## 'BULWARK AGAINST CHAOS IN ASIA'

### How Sri Lanka Becomes Helpful

THE impression of India, Pakistan and Ceylon as an "area of tranquillity" in that part of the world and as the last remaining bulwark against the tide of chaos and disorder sweeping across Asia, which he gained in previous visits to those countries was confirmed during a recent tour, Sir Percival Griffiths said in London recently. Sir Percival, who has had close association with the sub-continent extending over thirty years, was addressing a joint meeting of the East India Association (India, Pakistan and Burma) and the Overseas League on "Impressions of a tour of self-governing Nations of South East Asia".

#### Indonesia

After referring to Indonesia, from which country he said after observing the economic and political situation he came away with a gloomy view, he said he found a much happier state of affairs when he went on to Pakistan. He found a great degree of stability there and also a closer knitting together of East and West Pakistan than when he was there three years ago. Although there was Communist activity there, Communism was not a "major headache" in Pakistan. The problem there had been mainly an economic one with the food shortage. Pakistan like other countries in Asia had also suffered from the fall in prices following the 1950 boom. Pakistan was in great need of outside help and they in Britain wished to do all they could in that way. He wished however that Pakistan herself would make things easier in this connection. Business was not easy, for instance in the matter of remittance of profits home. Such difficulties arose not on a matter of policy—there was plenty of goodwill and a desire to help

on the part of Pakistan—it was often a question of procedure, "of finding the right person at the right time to sign the right form." As far as the economic situation was concerned the position seemed to have improved in the past few months and Pakistan seemed to be adjusting herself well to the new situation.

#### Sri Lanka

In Ceylon, Sir Percival went on he had found signs of a good deal of prosperity and plenty of good will. Ceylon economically was thoroughly sound. The advice of the World Bank team regarding Ceylon's development schemes, he said, put those schemes on a sound basis and if that advice were accepted he did not think Ceylon would have anything to worry about. Here as in other Asian countries Communists were extremely active with their propaganda but that they made little headway was due to a large extent to the excellent labour relations existing in the plantations.

#### India

In India the speaker said he found a political situation which he thought a much happier one than that existing six months ago. Communists in Travancore and Madras had received a setback after their election successes. In Madras Mr. Rajagopalachari was doing a grand job and it was widely stated that as long as 'C. R.' carried on there was no fear of the Congress Party losing its position in the Madras State.

In the economic sphere Sir Percival thought the most important event of the past three years had been the introduction of the "National Development Plan". It was "well written, interesting and full of sound common

## A Brotherly Spirit of Science

### For International Understanding

In the course of his inaugural address at the opening of the Electro-Chemical Research Institute at Karaikudi last week Dr. S. Radhakrishnan, Vice-President of India said that Science, Philosophy and Religion led to one goal namely the disinterested service to truth.

"The role of human welfare, which we have set to ourselves cannot be achieved without the aid of science and technology. The very spirit of scientific research demands that the knowledge acquired by it should not be put at the service of destruction. The discoveries of science are the products of intense and concentrated intellectual endeavour. Science demands of its votaries honesty and integrity of the most rigid type. It induces a sense of humility in the face of the mysteries of nature. Besides, it fosters co-operation among workers in the same field in different countries. A brotherly spirit of science makes for international understanding," Dr. Radhakrishnan said.

The branches of knowledge listed in the Chandogya Upanishad, the Philosopher said, included those, which had become later distinguished as knowledge of religion, philosophy and science. Those disciplines need not be at variance.

#### Wider than Materialism

"Philosophy is a disinterested pursuit of truth. It is not positive to metaphysics. Religion again is different from the fixed dogmas with which it is sometimes identified. Its role is the experience of reality. Science is something wider than the materialism it was thought to be in the 19th century. All these disciplines relate to the one role, of knowledge, nature of man and of spirit," he added.

From ancient times Dr. Radhakrishnan said, our country had been noted for its devotion to truth and learning. God Himself was said to be *Satya Swarupa*, *Satya Narayana*. They knew the famous Upanishadic phrase *Satyam, gnanam, anantam, Brahma*. Philosophy, science and religion had not been at variance and cross-purposes. The statement of the branches of

## VANNARPONNAI VAIDHIYESWARA SWAMI TEMPLE

IT would be interesting to know that about the time when most Hindu Temples were pulled down and razed to the ground by the Portuguese and later by the Dutch, this Temple appears to have been built in Jaffna.

#### Past History

One youngster by the name of Gopala Chettiar, who had migrated to Ceylon from Chola Nadu in South India found employment under one Kochchi Ganesha Aiyar, the interpreter to the then Dutch Governor, resident in Jaffna. After a short time, giving up the service under Ganesha Aiyar, he set up a business of his own in sundries and one of his customers was no other than the wife of the Governor. He put up a small temple for Ganesha—now called Vembadi Pillayar Temple—facing the K. K. S. Road and there performed his daily Pujas.

With the blessings of the Deity and the patronage of the Governor's wife, he was able to considerably enlarge his business and build up a large clientele.

His son, Vaitilinga Chettiar, a smart and pushy type of youngster succeeded in becoming the adapted child of the Residency. When he grew up, he became, sponsored by the Governor, the successful tenderer of the Pearl Fishery at Marichchikadde for 3 years in succession and made a fortune.

When he desired to put up a house for himself, an ascetic named Koolangai Thambiran, his family Guru, declared "you should first build a fitting abode to your Creator, Vaidhiyeswaran and His Spouse Theiyal Nayagi".

In obedience to this Vaitilinga Chettiar purchased a land and with due permission from the Dutch Governor laid the foundation of the present

Temple in the year 1787. Within 3 years, the building was completed and on an auspicious date in April 1790 the Deities, Vaidhiyeswaran and Theiyal Nayagi, were installed. With due rites and ceremonies, the first Kumbabishekam was performed and the temple thrown open to the worship of all devotees.

#### Other Temples

In addition to these, he was responsible for the building of (1) The Vembadi Pillayar Temple (2) Ayyanar Koil (3) Pidary Koil etc. For about 15 years, he himself administered these temples to the satisfaction of all concerned.

#### Trust

On 20-4-1805, by a deed of Trust, he bequeathed these Temples and its Temporalities to his two sons, Gopalachettiar and Kandappa chettiar and then left for Benares, where he later died.

In 1836 Vaitilinga Chettiar the second son of Kandappa Chettiar succeeded to the Management of the Temple. About this time one Sithambara Suppiab Chettiar appears to have donated a paddy land at Velanai called "Manan-gavalai" in extent 119 lachams and at Vannarponnai a land called "Pallivilithotham" in extent 113 lachams for the performance of pujas, out of that income, on certain auspicious days.

Then one Cholvanayagam Chettiar Thuraiappa Chettiar took up the management. Then with the authority of P. Kandappa Chettiar and S. Ramasamy Chettiar, the Nattukottai Chettiar's Nagaram (Society) looked after the affairs of the Temple from 1906 to 1914. Then came in Ponnusamy Chettiar as manager. With his death in 1939 P. K. Vaitilinga Chettiar controlled the affairs of the Temple. Since the death of Vaiti-

NATIONAL LANGUAGES— A NIGHT MARE?

IT IS A HISTORICAL FACT that before the threat of the Roma-Berlin-Tokyo Axis assumed a menacing proportion, the British Imperialist had been freely asserting that the colonies, particularly in the East, did not deserve to be given the right of self-government because, in his opinion, the people of Asia did not understand the art of Government. Perhaps the Vice-Chancellor of the Sri Lanka University has been suddenly reminded of the haughtiness of the hide-bound Imperialist of a decade ago. But it is a pity that Sir Ivor Jennings has conveniently lost sight of the fact that the imperialist of the Bureaucratic age lived to eat his own words and acknowledge the capacity of the Easterners to rise to as equal if not greater a height as that reached by the Westerners in the art of administration. If, however, the Vice-Chancellor in his capacity as an authority on Governments had occasion to make a disparaging remark about the ability of the people of this Island to conduct the affairs of the country in strict constitutional manner one would pause a little before crossing sword with him. But where the Vice-Chancellor rushed in to express an opinion on the richness of a language which he cannot ever hope to fathom one has only to conclude that he had impetuously dashed into domains that are not within easy reach of even angels.

The Tamil Language is masterly enough to maintain its majestic place anywhere. It is a language that has given to mankind the highest philosophy,

the richest literature, the subtlest art that human imagination can ever produce. Above all, it has enunciated the most scientific spiritual truths ever known to creation. To say of this sovereign tongue that it is lacking in vigour or vitality is a heresy which only one steeped in dark ignorance will have the hardihood to express.

The 'Swabasha' scheme may have scared a few sons of the soil of Sri Lanka who had been brought up in the rarefied atmosphere of Oxford and Cambridge; it may have opened the eyes of the foreign educational experts sojourning in this country to the re-appearance of an ancient effulgence which had been hitherto successfully screened off by the mighty smoke of imperialistic rule. But they who feel the fear running round their veins cannot certainly have the licence to libel a language, defame a culture and dishonour a nation. Whatever the barkings may be and from wherever they may emanate the Swabasha caravan will move on.

Said in jest or derision, the sweeping statement of Sir Ivor Jennings that the National Languages of this country do not possess as sufficient a literature as to make them entitled to become the media of instruction in the University of this Island is a challenge to the literati of the Tamil and the Sinhalese languages issued by one who has not the qualification nor the ability to determine the scope of these languages. Here is an opportunity for the scholars of these two languages to take up the gauntlet and prove to not Sir Ivor and those of his persuasion alone but to the wide world that both Tamil and Sinhalese have more literature of all kinds from picture books and nursery stories to psychological novels, metaphysical poetry, serious drama and intelligent literature generally to give students the broad ground of literacy which is needed at University level than any other language of the world, particularly the language spoken by the desperate challenger. And thus let those who talk with their tongues in their cheeks learn that sinister jibes and scornful jabberings will not be allowed to gain currency in this land of rich and glorious languages.

Letter to the Editor

Insufficiency of Tamil Language?

Sir, Sir Ivor Jennings' statement that 'there is not either in Sinhalese or Tamil enough literature to give our students the broad back ground of literacy which is needed at University level' is misleading. The fuller statement itself is couched in such elastic words that it is difficult to fix precisely the limits of the requirements which Sir Ivor intends. Coming, as it does from a Britisher whose knowledge of Sinhalese or Tamil is negligible and who is familiar with the modern trends of British Imperialism, this statement is apt to grate against the national sentiments of the Sinhalese and Tamils. However that be, the point to be considered is whether Sir Ivor whose ability is reckoned high, has been able, despite handicaps referred to above, to collect sufficient material, to come to a correct conclusion.

About the accusation that Sinhalese is inadequate, I would rather not speak. But in regard to Tamil I would state that Sir Ivor would have been wiser had he consulted his friends in the South Indian Universities on the gigantic strides Tamil Literature had made, following closely on the heels of modern English Literature, in matters ranging from "picture books and nursery stories to psychological novels, metaphysical poetry, serious drama and intelligent Literature generally" among other things, in recent times. Pray why "picture books and nursery stories" at University level. As for "metaphysical poetry" Sir Ivor's friends would tell him that even among the so-called classical languages there are very few rivals, in this respect, to Tamil. All this is not to say that Tamil is on a par with English, French or German. It is somewhat different in Literature covering recent developments in political and scientific thought. But it is good enough to make a start with. To have mentioned Tamil and Sinhalese in the same breath and dubbed them both as "insufficient," shows to some extent, the slipshod nature of the enquiries which Sir Ivor has made regarding the richness of Tamil Literature. Or is it political crooning?

knowledge given in the 7th chapter of the Chandogya Upanishad illustrated this.

#### India's Contribution to Science

Alvaruni, who lived for some years in India in the eleventh century A. D. had written in praise of India's contribution to science. Professor MacDonald had written: 'In science too the debt of Europe to India has been considerable. There is in the first place, the great fact that Indians invented numerical figures used all over the world. The influence that the decimal system of reckoning which depended on those figures, has had not only on mathematics but also on the progress of civilisation in general can hardly be over-estimated. During the 8th and 9th centuries, the Indians became the teachers in arithmetic and algebra of the Arabs and through them all the nations of the West. Thus, although we call the latter science by an Arabic name it is a gift we owe to India.'

Dr. Radhakrishnan recalled that Bertrand Russell had recently, in jest, remarked: "You Indians have contributed nothing to science." Dr. Radhakrishnan said Russell meant that "we gave to the world the concept of zero, which led to great advance in mathematics, *ganitha* and which we held to be the most basic and most important of all sciences."

#### Science—Now A Powerful Structure

"Science for the last 300 years has grown with astonishing rapidity. It has become an elaborate and powerful structure. It has had a profound influence on the development of human society. Some of our leaders are so startled and scared by rapid advances that they make fantastic suggestions to halt scientific progress and put a moratorium on it until our morals catch up with it. Leonardo Da Vinci was unwilling to tell all that he knew. He remarked of an under-water boat: "This I cannot divulge on account of the evil nature of men, who would practise assassinations at the bottom of the seas by breaking ships in their lowest parts and sinking them together with the crews who are in them."

"Advances in medicine and sanitation had made us relatively free of the diseases that used to afflict the human race. Think of the benefit that has accrued to us through penicillin, chloroform, telephone and aeroplane. Science is something wider than the materialism it was thought to be in the 19th century. All these disciplines—religion, philosophy and science—relate to the one role of knowledge, of nature of man, of spirit. The Goddess of Learning, Saraswati, has in her hands a many-stringed lute", Dr. Radhakrishnan said.

In conclusion Sir Percival said: "India, Pakistan and Ceylon continue in a remarkable state of tranquility and to show a remarkable degree of orderly progress. They represent the remaining bulwark against the rising tide of disorder sweeping over South and South East Asia. Because they are the last bulwark we freedom-loving countries of the West should go to the limit of our resources to help them, to assist them in making quite certain that Communism will not sweep across Asia. In helping India, Pakistan and Ceylon we are also helping ourselves. And when we are not only helping our very dear friends at the same time then the argument to strain ourselves to the utmost in our endeavours is very great indeed."
