"What kind of work do I want to do?" Do you turn that question over in your mind from time to time as you advance in your high school studies? Do not be too disturbed if you haven't yet decided on a lifetime career. Remember, most other young people of your age face similar problem. You need not immediately decide on your vocation, but you should begin to do some good hard thinking on the question. Your search for a career begins with a study of you. Until you have a clear idea of your own abilities and interests, you cannot even start to make an intelligent decision about your future.

If you live in a large city or near a college or university, you may be able to take some of the psychological tests that are designed to help guide you into the work for which you are best suited. Nearby offices of state will also help you along this line. Ask your teacher for information as to how these government and mercantile offices recruit hands. Whether or not you take an aptitude test, you should keep these and other questions in mind when deciding on a career:

- 1 Do you prefer to work with your hands or your mind? Most professional positions require more mental work than physical while the opposite is true in many trades.
- 2 What are your vocational goals? Are you looking for a career in which you can achieve maximum satisfaction for yourself and perform a maximum service for others, even though this occupation might not give nearly as high financial rewards as certain others? Or is your chief aim to make money, regardless of the factors? It is important to answer these questions honestly as you consider such public-service careers as teaching, nursing, and government service.

### THE POLITICAL BOSS!

In one of his inspiring speeches at the Avadi session of the Indian National Congress Shri Nehru aptly drew a distinction between the political leader and the political boss and went on to warn the people of the dangers of the latter being encouraged particularly in democratic countries. 'A person who captures leadership by various methods which are not desirable' is the description given by Shri Nehru of that pseudo-patriot who throws himself forward among the people with the one and only purpose of gaining personal power in the guise of service to the public.

The existence of the political leader along with the political boss may be a dangerous combination of circumstances but where the latter alone holds sway masquerading in the garb of a political leader the result would be a national tragedy. Examining the situation in this Island we cannot deny the fact that there were political leaders. But equally true it is that this illustrious generation of patriots has been succeeded by a different line of leadership very much bordering on 'boss development'. It may be due to the fact that this country has no national organisation of the strength and significance of the Indian National Congress with a great tradition of sacrifice and service to boast of. However, it is disheartening to note that leadership of the present day has been unimpressive. The moral stature of those at the

helm of affairs must be such as to inspire confidence in the minds of the people.

Recent developments in the Island in almost every sphere have been disappointing. Political 'bosses' seem to have more power than the real leaders of the people. And this reprehensible development of power politics in an infant nation like Sri Lanka cannot but lead to misgivings and misunderstandings and eventually to mass dissatisfaction. The menace of power politics must be wiped out. This can be effected only if the common man makes a determined effort to act in the cause of the country.

### WISDOM DAWNS!

The high prestige that has been enjoyed by the judiciary has been the distinguishing feature of free Sri Lanka. But quite unexpectedly and most unfortunately certain developments arose recently to make the common man wonder. However, we are glad that the Premier had helped in the readjustment of matters. Our observation is that those in authority should not wait till wisdom dawns upon them; they should be wise, or even worldly wise so as not to precipitate crises.

### Indian M. P's Visit Ceylon

A group of five Members of the Indian Parliament arrived in Colombo on January 24 for paying a friendly visit to this country and to establish personal contacts with leading citizens and members of Ceylon legislature. ## THE APPOINTMENT OF CHIEF JUSTICE

IN the colonial days the Attorney General of Ceylon took precedence of the Puisne Judges and became Chief Justice when the post fell vacant. The Soulbury Commissioners while expressing a wish that the Attorney General should be a minister following the British practice have made no recommendation that he should have prior claim to Chief Justiceship. On the retirement of Justice Howard, the claims of the Attorney General Sir Allan Rose were passed

### ALL'S WELL THAT ENDS WELL

On the Premier's advice the Minister of Justice has reversed the previous arrangements consequent on the retirement of Sir Alan Rose and announced that Mr. Justice Nagalingam would act as Chief Justice till his retirement in normal course.

Mr. Justice Nagalingam withdrew his papers of retirement.

The original arrangement was that Mr. H. H. Basnayake, Attorney General, should act as Chief Justice. This announcement was followed by Mr. Justice Nagalingam's retirement with immediate effect.

Now the practice of giving priority of claim to the Attorney General is not without some constitutional anomaly. In Great Britain the Attorney General is always a minister without a seat in the Cabinet and he goes out of office with the Cabinet. His office confers no claim to a seat on the bench. In India the

# RAJAJI ON 'FURTHERANCE OF WORLD PEACE'

Shri C. Rajagopalachariar seconding the resolution on Foreign Policy spoke at the subjects committee meeting of the Indian National Congress as follows:

## NECESSARY NEUTRALITY

The international policy of India had been described by outsiders and by some of our own people as a policy of neutrality. "I can assure you," that when anyone calls it a policy of neutrality he intends to express his disapproval of it to some extent. That is why I began by explaining that it is not a mere policy of neutrality but a definite positive policy to further peace in the world."

The main object of their Government led by Mr. Nehru had been throughout the furtherance of world peace. Neutrality ordinarily began and was based on a sense of impartiality and desire not to interfere in the quarrels of other people. Nobody would imagine that our Prime Minister did not interfere in the quarrels of other nations. "The complaint is that he interferes too much with foreign affairs. However, the nations have seen now the advantage of such interference so much so that they now call upon him to interfere in their quarrels. Experience has shown that the policy followed by the Government of India in international matters and the motive which India has had in such policy have proved useful to the world and to every nation therein.

"I do not wish to justify our attitude even on the ground that America had an isolationist policy once. America was isolationist purely from a selfish point of view, so her own affairs may not get unnecessarily complicated. Our neutrality has developed its full meaning. It has been clearly understood that we have been incessantly working for the furtherance of world peace.

"Let not the delegates imagine, that we wish to boost our achievements. The achievements are there and people may appraise, them as they like. But we are humble about it. The condition of the world is such that what we have achieved is very little, although from another point of view these achievements are very big. War is so bad that even a postponement of war is a great achievement. Such success that we have achieved in preventing war or settling disputes has a great value for the people concerned.

They should approve of the policy followed by the Government of India so that for many more decades to come it would be acted upon. Otherwise their work could not be completed. Neutrality, as he had explained, was "only a means" "only a means

to the end of the furtherance of world peace

Their attitude should not be likened to that of the cat on the wall attitude. That would be a miserable position to take. They could well claim that they had changed the entire position of Asia in international affairs. The former position of Asia, as the battleground for competing Powers had changed now. Asia now presented her own case to the world. He did not want to create a mutual admiration society here. But he did not think there was anybody ignorant of the fact that the one person who was responsible for this position more than anybody else was their Prime Minister. The passage of time and events had shown and as the full consequence of their position had unfolded itself every one now could see that the position and attitude India had taken had served world purpose. We have served ourselves very little. We have served the world. It is only when we serve others that we can grow big and even, it may be said, that we can live at all for the structure of nature is such that anybody or nation which is useless to others is simply wiped out after a little time.

There were many things which India had achieved in the constructive field like the building of great dams and embankments. But every one of them had been begun even while the Britishers were here and therefore, there was a continuity in them. But so far as achievement in the international sphere was concerned and so far as Free India's achievement in furthering world peace was concerned, it was entirely an achievement of Free India and the present Government of India. There was nothing that we have followed from previous history or built on previous history.

## KEEP NOT TIGERS TO WATCH HOUSES

"Our appeal in this resolution to the nations is also a matter of great importance. The greatest danger now was war. That was No. 1. The next point to be considered was the manner in which that war, if it came at all, was to be fought. The whole world was with them in their agitation to restrict the sphere of war. Our Prime Minister had been given full co-operation by the rest of the world. But in one matter he had not been given that co-operation which he thought we should claim and that is in the machinery that they used for winning war and carrying on war. The relevant part of the resolution in this connection is regarding the new nuclear weapons.

The A and H bombs that the rival Powers now possessed were more terrible than anything that our fiction writers could describe in connection with devils and demons. The actual facts had surpassed the imagination of our story-tellers. Without knowing the scientific details one could say that these new weapons carried with them cataclysmal consequences, not destruction and therefore it was that we said that they had passed beyond the range of what might be called weapons of war and we had to protest against any further experiments in making or trying them for the purpose of using them. These weapons should not be made, stored or used. We appeal to the Powers concerned to stop thinking about these weapons or making experiments with them. Experiments in any bad thing were bad because they were experiments in bad things. But in the present case, experiments themselves were bad. They were producing great harm to the health of the world as a whole. If this was continued no war was necessary. By the mere preparation for war, we shall be much worse off, because of the miserable conditions it would create. Luckily there were signs that these experiments were likely to be stopped, not because they were bad but because they were successful.

Referring to his recent statements in the Press on the subject, Rajaji said that it was an appeal on moral ground which only individuals could make. It was difficult for the Government or even the Congress which was running the Government to make. This appeal was that the world should combine and that all nations

should co-operate with one another to come to an agreement that these weapons should not be used and should not be manufactured. He was not a military Chief of Staff. But even babes could teach some wisdom to people who were running in a wrong direction.

When the flexibility of an offensive weapon was gone it could no longer be used as a weapon for retaliation, as a weapon for defence. He could keep a dog to watch his house but could he keep a tiger to do the job? Any claim by one side or the other that this was defence against wickedness of the opposite party was a meaningless claim. It could not be a defence at all. It was only a weapon for creating terror and that terror was created by each side. Would you like to take the initiative and kill the tiger or would wait for the tiger to pounce upon you before using your gun? Similarly, the tiger would not wait for the gun to discharge. That was the position of the parties opposed to each other and that was the special danger in this kind of weapon. It was not a case with a cannon or even with a submarine or even air bombing. Once it was used they were finished and there was no time for retaliation. The man who used it first finished. We strongly protest against this in this resolution unanimously and strongly.

## THE LATE MR. PETER MORTIMER

### AN APPRECIATION

Jaffna has lost a great social worker in the passing away of Mr. Peter Mortimer J. P., C. C. S. He was a grand example of what a man can be if he is only honest and persevering. Joining the Clerical Service at the age of 17 by dint of hard work and integrity he rose to the highest post open to a Clerical Servant. Promoted to the Civil Service he assumed duties at the Jaffna Kacheri in 1929 as Extra Office Assistant. He held this post till he retired in 1935 after 43 years of service. During the War he was called for Emergency Service and in 1942 & 1943 he was Superintendent of Food Supply. Inheriting the traditions of service from his grand father the late Rev. Thomas Mortimer and his father the late Mr. Henry Mortimer, Chief Clerk of the Master Attendant's Department, Mr. Mortimer was ever willing and ready to give of his best to any social cause that needed support. From the time he came to Jaffna he was a member of the Jaffna Friend-in-Need Society and later was elected its Vice President. He was not content with merely attending Committee Meetings of the Society. It being one of the oldest Societies in the Island with a proud record of service, Mr. Mortimer was anxious to inspire the younger generations with the same spirit of service. He delved into the records available at the Jaffna Kacheri and wrote a short but very inspiring account of the work of the Society for 95 years.

The King George Jubilee Home for the Aged found in him an ardent supporter. He was its Hon. Treasurer for 10 years. The Jaffna Library another important institution in Jaffna was at one time languishing for want of an energetic Secretary and Mr. Mortimer ably managed its affairs and registered the Library under the Society's Ordinance.

He never believed in allowing his talents to grow rusty. He threw himself heart and soul in food production and was a guide, philosopher and

friend to several enterprising Jaffna men who ventured out to Kilinochi. Farming at that time in those parts was risky not only from the financial angle but also from the point of view of health. Many a pioneer Jaffna Middle Class Farmer ventured out to those areas only to lose all his capital and to die of black water fever. Not content with being a gentleman farmer, Mr. Mortimer made a special study of food production in the Vanni and was well posted up with all information on the scientific aspects of farming. He made copious notes on the production of a Vocabulary of Tamil, Sinhalese and English names of the common plants and herbs of the dry zone.

An ardent Church worker he was a tower of strength to St. John's Church Chundikuli. He was Vicar's Warden and Treasurer for 20 years. Mr. Mortimer was not a man who tried to catch the limelight of power and therefore his quiet, unostentatious work went by unrecognised. For all his grand services to the State and to his country he was conferred the title of J. P. in 1946 and was awarded the Coronation Medal in 1953. His was a life that deserved higher honours.

The average Government Servant has always his initiative and powers of leadership stifled and stunted by long years of humdrum office work. When he retires he is a flaccid, unimaginative, yes-man. Mr. Mortimer was a noble exception. He felt that the civic affairs of his Ward needed a champion and he was a member of the Urban and Municipal Councils for six years.

Straight as a die, a sincere friend, a generous Christian, dependable and persevering, Mr. Mortimer's life is an inspiration to the younger generations. His large circle of friends will miss him but to live in hearts we leave behind, is not to die.

## PROGRESS OF MALARIA CONTROL

Organized attempts to control Malaria in Ceylon may be said to have commenced with the appointment of the first Malariaologist in the year 1921.

The next decisive step towards the progress of the work was taken in 1937 with the inauguration of the Malaria Control and Health Scheme, when the whole Island was divided into 105 Health Areas each with its own Health Officer, an important part of whose duties was the control of malaria in his area.

The disease however continued unchecked taking its annual toll of life. Threefourths of the country was ridden by this scourge and attempts made at the time to reclaim and colonise these parts invariably ended in failure.

Then came the epoch-making discovery in 1939, of the remarkable insect killing powers of DDT. It was first introduced for civilian use in Ceylon during the latter part of 1945.

In 1946 a regular campaign was launched to kill the Malaria carrying mosquito in Ceylon by spraying dwelling houses with this substance.

By the end of 1947 this campaign had expanded to cover the whole of the malaria stricken areas of this country and DDT protected even the remotest village in these parts. About 300 tons of DDT was being expended annually and 30 Trucks, 6 Jeeps and 37 Walking Units had been established.

All those who are living in malarial areas are now familiar with these Malaria Control Units.

## A STUDY OF THE SVETASVATARA UPANISHAD

(By A Science Graduate)

(Continued from our issue of 21-1-55)

## Fourth Adhyayam (Contd.)

16. Whoever knows Sivam, which is extremely subtle like the essence of refined ghee and concealed in all creatures, the all pervading One,—whoever knows (this) Devan gets liberated from all bonds (Sarva Pasam).

Some of the averments of these verses are repetitions of truths and pious hopes given utterance to in earlier Sruties reiterated here with a view to emphasise their importance, while others are so self-explanatory that it seems unnecessary to expand on them here. We may however cite a Siddhiyar verse which gives expression to some of them in still more emphatic language:

உலகினை திரிந்து கின்றது தான்-உரு எப்பது ஓர், உலகு அவன் உருவில் தோன்றி ஒடுங்கிடும் என்றும் ஓர், உலகினுக்கு உயரும் ஆதி, உலகும் ஆய் கின்றது ஓர், உலகினில் ஒருவன் என்பர், உருவினை உணர்வர் என்பர்.

They know not that God's Form transcends the world, they know not that the world originates from and merges into His body, they know not that He is the life of (motive power behind) the world and that He appears as one with the world,—those who do not understand His nature say that He is one of (the ordinary souls in) the world.

We wish to draw the reader's attention to one other point of importance before proceeding further. When studying a previous Sruti (II, 8), we stated that the words 'Mriyu' and 'Anavam' were often used as synonyms in Agamic literature, the connotation of both terms being practically identical, and translated 'Mriyu' as 'bondage' and not as 'death' as done by other translators. That our view is the correct one is amply borne out by the use of the word 'Pasam' side by side with the word 'Mriyu' in verse 15 here. Just as we speak of the three kinds of Malam as Anava Malam, Maya Malam, and Karma Malam in Tamil the Sruti speaks of this bondage as Mriyu Pasam in this verse and of all bondage as Sarva Pasam in the immediately following verse 16.

17. This God (Devan), the Architect of the Universe (Visva-Karma), the Supreme Soul (Mahatma), ever dwelling in the hearts of the people—by love (Hrida, heart) and concentration of mind (Manasa Manasa) is He discovered. Those who know Him become Sivam (Amritam, deathless).

The second half of this verse is found repeated in Katha Upanishad (II, 6.9), and the reader's attention is drawn to our remarks in the study of that Upanishad (Vedanta Moola Saram, Chapter XX). The reader's attention is also drawn to our remarks regarding the word 'Amritam' in our study of the Jabala Upanishad (Chapter VII of the same publication), where we made copious quotations from the Tamil to support the statement implied in that Upanishad that 'Amritam' was a synonym of 'Sivam'. We may here add that Sivam is called 'Amritam' not only because it is deathless, but also because it is 'Amalam' or taintless. Mriyu being a name for Anava Malam, the deadliest of the three Malas and hence often referred to as Malam without being preceded by the word Anavam, Amritiyu or Amalam means devoid of Anava Malam. Our readers will no doubt recall to their minds in this connection that God is very frequently addressed by our Devara and Tiruvachaka hymnists by such names as Amalan, Nimalan, Nirmalan, Vimalan (அமலா போற்றி, நிமலா போற்றி, &c), the idea in all cases being that God is pure, not tainted by impurity of any sort. Even similar is the use of the epithet Amritan. And when it is said that a holy man becomes Sivam or Amritam or Brahm, the idea that is intended to be conveyed is that he attains the blissful state, the state of deathlessness or taintlessness, the Supreme state.
