A Shroud of Secrecy

In an article pertaining to university admissions, which received publicity in the press recently, I drew attention to the secrecy with which examination marks are treated, and, that the powers that be, would appear to do indirectly what they cannot do directly and that as far as education policy is concerned, government policy cannot face day light.

I now find that according to a press communique (15-2-73), that the position is even worse and this is confirmed by no less an authority than the University Teachers Association of the Peradeniya Campus. The following extracts show what a serious state of affairs prevails and that too in the field of education, of which it would now appear even Sinhalese students are victims. What chance then of Tamil students getting a square deal in the field of education?

I quote here verbatim some extracts to illustrate and confirm what I have stated above and also what I stated in my article which dealt with this subject and which received publicity in the press.

"The admission procedure has been drastically changed and it is now handled by a group of appointed officials."

"The mechanism of selection is shrouded in secrecy and neither the academic staff nor the students are aware of what is happening".

"... no official information has been released to the university teachers and the staff was not consulted at any stage."

Referring to job oriented courses and the implementation of the teaching of certain subjects at Peradeniya it says to the effect that, "the instructions to the candidates show that the allocation of students to the different campuses can be so

made that no students who have qualified in the latter subjects would be sent to Peradeniya.

This, the association points out, would achieve surreptitiously the original intention of the authorities to eliminate these subjects from Peradeniya. Ironically the only two "job oriented" courses, Education and Commerce, that were available to arts students at Peradeniya have been earmarked for removal from that campus."

I think the time has come for the educationists, at least of the Tamil country of Ceylon, to make a thorough study of the educational policy (if at all it can be called an educational policy); including the immediate revival of the compulsory teaching of English, the neglect of which has greatly handicapped the last generation, and commence a sustained agitation for them to shape their own policy and also administrative same.

This problem would not have arisen if the Tamil country had been granted local self rule or whatever you may call it. District Councils or Federation. That education is in shambles nobody can deny. That the economy has crashed is now accepted.

The tragedy is that the citizens of Tamil country should also be penalised for the doings of the inefficient and incompetent handling of state affairs by the Sinhalese only governments of the last few decades. That they are responsible for the present state of affairs has been admitted by responsible Sinhalese leaders themselves. How long are we to be governed by these self-confessed failures.

Ceylon Affairs and the United Nations

Sir,

An interview recently given by the Secretary General of the United Nations, Dr. Kurt Waldheim and reported in the Press re attempts to solve the differences between India, Pakistan and Bangladesh, could prove very helpful if the underlying principle is sought to be applied in relation to some of Sri Lanka's inter-communal problems. The Secretary General, at the conclusion of the tour of the these three countries, has suggested.

"Business like, pragmatic and realistic approach to the problems of the sub-continent without any emotions"

This mode of approach is fully worth trying in Sri Lanka specially in relation to Sinhalese-Tamil differences.

Some time ago, it was stated that attempts are to be made to invoke the United Nations to use its good office to facilitate a solution of Sinhalese-Tamil differences. Whether the United Nations would intervene is a matter not beyond doubt. Whatever that may be, the spirit behind the procedure recommended by Dr. Waldheim is worthy of the utmost consideration by leaders of the respective communities in Sri Lanka. If the Secretary General of the United Nations had recommended this salutary principle for the solution of differences between three independent countries like India, Pakistan and Bangladesh, how much more applicable would it be in the case of communities inhabiting one single country, and that line of reasoning is most likely to find general acceptance in the Councils of Nations.

Rajaji Remembrance

(Here we quote from the Swarajya of 1960 Sri Rajaji's considered views on the Language question.)

The fact of the matter is that interest in language goes hand in hand with the modern knowledge it brings. The substance of knowledge, for which English books serve as medium, is the motive power behind the attention to that language. What modern knowledge now or in the future will Hindi bring? Can we be really dependent on translated material, translated not by men eminent in the science or the technology of which the books is an exposition but by mere translators of words? New knowledge brings its own language, the language of the men who have made and are making that science or other branch of modern knowledge. Anything else is second-hand and we have no time, neither we nor the young people in schools and colleges, to waste on prestige when progress depends on knowledge.

Breeding Disunity and Discord.

The greatest fallacy of all is the notion that unity is brought about by the adoption of Hindi as the official language of

the Union. What is brought about is protest, dissatisfaction and discord, not unity. Hostility can be overcome by political dodging or pressure but that way heart-rankling is produced, not unity. Where the principle of justice is materially ignored, we cause a wound which will not heal easily. He who points this out is not the offender, but he who inflicts the wound.

I appeal to my brethren and friends in the North to abstain from this plan and to join with me in asking that Part XVII of the Constitution be suspended as an erroneous step taken when thought was not ripe. It would be a gesture of great value for the unity and emotional integration of India. Let no one imagine that I have lost my love for India, or my concern for all its parts. Indeed it is greater than ever, and it is that very thing that makes me talk and write now in this unpleasant way. The Hindi-speaking people injure themselves in the long run by pressing that their mother-tongue should be accepted as the Union official language by those who do not speak it. I beg of them to concentrate on their work at State-level and declare the match drawn at the Union level and leave the status quo intact with no threats (Over to page 7)

PRESS COUNCIL ACT AND THE PEOPLE

Shrouded in the subtle mysteries of constitutional concepts and their contradictory connotations, the discussions and dialogues on the Press Council Bill have now slowly become a stale story of the past. The Press Council Act is now a reality in practical life. The people and the Press will now have to study the Act, clause by clause and comprehend it as far as they can. The people have been patronisingly told by the

Ministers who had commented on the Bill at various stages that the publication of pure truth is just what is expected of the Press and that the Press Council when set up will watch whether the truth and nothing but the truth has been published. With these pontifical propositions that the publication of truth will not provoke the Press Council we ourselves agree.

What is truth! This question need not wait for any answer. It is simply self-evident. Let us suppose that a newspaper in its enthusiasm to publish only true happenings, instead of merely stating that it rained at a certain place went on to wax eloquent and wrote "it rained cats and dogs" and it was later proved that meteorological statistics did not merit the description of 'rained cats & dogs'. Will this be a desecration of truth driving the publisher into the arms of the Press Council. 'Raining cats and dogs' cannot be gauged in inches!

No publisher can henceforth dare describe political meetings as heavily or largely attended. "Mammoth gatherings" must be accurately mentioned in specific numbers. These descriptions will always be untruthful and open to scrutiny by the Press Council.

The prudent publisher will do well to collect official communiques and repeat them as news of the day. That will be true news though truth like murder will some day be out!

the language of the foreign occupation. If we wish to preserve the unity that has resulted from the national disgrace, the language too must be kept and not discarded in irrational disgust. The idea that honour demands some one of our Indian languages to be enthroned to official sovereignty, will, if indulged in, be an error of the first magnitude.

History moves forward and can never be forced back to take a different line. What has happened directly or indirectly to the affairs of a huge population cannot be shoved about according to caprice. The mass involved is too big for such manipulation. If political unity has arrived as a result of British occupation, what accompanied that double process, in the shape of language, must not only be tolerated but preserved as an essential protection for the resultant blessing.

Hindi through force bribery, flattery, manoeuvring or undisclosed pressure of various kinds will only serve to teach us that linguistic success can be politically disastrous.

Guide Movement

Sixty six Guiders underwent an intensive and instructive training course organised by the Jaffna Division Girl Guide Training Unit at Kopay Christian College on February 17th and 18th. The Division Commissioner for Northern Province, Mrs. R. Rajanayagam addressing the Trainee Guiders said that although the Guide Movement was entirely a voluntary one, when guiders undertook to take charge of Guiding in their respective schools, they took upon themselves the full responsibilities of training their Rangers, Guiders and Little Friends to become good, useful and responsible citizens. It certainly called for the sacrifice of their time and energy. Successful guiding called for careful planning and forethought. Planned and well organised instruction in the Law and Promise and the various Guide skills, encouraging Guides to live up to Guide ideals was essential but the most important of all was the personal example set by the Guiders themselves. It was said that Guiders had no reward. Certainly there was no reward monetarily or even promotionally in their profession but there was that mental happiness of having trained and sent out into the world hundreds of Guides who would contribute in no small measure to the prosperity of our land.

Interesting sessions on various aspects of guiding including a demonstration in Backwoods cooking, cooking-rice, vegetables, eggs, fish, meat etc. and baking twist bread without using utensils was gone through.

The Training Team consisted of Mrs. R. Rajanayagam, Miss M. Arulnandy, Miss M. Elias, Mrs. G. Arudpiragasam, Mrs. T. Ariaratnam Mrs. S. Perairavar, Miss G. Thambiah and Miss S. Mylvaganam.

An under canvas Guide Camp for Guides in the Northern Province who had passed their second class was also held at Kopay Christian College, Kopay from February 15th to 18th with Mrs Arudpiragasam as Camp Commandant assisted by Miss Mylvaganam. Nearly sixty Rangers and Guides lived under canvas during this period, cooking their own meals and attending instruction classes, going out on hikes and nature rambles.

In spite of the extreme heat and dust, the campers

kept good health and spirits and it was a very enthusiastic band that broke up on Saturday evening after a very enjoyable camp.
