by stunts in a series. The Telecommunication Engineers who are still on strike have learnt to their bitter chagrin that even with the aid of sabotage neither the Minister of Posts nor the Premier could be coerced into yielding to their demands. The Ceylon Workers' Congress though persuaded to precipitate a high-level halting of work was however very practical in listening to the Premier with a sense of responsibility. The Democratic Workers' Congress, the Lanka Estate Workers' Union and some other leftist labour Unions who had been waiting to make a pawn of the C. W. E. were finally frustrated in their plans and had to bell the cat themselves. It is now reported that even the Anti-Malaria Campaign Trade Union Front has decided to give the Government a mosquito sting some time next week. The chain of strikes both conducted and contemplated now clearly appears to have a common wire sustainingly running through the net work, the handiwork of the disgruntled political disruptors who having failed during the last two years to unnerve the National Government now frantically search for subterranean schemes to bring about work to a standstill.

The people have for a long while tolerated this undemocratic activities of leftist leaders who are only too ready and vigilant to create evil tendencies among members of

marxist-led Trade Unions. No longer can the common man allow himself to be fooled by these self seeking pseudo-socialists. Where nature has dealt a severe blow these designing demonstrators want to make the financial stress more burdensome.

The pattern of this political planning is easily discernible even to the unsuspecting ordinary man. The parties that were rejected at the polls in March 1965, smarting under the stunning blow, have been preparing ever since their debacle to create difficulties for the National Government. That is the story of the series of strikes which the people are now witnessing with wrathful emotion. That is the problem for the people. The answer to this arrogance must come from the people themselves.

ers on full pay at the three universities, only a handful in the University of Ceylon were Tamils.

Perhaps the most significant data in the analysis quoted relates to the provision of 'AL' and 'OL' science courses. Of 400 'AL' science classes, 111 classes, i. e. 28%, are in the Tamil medium, all but 15 of these confined to the Jaffna and Batticaloa Regions. In 10 out of the 15 Educational Regions of Ceylon, there is no provision whatever for Tamil science courses at the 'A' level; in 3 out of the 5 Regions where such provision exists—Colombo South, Kandy and Ratnapura—it is modest. Of 1992 'OL' classes, 567 classes, i. e. 28%, are in the Tamil medium; but outside Jaffna, Batticaloa, Kandy and Colombo South, the classes are very thinly spread over the rest of the country.

Grave Situation

The grave situation facing Tamil-speaking children in Ceylon because of the uneven nature of the educational provision and the questionable actions of successive governments points to the urgent need for a high level committee to make a district-wise survey of facilities for primary, secondary and higher education for Tamil speaking pupils and the training of Tamil medium teachers, and to recommend measures to ensure a better deal,

With the hundreds of graduates awaiting employment, it should be possible to equalise provision everywhere (in both Sinhala and Tamil media) without levelling down standards in the Jaffna District.

Changes Necessary

It may be also be necessary to make such changes in the set-up of the Ministry and the Department as will prevent their discriminating against any section of the people. In any event, the planning of education for any District should be after consultation with a committee based on the area. District School Committees had been set up following the Ordinance of 1907, but they have now lapsed. It is time that, in the modern context, development plans to ensure sufficient educational provision in every District of Ceylon were prepared by a representative committee in the District and submitted for the consideration of the Minister. There is no other way of evolving a national plan of education.
