It is of interest to note that the two earliest documents which contained the word "Tamil" (Damirike) are both maps dating back to about 20 BC & 140 A D. The earliest map of which copies are still available is known as the Peutinger Table and dates back to about 20 B C The second ear liest map is the map based on Ptolemy's geography and dates back to 140 A. D. It is also of interest to note in this connection that "Thuki" in Kings and the Chronicles of the Bible is the oldest specimen of the Tamil language extant in any written record, ac ording to Caldwell, vide his .Dravida Grammar" P. 66.
