Abrogation of Smuts -Gandhi Agreement

The South African Government decision to abolish the Smuts-Gandbi Agreement of 40 years ago which allowed the wives and minor children of Indians resident in South Africa to enter the country from India has been described as an "impotent gesture" by the Johannesburg STAR In an editorial the Paper said: "In throwing this sop to the anti Indian sentiment, the Minister of Interior Dr Donges indulged in some pre-election window-dressing by implying that the Government was getting rid of the obnoxious relic of pre-Nationalist policy". The Newspaper added:

"The abrogation is not of much significance to the Indo-South African relations and will have little effect on the Indian situation in Natal.'
