If the West invents atom bombs and hydrogen bombs and hurls them at others, it does wrong; we should not do likewise. The monazite sands of Travancore should be u ilised to split the atom in a cheap way and to store atomic energy for peaceful purposes It is just here that the value of Divine Life comes in and that we can put "Fivaism" to the highest human uses"

"There is one class of magazines on sale which seem to us to be thoroughly objectionable. They are of trans-Shastras and it should be the period concerning the true. These publications are detlorable from every moral and aesthetic point of view, for their literary style is as crude as their subjec matter, and the advertisements they contain are hard y less objectionable than the stories.

> We have no means whatever of knowing how many of these magazines are sold in England, but the total numper must be considerable because they are sold throughout the country by one of the multiple stores, and they re often obtainable on book. stalls, and in street markets. and in a number of the smaler and low-grade bookshops: Whatever the number, however, we believe that the importation and sale of these magazines is undesirable. Their influence can be nothing but evil."
