THREE DAY PROGRAM  
FROM OCTOBER 11, 1973

Sixty years have elapsed since that memorable day in 1913 when the first Hindu College for Girls was started by the distinguished legislator, legal luminary, scholar and religious devotee Sir P. Ramanathan. This first complete cycle of sixty years places Ramanathan College on a still higher pedestal of proud performance. The laudable history of this Hindu Institution is in other words the story of the patriotic performance of the founder for sixteen years and the sustained efforts of Lady Ramanathan, Shri S. Natesan and Mrs. Sunderi Natesan coupled with the spectacular contribution by the long line of eminent Principals and staff.

The first day program commenced with Poojah at the Ramanathaswara Shrine and the College Shrine in the morning of October 11. In the evening a public meeting was held with Mrs. R. R. Navaratnam, President of the Saiva Mangayar Sabha and former Director of Education Northern Region in the Chair. Mrs. R. Arunachalam Principal of the College welcomed the Chief Guest Mr. T. Manickavasagar, Director of Education N. D. and his wife and the Chairman.

Delivering the Diamond Jubilee Address, Mr. Manickavasagar paid a glowing tribute to the incomparable services of Sir P. Ramanathan. He referred to Sir Ramanathan as a top ranking patriot who lived and died for the cause of the country, religion and language at a level of cultural eminence.

In the course of her address Mrs. Navaratnam spoke from her long experience as student, teacher and Principal of the College established by Sir Ramanathan and as President of the Saiva Mangayar Sabha founded by the great leader and described the Founder as a complete personality embodying the best Saiva Culture and Tamil tradition. She also pointed out



how Sir Ramanathan while providing for the proper study of Tamil had paid particular attention to the teaching of the English language which he considered was a sine qua non for the acquisition of knowledge.

Prize Day Speech at Jaffna Hindu

Delivering the Prize-Day address at the Jaffna Hindu College on October 10, 1973, Dr. S. Ananda Rajan, the Chief Guest analysed the purpose of life in a thought provoking talk and observed that work and industry would make man live the ideal life if only that would be for the cause of the people as a whole. The Chief Guest stated in conclusion that there was no need for frustration though man was living in the midst of pain and sorrow as labour in the cause of the general good would lead to happiness.

As I entered the premises of the Jaffna Hindu College I was able to observe a significant change that has taken place during the last decade since I left this

Institution. Then we students thought in the English language spoke that language and almost everything was in English. But today I find the medium of thought,

writing and speech to be Tamil. Everything is All-Tamil. This progressive step is certainly our contribution to the growth of the College.

My mind speeds back across the years to recollect how Pandit Sambandhan, then Editor of the Inthusathanam, and Shri K. A. Subramaniam, our lecturers in Tamil, created in me a taste for Tamil. Also I realize how the teachers who taught me

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## Food Crisis and Tamil Co-operation

Sri Lanka is experiencing difficulties which many other countries are also passing through. The food problem is said to be acute. Though it has been said by many religious seers that man does not live by bread alone, it has also been said that man cannot flourish or exist on empty stomachs. In the circumstances, it is the bounden duty of all inhabitants of this country, to co-operate with the Honourable Prime Minister and the Government and work for an improvement in the food crisis. Undoubtedly, if better alternative schemes in relation to the problem, could be found they could be placed before the Government. It would be the duty of Government to pay heed to such representations.

In the meanwhile, as a humble Tamil and inhabitant of Sri Lanka, I feel it my duty respectfully to appeal to my Tamil brothers and sisters to suspend for a while public agitation for obtaining the rights of the Tamil community and to desist from campaigning against the Prime Minister who happens to be the World's first Lady Prime Minister and who appears to be trying her best to do her duty under prevailing circumstances. Nothing is free from error completely. Nobody is infallible; this applies to our Government and the Prime Minister as well. At the

same time, we should consider whether their critics including Tamil leaders could do better as things are—What is the alternative.

Recently, the Chief Minister of Tamil Nadu State in South India, Mr. Karunanithi is reported, in the India Press to have appealed to the people of his own province, to eschew all agitational methods—and to adopt methods of peaceful persuasion and democratic diplomacy.—If Mr. Karunanithi (who is said to be a friend of the cause of Tamils in Sri Lanka) holds that view in respect of the affairs of his own state, then the same principle ought in all fairness and in the name of common sense, to be applied by his admirers among in Tamils in Sri Lanka—Two different sets of principles cannot be applied—One for the Tamils of South India, and another for the Tamils of Sri Lanka.

Another important thing to bear in mind is that the problem of the political rights of the Tamils in Sri Lanka, is not a special creation of Mrs. Bandaranaike. It is a legacy left behind by Sinhalese and Tamil leaders in the past and the British Government from the time of the Donoughmore Constitution enacted about forty three years ago—It is a Damocles Heredity which our lady Prime Minister has

in this College had equipped me with the necessary knowledge to enable me climb up to the present position of service to the country.

I think it is appropriate that I should tell you what strikes me in my mind when I give thought to the subject what life is and why we all are born.

Man is but one among the many living beings. He has performed many a feat. To man who has the faculty of discernment, knowledge is provided by the eye and sight. He does several things; but he is unable to follow the ideal and learn "to live and let others live."

Using two hands and two legs, man has travelled to the moon. And what use has man who eventually is reduced to a handful of ashes, found in these exploits? Scanning the lofty literature of the Sangam Age, particularly the Purananoru and Akananoru we find there depicted the purpose of life. History tells us that lust for territory, wealth and woman had caused the downfall of empires. Desire and anger destroy man even as they give them a fleeting position. It is to conquer these passions that saints appeared frequently.

But these sages could only help themselves control these passions. They could not completely reform society. He who thinks only of himself and his possessions merely wastes his life time. The present age of advancement in the study of the Sciences and Economics, a new type has produced a new type of household. Such persons

can be classified into four categories. The first like the lizard who live only for their own sake. The second group also are self centred but when the occasion demands listen to great men. Yet another group like the stork lie in wait for benefits for themselves. The other group I would refer was trees. Man should live to be useful as the tree.

God has given man several limbs of them the hands, it is often said, are for worshipping God. There is another use for these limbs. Let us use our hands also to lift the downtrodden in society and to help them. Let us not be indifferent to the welfare of the rest. let us not be without feelings of compassion for others. Let us make our lives noble by thinking of others and living for them also. Such service to fellowmen is a real way of being devoted to God.

It is time that we are in the midst of sorrow and pain. It is nothing new to man. Two thousand years there was the fall and decline of the Romans; they migrated to other countries but that did not erase out Rome. The city still stands in all its splendour. Let us not be disheartened or be dispirited. What is there that cannot be achieved by industry and work. The Bard of Santiniketan, Poet Tagore, in one of his poems referred to the fact that when a child is born it cries but others feel, rejoiced, and when a person dies, there is rejoicing for the soul but mourning for the rest. That is life in essence.

Mr. E. Sabalingam, Principal, in his report, among other things, referred to the religious activities of the College and stated that

inherited—Matters could be best improved through friendly, democratic and pleasant methods of approach in a multi-lingual, multi-racial, and multi-religious country like Sri Lanka where on the whole people of all communities have been so intimately connected.

The spirit of ancient Tamil culture enjoins that even if an opponent or an enemy visits our home, such a person should be treated with the highest possible courtesy and deference. It is my humble prayer that if the Prime Minister or her colleagues or other Sinhalese or non-Tamil country men of ours, visit areas where Tamils are found in large numbers, they could be received in the spirit of this ancient Tamil ideal. If there are political differences, such differences certainly ought to be pressed though the proper forum, in proper manner, and in suitable language and at opportune times.

The Jaffna Archaeological Society conducted an Archaeological Exhibition and a series of lectures on Archaeology and History under the auspices of the Social Science Association at Mahajana College, Tellippalai on the 4th and 5th of this month.

The programme for the first day started with the formal opening of the Archaeological Exhibition by Mr. P. S. Kumaraswamy, Education Adviser Jaffna. This was followed by a Public Meeting presided over by Mr. S. Sivasubramaniam, Principal of the College.

Mas. K. Nagesvaran sang a 'Devaram' after which, Mas. V. Sri Kathirgamanathan, President of the Association welcomed the guests. After some introductory comments by Mr. Jeyaratnam, Principal, Mahajana College, Mr. P. S. Kumaraswamy, Education Adviser, Jaffna initiated the series of lectures.

Dr. K. Indrapala, Lecturer in History, University Campus, Peradeniya, and Mr. V. Sivasamy, Lecturer in History, Undergraduate Dept., Jaffna College, Vaddukoddai delivered lectures on "The Origin and growth of the kingdom of Jaffna" and "Archaeology and History" respectively. The meeting ended with a vote of thanks by Asst. Secretary Mas. S. Don Bosco.

Mr. M. Mahadevan, President of the Jaffna Archaeological Society and Principal, Kokuvi Hindu College presided over the meeting on the second day. After a 'Devaram' by Miss M. Sinnathamby, the Vice-President Mas. A. Arunthavaneesan welcomed the guests. Mr. A. Sittampalam, lecturer in Archaeology and History, University of Ceylon, Peradeniya and Vidyalaankara campuses, delivered lectures on "Archaeology and Indus Civilization and Ancient Hindu Temples of Jaffna" respectively. Mr. T. Shanmugasundaram, Patron of the Association rendered a summary of the series of lectures and Miss. S. Sivasubramaniam the Assistant Secretary of the Association proposed the vote of thanks.

The archaeological exhibition included some publications on archaeology and various archaeological specimens from the Northern and Eastern parts of Ceylon. The Jaffna Archaeological Society collections, the impressive collections of Mr.

S. Ponnampalam from Kanterodai, Batticaloa collections of Mr. S. Yoganathan and the collections of Mas. S. Yogeessvaran (a student of Jaffna Hindu College) from the Vanni areas may be mentioned.

This is the first time that the Jaffna Archaeological Society is conducting such an exhibition and lectures on archaeology and History to popularize archaeologies and History and to create an abiding interest in this branch of study at the school level on the Education Circuit basis. Many students and teachers from the Vail-North Education circuit came to see the exhibition and attended the lectures.
