PRACTICAL RELIGION FOR ALL

It is generally said these days that the problem of religion is hardly a matter of concern for the people, that religion has, in fact, ceased to be a problem. The immediate problems are, rather, economic, social and political. International tension is caused by the clash of political ideologies, not because of religious dogmas. The minds of the people are in ferment due to social inequity and economic class war. Religion is being gradually pushed away from the lives of the people, except, more or less, in a conventional sense.

If, however, one would pause to think of the basic cause of most of the problems of life, it would be found that all of them are due to a lack of religion, or its practical unfoldment in the daily conduct and activities of man. The complaint that there is already too much of religion is baseless, although new churches, temples and mosques are being built continuously. Man has unfortunately lost the sight of the wood amidst the trees of mechanical conventions. Religion has gone out of the lives of the people, though they continue to visit churches and temples. This is the root cause of all the problems that confront mankind today.

Religion is focused into various institutional modes that are diverse in accordance with the historical, cultural and psychological backgrounds. But religion cannot merely be a set of scriptural injunctions on rituals and conventions, which must always, be subservient to the cultivation of a universal consciousness, in the light of the practical realisation of one's relation to God and the Universe. It is true that allegiance to some beliefs and observance of a few rituals could be termed practice of a particular religion, but if they do not lead to a harmonious self development and the dawn of divine consciousness, their

purpose is of no great importance.

The pivot of religion is a perfect ethical life, with an abiding faith in the existence of a common all pervading, sustaining governing and unifying spirit, through the realization of which one comes to really know oneself and all. Practice of religion is the practice of righteousness, goodness, justice, truth, love and purity.

The righteous man is the truly religious man. One may meticulously perform religious devotions, and yet be very irreligious at heart and in conduct. The cruel and the untruthful can never be religious. The ringing notes of religion are: "Be good. Be good. Be pure. Be kind. Be compassionate. Serve all. Love all. See God in all." The practice of these precepts alone will awaken man to the consciousness of the unity of existence and the realisation of the divine spirit within and without.

Religion loses its basic purpose if it does not aim at self-realisation if it does not bind man to the cosmic whole, and enable him to act in the light of the understanding that he is a part of the whole, is governed by the fundamental law of cause and effect, and is trying to fulfil the common purpose of the various constituents of the whole, as his ultimate objective behind all his endeavours. If one is able to attain this basic realisation then whatever one does will be performed as Karma Yoga, selfishness having been completely eradicated from the heart. All actions would then help and complement one's efforts for spiritual unfoldment.

Practice of religion puts one in consonance with the law of truth and love, which would show one the way to the attainment of all that is noble and

good. Religion should be a living experience in the life of man. Unless the heart opens up, and is purified and enlightened with the bright rays of divine knowledge and experience, unless the soul is imbued with a burning love for the entire creation of God, unless one is ready to sacrifice one's little self and willingly offer to serve the needy, console the distressed, cheer up the depressed, give hope to the forlorn, unless these remain to be effected then the practice of religion has, indeed, failed in its purpose.

Intolerance, practised in the name of religion or in the name of one's spiritual pursuits, is the worst form of vice. Practice of religion presupposes a deep, abiding understanding of the nature of things. One may consider the differences, but to enter into disputes on account of them and say that this is superior and that is inferior, to indulge in caprices and have a biased attitude, would only indicate that one has a primitive mind. It takes all sorts to make this world. God alone is the only good which is permanently good. Nothing else is good for all times and bad for ever. No one is good at all times and no one is bad for ever. No one is good, except the realised saint, and no one is completely bad. Even the worst sinner has some good qualities, and even the best of men have some weaknesses. Therefore, never have a biased mind.

The spiritual aspirant, who thinks others to be bad or impure, would find, on introspection, that there is a good deal of badness and impurity in him. One who turns up one's badness on others is but fighting shy of one's badness. Have an open mind, and improve yourself. Then you would find that others have already improved themselves. Practise, before you ask others to be pra

Religious & Moral Education

(Extract from 'National Education'
by Mr. N. Sabaratnam)

Few will dispute the fact that religious and moral education plays a vital role in the growth of character. Opinion may be divided, of course, on whether religious instruction should be imparted in state schools. The state is secular, they say, and as such should not actively assist in the approval of any particular religion. While this is true, it does not imply that because the state is secular there is no place for religion in the state school.

In the new set-up, the State is planning to provide religious instruction to pupils according to the tenets of their faith. The problem is simple in schools where all children belong to one particular faith. Where children of different faiths are mixed, it would become a Babel of Creeds. Whatever that be, the benefit of such instruction will be derived not from its being treated more or less on the lines of classroom instruction but from the spirit of the school and the influence exercised by the teachers. The development of the religious consciousness is not, and cannot be, the subject of a syllabus. It is a growth from a life that is lived. It is obvious that intangible spiritual values come not so much from what teachers say and teach, from curricula and examinations, but from what they are, and what they are seen to be, inside and outside the classroom. The Norwood Report mentions that a wise and famous headmaster once said that the rules for a school master were as simple to state as they were hard to fulfil; they were only that he should know what he wanted his boys to know, that he should be what he wanted his boys to be, and that he should add enthusiasm. On this depends mainly the religious life of the school. Properly organised religious instruction, may supplement the influence and improve the climate prevalent in the school

community. In a residential school which commands the whole life of the school it would be easier to fulfil programmes of religious education. But even the day-school can do much. It can make of morning assemblies something of which the school can be proud, if the pupils are trained to take part in general non-denominational prayers offered in song and speech.

Sierra Leone Independence

Instruments Presented

The Duke of Kent, who as the Queen's special representative presented the instruments of independence to Sierra Leone on April 27, visited the site of the new Parliament building in Freetown. He told the gathering that the building "represents the challenging assertion of your faith as a free people in the supremacy of elected representatives of the people for many years to come."

The Duke added: "Unity, freedom, justice is the triple aspiration which appears on your coat of arms. Within these walls decisions will be taken which will make a reality or a mockery of these words. God grant wisdom to all those who guide the destinies of Sierra Leone in this place."

The new Parliament building is due for completion in 18 months. It will be of modern design with balconies overlooking the city of Freetown and the harbour. In the words of the Speaker of the Sierra Leone House of Representatives, the Hon. H. J. L. Boston: "The oldest council in this part of Africa will be meeting in a worthy setting which many will envy."

Later in the day the Duke of Kent attended a State banquet in Freetown and a searchlight tattoo.

PROPHET OF INTERNATIONALISM

The Centenary of the birth of the Bard of Bharat whose intellectual inspiration to humanity reached an international level is being celebrated most appropriately in all parts of the world. The period during which Poet Tagore lived and embellished literature acquired a rare prestige as the golden age of genius and patriotism. In this contribution to the culture of the world Mahatma Gandhi and Poet Tagore played very important parts though not in identical ways.

As a poet of international fame, Dr. Tagore represented the culture of the ideal man and reflected the glory of Hindu thought in a universal setting. The lofty ideals of human greatness found lyrical expression in the noble life of the Poet. The sweetness and serenity of his poems revealed a richness of spiritual elegance which though significantly Hindu in content was yet universal in character.

The lives of Gurudev and Gandhiji have a permanent significance. The Poet's patriotism was as intense as his plea for world citizenship. His political poems and speeches portray the patriotic mind. Once he declared in deliberate language "whether the people of England listen to our piteous cries or do not listen, our country is our country eternally, the land of our fathers and our sons and descendants, the giver of life to us, the giver of good."

The remarkable achievements of the Poet have enshrined his name in the heart of humanity. Hence the Universal Celebration of the Tagore Centenary.

SHEPARD ON HIS SPACE TRIP

America's first manned space flight was a success because everything connected with it "was very, close to what was predicted."

This appraisal of his 16.5 minute flight into space at 5000 miles an hour was provided at a news conference Monday by Navy Comdr. Alan B. Shepard Jr., who made that historic journey in a Project Mercury capsule.

Shepard, shot into space by a Redstone rocket Friday from Cape Canaveral, Florida, landed exactly as planned 300 miles out in the Atlantic Ocean. About five minutes later he was retrieved from his parachute-equipped capsule.

When asked at his news conference whether he encountered anything

different from what he was led to expect during prolonged training, Shepard replied:

"It was very, very close to what was predicted... I wasn't uncomfortable or embarrassed at any time during the flight... everything worked fine."

Shepard, poised and modest as he faced scores of newsmen and the television cameras, emphasized that "hundreds of persons," not himself alone, were responsible for the success of his flight.

Shepard's press conference followed receptions at the White House and on Capitol Hill and a motorcade through the city to the cheering of thousands. Shepard and the six other U. S. astronaut-trainees, arrived by jet plane in the morning and together

with members of Shepard's family were flown from the air field to the White House in helicopters. There President Kennedy presented Shepard with the Distinguished Service Medal of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration. The full membership of Congress and many other high-ranking dignitaries were invited guests at the reception later in the Capitol building where the U. S. Congress meets.

Shepard told the news conference he was "very proud" of the manner in which the Mercury program was planned from the start.

"All in all, we are very much pleased with the flight," the astronaut said. "We are very much encouraged by it, and we plan to press ahead with the best possible speed to the successful completion of Project Mercury as we now know it."

On the platform with Shepard were the six other astronauts-in-training who are scheduled to have key roles in Project Mercury.

James E. Webb, administrator of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration, opened the news conference with a statement.

"The historic Project Mercury flight on last Friday was a dramatic demonstration before the eyes of the world of how the United States space team, through effective large-scale organized effort, can pass one very important milestone on the long road toward the mastery of the space environment by man."

Shepard reported that, using the periscope in the capsule, he was able to see about 800 miles of the eastern United States coastline except where it was obscured by clouds.

It was this sight during his space ride Friday that prompted him to exult over his radio equipment: "What a beautiful view."

Shepard told newsmen that he suffered no great stress during the space flight.

"All of the transitions from the booster acceleration through cut-off were just relatively gradual," Shepard added. "I was really quite pleased with the smoothness of it all."

He explained that those connected with the Mercury Program were in "complete agreement" with the project as laid out.

rushed the program, but we chose not to."

Asked to describe the "next goal" for the manned space program, Shepard turned the question over to Webb to answer.

"Of course, we are going to try to expand the use of the Mercury capsule into extended flights," Webb said.

"Then we have programs for the exploration of the environment around the earth, around the moon, in between the two. We have plans for the Apollo three-manned orbiting laboratory, and this is capable of expansion to make a three-manned trip around the moon and return."

"Of course, the same vehicle or parts of it will be used for the effort of the first lunar landing, so there is an orderly process from which we learn from each step and move on to the next."
