The Minister has done marvellously well in taking the mind of the ordinary man away from the misery of the economic crisis that is on.

Here they are :

- (1) No additional taxation.
- (2) No increase of prices;
- (3) Handloom Textiles at lesser price.
- (4) Tobacco costs less.
- (5) Compulsory Savings—Limit of income raised from Rs. 12000 to Rs. 18000.
- (6) Recoveries of Loans from Government Officers put off.
- (7) Convertible Rupee Account increased by one per centum.

## BACK TO THE LAND

A. V. KULASINGHAM, ADVOCATE

What prophetic words these — written as far back as 1949 about a quarter of a century ago; the opinion expressed in the special message to the readers of the HINDU ORGAN by no less a person than a political leader who is still a leading agriculturist. Mr A. V. Kulasingam, Advocate has a particular significance at the present time.

In a message to the Diamond Jubilee number of the Hindu Organ, I can do nothing better than to emphasize, as I have always done, the supreme need for an intelligent, practical and scientific development of the land. It is not merely as an avenue of employment for the young men of the Island that one has to look at this question. There is not the slightest doubt that if the independence we have gained is to be worth anything, we must have food and plenty of it. At present we live on imported foodstuffs, and it is not at all wise for any nation to depend on the goodwill of its neighbours to appease its hunger.

It is the duty of all patriotic citizens, by precept as well as by example, to support the policy of the Government in this matter, and it is equally the duty of the Government to frame its policies and schemes with due regard for realities.

Any scheme of development must seek to harness the best brains and character available to the great purpose of developing the resources of the land. It seems to me that there is a good deal of room for considerable improvement in this respect. I have always held the view that it is the educated classes who must lead the way in securing for us whatever the

untilled land of Ceylon has to give. Unfortunately however the educated classes have failed to do what was expected of them owing to lack of training, knowledge and resources. These defects can be remedied and it is the duty of the Government to remedy them. What is far more important is the need to make the educated man realize that life on the land has attractions which urban life does not possess and that conditions of farm life can be closely approximated to the amenities of urban life in so far as these amenities are necessary.

The great advance that modern engineering and science have made in the field of agriculture places at our disposal for the first time in the history of this Island, very effective means of developing land which never existed before. Mechanisation of agriculture has come to stay. Ceylon has too little man power to develop its resources but mechanisation will help the Government and the public to overcome this difficulty.

I trust that readers of the Hindu Organ will do their best to take their share in the progress and expansion of modern agriculture in Ceylon. It is a duty which they owe to themselves and to future generations.

## United Human Life Urged

Writing on the subject of "The Ideal of Human Unity" Sri Aurobindo, the wellknown sage and scholar, made some very inspiring comments. Dangerous diseases that are epidemic and endemic in character, like famine, affect the people as a whole. The efforts to stem the tide of these misfortunes must be on a national scale. And therefore Prayer to Providence also must be conducted by all the people. Skanthashaddi fast has, therefore, a greater significance this year. Let our prayers be heard. Worship of Lord Muruga has been universal. In our country Hindus and Buddhists offer prayers to Lord Muruga; a fact provided by the large numbers of hundreds of thousands of devotees who go to Kataragam on pilgrimage to worship Him, Hindus and Buddhists joining in this spiritual exercise.

The war against want and woeful epidemics has to be undertaken with the aid of invocation to God. Lord Skanda according to Kandapuram has been endearingly worshipped as Lord of War who subjugated the Asuras or Forces of Evil. Let us all, the people of Sri Lanka, join in persistent prayer to Lord Skantha in this fight against the crisis brought about by the shortage of food and the spread of cholera.

Adversity brings differing and dissenting factions together for the common purpose of warding it off. This week of worship, we are confident, will bring together the entire nation to combat the present crisis and to prepare for a prosperous future. Here is a national demand which requires co-operation and collaboration in a common effort. The Skanthashaddi fast is just the occasion for a people's prayer for better prospects.

# Archaeological Reserves Near Ancient Thiruketheeswaram

Our attention has been drawn to the Order of the Minister of Cultural Affairs under the provisions of the Antiquities Ordinance published in the Gazette of the 10th day of September 1973 that the Regulation 27 of the Regulations gazetted on the 23rd day of December 1940 will apply to the ancient ramparts and moats lying on the land covered in lots 1, 7, 9, & 43 of P. plan No. 130 and in numbers P P 4717/2 P P 4360/2315, P P 4360/2316 P P 4360/2317 and P P 4360/2318 in the village of Thiruketheeswaram and Mantai in Mannar D. R. O's division with effect from the 10th day of September 1973.

What extent of land belonging to the ancient Temple of Thiruketheeswaram comes under this Regulation, we, however, are not aware of. Thiru-

ketheeswaram Temple extends to several acres of land. There are madams, reading room, kurukulams and other buildings that belong to the Temple. We wonder whether these lands can be identified on the ground according to these plans.

The declaration that certain places should be treated as Archaeological Reserves is a step that is provided for in the Antiquities Ordinance.

But considering the fact that the ancient and hallowed Temple of Thiruketheeswaram is a place of religious importance and that the Temple premises house a number of buildings which are of imperative utility for the proper functions of the shrine we would urge on the Minister of Cultural Affairs to exclude all

those lands in and about the Temple from the particular order and the relevant regulation. The Thiruketheeswaram Temple Restoration Society has been engaged in the stupendous task of renovating and reconstructing the ancient Temple and providing for all amenities that are required according to Agamic pronouncements. The Himalayan work has only reached the first stage of restoration; much remains to be done. The entire Saiva public of this country together with devotees in India, Singapore, Malaysia, Indonesia, South Africa and other places have in Thiruketheeswaram a temple typical of their faith and belief and therefore have contributed several lakhs of rupees for the reconstruction.

## Inadequate Information!

Statistical particulars of those inoculated against cholera will not do. Full information regarding the particular areas in which there has been outbreaks of cholera including the number of fatal cases must be made available to the people to enable them take precautionary measures. The accounts of the spread of this dangerous disease appear to be conflicting. For instance; the Kankesanturai area was once reported to be afflicted by cholera but according to statements in the press the earlier information seems to be incorrect. In a similar strain reports had it that certain persons in Colombo had contracted the fell disease. The Health Authorities however state that it is not so.

In the meantime the public have been told that the theatres in Jaffna will be reopened although there is the announcement that three more cases have been detected. We do not see any reason why the cinema houses should be allowed to be reopened when the danger of the disease spreading further has not been ruled out. If according to medical reports the situation has not been fully brought under control, the better way would be to keep places of entertainmen-

closed for some more time. Strict supervision by Health Authorities must be ordered, particularly in restaurants refreshment rooms and other such places where articles of food are sold. The large number of school children who attend schools will have to take a risk if there is no restriction in entertainments and distribution of food.

## Praiseworthy Performance

The Atma Jothi Nilayam of Nawalapitiya deserves the approbation of all Tamils for the enterprising venture they had undertaken to have a Sinhalese version of the popular Saiva Vina Vidai of the Great Navalur released to the reading public. The rendering of the original in the Sinhalese language has been competently done by Mr. D. D. Nanayakkara, retired teacher. The translation would not have been a true rendering of the Tamil text had not Mr. Nanayakkara been a religious minded teacher with a thirst for true knowledge. That the Sinhalese-speaking people of Sri Lanka should learn and appreciate a primer of Saiva practice is certainly a lofty ideal. It has been well set by

Mr. Nanayakkara whose exertion in this unusual direction has won for him island wide appreciation. Knowledge in any language portraying any particular Faith is by itself a treasure. And treasures are common to all.

We are confident that this ennobling example will be followed by similar publications that will enable the people understand themselves in the proper perspective.

# THE EARTH AND ITS TREASURES

## Food Production An Important Duty

The Earth, the home of all living beings, has many bounties to bestow on its inhabitants with its picturesque natural scenery made up by the perennially-flowing rivers, vast mountain ranges, forests, fruit trees, flower trees, seas and oceans, each in its turn never fail to adorn the surface and contribute to the happiness of man. The lithosphere the hydrosphere and the atmosphere are the three different fields which afford facilities for man's activities and which have in their entrails hidden treasures, some discovered and much undiscovered. The continuous search for the hidden wealth and the secrets of nature has been done for generations and yet there seems to be an abundance of undiscovered wealth in the womb of the earth, in the bed of the ocean and in the atmosphere which pervades the space over us.

## Earth An Everlasting Source

The lithosphere or the solid crust of the earth has been providing man with food, water, clothing and shelter. It is the earth's soil with all its natural fertility remain as an ever-lasting source for obtaining food. The early man grew his own food. The gradual growth of civilisation and sophisticated life of man which weaned him away from his simple natural and healthy food showing preference for artificial food, leads him to the verge of poverty. The neglect of agriculture makes one country depend on other countries for food which the Mother Earth is ever prepared to yield in plenty to those who persevere hard in order to eat the fruits of their hard labour. This land of ours is rich in fertility, has plenty of water resources both tapped and untapped and has plenty of man power. The sloth and indolence resulting from easy life for several generations have plunged man into murky depths from where they should be awakened from their slumber and goaded to look for the treasures of the earth whether it be food, clothing, gold or any precious minerals. All the food that we require whether grains (such as rice or wheat or yams or fruits are the valuable gifts of the Mother Earth.

Only the will and the effort to grow them is what is wanted. Hunger, starvation and scarcity of food will drive everybody to grow whether he could in every available inch of land to make himself self-sufficient and that will ultimately bring happiness to him as well as to his country. It is said,

"Happy the man whose wish and care  
a few paternal acres bound  
Content to breathe his native  
air in his own land."

## Hidden Treasures

If the surface of the earth visible to us could supply all our wants, we cannot with certainty say what treasure has undiscovered in the interior of the earth. Precious gems, valuable minerals such as gold, silver, iron, tin and copper and the natural fuel such as coal and petroleum are other gifts of the earth in addition to the food and water which are the life-sustaining substances. It is quite evident that the raw materials for industries and all the food for men and other living beings are the bounties of the Earth which can be enjoyed to the full by the industrious and the diligent but are denied by the slothful and the indolent. The young men should devote all their energies for food production and the development of the land without remaining a burden to their parents. They should contribute their best for their own welfare as well as to the general prosperity of the nation.

The second field which could yield its natural bounties to man is the hydrosphere. About four-fifths of the earth's surface is covered by water. Perhaps, except the fish, man knows little of the marine beings whether at the depths of the ocean or on its surface. Through exploration of the sea bed its undiscovered wealth may, one day contribute to man's happiness and progress. The truth is well illustrated by the lines of Thomas Gray who says: "Full many a gem of purest ray serene, the dark un-fathomed caves of ocean bear." So the ocean could reveal its unknown treasures only if man could direct his attention to explore it in the way he is exploring the earth and the space above us in the ocean bed is not so visible to us as the other fields. We shall yearn for the day when the Nature's marvellous

bounties that lie deep in the sea would be brought to the surface for man's benefit and happiness.

The third field is the atmosphere which pervades the space - the air that gives life to all living beings has been the subject of research for scientists. The scientist who discovered the wireless

showed the possibility of transmitting human voice through air man has made persistent efforts through centuries to know the secrets of nature; yet nature remains unconquered though it has revealed some which stand as the marvels of this scientific age.

All learning and philo-

sophy will not be of an avail if man cannot find food, clothing and shelter which are the necessities of life. We can think of egalitarian society in consonance with the socialist ideals, if only a joint and sustained effort of all are put into operation to make our country a land of plenty with a view to driving away poverty, hunger and disease. Let every citizen consider food production as his important duty.

## Eight Points for Ensuring Immunity from Epidemics

1. Eat and drink only at home;
2. do not prepare and keep food in advance;
3. always use boiled water for drinking;
4. wash hands with soap and water before eating, cooking serving and also after visiting the lavatory;
5. always use a lavatory;
6. do not swim or bathe in tanks, ponds and rivers;
7. keep houses clean and eliminate flies;
8. consult a doctor immediately if there are symptoms.

capital importance and meant the initiation of a new era in world history.

Especially, it was an initiative, which even if it failed, could not be allowed to remain without a sequel but had to be taken up again until a successful solution safeguarded the future of mankind, not only against continued disorder and lethal peril but against destructive possibilities which could easily prepare the collapse of civilization and perhaps eventually something that could even be described as the suicide of the human race.

We live in a world of conflicts and yet the world goes on, undoubtedly because of the cooperation of the nations and individuals... even today between countries which are opposed to each other in the political or other fields there is a vast amount of cooperation. Little is known, or little is said, about this cooperation that is going on, but a great deal is said about every point of conflict, so the world is full of this idea that the conflicts go on and we live on the verge of disaster. Perhaps it will be a truer picture if the cooperating elements in the world today were put forward and we were

made to think that the world depends on cooperation and not on conflict.

The ultimate result must be the formation of a world-state and the most desirable form of it would be a federation of free nationalities in which all subjection or forced inequality and subordination of one to another would have disappeared and, though some might preserve a greater natural influence, all would have an equal status...

This is a mutable world and uncertainties and dangers might assail or trouble for a time; the formed structure might be subjected to revolutionary tendencies as new ideas and forces emerge and produce their effect on the general mind of humanity, but the essential step would have been taken and the future of the race assured or at least the present era overpassed in which it is threatened and disturbed by unsolved needs and difficulties, precarious conditions, immense upheavals, huge and sanguinary world-wide conflicts and the threat of others to come.

The ideal of human unity would be no longer an unfulfilled ideal but an accomplished fact and its preservation given into the charge of the united human peoples.
