## ANXIETY AND OVERWORK BRING DISEASE

### Cause of High Blood Pressure

High blood pressure is a disease to which doctors give the more scientific name of "arterial hypertension."

This hypertension, or high blood pressure, may be associated with various diseases, or it may be present as a serious disease by itself.

When it is present by itself, we may call it essential hypertension and is this so-called "essential" form of arterial hypertension which will be discussed here

Persistent or chronic high blood pressure may be a very dangerous disease which can bring about heart failure, kidney insufficiency, and other serious results. Thousands die from this cause all over the world, and in our modern conditions of living, it is becoming more and more widespread.

#### The Three Factors

We recognize three main predisposing factors leading to essential arterial hypertension. One of these factors we call the familiar factor. This does not necessarily mean that a tendency toward high blood pressure is inherited—but we do notice that the disease tends to run in the same family.

Secondly we notice that sometimes the tendency towards high blood pressure is constitutional. Some people seem to have a natural weakness or predisposition towards this disease.

Thirdly, and perhaps most important of all, it is a disease of adaptation.

Before this third point is discussed, it is necessary to explain how the body normally regulates the pressure of the blood, and keeps any variation or fluctuation of the pressure within narrow limits.

This is done through reflex nerve actions, so that any increase or decrease in blood pressure stimulates the nerve

endings in certain special areas of the arteries causing them to expand or contract to compensate for fluctuations in blood pressure.

This is a kind of buffering or moderating mechanism which in normal conditions, operates automatically through the nervous system.

#### Emotional Stress

It is when disturbances of one kind or another upset this buffering or regulating mechanism, that arterial hypertension, or high blood pressure manifests itself. We very often find that such disturbances of the regulating mechanism are caused by conditions of emotional stress.

We know that anxiety, overwork, and occupation stress, if they act on the mind for prolonged periods have an effect on certain parts of the brain which in turn stimulate certain organs of the body known as endocrine glands.

In particular these stresses stimulate the adrenal gland to secrete certain hormones. These adrenal hormones, in turn, dislocate the mechanism which ought to regulate the blood pressure.

Ordinarily this interference with the regulating mechanism causes high blood pressure only when a person is continuously exposed to emotional disturbances and stress over a rather long period. Under the rather rapidly changing conditions of life to which most of us are exposed, the risk is much more serious.

High blood pressure is the price which rich industrialists often pay for their directorships, and the penalty which worried salesmen forfeit for their high commissions.

## Indian Professor's Contribution

### To Theory Of Relativity

Professor S. N Bose, Dean of the Faculty of Science, Calcutta University, has evolved some equations with regard to the General Theory of Relativity, which it had hitherto been believed impossible to work out.

According to his fellow scientists, Prof. Bose has been able to deduce some fundamental identities of the Unified Field Theory (General Theory of Relativity) in a general manner without introducing restrictions usually interested by previous workers in the field including Prof. Einstein that "all results in the Theory of Relativity should follow from rigorous solutions."

The Indian scientist is reported to have formulated his theory by utilising his new findings and verified the new formulation by showing that the usual equations in the electro-magnetic field can be obtained.

Prof. Bose made valuable contributions on "Quantum statistics" which have been appreciated by Prof. Einstein. His theory is known as Bose-Einstein statistics. A group of fundamental particles has also been named after him as "Bosons" by Prof. P. A M. Dirac Nobel Laureate of the Cambridge University.

Prof Bose left Calcutta last week to attend the World Peace Conference at Budapest as a special invitee. During his six months tour of Europe, he proposes to visit some well-known laboratories and universities in the Continent and to meet Prof. Einstein.

## DISCUSSION ON THE FEDERAL PARTY PROGRAM

### Federalist M. P. And Leftist Senator In Debate

AT the General Meeting of the Union Society consisting of the upper school students of the Manipal Hindu College held on the 12th of June 1953 at 8.30 p.m. at the college hall a debate took place, the subject being "That this house approves the policy and programme of the Tamil Arasu Kaddehchi". The proposition was led by Master Ganathan and supported by Mas. E. Neshrajasingam and Mr C Vanniyasingam M.P. The Opposition was led by Master A. T. Thiagaraj and supported by Master N. Vivekanandaram and Senator P. Nagalingam.

Mr. Vanniyasingam contended that the Leftist parties and mainly the L. S. S. P. has not always supported the Tamils. He said that Dr. N. M. Perera who maintained during the flag debate that the adoption of the lion flag an arbitrary imposition on the Minorities did not however cast his vote on the side of the opposition. He said that the Tamils with a territory of their own and speaking a different language formed a separate nation and therefore should have a state of their own. He said that it was not true that his party ever advocated affiliation with South India.

Senator Nagalingam in his reply said that the voting on the parliamentary debate that took place in 1948 on the question of India franchise unmistakably showed that the Tamils of the Jaffna district were not the sole advocates of the Indian Franchise. As a matter of fact 4 out of 7 Jaffna members voted with the Government. But there were over 40 votes of the opposition members which supported the Indian Franchise. The Indian News papers at that time maintained that the voting clearly indicated that with the

change of Government when a leftist Government was in power undoubtedly justice would be done to the Indians.

It was extremely preposterous for the Tamil Arasu Kaddehchi to put forward the claim that as distinct from other Ceylonese and other parties they were the sole custodians of Indian liberties.

The L. S. S. P. believes in first achieving Socialism and thereafter leave it to the self determination of the Tamils to decide on the form of Government they would have. Their elected representatives in a constituent assembly will sit with other Ceylonese and draft a free constitution.

When voted upon the proposition was declared lost by 43 votes to 14.

## Who Is An Indian Citizen?

A number of enquiries have been received in the High Commission for India in Ceylon, consequent on the publication in a section of the local press, of a letter issued by the High Commission to an applicant for an India-Ceylon Pass. The question relates to the definition of who is an Indian citizen.

The High Commission wishes to make it clear that a person does not lose his Indian domicile by merely being absent from India for purposes of employment or business or any other similar activity. A person who was in Ceylon on 26th January 1950 but who was domiciled in India on that date continues to be an Indian citizen, provided he is otherwise qualified. The question of domicile has, however, to be determined by the authority concerned.

# British Press on Soviet's Motives

Writing of what it calls in the headline "Stirrings in Russia", the London Times says: "If nothing had changed inside Russia since Stalin's death the Western world could easily dismiss the changes in the Soviet tactics abroad as propaganda and window dressing. In fact a great deal is changing inside Russia. Evidence of it accumulates day by day and, when internal and external developments are compared, they are seen to have much in common and to spring from much the same motives. There is as yet no overt sign of any departure from Stalin's fundamental policies. His successors think and behave as Communists at home and abroad. Yet there is beyond all doubt a departure from many of his practices and tactics. There is a revulsion against the autocratic rule that characterised him, against the bleakness and harshness of a regime that stifled initiative within the Soviet Union, and against the rigidity and dangers of a foreign policy that aroused the free world to stand in arms against the Soviet Union. It is as if the new leaders of Russia proclaimed that, much as Russia owes to Stalin, he became too set in his ways, too suspicious, too heavy-handed. They act as though convinced that a little lighter hand at home and abroad will bring greater benefits and fewer dangers to themselves and to the Communist cause."

After citing from the Communist Press instances of criticism of the adulation of Stalin and of the "abhorrence of personal rule in Stalin's native Georgia," the Times proceeds: "These it may be said, are the only straws in the wind, and how far the wind will carry them cannot be known. It may be said, too, that emphasis is put on the need for collective decisions because none of Stalin's immediate successors is of his stature, that they are making a virtue of necessity, that the real struggle for succession has not yet begun, and in the meantime they are prudently holding each other's hands. The full truth cannot be known, but provisional interpretations fall far short of explaining the persistent doctrinal insistence on

collective responsibility and the thorough-going denunciation of a personal rule. The denunciations are made with the force of men who have endured such rule in the past and saw it prolonged until it had a deadening effect. Stalin's successors are, without any doubt, as hard-headed and as shrewdly calculating as Stalin himself. They do not want to alter the fundamental structure of the regime; but they do act as though they wish it to work more smoothly and more lightly and, therefore, more efficiently. This is why they emphasise collective responsibility, while at the same time promising more consumer goods for the workers, and laying new stress upon the rights of the individual before the State. The Russian internal policy, like the Russian external policy, is in a tentative and inquiring phase; and in both there is a general sense of something bigger afoot than the actual evidence warrants."

"The way of the penitent is not easy," remarks the Daily Mail. Russia's newfound benevolence in Eastern Germany has not been greeted with universal joy in the West. It has aroused suspicion. This is a healthy reaction. Individuals may act through pure idealism but nations are rarely altruistic. It is always necessary to seek motives for their conduct, especially with Russia. The virtual repudiation of Communism and the reduction of armed strength in Eastern Germany are interpreted as a Soviet bait to lure Western Germany away from the Atlantic Alliance. Russia's object, it is said, is to set up a united and neutral Reich." This may indeed be the prelude to the withdrawal of Soviet troops from East Germany, to be followed by propaganda against the West, with the hope of bringing about the situation of Soviet troops still on the doorstep of Germany and Americans 3,000 miles away. But concludes the Daily Mail, "when all the pitfalls have been pointed out...there remains the possibility that the Russians genuinely desire peace. We should not neglect that possibility."

Few mortals have passed away with greater dignity and consideration for his fellow-men than Socrates, who after he had swallowed the hemlock and his senses were growing dim remembered a debt. "Crito" he reminded "we owe a cock to Aesculapius" with these words he died.

Sir Walter Raleigh just before placing his head on the block examined the Executioner's axe with interest. "This gives me no fear" he smilingly remarked "it is a sharp medicine to cure me of all my diseases."

Robert Louis Stevenson, who lost his power of speech as he lay gasping on his death bed, reached out for a pencil and wrote "Don't be frightened. If this is death it is an easy one."

Bernard Shaw is reported to have said "I am tired—I want to sleep" And perhaps no man earned his rest more truly.

Blake, an artist, managed to sit up on his bed supported by bolsters. Holding an old painting of his at arm's length, he touched and re-touched it. His wife was in tears. "Stay Kate", he pleaded "Just as you are. I will draw your portrait—for you have been an angel to me." With a few deft strokes he completed it. That work and those words were his last.

Currin, the famous 8th century Irish lawyer died wittily. He was told by his Doctor that he was coughing somewhat easier than before. Even at death's door Currin was witty "In faith" he murmured "I have been practising all night."

Another wit, Lord Holland, lay on his death-bed when his friend Selwyn called to inquire after his lordship and left his card. When on waking Holland was told of the visit, he said sarcastically "If Mr. Selwyn calls again, pray show him into my room. If I am alive I shall be glad to see him. If I am dead, I am sure he

will be delighted to see me."

If reports are to be credited, the late King George V of Britain according to some, appears to have whispered. "How's that umpire?" which was perhaps in keeping with a vast sporting fraternity, and that when the UMPIRE with the Scythe raised his finger he bowed to the fatal decision. Others aver that he questioned "How's the Empire?" and that only when he was assured that everything was well, did he fall back and release his spirit.

# VIVEKANANDA SOCIETY ACTIVITIES

## Vidyalayam Makes Vast Progress

The following passages taken from the Annual Report of the Colombo Vivekananda Society show the progress made by this Hindu Religious Association during the year.

From very small beginnings this important activity of the Society which was inaugurated nearly 23 years ago with the object of encouraging Hindu children to take an active interest in the study of our great religion, has now assumed great proportions and has gained island-wide popularity. The Annual Examinations—the twenty second conducted by the Society—was held during the year on Sunday, the 26th October, 1952. A record number of 5791 candidates from 87 schools and 2 Approved Societies sat for the examination, of whom 2089 were successful.

School prizes to all eligible candidates and consolation prizes to those who showed special merit were also awarded in addition to special prizes.

### Vivekananda Vidyalayam

The Vivekananda Vidyalayam has completed 27 years of useful work. Starting its career in 1926 with 25 pupils and 2 teachers at a time when there was not a single Hindu School in the metropolitan of the Island with a preponderating Hindu population, the Vidyalayam has today grown to the remarkable position of being the largest Swabasha school in the whole Island. With a staff of 28 teachers and 1032 pupils on the roll, the status of the school has been raised to that of a Senior Secondary School. There are 16 students in the S. S. C. Class and permission has been obtained to present them for the G. C. E. Exami-

nation this year. The question of new admissions presented a formidable problem in view of the large numbers seeking admission and the inadequacy of floor space. In order to make the school serviceable to those genuine students who were suffering for want of schooling facilities, a weeding process was carried out during the year and names of pupils who were absent for a period of over two months without valid reasons were removed from the register and their places were given to deserving applicants. A system of admission by means of written applications was also introduced at the beginning of the school year in 1953. In spite of all these efforts we regret to have to report that a large number had to be turned away for want of accommodation. The members in particular and the Hindu public in general are perhaps not aware of the great handicaps under which the staff is carrying on the day to day work of the school. The available floor space is so much crammed up with classes—in some cases with 45 to 50 pupils in each class—that the teacher is compelled to seat 8 to 10 pupils on a bench intended for a maximum of 5 students. This state of affairs has to be remedied before long if the teacher is to do his work satisfactorily and the students are to benefit by their education.

The teaching of Hindu Religion occupies a prominent place in the Vidyalayam curriculum and every effort is being made to impart a sound religious education.
